

Collective Bargaining Highlights

AGREEMENTS SETTLED IN JUNE

- ▶ In June, 24 collective agreements were ratified, each covering 200 or more employees. These agreements covered 44,469 employees, 80% of whom were in the private sector (35,417).
- ▶ The overall average annual increase in base wage rates in June was 1.6%, down from 2.2% reported in the previous month. In the public sector, nine agreements were settled for an average annual wage increase of 2.5%, unchanged from May. In the private sector, 15 agreements were settled for an average annual wage increase of 1.3%, an increase from 0.5% reported last month.
- ▶ Major settlements in June included two 36-month agreements with Bombardier Aerospace (de Havilland and Regional Aircraft Divisions, Toronto) and the Canadian Auto Workers (CAW-Canada). The settlements provided 3,060 production and office employees with average annual wage increases of 2.4% and 2.1%, respectively. General Motors of Canada Ltd. and CAW-Canada negotiated an agreement in effect until September 17, 2012. The agreement, covering 10,500 production employees, freezes hourly wage increases, and initiates COLA adjustments in June 2012. The Treasury Board of Canada and the Professional Institute of the Public Service of Canada settled two four-year agreements covering 2,624 Ontario-based employees, for average annual wage increases of 1.7%. The Regional Municipality of Durham

(Long Term Care Homes) and the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) reached a settlement covering 1,021 employees, for an average annual wage increase of 2.8% over four years. A centrally bargained Participating Nursing Homes settlement with the Ontario Nurses' Association (ONA) included an agreement with Extendicare (Canada), covering 409 employees. The settlement provided an average annual wage increase of 3.4% over two years, including retention and recruitment adjustments.

SECOND QUARTER 2009 SUMMARY

During the second quarter of 2009, 124 collective agreements were ratified, each covering 200 or more Ontario-based employees. These agreements covered 180,224 employees, 70% of whom were in the public sector (Table 1). By industry, the majority of employees affected were in education and related services (79,713), followed by transportation equipment (24,240), recreational services (15,290), federal government (11,578), provincial government (9,798), and local government (9,441) (Table 3).

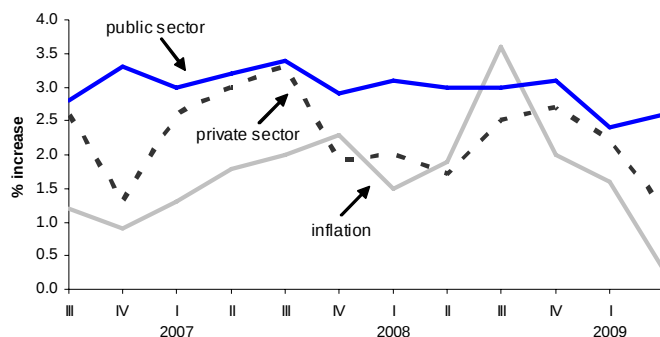
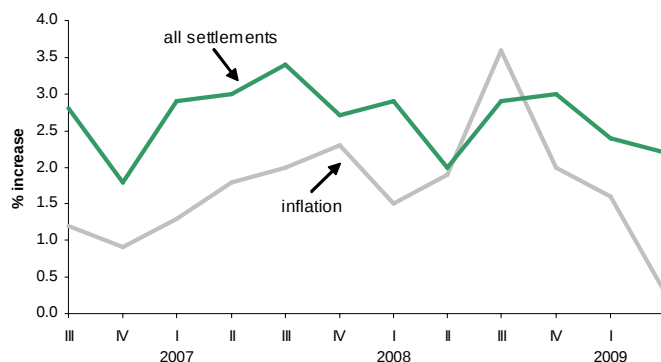
Wage Adjustments

Second quarter settlements provided an overall average annual wage increase of 2.2%, a slight decrease from 2.4% in the previous quarter. In the public sector, the average annual wage increase was 2.6% compared to 2.4% last quarter, while the private sector reported an average annual wage increase of 1.2%, a decrease from 2% in the previous quarter. During the second quarter of 2009, average annual wage increases were affected by settlements in education and related services (2.7%), transportation equipment (0.3%), recreational services (2%), and federal government (1.7%) (Tables 1-3).

In the second quarter of 2009, approximately 50% of all employees received average annual wage increases ranging from 2% to 2.9%, compared to 22% who received increases ranging from 3% to 3.9%. In the public sector, 53% of employees received average annual wage increases ranging from 2% to 2.9%, compared to 45% of private sector employees. Also in the private sector, 8% of employees received average annual wage increases ranging from 1% to 1.9%, while 42% of employees received no wage increases.

Of the total number of employees who reached an agreement during the second quarter of 2009, 47% were covered by four-year agreements and 37% were covered by three-year agreements. Approximately 64% of public sector employees were covered by four-year agreements, while 48% of private sector employees were covered by three-year agreements. In the manufacturing sector, 27% of employees were covered by three-year agreements compared to 55% of non-manufacturing employees who were covered by four-year agreements (Table 4).

Negotiations

On average, private sector agreements were settled within 3.8 months from the start of negotiations, compared to 7.4 months in the public sector (Table 5).

Of all settlements reached during the second quarter, 81 agreements covering 75% of employees were settled directly by the parties, compared to 32 agreements, covering 19% of employees that were reached through conciliation or mediation. Five agreements were settled by arbitration and six agreements were settled following work stoppages.

In the public sector, approximately 76% of employees reached settlements in direct bargaining, while 17% settled through conciliation or mediation. In the private sector, 73% of employees settled by direct bargaining compared to 23% of employees who reached agreements through conciliation or mediation. (Table 6).

Upcoming Bargaining

Major negotiations continuing into the third quarter of 2009 include the federal government, municipalities, universities, hospitals, nursing homes and homes for the aged, Police Services Boards, Bell Canada, Vale Inco, Cara Operations (various Swiss Chalet Franchises), and A & P Canada.

Major agreements scheduled to expire during the third quarter of 2009 include the College Compensation & Appointments Council (academic), universities, and hospitals.

Work Stoppages

During the second quarter of 2009, 39 work stoppages under Ontario jurisdiction were reported, compared to 40 reported in the same period in 2008. In terms of the number of employees and person-days lost, work stoppages during the first six months of 2009 involved 35,155 employees and resulted in 399,770 person-days lost, compared to 13,241 employees and 101,660 person-days lost reported for the same period last year.

From January to June 2009, 17 work stoppages were reported in the manufacturing sector, a slight increase from 16 during the same period last year. In comparison, the non-manufacturing sector reported 22 work stoppages during the first six months of 2009, a slight decrease from 24 reported during the same period last year (Table 7). During the first six months of 2009, 0.06% of the estimated working time in Ontario was lost due to work stoppages (Table 8).
