

Highlights of Second Quarter 2013

September 26, 2013

Population Growth

Ontario's population reached 13,537,994 on July 1, 2013, with growth of 39,892 people in the second quarter of 2013. This compares to growth of 43,476 in the same quarter of the previous year.

Births and Deaths

Births and deaths increased by 1.0% and 3.2%, respectively, from the same quarter of 2012.

Natural increase (births minus deaths) was 12,881 in the quarter, down slightly from 13,249 in the same quarter of 2012.

International Migration

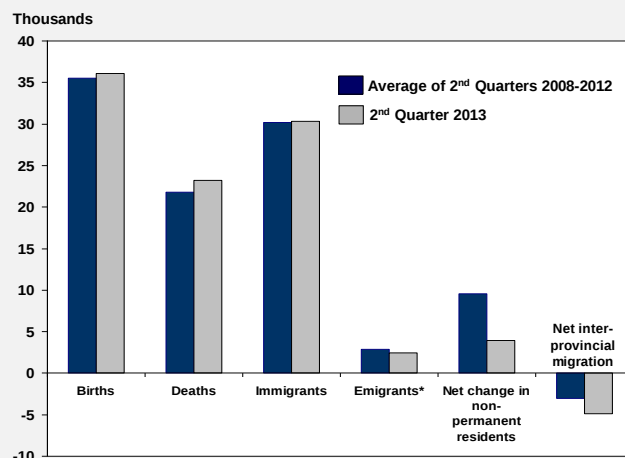
Immigration to Ontario was 30,337 in the quarter, up 9.3% from the same quarter of the previous year. Ontario received 40.2% of all immigrants to Canada in the quarter, up from 38.0% in the same quarter of 2012. Over the last 12 months Ontario received 105,818 immigrants, up from 101,287 during the previous year.

There were 2,427 emigrants from Ontario in the quarter, little changed from 2,406 in the same quarter of the previous year. Ontario accounted for 33.9% of all emigration from Canada in the quarter.

The number of non-permanent residents in Ontario (NPRs – i.e. foreign students, visa workers, refugee claimants) increased by 3,949 to 286,024 in the second quarter.

In summary, net international migration was 31,859 in the second quarter, down from 35,118 in the same quarter of 2012.

Interprovincial Migration

In the second quarter of 2013, Ontario had a net loss of 4,848 people to other provinces compared to a net loss of 4,891 people in the same quarter of 2012. Ontario experienced net gains in its exchanges with five of the 12 other provinces and territories, with the largest net gains from Quebec (2,278) and the Nova Scotia (154). Ontario's largest net losses were with Alberta (-5,977) and Saskatchewan (-783). Over the last 12 months, Ontario's total net interprovincial migration loss was 21,323 compared to a 10,611 loss during the previous year.

Year-Over-Year Growth

Over the last 12 months, Ontario's population grew by 126,000 or 0.9%, lower than growth of 148,450 during the previous year. Among the provinces, Alberta and Saskatchewan had the highest population growth rates (3.5% and 1.9% respectively). Canada's population growth rate over the period was 1.2%.

2. Except for Canada, projections are produced by the Ontario Ministry of Finance (Spring 2013). Projections for Canada are from Statistics Canada (based on 2006 Census).
3. Total dependency ratio is the ratio of the population aged 0-19 and 65+ to the population aged 20-64.
4. Total Fertility Rates and life expectancy estimates are for calendar year, and projections are for census year. Life expectancy estimates for years after 2005 represent three-year averages (e.g., 2008 reported life expectancy corresponds to the average recorded over 2007-2009).

6. In the "Components of Change" table, flows are for the 12-month period July 1 to June 30. Net international migration is calculated as the net balance of immigrants, net emigrants and net non-permanent residents (NPRs).
