AGREEMENTS SETTLED IN APRIL

- In April, 47 collective agreements were ratified, each covering 200 or more employees. These agreements covered 46,536 employees, 84% of whom were in the public sector (39,134).
- The overall average annual increase in base wage rates in April was 2.7%, down slightly from 2.8% reported in the previous month. In the public sector, 32 agreements were settled for an average annual wage increase of 2.8%, down from 2.9% in March. In the private sector, 15 agreements were settled with an average annual wage increase of 2%, a decrease from 2.2% reported last month.
- Major settlements in April included three 36-month agreements between York University and the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE), covering 3,200 graduate teaching and research assistants, and contract faculty. Each agreement provides an average annual wage increase of 3%. Carleton University and Carleton University Academic Staff Association (CUASA), representing 812 librarians and academic staff, settled a one-year agreement for a wage increase of 3.1%. District school boards and the Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) settled 20 agreements, covering 24,215 permanent and occasional elementary teachers. The four-year agreements provide average annual wage increases ranging between 2.5% to 3.9%. The City of Ottawa and the Firefighters' Association settled a 36-month agreement, providing 926 firefighters with an average annual wage increase of 3.3% over two years and wage parity with Ottawa police agreement in the final year. In the utilities sector, Ontario Power Generation reached two agreements with CUPE, representing 7,705 nuclear and non-nuclear employees. Each three-year agreement includes an average annual wage increase of 3%.

SELECTED SETTLEMENT SUMMARIES *

Kraft Canada Inc. (Lakeshore Bakery) and Bakery, Confectionery, Tobacco Workers & Grain Millers International Union, Local 426 (700 employees)

a four-year renewal agreement, effective May 1, 2009, expiring April 30, 2013

- general wage increases of \$0.50 in each of the first three years, and \$0.55 in the final year; signing bonus for eligible employees
- improvements to life insurance, pension plan provisions, and health care benefits

Ontario Power Generation Inc. and Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 1000 (7,705 nuclear and non-nuclear employees)

two, three-year renewal agreements, effective April 1, 2009, expiring March 31, 2012

- wage increases of 3% in each year
- improvements to health care benefits, and various leaves
- increases to pension contributions
- modifications to grievance procedure and arbitration provision

City of Ottawa and Ottawa Professional Fire Fighters' Association (926 employees)

a three-year renewal agreement, effective January 1, 2009, expiring December 31, 2011

- wage increases of 2.2% on January 1, 2009, 1% on August 1, 2009, 2.25% on January 1, 2010, 1% on August 1, 2010; for the calendar year 2011 a 1st class Firefighter is to receive the same across-the-board economic wage increases that are provided to the Ottawa 1st class Constable and on the same effective dates
- improvements to health care benefits
- amendments to vacation and sick leave provisions
- increase in automobile allowance
- Letter of Understanding regarding a joint Recommendation Committee to develop a revised promotion system

Perley Rideau Veterans' Health Centre and Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 870 (500 RPNs and service employees)

a three-year renewal agreement, effective September 29, 2006, expiring September 28, 2009

- wage increases of 2.75% in the first year, 3% in the second year, 2.6% in the third year
- increased standby pay, shift and weekend premiums, and vacation entitlement
- improvements to health care benefits, and separation allowance
- modifications to the voluntary exit option, uniform allowance, and various leaves

SELECTED SETTLEMENT SUMMARIES *

York University and Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 3903 (1,750 graduate teaching assistants [unit 1], 950 contract faculty [unit 2], and 500 graduate research assistants [unit 3])

a three 36-month renewal agreements, effective September 1, 2008, expiring August 31, 2011

- general wage increases of 3% in each year
- improvements to health care benefits, various funds, and paid leave provisions
- continuation of tuition protection
- enhanced job security for contract faculty
- new employment equity language, including language relating to the development of an employment equity plan, surveys, and a new self identification provision for Unit 2

Upper Grand District School Board and Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (1,362 teachers)

a four-year renewal agreement, effective September 1, 2008, expiring August 31, 2012

- wage increases of 2% in each of the first and second years and 3% in each of the third and final years
- improvements to extended health and dental plans benefits
- modification to staffing and class size allocation as per PDT agreement; teacher preparation time to increase to 240 minutes over a five-day week by end of fourth year
- maximum supervision time will be 80 minutes within each period of five instructional days
- The "Instructional Day" shall not exceed 300 minutes commencing with the start of instruction, and ending with the students' dismissal from school for the day exclusive of recess and lunch/nutrition breaks. Opening exercises are included as part of the Instructional Day

The increases do not necessarily reflect the average increase for each member of the bargaining unit.

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
