LTVCA Holds Annual Meeting

The Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority (LTVCA) held their

Annual General Meeting the evening of February 23 at the Administration Building in Chatham. Brian King was re-elected as Chair and Bill Scott as Vice chair, both for their second term. Mr. King and Mr. Scott are also municipal councillors for Chatham-Kent.

The 2006 budget of \$1,661,231 for the LTVCA received approval at the meeting. Funding sources include 33% in general levies, 14% for infrastructure in water related capital projects with matching grant from the Province, 29% in Federal and Provincial grants, 22% in revenues from program and services fees, and 2% in grants from the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Foundation. New to the Board for 2006 is Mr. Ron Doane, Director for Strathroy-Caradoc. (continued top next page)

The LTVCA staff gave several presentations and reports throughout the evening including one on Source Water Protection, another on the Generic Regulation and also their 2005 Annual Report. Highlighted was the planting of over 75,000 trees across the watershed in 2005, and grants available to landowners for tree planting and habitat restoration. Also noted was the LTVCA's involvement with species at risk recovery strategies for the Thames River and Lake Erie. Monitoring groundwater and surface water has been ongoing and this information will facilitate the development of a Source Water Protection Plan, an agreement among the people and municipalities of a watershed about the ways to protect water quality and quantity. The partnerships that the LTVCA made in the local community for conservation projects were also well emphasized. Conservation areas and the educational programs of the LTVCA were examples of opportunities for the public to enjoy, learn and respect the natural environment. All reports were well received by the Directors who provided constructive comments on behalf of their respective municipalities.



Staff are beginning work on the Water Budget component of the Source Water Protection Plan. The water budget will form part of the Watershed Characterization Report. There is a budgetary allotment at the Provincial level to undertake "Intake Protection Zone" studies or evaluations. Within the LTVCA, there are intakes at Wheatley, Erie Beach and Eagle. It was proposed to the Province that the intakes at Wheatley and Erie Beach be undertaken in a package with the intake at Union, between Leamington and Kingsville. The intake at Eagle is suggested to be done alone. The requests were submitted to the Ministry of Environment by the end of January. We understand however, that none of the proposed evaluations in our area were approved during this round of funding. We are also anticipating conclusion of the six Conservation Authority Groundwater Modeling study soon. The results of this model will be important to the production of the Water Budget portion of the Source Water Protection Plan.

Source Water Protection Calendars for 2006 were distributed to watershed audiences in January. The maps from the calendars are available on the SWP web site. Other communications products and initiatives include a newsletter, speaking engagements, and displays circulating within the Thames, Sydenham and Region SWP Region.

Generic Regulation -

Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alteration to Shorelines and Watercourses

The LTVCA went before the Provincial Technical Review Committee regarding the Generic Regulation on November 1, 2005. Comments were made on:

- the mapping of watercourses that have no apparent valley as they relate to low level flooding under regional storm conditions
- the Regulatory Flood Standard of the Conservation Authority and
- maps to be more sequentially indexed

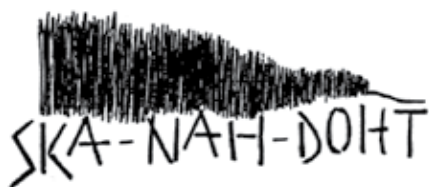
A special information meeting regarding the Generic Regulation was requested by Chatham-Kent and held on February 7, 2006. The LTVCA and SCRCA gave presentations. Concern at the meeting revolved around policies and procedures the Conservation Authority (CA) would use in administering the new regulation, especially along the shoreline areas where the CA's had no previous regulations. CA staff prepared draft, proposed, operational guidelines that we can use in administering applications under the regulation. These were presented to the Board of Directors at the February meeting. Staff are in discussions with neighbouring CA's to create somewhat seamless policies and procedures concerning the new Regulation. The LTVCA has also better defined the regulated area along the shoreline in Chatham-Kent, West Elgin and Dutton/Dunwich.

Community Support Flows to Village

A \$60,000 Job Creation Partnership (JCP) program with Services Canada has been granted to help with projects in the Village. A crew of five will be working on a new palisade maze, a lookout platform to view the marsh and begin preparations to build a new longhouse at Ska-Nah-Doht. The crew will also work with the Eastern District Supervisor, Dave Little to obtain a variety of training certificates while learning more about the local environment and heritage. One unique feature of this project will be the archiving of the activities in the village.

In 2005, the Walter J. Blackburn Foundation of London donated \$5,000, the George Lunan Foundation donated \$1,000 and the S.M. Blair Family Foundation donated \$1,000 towards Ska-Nah-Doht's capital restoration project.

MEMORIAL FOREST PROGRAM

memories live on



There are six Foundation memorial forests located in the Lower Thames watershed. By planting a tree, we preserve precious memories and encourage the preservation of nature for future generations. We are grateful to the McKinlay Funeral Home of Chatham, the John C. Badder Funeral Home in Thamesville and the Badder & Robinson Funeral Home in Bothwell for their continued support of our memorial forest program. With the assistance of the Tilbury & District Horticultural Society, a new memorial forest grows at the Tilbury Northside Memorial Forest. Friends and family dedicate trees by contacting the Conservation Foundation, requesting a memorial forest donation card and making a \$30.00 donation for each tree. Next of kin receive a memorial certificate, and an invitation to an annual memorial forest service. Individual trees are not identified, however records are kept of all donations.

'Partners in Conservation'

Education programs offered by the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority out of Longwoods Road Conservation Area, require ongoing support from private funding sources. The Foundation invites service clubs, local businesses, other charitable foundations and private citizens to become 'Partners in Conservation' by donating towards the education programs. Donations received help to maintain trails, supply educational equipment and materials, and support the hiring of summer staff for the Conservation Authority.

Trail Sponsorship Program

Our Foundation invites groups such as churches, youth organizations, schools, local businesses and corporations to support the nature trails at Longwoods Road Conservation Area. There are 6.5 km of trails, two of which are wheelchair accessible. The park is visited by 30,000 visitors annually and is also home to Ska-Nah-Doht, a recreated Iroquoian village of one thousand years ago.

Donations provide stone chips for wheelchair accessible trails, maintenance of boardwalks and stairs, trail pruning, signs and information.

Ska-Nah-Doht Restoration

In 2005, the Walter J. Blackburn Foundation of London donated \$5,000 towards the Ska-Nah-Doht Iroquoian Village restoration project. In addition, the George Lunan Foundation and the S.M. Blair Family Foundation of Toronto donated \$1,000 each towards the same project.

Applying for Trillium

Directors intend to submit an application to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for the July 1st deadline. The funding will be used to restore the three heritage log cabins at Longwoods Road Conservation Area.

Cobban Donation

In December, Mrs. Audrey Cobban, donated \$4,500 to the Foundation to be split between Longwoods Road and Sharon Creek Conservation Areas for use on capital development or summer student help. Her generosity is greatly appreciated!

Conservation Services Initiatives - Tree Planting, Habitat Restoration Projects

In the West

Randall VanWagner - Environmental & Forestry Partnership Coordinator, and Bob Pennington - Environmental Technical Assistant were hired through Services Canada to work at LTVCA in Chatham until the end of 2006. The project costs are \$188,000 including wages, and the LTVCA's costs for materials and training. This 50 week project began in January. They will provide technical information, do site inspections, assist landowners with application forms, and seek other grants for restoration/reforestation projects within the watershed. Tree information sessions about the LTVCA's tree planting program were held at the municipal service centres in Tilbury, Chatham and Ridgetown. This is a cooperative program between the LTVCA, Chatham-Kent, St. Clair Region Conservation Authority, Stewardship Kent and other local groups. The LTVCA will look for future funding for these two positions, to extend the program into and beyond 2007.

In the East

Lawrence Sturgeon, Paul Verelli, Arlene McEvoy, Ron Orr, and Michael Latham were hired at Longwoods Road Conservation Area to assist the Ska-Nah-Doht Iroquoian Village Curator with the restoration of the Village, create an archival record of Village activities, help with the spring forestry program, and work on other conservation area projects in the eastern watershed. The project costs are \$65,000, including wages through the Job Creation Program of Services Canada, and the LTVCA's costs for materials and training. This 26 week project will end in July, with an anticipated extension to October.

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) Update

Landowners in Chatham-Kent and Essex, within the LTVCA's watershed, that received a "Notice to Dispose" (issued by the CFIA on or before March 31, 2006 requiring removal of host ash trees to prevent the spread of the invasive pest EAB) can order replacement trees through our office. They will receive a receipt from the LTVCA to submit to the CFIA for compensation. The applicant must purchase and plant non-host replacement trees on the same property, complete and submit the application to the CFIA on or before December 31, 2007 and include their Notice to Dispose and the original receipts for the replacement trees. The application form is available from the Essex District Office, CFIA 360 Fairview Ave, W., Essex, On, N8M 3G4, Tel: 1-866-463-6017. It is anticipated that manpower to help with the planting of replacement trees will be available through a Services Canada Program.

Tree Planting Program

Order forms for spring tree seedlings are available at the LTVCA in Chatham. Seedlings range in size from 4 - 20 inches and in price from \$0.57 to \$1.50 (plus gst) for plugs and bare root stock. A minimum order of \$50 and 10 seedlings per species are required. The cost is \$50 per day plus taxes for the LTVCA tree planter rental.

The CFIA has continued surveying for EAB in Lambton County, Chatham-Kent and Elgin Counties as well as high-risk sites in Middlesex and Haldiman-Norfolk Counties. A quarantine five kilometers around an emerald ash borer infestation in Dutton/Dunwich will include properties in West Elgin. A quarantine prohibits movement of ash off individual properties. The quarantine stretches from Graham Road to Willey Road, Stalker Line and Duff Line to the north and Talbot Line to Thomson Line in the south. CFIA staff continue to stress the importance of not moving firewood or ash wood materials from the quarantine areas and are working with the logging industry and general public to prevent the movement of potentially infested materials. 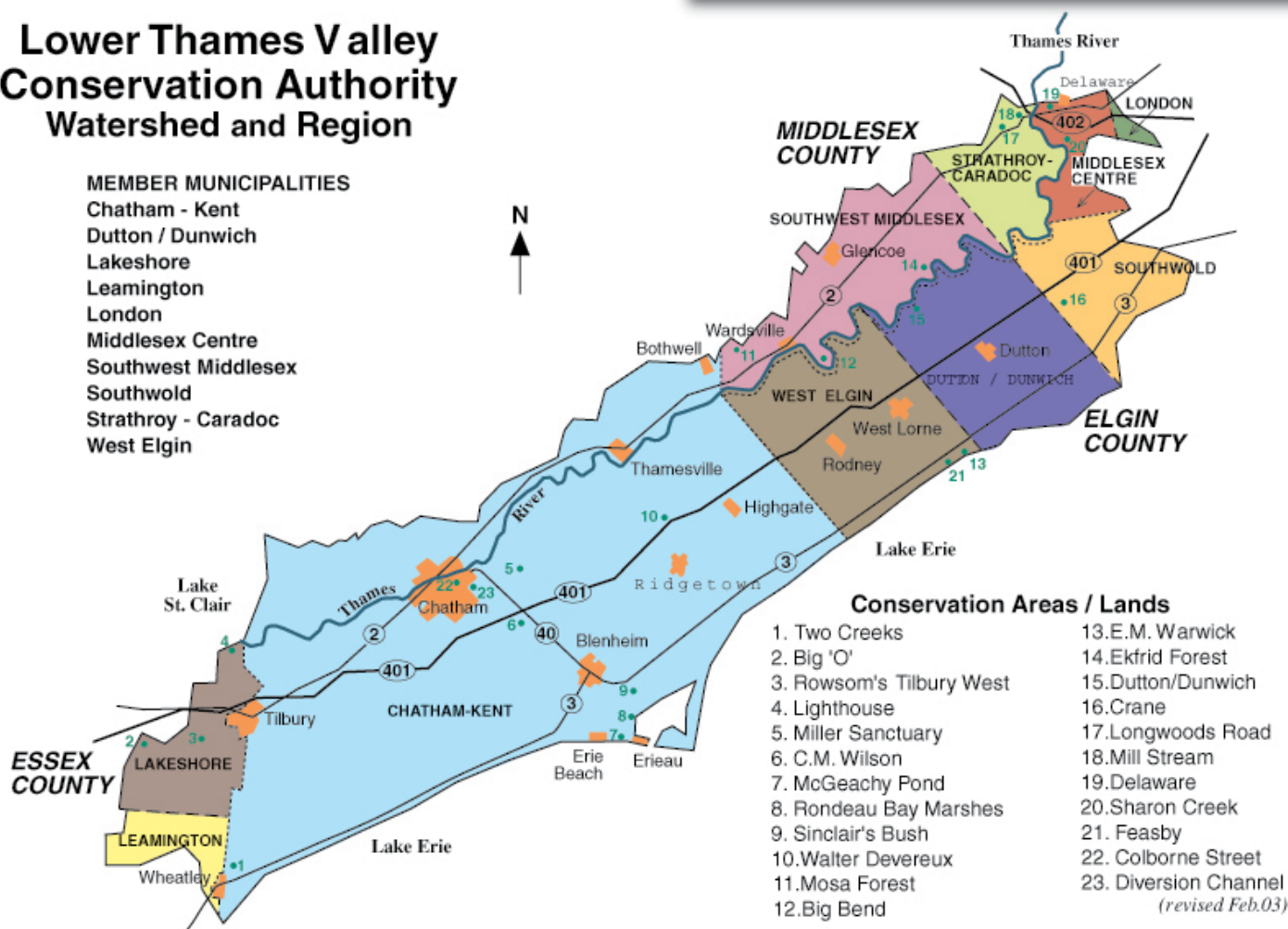


The Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority has jurisdiction over the watersheds of all streams which drain into the Thames River from the village of Delaware to Lake St. Clair.
