

Highlights of Second Quarter 2014

September 26, 2014

Population Growth

Ontario's population reached 13,678,740 on July 1, 2014, with growth of 38,553 people in the second quarter of 2014. This compares to growth of 48,500 in the same quarter of the previous year.

Births and Deaths

Births increased by 0.8% and deaths increased by 3.7%, from the same quarter of 2013.

Natural increase (births minus deaths) was 11,929 in the quarter, down from 12,486 in the same quarter of 2013.

International Migration

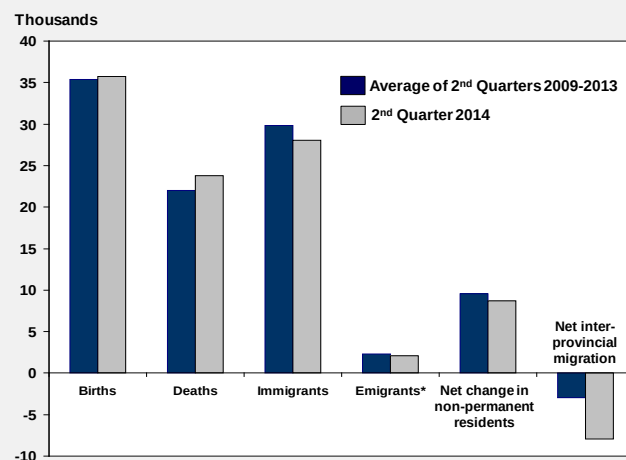
Immigration to Ontario was 28,028 in the quarter, down 7.9% from the same quarter of the previous year. Ontario received 35.9% of all immigrants to Canada in the quarter, down from 40.2% in the same quarter of 2013. Over the last 12 months Ontario received 101,841 immigrants, down from 105,910 during the previous year.

There were 2,121 emigrants from Ontario in the quarter, slightly up from 2,061 in the same quarter of the previous year. Ontario accounted for 32.1% of all emigration from Canada in the quarter.

The number of non-permanent residents in Ontario (NPRs – i.e. foreign students, visa workers, refugee claimants) increased by 8,675 to 308,071 in the second quarter.

In summary, net international migration was 34,582 in the second quarter, down from 39,119 in the same quarter of 2013.

Interprovincial Migration

In the second quarter of 2014, Ontario had a net loss of 7,958 people to other provinces compared to a net loss of 3,105 people in the same quarter of 2013. Ontario experienced net gains in its exchanges with three of the 12 other provinces and territories, with the largest net gains from Quebec (1,557) and Manitoba (119). Ontario's largest net losses were with Alberta (-5,839) and British Columbia (-1,533). Over the last 12 months, Ontario's total net interprovincial migration loss was 13,980 compared to a net loss of 13,901 during the previous year.

Year-Over-Year Growth

Over the last 12 months, Ontario's population grew by 127,811 or 0.9%, lower than growth of 140,847 during the previous year. Among the provinces, Alberta and Saskatchewan had the highest population growth rates (2.9% and 1.7% respectively). Canada's population growth rate over the period was 1.1%.

4. Total Fertility Rates and life expectancy estimates are for calendar year, and projections are for census year. Life expectancy estimates for years after 2006 represent three-year averages (e.g., 2006 reported life expectancy corresponds to the average recorded over 2005-2007).

5. Families and households are Census data.

6. In the "Components of Change" table, flows are for the 12-month period July 1 to June 30. Net international migration is calculated as the net balance of immigrants, net emigrants and net non-permanent residents (NPRs). Components may not add up due to existence of residuals.
