Notes to Financial Statements (unaudited)

1) BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENT PREPARATION

As of January 1, 2011, Part V of the CICA Handbook ceased to be a source of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for the IESO. On that date, the IESO adopted Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) accounting standards with a transition date of January 1, 2010.

The IESO's adoption of PSAB includes early adoption of Sections PS 3450, *Financial Instruments*, PS 1201, *Financial Statement Presentation*, and PS 2601, *Foreign Currency Translation*. Additionally, the IESO exercised an exemption within Section PS 2125, *First-time Adoption by Government Organizations*.

PSAB requires restatement of the comparative period.

2) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

In adopting PSAB, the framework for accounting changes, however, many of the significant accounting policies of the IESO remain unchanged.

The following outlines the accounting policies in areas which changed as a result of the IESO's adoption of PSAB:

Financial instruments

The IESO records it cash and cash equivalents, investment portfolio, and foreign currency exchange forward contracts at fair value. While held by the IESO, the cumulative change in fair value of these financial instruments is recorded in accumulated surplus as remeasurement gains and losses and is included in the value of the respective financial instrument shown in the statement of financial position and the statement of remeasurement gains and losses. Upon disposition of the financial instrument, the cumulative remeasurement gains and losses are reclassified to the statement of operations and all other gains and losses associated with the disposition of the financial instrument are recorded in the statement of operations. Transaction costs are charged to operations as incurred.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash, term deposits and other short-term, highly-rated investments with original maturity dates of less than 90 days.

The IESO records it accounts receivable, accounts payable and debt at amortized cost.

Property and equipment in service

Property and equipment includes software, facilities, meter data management/repository, market systems and applications, infrastructure and other assets. Property and equipment are capitalized at cost, which comprises materials, labour, external support, overhead, and interest applicable to capital activities.

Intangible Assets

The IESO no longer has a policy for intangible assets since the IESO no longer has intangible assets as software is classified as property and equipment.

Pension and other post-employment benefits

The IESO's post-employment benefit programs include pension, group life insurance, health care, long-term disability and workers compensation benefits.

The IESO accrues obligations under pension and other post-employment benefit (OPEB) plans and the related costs, net of plan assets. Pension and OPEB expenses and obligations are determined annually by independent actuaries using the projected benefit method and management's best estimate of expected return on plan assets, salary escalation, retirement ages of employees, mortality and expected health-care costs. The discount rate used to value liabilities is based on the expected rate of return on plan assets as at the measurement date of September 30.

The expected return on plan assets is based on management's long-term best estimate using a market-related value of plan assets. The market-related value of plan assets is determined using market-related values for equities (whereby fund assets are calculated using the smoothed value of assets over five years) and market values for fixed income securities, as at the measurement date of September 30.

Pension and OPEB expenses are recorded during the year in which employees render services. Pension and OPEB expenses consist of current service costs, interest expense on liabilities, expected return on plan assets and the cost of plan amendments in the period. Actuarial gains/(losses) arise from, among other things, the difference between the actual rate of return on plan assets for a period and the expected long-term rate of return on plan assets for that period or from changes in actuarial assumptions used to determine the accrued benefit obligations. Actuarial gains/(losses) are amortized over the expected average remaining service life of the employees covered by the plan.

The expected average remaining service life of employees covered by the pension and OPEB plans is 12 years (2010 - 11 years).

In its transition to PSAB, the IESO exercised an exemption for first time adoption by a government organization. The exemption allows for the pension and OPEB accumulated unamortized actuarial gains and losses, as of the date of transition, to be moved directly in accumulated surplus/deficit. At January 1, 2010 the unrecognized actuarial loss for pension benefits was \$72,847 thousand and the unrecognized actuarial loss for OPEB was \$5,275 thousand. The discount rate and return on asset assumption at January 1, 2010 was 6.75%.

Foreign currency exchange

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Canadian dollars at the rate of exchange prevailing on the date of the transaction. Items on the statement of financial position denominated in foreign currency are translated to Canadian dollars as of the financial statement date. The cumulative unrealized foreign currency exchange gains and losses of items continuing to be recognized on the statement of financial position are recorded in accumulated surplus as remeasurement gains and losses and shown in the statement of financial position and the statement of remeasurement gains and losses. Upon settlement of the item denominated in a foreign currency, the cumulative remeasurement gains and losses are reclassified to the statement of operations and all other gains and losses associated with the disposition of the financial instrument are recorded in the statement of operations.

4) REGULATORY APPROVALS FOR 2011

On April 25, 2011, the Ontario Energy Board (OEB) issued its order approving the IESO's application fee of \$1000, the usage fee of \$0.822/MWh and the IESO's revenue requirements in the amount of \$126.0 million and capital expenditures in the amount of \$21.5 million. Included within the approved revenue requirements was the recovery of the estimated PSAB transitional items for pension and OPEB over the expected average remaining service life of the employees covered by the plan

In its 2011 rate application, the IESO requested to retain \$13.1 million in its approved regulatory deferral account. This request was denied and the OEB approved the IESO retain \$5.0 million within its approved regulatory deferral account. The difference, of \$8.1 million, was recognized in April 2011 through a reduction in system fees revenue and an increase in rebates to market participants.

5) DEBT

Note payable to Ontario Electricity Finance Corporation (OEFEC)

In May 2011, the IESO entered into a two-year note payable with the OEFEC. The note payable is unsecured, bears interest at a fixed rate of 2.245% per annum and is repayable in full on May 1, 2013. Interest accrues daily and is payable in arrears semi-annually in May and November of each year. As at June 30, 2011, the note payable to the OEFEC was \$78.2 million (December 31, 2009 - \$78.2 million).

Credit facility

The IESO has an unsecured credit facility agreement with the OEFEC, which will make available to the IESO an amount up to \$60.0 million. Advances under the credit facility are payable at a variable interest rate equal to the Province of Ontario's cost of borrowing for a 30 day term plus 0.25% per annum, with draws, repayments and interest payments due monthly. The credit facility expires April 30, 2013. As at June 30, 2011, \$21.0 million was drawn on the credit facility (December 31, 2010 - \$2.0 million).

Bank Indebtedness

The IESO has an unsecured overdraft agreement with a Canadian commercial bank, which will make available to the IESO an amount up to \$5.0 million. Interest on funds overdrawn is calculated daily and paid monthly at the Canadian prime rate. As at June 30, 2011, \$1,082 thousand was drawn under the agreement (December 31, 2010 - \$0). In addition, the IESO had issued \$924 thousand in cheques in excess of bank balances (December 31, 2010 - \$0).
