Tuesday, the twenty-seventh day of January, 1959, being the first day of the Fifth Session of the Twenty-fifth Parliament of the Province of Ontario for the Despatch of Business pursuant to a Proclamation of the Honourable Dana Harris Porter, Chief Justice of Ontario, Administrator of the Province.

And the House having met,

The Honourable the Lieutenant-Governor then entered the House and, being seated on the Throne, was pleased to open the Session by the following gracious speech:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario:

It is a pleasure for me to welcome you to the Fifth Session of this Twenty-fifth Legislature.

Each year, with the growth of our population—which is now approaching six million—and the development and expansion of our resources, industries and communities, your duties and responsibilities assume increasing importance.

Since the last Session, many events and developments have occurred which have enriched and strengthened the economic and social fabric of Ontario.

The year 1958 was notable for many reasons. Economically, it commenced in recession—a downward trend in evidence throughout America. When it closed, our position had become considerably stronger. Unemployment has caused us great concern and we have taken many steps to ameliorate it. In the past year, furthermore, there emerged major areas of strength and quickening activity, which will lessen its incidence. Agriculture enjoyed a larger gain in production and cash income last year than in any year since 1951. Mining

output was also generally higher. Personal incomes and consumer sales increased, while capital investment was well maintained. As the new year proceeds, we can look forward to increasing employment and production and a continuation of the growth and development of our great Province.

We were highly gratified by the visit last summer of Her Royal Highness, The Princess Margaret. This year we look forward with loyal anticipation to the visit to this country of Her Gracious Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the Queen of Canada, and her Consort, Prince Philip. It is particularly fitting that Her Majesty should come to Canada to open the St. Lawrence Seaway which makes possible the wider utilization of the vast inland seas which bound the southern portions of our Province. The year 1959 will see our lake ports from Cornwall on the east to the Lakehead on the west become in fact ocean ports. 1959 will also see important steps taken at our tidewater port of Moosonee, the development of which will not only open up the resource-rich northern parts of this Province, but also link up with the interior of this Province those great territories contiguous to Hudson and James Bays. Plans for an airport at Moosonee are also being considered.

The Government has in operation an immense employment and capital investment program, providing for schools, highways, hospitals and a variety of essential works. This program, together with that of the municipalities and government boards and subsidiaries, provides employment to about 235,000 workers. Additionally, last December 1st, in co-operation with the federal and municipal governments, a special winter works program was initiated, to provide winter employment and to create useful public facilities. Full details will be laid before you.

In 1959, the Government and the municipalities propose to undertake a record volume of school, highway, hospital and other construction. You will be asked to vote funds to underwrite Provincial and municipal building activity in all parts of Ontario. In addition to the foregoing, a number of special projects, such as skyways over the Welland Canal at St. Catharines, Welland and Port Colborne, together with the causeway at Fort Frances, all based upon toll financing, will be pressed forward. Particulars of the negotiations and agreements relating to international bridges at Queenston, Sault Ste. Marie, Fort Frances and Rainy River will be presented. The Province's vast highway program is being carried out vigorously. Our trans-provincial highway, 401, will be completed in 1963—four years ahead of schedule. All of these great undertakings are aimed at stimulating business and employment and facilitating commerce originating both within and beyond our Province.

Outstanding events have occurred in the field of power and energy. During the past year, the completion of the Trans-Canada pipeline has made available to our people for the first time the rich natural gas resources of Western Canada. Not only has this altered the economic outlook and opportunities for Northern Ontario, but it has also given the whole of Ontario a valuable new fuel which renders us less dependent upon sources outside of Canada. Developments of the utmost importance have occurred in the realm of electric power. More than half the potential of the St. Lawrence project has been brought into operation and additional power has become available at Niagara and elsewhere. Accordingly, since we last met, our electric power resources have increased by the impressive total of a million and a quarter horsepower.

With our rapidly expanding economy, growing population, greater production and higher standards of living, we must have an adequate supply of power and energy. Our research program to hasten the time when we may generate electric power from our almost inexhaustible sources of uranium is being accelerated. The energy problem is so vital to the future of our fast-growing Province that a Department will be set up through which the Government will deal comprehensively with energy and power—whether they be derived from hydro developments, uranium, natural gas, oil, coal or any other source. It will also facilitate dealing with the vast financial problems involved in such developments, the most economic use of power sources, and, as well, the development of safety factors in the use of gas, electricity and other power resources.

The Ontario Water Resources Commission has been making rapid progress. Its plans will be laid before you, and, as well, those of our many conservation projects which are a necessary part of our program to conserve water and eliminate and prevent pollution.

Plans will be presented relative to the improvement and expansion of the Province's parks system which is growing very rapidly. Full details of the progress made together with a comprehensive parks plan, which will be a chart for the future, will be presented. Large new areas, particularly of Crown lands, will be set aside for forest propagation and the conservation of fish and wildlife. Camping facilities and picnic sites will be very greatly augmented and all necessary amenities provided. This program is aimed not only at preserving for all time very large areas of our beautiful countryside for the people of this Province, but also at attracting here the vast number of visitors who will come from elsewhere.

In natural resources, important matters will be submitted for your approval, involving development and conservation. Far-reaching legislation will be recommended. The policy of sustained forest yield will be broadened and strengthened. Measures will be submitted providing for the designation of wilderness areas to be maintained in their original state in perpetuity for the benefit of the people and to assure the continuation of their forest production. A three-fold expansion of access road construction will be undertaken in the north and an air-borne geophysical survey will be conducted in the Patricia District. Amendments having to do with safety in mining will be presented to you.

The Ontario Hospital Insurance Plan, a milepost in the history of health and welfare legislation, not only in this Province but in Canada, came into operation on January 1st. So acceptable are its provisions that more than 5,300,000 or over 90 per cent of our people have become insured beneficiaries under its broad coverage. Not only does this hospital insurance program relieve individuals from the fear of heavy financial burdens associated with hospital treatment, but it also frees municipalities of large expenditures, averaging about \$12 million a year, for hospital indigents and deficits.

To compensate municipalities which are obliged to make statutory payments on behalf of insured indigents, the Province this year will pay to each municipality an unconditional grant based upon its hospital indigency experience over the last three years.

Notable progress has been made in the extent and quality of mental health services, but newly developed treatment methods are bringing us to the threshold of a new era of great promise for those suffering from the consequences of mental illness. A comprehensive plan very greatly altering traditional methods and designed to bring diagnostic and treatment services closer to those who require them will be put into effect. This plan will progressively reduce the social segregation and isolation of the mentally ill, and will assure their earliest possible return to normal life. Custodial elements of care will be reduced to a minimum. Patients who are permanently mentally handicapped or infirm will be cared for in more suitable social surroundings.

Ontario, which in 1949-50 was the first province to embark on a systematic approach to the prevention and treatment of alcoholism and has won world acclaim for its progress, will again undertake major advances in this field. New facilities for research, treatment and rehabilitation are to be provided and the educational services are to be greatly extended.

This year the Province is entering the third stage in the development of its new educational grants formula. It marks another great forward step in our fifteen-year effort to evolve an equitable basis of financial assistance to our municipalities. Over that period, grants for education increased from \$8 million to nearly \$135 million. You will be asked to provide for a revision and adjustment of the grants formula which will give substantial additional relief to our municipal taxpayers.

The magnitude of the problem of education is demonstrated by the fact that last year alone it was necessary to provide additional school teachers and facilities for 78,000 more pupils. Since the end of World War II, we have created new and additional accommodation for over 650,000 pupils. Striking progress has been made in the building of teachers' colleges, where there is now an unprecedented enrolment. The pressure on school facilities is a continuing problem which our Province is in the lead in solving. On all educational fronts, betterments are being made. More emphasis is being placed on science and mathematics in our curriculum. In special phases of education, such as in schools for retarded children, rapid progress is being made and plans for the future will be submitted to you.

Recognizing the invaluable role of our universities, a program of assistance in meeting their expanding requirements will be submitted to you. Very marked advances have been made in creating university facilities in Ontario. A dozen years ago, the Province contributed to only three universities. This year, with still more universities in the making, you will be asked to provide grants to ten of them. The whole system of scholarships, bursaries and student loans will come before you for consideration and review.

You will be asked to approve legislation which will enable the Government further to remove difficulties in marketing arrangements and to ensure more effective disposal of Ontario's farm crops. Amendments to The Milk Industry Act will be proposed, to strengthen the position of producer marketing plans in the dairy industries. An accelerated safety program will be undertaken to diminish the hazards associated with farming. This year, the final phase of the Brucellosis Control Program will be carried out. The Department of Agriculture and the Department of Lands and Forests are initiating a new policy whose

objective is to assure a more systematic and permanent development of Northern Ontario's agricultural lands. To help prevent loss from rabies in livestock, the Government will provide free vaccine and will share equally with the municipalities in the cost of vaccination.

Notable progress has been made in farm marketing, but we are continually looking for means of improvement. It is proposed to set up an enquiry which will make a thorough and comprehensive examination of Ontario's agricultural industry with reference to processing, handling, storing, transporting and marketing farm produce. The enquiry will be aimed at facilitating the marketing and processing of Ontario farm products to meet the requirements of consumers whose purchasing habits are being altered by new merchandising facilities and methods.

Details of a new program to improve the educational and employment opportunities of our Indian population and their general standard of living will be laid before you. Continued efforts are being made to integrate Indian children into our regular school system. New measures will be adopted to help our Indian population fit more readily into the main stream of life and progress in Ontario. Accordingly, increased opportunities will be provided Indians in positions with such Departments as Lands and Forests. Indian youths will be brought into its Junior Ranger program. Bursaries and other forms of student aid will be earmarked specifically for deserving young Indians who demonstrate both a desire and an aptitude for further schooling.

Your approval will be sought for the initiation of an educational program by the Anti-Discrimination Commission. You will be asked to reinforce our present far-reaching legislation to prevent discrimination and assure equal rights to our people.

The work of the Department of the Provincial Secretary will be extended to deal with the broad question of citizenship and to facilitate the integration of new Canadians into our Ontario way of life.

Ontario is leading the way in the implementation of the forward-looking recommendations of the Fauteux Report, which will usher in a new era. The Province will be responsible only for lawbreakers sentenced to six months or less, as the program develops. Thus, for the first time, we will be able to devote our entire reform institution facilities to their true function and objective, namely, the rehabilitation of reformable persons who can subsequently take their place in society and lead normal, useful and law-abiding lives. The program of the Department of Reform Institutions will be revised to meet these fundamental and far-reaching changes. To complement and support this program, the Province will further extend its probationary services which have already achieved an outstanding record of success in the treatment of certain offenders. Thus, 1959 will witness the commencement of the elimination of many of the penal aspects of reform institutions and their devotion to the true provincial work of reformation.

You will have placed before you the report of the Select Committee appointed to examine into the operation of The Labour Relations Act. The Department of Labour is doing outstanding work in labour relations and in furthering understanding between management and labour.

Assistance to municipalities, school boards and other local agencies will again be increased across a broad front. A number of amendments to municipal statutes will be introduced.

Appropriations required to carry out the Province's many-sided and expanding welfare program will be substantially increased. Greater recognition will be given to the social welfare needs of our older citizens and our Indian population. A new factor will be introduced to facilitate the erection of Homes for the Aged in communities servicing unorganized territory.

The new Department of Transport has made outstanding progress in the past year. As a result of close co-operation between the Departments of the Attorney-General, Highways and Transport, the rate of traffic accidents and fatalities has been reduced. A new points system will shortly become operative. A number of measures aimed at strengthening the administration of safety programs will be recommended. The higher standards recently adopted for licensing drivers will be extended and encouragement will be given for extra-curricular driver education in our high schools. There will be a re-adjustment of speed limits which are no longer consonant with the best interests of traffic management and safety. Within the next year, improved machinery for the issuance of driver and motor vehicle licences will be set into motion.

The Attorney-General will submit measures to facilitate the administration of justice throughout Ontario in county and district courts and in juvenile and family courts in the larger centres. Municipalities will be relieved of the cost of coroners' investigations in Provincial institutions. Compensation for those chosen for jury duty will be increased. Important legislation will be introduced to unify and simplify expropriation procedures while fully protecting individual rights. A complete revision of The Bulk Sales Act will be proposed. In order to permit greater flexibility in the administration of trust funds, while at the same time assuring their security and soundness, the courts will be given authority to extend the powers of trustees to make investments in certain securities.

An amendment to The Succession Duty Act will be introduced which will increase the exemption for widows and their dependent children.

The Committee appointed to examine and report upon the organization of Government and Commissions in Ontario is continuing its very thorough investigations, which are aimed both at preserving and strengthening the parliamentary system and at the same time assuring that the Government and its agencies practise the most efficient business methods.

A major review and revision of our fiscal arrangements with the Federal Government are matters of transcending importance. Ottawa has proposed that the entire subject of financial relations between the Dominion and the provinces will receive active, co-operative study and to that end the existing machinery of the Federal-Provincial Continuing Committee will be used. My Government has concurred in this, and in the meantime last year's increase from 10 to 13 per cent in the Province's share of income tax will be continued. This study, which will involve the whole of Canada's tax structure, will provide a firm basis upon which to make a just and equitable settlement.

To enhance the efficacy of a wide range of Government services and enactments, amendments will be made to the following Acts: The Charitable Gifts Act, The Judicature Act, The Jurors Act, The Agricultural Societies Act, The Trade Schools Act, The Public Schools Act, The Schools Administration Act, The Secondary Schools and Boards of Education Act, The Archives Act, The Air Pollution Control Act, The Public Health Act, The Children's Boarding Homes Act, The Highway Improvement Act, The Provincial Land Tax Act, The Forest Fires Prevention Act, The Department of Municipal Affairs Act, The Municipal Board Act, The Local Improvement Act, The Conservation Authorities Act, The Housing Development Act, The Planning Act, The Public Vehicles Act, The Corporations Tax Act and as well to a number of other Statutes.

The welfare of the Province's Civil Service is receiving continued attention. A complete review of The Public Service Act is being made by the Civil Service Commission and steps are being taken to provide for an extensive man-power survey, a program of in-service training and development, and improved methods of selection and recruitment. Studies to improve procedures for promotion and transfer are also being undertaken.

You will receive for examination and study the Public Accounts for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1958. The Treasurer will present his annual Budget Statement, reviewing the financial operations of the Province in this fiscal year and forecasting the program for the fiscal year 1959-60. You will be requested to vote funds for the carrying on of the Government of the Province in the months ahead.

I wish to thank you for the diligent and conscientious efforts you have always put forward on behalf of the people of Ontario. Such faithful attention to the affairs of the Province contributes materially to its sound development.

I pray that Divine Providence will guide your deliberations.

Before the Orders of the Day, Mr. Daley made a statement to the House with respect to a statement he gave to the Press on Thursday last. In it he announced that the Niagara Falls Bridge Commission had purchased the Whirlpool Rapids and Queenston-Lewiston Bridges.

An item appearing in the Globe and Mail this morning made it appear that these Bridges had been purchased by the Province out of public moneys. Mr. Daley expressed the wish to make it clear that this was not the case, but that the Bridges were purchased by the Commission financed by revenue bonds issued for the purpose which will be retired entirely from the revenue from users of the Bridges.

He reviewed the formation of the Commission, explaining that it is a joint Commission appointed by the Province of Ontario and the State of New York, and the cost of these and other Bridges owned by the Commission is in no way charged to taxpayers of Ontario or of New York.

The Prime Minister amplified Mr. Daley's statement.

Before the Orders of the Day, Mr. Speaker delivered the following Ruling:—

On Wednesday last, Mr. Wintermeyer moved, seconded by Mr. Oliver, that the House be adjourned to discuss a matter of urgent public importance, viz., the unemployment situation in Ontario.

At that time I advised the House that I would take the matter under consideration and give my decision in due course.

I have looked thoroughly into this matter and, in my opinion, I must refuse this motion on two grounds.

According to the rules as approved by this House such a motion is only in order if the subject matter is definite, urgent and of public importance. I refer you to Rule 38, and to Lewis' Parliamentary Procedure in Ontario, pages 39 and 40. On page 40, you will see that the Speaker may decline to receive such a motion if the subject is one which should be discussed at an early date in the Debate on the motion for an Address in reply to the Speech of His Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor, the Debate on the Budget, or some other business now before the House.

I find that while the general question of unemployment is urgent and of public importance, it is general and not definite. Some specific instance would, of necessity, be the subject matter of such a motion.

Moreover, as the question of unemployment was referred to very fully in the Speech from the Throne, ample opportunity will be afforded at a very early date for a full debate on this subject.

The undersigned, as Commissioners of Estate Bills as provided by The Legislative Assembly Act, R.S.O. 1950, Chapter 202, Section 57, having had the said Bill referred to us as such Commissioners, now beg to report thereon.

We have heard counsel for the petitioners and the Official Guardian on behalf of the infant contingent beneficiaries and unborn infants. The petition has been signed by all the adult beneficiaries under the will. The Official Guardian strongly supported the passing of the Bill and stated that he considered it, under all the circumstances of this Estate, to be in the interests of the contingent beneficiaries.

It appears from the petition filed herein and from the information disclosed on the hearing before us that an amendment is necessary to clarify section 1 of the Bill and that a section should be added, to be numbered section 2, to assure that the purpose of the petitioners is carried into effect by the Bill.

We therefore propose the following amendment:

- "2. Such investments shall not be subject to the provisions of subsections 3 to 15 of section 207 of The Corporations Act or any provisions that may be substituted therefor."

Consequently, sections 2 and 3 should become sections 3 and 4 respectively.

It is a great pleasure to present to the House another volume in the Ontario Government-Champlain Society series on various aspects of Ontario's history. This is entitled "Kingston Before the War of 1812", and its author is Dr. Richard A. Preston, Professor of History, of Royal Military College. I congratulate Dr. Preston on his production of this handsome and interesting work, and I am sure that all members of this House join me in expressing thanks to him.

Two volumes have preceded this one. They are "Valley of the Trent" by Edwin C. Guillet and "Royal Fort Frontenac" by Professor Preston, in collaboration with Dr. Leopold Lamontagne. Once again I should like to acknowledge the great contribution which these historians have made both to historical scholarship itself and, in particular, to our knowledge of the origins of this Province.

These volumes are being prepared under the direction of the Champlain Society, with the financial backing of the Government of Ontario. The Society, which has been sponsoring the production of historical studies for more than 50 years, chooses and guides the authors of the various works, while the Government defrays the expenses of preparation and publication.

The authors, of course, are given a free hand in the preparation of their various volumes. Professor Preston has, for example, selected all the material which is reproduced in this book. You will see that he has written an introduction giving the background of the pre-1812 period in the Kingston area. He has also written commentaries upon the various records and documents in the book in order to illuminate them and make them fully understandable and meaningful. In all of this, there has been no interference from outside. The opinions which the author has expressed in the introduction and commentaries are his alone. From beginning to end, this book—like its predecessors—is the independent and objective production of a professional historian.

Our purpose is to provide a series of documentary volumes of Ontario's history. Our hope is that this will be interesting and instructive to the general reader and that it will also constitute a solid foundation of source material for the interpretive historian. Professor Preston has met this objective in its entirety. Another very important reason for undertaking this enterprise is the desire to preserve in perpetuity Ontario's rich and fascinating stock of historical records and documents. These are very perishable and can easily become lost or destroyed through inadvertence.

May I quote Professor Preston to underline the value of this historical project:

"Some of the collections of documents which were explored have not previously been used intensively by historians. Other records that were known . . . have since been forgotten by their custodians; and some of these were triumphantly rediscovered after dusty searches. Thus, in addition to the service of providing in print a documentary history of a pioneer community, the preparation of the present volume has led to the discovery, or rediscovery, of material that was either unknown or forgotten."

With the publication of this work, we now have a comprehensive collection of documents and a brief descriptive history of the Kingston area from the very beginning of its development in the early 17th Century until the outbreak of the War of 1812. This book, particularly, covers a most important period in the life of Kingston—the formative period. At that time—the turn of the 19th Century—Kingston was the leading centre of what is now the Province of Ontario. Around it, the United Empire Loyalists founded their St. Lawrence River and Bay of Quinte settlements. Kingston was the commercial capital,

principal naval base and, in many ways, the citadel of this Province. Its contribution to the establishment and development of Ontario cannot be over-estimated.

Within the next two or three years, further volumes, covering other areas of Ontario, will be completed. Next year, a work on the Windsor area will issue from the press. It will be followed by a volume on "Muddy York" and another on the Muskoka-Haliburton area. Thought is being given at the present time to the preparation of a special volume on the famous pioneer roads of Ontario, the Bobcaygeon Road, Dundas Street, Yonge Street and so on. I am sure we all look forward eagerly to the publication of these works over the next few years.

Also the Prime Minister made a further statement to the House with respect to the Committee of Enquiry the Government proposed to set up to carefully investigate all matters relating to the use of fluorides and fluoridation.

Was the contractor called to repair the crack the same contractor who erected the building. 3. What was determined as the underlying cause of the crack. 4. How much was paid to have the crack repaired.

Answer by the Honourable Mr. Macaulay:—

1. Contractor was still on job—he undertook work as part of the contract.
2. Yes.
3. The cause was a combination of loading and temperature changes in the plant during the summer and winter of 1952 before No. 4 unit superstructure was closed in and heated. The crack in the building occurred between units No. 2 and No. 3 and the opening was 3/8" at the top of the building extending downwards to zero at ground level. This condition is in no way detrimental to the building as a structure, and as a continuing check on the stability of the plant bench marks were established in 1953 and to date there is no evidence of movement other than that expected from seasonal temperature changes.

The Commission was fully aware of the soil conditions existing at this site before engineering was commenced by the H. G. Acres Company.

The Commission was aware that heavy structure loadings on similar sites in Canada and the United States had resulted in some settling and minor cracks in walls and floors and that these were not detrimental to the functional use of the structures.

To be assured that the site could be successfully used for the steam plant, H. G. Acres called in Dr. Terzaghi, Professor of Harvard University who is one of the top-ranking consulting engineers in the U.S.A. on soil mechanics, who gave a favourable report on its use.

Borings were taken to depth and piling was used to support the plant, which is normal engineering practice.

Suitable sites in this area are limited. The one chosen was the most desirable; its advantages from a coal-handling and transmission facilities point of view offset the disadvantage of soil conditions. The Commission is satisfied that the choice of location which was made at the time was correct.

Kelly before the bar of the House in order that he may be questioned about his involvement in Northern Ontario Gas Pipeline stock distribution, and related matters, notably the reconciling of statements made by Mr. Kelly in the Toronto newspapers of Friday, February 6, 1959, and Saturday, February 7, 1959, with his sworn testimony given to the Attorney-General's committee of investigation, and his observation that, "If I stood in that House today I could back a few of them off their chairs."

Mr. Speaker ruled it Out of Order on the grounds that the procedure followed by Mr. MacDonald was incorrect and also that the motion was bad in form as it called on the Government to call Mr. Kelly before the bar of the House, which action could only be taken by the Legislature.

The House then adjourned at 12.00 midnight.

It must be noted that the number of kilowatt hours sold to the municipal electrical utilities and the revenue received therefrom cannot be compared with the number of kilowatt hours sold to either the direct industrial customers or rural customers, or the revenue received therefrom, due to the differences in peak loads, base loads, diversity, energy rates and distance from source of supply.

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25. *Mr. Spence*—Enquiry of the Ministry—How much money has Hydro spent in each of the last four years: (a) On transportation of all kinds for visitors and guests to Hydro installations in any part of the province; (b) for accommodation; (c) for meals and entertainment.

Answer by the Honourable Mr. Macaulay:

During the years 1955, 1956, 1957 and 1958 it is estimated that approximately 2,600,000 visitors and guests visited the construction undertakings of the Ontario Hydro, such as the Robert H. Saunders Generating Station at Cornwall and the Sir Adam Beck Generating Stations at Niagara Falls. During the same period the expenditure by Ontario Hydro for transportation, accommodation, meals and entertainment of all visitors and guests amounted to less than 3.3c. per person. The expenditure for this purpose is as follows:

The Commission considers that this expenditure is in the best interests of the tourist industry of Ontario, as well as the desire of the Commission to draw to public attention the undertakings of the Commission so as to encourage more people to "Live Better Electrically".

26. *Mr. Spence*—Enquiry of the Ministry—In connection with the official opening of the Robert H. Saunders generating station on the St. Lawrence power and seaway project September 8, 1958: (a) How much money was spent by Hydro for special trains, special buses and other types of transportation for guests, press and others to and from the ceremonies; (b) How much did Hydro spend for hotel and motel and all other accommodation; (c) How much did Hydro spend for meals and entertainment; (d) What was the total cost of the opening ceremonies.

Answer by the Honourable Mr. Macaulay:—

The Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario paid one-half of the total cost involved in the official opening ceremony of the St. Lawrence power project, the other half being paid by the Power Authority of the State of New York. The joint amount spent totalled \$74,790, of which Ontario Hydro paid one-half, or, \$37,395. Hydro's share of the cost of the opening ceremony represents 0.012 per cent of its share of the cost of the project and approximately 1.7c. per visitor for the nearly 2,200,000 persons who have visited the Ontario section of the project.

The Commission considers that these expenditures for the receiving of visitors at its projects have not only been a worthwhile contribution towards Ontario's tourist industry but also a most acceptable means of conveying to the public the activities of Ontario Hydro in making available new sources of electric power for the continuing expansion that is taking place within the Province and for the steadily increasing improvement in the standard of living in which electricity plays so vital a part.

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27. *Mr. Reaume*—Enquiry of the Ministry—1. How many contracts have been awarded by Ontario Hydro for work in connection with the St. Lawrence power project. 2. What was the contract price of each contract award. 3. How many claims have been made by contractors for payment in excess of the original contract price. 4. What is the amount being claimed in each case above the original contract price. 5. What is the total amount being claimed. 6. Have any claims for payment above the original contract price been made in the course of the work that have now been settled, and if so, in each case what was the original contract price, the amount claimed above the original contract price, and the amount of the settlement.

Answer by the Honourable Mr. Macaulay:—

1. The estimated cost to develop the St. Lawrence Power Project by The Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario and the Power Authority of the State of New York is a total of approximately \$600,000,000. Ontario

Hydro's share of this cost is approximately \$300,000,000, and this expenditure by the Ontario Commission involves several thousands of purchase contracts, of which there were 83 formal construction contracts. Of these construction contracts, 71 were shared with the Power Authority and prior to the awarding of each shared contract the concurrence of each power entity was obtained.

- 2. The contracts and the tendered price for each of the 83 contracts referred to in (1) are shown on Appendix A, and the tendered price of these contracts totals \$118,805,427.
- 3. Of these 83 contracts, claims have been made in respect of 11 contracts for conditions and work alleged to have differed from the contract.
- 4. These 11 claims total \$22,074,595, or approximately 7.4 per cent of Ontario Hydro's share of the cost of the project. (See Appendix B.)
- 5. Claims totalling \$3,147,668 have been paid to date, out of the \$22,074,595 claimed, and the balance is under negotiation. Settlement of these claims involves the approval of both the Ontario Hydro and the Power Authority of the State of New York.
- 6. The amount of claims filed by contractors with the Power Authority of the State of New York exceeds the amount claimed against Ontario Hydro by its contractors.

29. *Mr. Nixon*—Enquiry of the Ministry—In connection with the Liquor Control Board of Ontario store price list, item 188B L.C.B.O. Extra Special, 25-ounce bottle \$4.75, liquor imported in wood and bottled by the L.C.B.O.: 1. What is the strength per cent underproof when this liquor is (a) imported in casks, and (b) when it is sold in bottles. 2. What percentage of water is added to this liquor. 3. What is the cost, per cask, of this liquor when purchased overseas. 4. What is the cost laid down in Board warehouse. 5. How many 25-ounce bottles of liquor are obtained after the “watering” of a single cask of liquor.

Answer by the Provincial Secretary:—

1. (a) Brand Number 188B, L.C.B.O. Extra Special Scotch Whiskey is imported in Hogsheads from various Scotch Distillers. Depending upon the particular shipper, the proof can vary from Proof to 99.96 Proof measured by Imperial Proof.

(b) When this brand reaches the consumer it is at the same Proof as all Scotch Whiskies offered to the public in the Dominion of Canada and the United Kingdom, namely, 70 Imperial Proof, the Proof introduced by the Wartime Beverages Order of the Government of Canada in 1942 and which has been the Proof since that time. This applies in all Canada.
2. Depending upon the strength by Proof of the spirits as imported, the quantity of distilled water, which may be added to obtain 70 Imperial Proof at which all Scotch Whiskies are sold to the consumer as shown in the answer to 1 (b), varies.
3. The average cost per Hogshead containing 53.37 Proof Gallons is 35 Shillings per Proof Gallon. Taking the rate of exchange to be \$2.80 per pound sterling, this would amount to \$336.23 at the point of distillation.
4. To the Overseas cost must be added the cost of freight and insurance, customs duty based on \$12.50 for each 1.3125 Proof Gallons and sales tax, which results in the average laid-down duty paid price per Hogshead at the Board's Warehouse of \$1,099.09.
5. This depends upon loss through evaporation in transit and in storage, and also the strength of the Proof. Because of high transportation costs it is more economical to the Board to transport at a high proof and reduce to the Canadian Standard in Ontario. Ontario retail prices are the lowest in Canada.

37. *Mr. Wren*—Enquiry of the Ministry—1. Set forth the number of jobs created in each area in the fiscal year ending (a) March 31st, 1957; (b) March 31st, 1958; (c) March 31st, 1959, as compared to employment in each particular for the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1956. 2. (a) How many employable persons were unemployed in Ontario as of (i) December 31st, 1956; (ii) December 31st, 1957; (iii) December 31st, 1958; (b) How many employable persons were un-

employed in Ontario as of (i) June 30th, 1956; (ii) June 30th, 1957; (iii) June 30th, 1958; (c) In the difference in tabulation of answers to (a) and (b), What effect did Ontario Government activity have on that difference, quoting your source of information.

Answer by the Minister of Municipal Affairs:—

1. The estimates of employment, generated through Provincial Government Expenditures, were made on the basis of a capital expenditure—employment ratio for the entire program. These include both on-site and off-site jobs and, because the programs are outlined on a Departmental basis, it is not possible to break down the figures on a regional or district basis.
2. The Labour Force Survey conducted by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics is the most reliable source of information on the Work Force. It is a survey of households and for this reason is subject to sampling variability. However, it does give a reasonably accurate indication of trends in labour force movements. This survey classifies all persons who were without jobs during the survey week and were looking for employment, as unemployed.

Although it is possible that some people would classify themselves as seeking work even though they are unemployable, not many would come into this category. It is, therefore, fairly safe to assume that persons classified as Without Jobs and Seeking Work by the Labour Force Survey are employable unemployed.

The following table shows Persons Without Jobs and Seeking Work in Ontario for the dates nearest June 30 and December 31, 1956, 1957 and 1958.

2. (c) Last winter the government started a program of direct assistance to municipalities for work performed during the winter. This provided jobs for a good many workers who would not otherwise have been employed, but because the municipalities provided information only on labour cost of their projects, and not on the number of men employed, we have no definite information on the numbers employed on that Winter Works Program.

In this year's municipal winter works program, however, more detailed information was obtained. As of March 20th this year, an estimated 9,575 additional men were employed in 180 municipalities, including 10 Conservation Authority areas, throughout Ontario.

The Ontario Government has also stimulated employment during the winter through special programs carried out by its various departments. Emphasis has been placed on accelerating projects where unemployment is heaviest.

The Department of Highways is carrying out two programs in an effort to provide additional work this winter. The first is a program of picnic area construction throughout the Province. The second is more of a special winter policy in which the Department carries on with its regular work even though some extra cost is involved in keeping projects going. In all, the Department estimates that these special programs will provide jobs for more than 1,000 men over the winter period.

The Department of Lands and Forests is also carrying out two special winter programs in an effort to create additional work. The first is a program of work on forest access roads in the northern parts of the Province, and the second is a program of park construction throughout the whole of the Province. Work on these two programs is estimated to provide jobs for over 4,500 additional men.

The Ontario-St. Lawrence Development Commission, coming under the Parks Integration Board and the Department of Planning and Development, is also carrying on a parks construction program, stretching from Kingston to the Quebec border, and their program is estimated to provide additional work for approximately 170 men. In each of the above cases, except for the regular work carried on by the Department of Highways, the Federal Government has promised to defray a proportion of the costs involved in these projects provided that the work is carried out within the period November 1, 1958, and June 30, 1959, and, in most cases, with the stipulation that at least half the construction costs involved are wages. This has provided a strong incentive to do extra work and to create additional employment.

Finally, for many years, it has been the practice of the Department of Public Works to write a "cold weather working requirement" clause into the contracts wherever this is possible. This affords a greater degree of seasonal stability in construction than would otherwise be obtained. However, inasmuch as the work is done by contractors, no accurate figures are available of how many more workers are employed on these Government of Ontario projects during the winter months than would have been employed had this clause not been inserted as part of the agreement. Generally speaking, however, it is believed that under these contracts let by the Department of Public Works, employment is provided for between 3,000 and 4,000 men during the winter season.

Thus, as nearly as can be estimated, the Government of Ontario, together and in part, with the Federal Government and our municipi-

palities, is providing through these winter projects jobs for nearly 20,000 workers. Certainly this is by far the largest number of jobs that has been created by special winter works in the history of this Province.

In addition, the Province through its huge capital investment and repair program is providing employment for nearly 250,000 other on-site and off-site workers, so that it is estimated that, in all, employment is provided for over 265,000 workers in construction and repair occupations. This total is of course exclusive of the regular employees engaged in such departments as Health, the Attorney-General, Reform Institutions, etc., which, if included, would increase the total number of persons provided with jobs to approximately 300,000.

"It is the first up-to-date painting in any Government building."

(ii) *Alan Jarvis, Director of the National Gallery in Ottawa*

"The work is a great step forward in Canadian mural art and it will enhance our international artistic status enormously."

(iii) *Toronto Globe & Mail*—June 27, 1958

"If ever abstraction is justified, it is in dealing with such abstract matters as the power of nature and man-controlled energy."

(iv) *Toronto Telegram*—June 28, 1958

"On one point, opinion will be unanimous. The mural is daring in its defiance of convention. There are no beavers fraternizing with eagles, no melancholy Indians or dour pioneers gazing into vacuous horizon, none of the claptrap frequently used to portray Man on the March."

(v) *Toronto Telegram*—September 16, 1958

"Ontario Hydro has used art in industry in a manner for which too few Canadian corporations have the courage. It is to be congratulated . . ."

The mural purchased by the Power Authority of the State of New York and installed in its powerhouse cost approximately \$21,000, while the cost to Ontario Hydro for its mural was \$10,000. If the wall containing the

Ontario Hydro mural had been finished in marble to match the adjoining walls the cost would have been \$1,500, so that the net cost of the mural to the Commission can be stated as \$8,500.

(b) The cost of the St. Lawrence Suite, including the personal appearance of Mr. Morton Gould, was \$5,500, of which Ontario Hydro paid \$2,750.

3. (a) and (b). Arrangements for the Indians have had to be made in consultation with the Department of Indian Affairs. It is our understanding that those Indians who are self-supporting, that is, regularly employed, pay their own premiums, either on a pay direct basis or by payroll deductions. Indians who are entitled to health services through the Department of Indian Affairs are insured by that Department, that is, their premiums are paid by the Department of Indian Affairs.
4. (a) The intent of this question is not very clear. If the question concerns the Ontario Hospital Services Commission, then it can be stated that

the Commission has no responsibility for the provision of Health services. For Hospital services, the additional cost to the Province will be approximately 10 million dollars.

To these Acts the Royal Assent was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:—

"In Her Majesty's name, the Honourable the Lieutenant-Governor doth assent to these Bills."

Mr. Speaker then said:—

May it please Your Honour:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and faithful subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, in Session assembled, approach Your Honour with sentiments of unfeigned devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty's person and Government, and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance a Bill intituled, "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money for the Public Service for the fiscal years ending the 31st day of March, 1959, and the 31st day of March, 1960".

To this Act the Royal Assent was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:—

"The Honourable the Lieutenant-Governor doth thank Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, accept their benevolence and assent to this Bill in Her Majesty's name."

The Honourable the Lieutenant-Governor was then pleased to deliver the following gracious speech:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario:

With the conclusion of these remarks, the Fifth Session of the Twenty-fifth Legislature of Ontario will be brought to a close. It will then be a matter of history. But the decisions made and the actions authorized at this Session will have enduring value. They will operate in many ways to encourage industrial expansion, to enhance the opportunities for education and employment and to strengthen individual and family security.

As in the past, you have been confronted with numerous problems arising from the exceptionally rapid growth of this Province and the special needs that are associated with the complex age in which we live. For your conscientious devotion to the affairs of the Province, and for your industry and diligence, I thank you.

Recognizing the need for maintaining an environment which assures high levels of employment, prosperity and well-being, you have authorized the expenditure of record sums for the construction of physical assets and the expansion and improvement of Provincial services. A full program of services in support of the education, health, industry and the general betterment of our people has been implemented without the imposition of additional taxation. On the contrary, you have effected reductions in succession duties. The Corporations Act has been adjusted to make it correspond with certain revisions in the Federal law. You have also clarified the position of Provincial crown agencies by passing legislation designating them to be crown agencies and therefore exempt from Federal taxation on their purchases.

During the Session, it was announced that the Government would participate fully in the new conference to be convened on Federal-Provincial tax-sharing arrangements and the Canadian tax structure. We are confident that a just and realistic settlement of this difficult problem will be achieved. We will continue to work earnestly and vigorously for a just share of the direct tax fields and for the repeal of the Federal estate tax.

Once again, to strengthen the financial capacity and vitality of our local authorities, you have approved a substantial increase in the Province's assistance to municipalities. For the first time in history, our grants exceed \$300 million. In the next fiscal year, a total of \$310 million will be paid to the municipalities, school boards and other local agencies—a fifteenfold increase in the last decade and a half. During these years, an ever-larger proportion of our revenues has been channelled to local government. This speaks eloquently of our efforts to improve the standards of local services and to give relief to the local taxpayer. Not only have we expanded our assistance, particularly for education, roads and general purposes, but this year we have introduced a new grant to reimburse municipalities for their expenditures on behalf of indigent patients in hospitals. The Unconditional Grants Act and The Municipal Act have been amended to authorize these payments. The Municipal Act has also been amended to permit the wife of an owner or tenant to be elected a member of council.

The Assessment Act has been clarified and modernized while The Power Commission Act has been amended to provide for the payment of grants in lieu of taxes in municipalities in which there are Ontario Hydro generation or distribution facilities. Considerable other legislation, designed to improve administration and the sound development of our municipalities, was also approved. For example, The Municipal Franchise Extension Act was amended to provide for the making of voters' lists by assessors and by registration instead of by enumeration.

The three-year plan for the development of a new educational grants system is being implemented with marked success. This year, five improvements are being made in the grants structure to assist local education. Commencing last January 1, the approved cost of industrial arts shops, home economics classrooms, cafeterias, gymnasiums and all-purpose rooms, as well as basements used as all-purpose rooms, will be included in the cost basis for computing the grants to be paid to school boards. Grants will also be paid on the approved cost of land acquired for school purposes. In addition, the Government's grants will be based on an approved cost that has been raised to \$25,000 per classroom in secondary schools. In the coming fiscal year a thorough study will be undertaken of the established concepts of approved school costs.

Higher education in Ontario will benefit from increased grants to universities. Of even greater import to individuals is the revision in our student aid system: those with high standing in Grade 13 examinations will be granted Ontario scholarships to encourage them to pursue advanced studies. At the same time the existing bursary program has been expanded and a much larger appropriation has been made for individual awards. An estimated 4,000 students will receive scholarships or bursaries, double the number assisted last year.

For the first time in history, the Province's expenditure on education will exceed the \$200 million mark, while grants to local school boards have been raised to nearly \$150 million, double their level just four years ago.

You voted larger sums for the operation of technological schools and schools for retarded, blind and deaf children. Once again you made a special contribution of \$1 million to the Teachers' Superannuation Fund in addition to the sum which constitutes the Province's normal payment to this fund. The establishment of county or inter-municipal public libraries was facilitated. Stricter regulation of safety factors in trade schools was authorized.

You voted funds to finance the most decisive advance ever accomplished in Ontario's public health program—the Hospital Insurance Plan—which went into full operation on January 1st last. You hastened the construction of additional accommodation in all types of hospitals across the Province.

In the field of mental health, promising developments are to occur in Ontario over the next few years. You were apprised of plans to enlarge out-patient facilities and to transform treatment services within the mental hospitals, to the end that curable patients may be returned to normal life as rapidly as possible. There will be major advances in the prevention and treatment of alcoholism. The Air Pollution Control Act has been strengthened.

You authorized substantial appropriations to relieve the handicapped, the disabled, the unemployed, the aged and the unfortunate. The establishment of homes for the aged in communities in Northern Ontario was facilitated.

The report of the Select Committee on Labour Relations was presented to the Legislature. In order to expedite the work of the Labour Relations Board, you authorized the appointment of additional deputy vice-chairmen so that the Board may sit in more than two divisions.

Close attention was paid to matters of good citizenship. The Provincial Secretary has created a citizenship branch which will help new Canadians adjust themselves to Ontario's way of life. Efforts are being made to give our Indian population a larger role in the economic and social life of the Province. Indian councils are to be accorded the status of municipal councils in matters coming within the purview of The General Welfare Assistance Act. The Ontario Anti-Discrimination Commission has been established and it has embarked upon a campaign against discrimination.

Your awareness of the absolutely essential part which highways play in the economic life of the Province was never more clearly demonstrated than at this Session of the Legislature. You authorized an unprecedented expenditure for the construction and maintenance of highways and roads, both Provincial and municipal. Embodied in amendments to The Highway Improvement Act was a substantial measure of relief for traffic congestion in the rapidly developing urban centres of Ontario. You improved the system of Provincial contributions for development roads.

My Ministers propose to confer with representatives of the Western Provinces on a reciprocal trucking agreement which will ensure that Western Canada's shipping business remains in Canadian hands, via Port Arthur and Fort William.

The jobs and incomes of thousands of Ontario people are dependent upon the record-breaking, billion-dollar construction program which you implemented this year. Projects and works of every description have been undertaken by the Province and the municipalities, and their respective boards and commissions. This program not only adds to Ontario's wealth of physical capital and meets today's pressing requirements but it also constitutes the indispensable framework which will support tomorrow's prosperity.

In co-operation with the Federal and municipal governments, the Province has undertaken the construction of numerous special works designed to provide winter employment and to create useful facilities in the municipalities and the northern parts of the Province. In response to our formal request, the Federal Government has extended from April 30 to May 31 the period during which it will contribute to these projects.

In addition to providing funds for highway modernization, which itself reduces accident hazards, you authorized an intensified traffic safety campaign. The new points system, which has been in trial operation, will soon become fully operative. You amended The Highway Traffic Act in order to improve safety features, facilitate traffic flow, and ensure the reporting of traffic convictions. In addition, urbanized townships were given the right to prescribe 30-mile per hour speed zones. Speed limits throughout the Province are to be readjusted in accordance with the dictates of good traffic management and safety.

Plans for the fuller realization of Northern Ontario's bright promise received your attention. The establishment of a tidewater port at Moosonee, together with an airport, was announced. They will open a path to the vast mineral-rich territories which bound Hudson and James Bays. The construction of mining, logging and community access roads has been stepped up, while main traffic arteries are being greatly expanded and improved. A new policy which seeks a more systematic and permanent development of northern agricultural lands has been inaugurated.

You authorized the establishment of the new Department of Energy Resources, which, exclusive of Ontario Hydro, will study and deal with various phases of energy and power production and distribution in Ontario. Numbered among its responsibilities will be the establishment of standards and conditions and the supervision of safety aspects relating to natural and manufactured gas. It will give special attention to the utilization of uranium for electric power generation and for other peacetime purposes.

Agriculture income last year was at a record level, and many improvements are being made. However, to better assure the continuing growth and prosperity of this essential industry, a committee of inquiry has been set up to study and report on ways and means of promoting the production and effective marketing of Ontario's agricultural commodities in relation to changing marketing methods and consumer tastes.

Steps were taken to improve farm marketing machinery, to strengthen dairy marketing plans and to protect both buyers and sellers at community livestock sales. Through The Department of Agriculture Act, you authorized the formulation of programs to encourage any branch of agricultural activity. In order

to diminish the hazards associated with farming, a comprehensive safety program has been undertaken.

Under the aegis of the Parks Integration Board, fresh advances have been made in the development of a chain of parks across the length and breadth of Ontario. It is anticipated that in this way, large park areas will be acquired and preserved in perpetuity for the enjoyment of the Ontario people and as an attraction to tourists. Authority was also given to the Province to pay municipalities one-half of the cost of acquiring and establishing parks and camp sites in rural areas.

Natural resource development and conservation continued to receive a major part of your attention. Under The Wilderness Areas Act, large tracts of virgin territory will be reserved for the use and enjoyment of the public. You have enacted legislation which assists municipalities and conservation authorities to acquire lands for reforestation. You have empowered the Government to prohibit the sale of crown lands in specified areas in order that proper programs of land use planning might be developed. Changes in The Mining Act have been approved to facilitate claim staking and development. At the same time, you have provided for the maintenance of greater safety in the operation of quarries.

Funds were voted to the Ontario Water Resources Commission for a substantial enlargement of its waterworks construction and pollution abatement program. Aided by Provincial contributions, conservation authorities are carrying out flood control projects at a number of sites across the Province.

The implementation of the penal reform recommendations of the Fauteux Committee was approved. The result will be a sweeping transformation of the Provincial penal system in which the emphasis will be entirely upon rehabilitation. Certain of the responsibilities and reform institutions of the Province will be turned over to the Federal Government. In anticipation of broad changes in the methods of handling offenders, you have augmented the Provincial probation services.

A substantial increase in general welfare services was authorized. Steps were taken to improve the educational and employment opportunities for Indians. The General Welfare Assistance Act has been amended to enable the councils of Indian bands to function in the same way as the councils of municipalities in all matters relating to the several forms of assistance dealt with under the Act.

Several measures which facilitate the work of the courts have been passed. The compensation payable to witnesses and jurors has been increased. The Juvenile and Family Courts Act has been completely revised. The Supreme Court has been empowered to make such adjustments in the administration of trusts as are necessitated by changing business practices and economic conditions. Several other acts have been revised to bring them into line with modern conditions. Among these are The Reciprocal Enforcement of Maintenance Orders Act, The Charitable Gifts Act and The Insurance Act. You have modernized The Loan and Trust Corporations Act and broadened the scope of credit unions.

Amendments to The Planning Act have been made to reinforce control over planning and building across Ontario in accordance with local conditions.

A new act, The Boundaries Act, has been passed to provide an expeditious method of fixing the boundaries of lands.

A revision of the Statutes and Regulations of Ontario has been authorized and it is expected that this revision will be completed by the end of 1960.

In order to achieve the most efficient operation within the Government service, the methods of selection and recruitment in the Civil Service have been improved and a program of in-service training and development has been authorized. A full-time secretary to the Civil Service Joint Advisory Council has been appointed to perform the administrative work of the Council and to coordinate that of all the departmental Councils. A Minister of the Government will also be assigned to review these matters. Appreciation is expressed to the members of the Civil Service for their industry and the faithful discharge of their responsibilities.

Thanks is expressed to the members of the Select Committee on Labour Relations who completed and delivered their Report during the past Session and to those of the various Standing Committees of the House.

The year 1959 gives promise of sound economic growth. Each passing month reveals fresh evidence of expansion. Virtually all economic barometers are rising, some rapidly. The new measures that you have enacted and the action you have authorized to be taken at this Session support this expansion. They help achieve that kind of economic climate that is so favourable to industrial expansion and the creation of new employment opportunities and that brings ever-higher living standards and security for our people.

We look forward to the visit in June of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, and Prince Philip. When Her Majesty opens the St. Lawrence Seaway, the people of Ontario will rejoice in the opportunity of again showing their loyal devotion to the Queen of Canada.

In proroguing this Session, I pray that Divine Providence may guide you and bless you.

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RESOLUTIONS SUBMITTED TO THE GAME AND FISH COMMITTEE

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RECOMMENDATIONS

BY WHOM

1. (No. 59-1-G3) GAME MEAT CARE:

It has been brought to our attention that a great deal of meat is lost or wasted annually through hunters not knowing the proper method of skinning, cleaning and butchering of Moose and Deer.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests print and issue with each Big Game Licence a simple pamphlet describing the correct techniques of skinning, cleaning and butchering of Moose and Deer.

2. (No. 59-2-G4) COTTAGE SITES:

Whereas the new legislation planned by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, and introduced by Honourable Clare E. Mapledoram, which provides for the sale of public lands, especially cottage sites, under a calling of tenders or auction system, would tend to discriminate against persons of ordinary means and definitely give preference of the choice sites to those with big money.

Be it resolved that the present system under which public lands are disposed of under a first come, first served basis, be retained.

3. (No. 59-6-G5) BACK BADGE:

To assist in creating better farmer-sportsmen relationship, and as an easier means of identification.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests issue a back badge with every hunting licence issued in the Province of Ontario. The said back badge number to correspond with that on the hunting licence. That the size of the badge be adequate for easy identification and be acceptable to the Department of Lands and Forests. That this back badge must be worn by a hunter at all times while hunting.

4. (No. 59-6-G6) PENALTIES:

Be it resolved that any person convicted of shooting Pheasants out of season in the Province of Ontario be fined a minimum of not less than \$50.00, with a maximum to be set by the Department.

5. (No. 59-1-G7—No. 59-1-G8) ACCESS ROADS:

In the interest of good fish and wildlife management The Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters have repeatedly asked for legislation to open access roads into leased timber limits of various lumber and pulp and paper companies. These limits are owned by the

Crown in the name of the Province of Ontario, and are part of properties belonging to the people of Ontario. The leasing of the lands for lumber and pulp purposes does not give the lessee control of the game and fish found on or in these leases.

Be it resolved that access roads into lumber and pulp leases be opened to the general public for hunting and fishing.

Two examples of closed access roads that tend to waste game and fish are:

1. The access road of the Ontario-Minnesota Pulp and Paper Company road from OM Camp 113 to OM Camp 109. The use of this road would open up the area north and west of Atikokan.
2. The access road of the J. A. Mathieu Co., from Sapawe to Richardson Lake, would open up the area north of Sapawe and northeast of Atikokan.

6. (No. 59-1-G9) GUIDES:

The discontinuance of non-resident Moose hunters having to employ guides is causing considerable unemployment among the guides of Northwestern Ontario, and quantities of meat are being left in the bush while trophies are taken out. Non-resident hunters could be better controlled if it was necessary for them to have guides.

Resolved that non-resident Moose hunters be required to employ guides as has been the policy in past seasons.

7. (No. 59-1-G10) GUIDES:

The guide law as enforced in the Rainy River District has been approved and supported throughout the District as a worthwhile conservation measure.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests retain the guide law presently in effect in the Rainy River District, as referred to in Section 22, subsection 3, of The Game and Fisheries Act.

8. (No. 59-1-G12) GUIDES:

At the present time guides in Ontario are not required to pass a proficiency test, and guide licences are issued to anyone making an application. It is felt that this practice is not good policy.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests require guides to pass an experience or proficiency test for guiding hunting and fishing parties. That said guides be classified as A., B., and C.

9. (No. 59-5-G14) SANITARY CONDITIONS:

Whereas first-hand observations and various letters received describe deplorable sanitary conditions existing in many of the areas used as recognized camp sites along the popular canoe routes throughout the Province, due to the lack of garbage disposal.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests take all necessary steps to provide suitable garbage disposal facilities and that sanitation rules be posted at all camping areas.

10. (No. 59-1-F1) LAKE TROUT:

The Department of Lands and Forests have deemed it advisable to close the Lake Superior Shoal (Lat. 48 degrees, 4 minutes North and Long. 87 degrees, 5 minutes West) to commercial fishing to preserve certain species of Lake Trout inhabiting this area; this being part of the program of combatting the Sea Lamprey.

Closing of this shoal and the Department's opinions in the matter appear to be justified by the increase in numbers of small Lake Trout in the waters, in and about the Slate and Leadman Island, situated approximately 40 miles north of the Lake Superior Shoal—with many of these small Trout being of the species *Salvelinus namaycush* siscowet, which is one of the species being protected by this closure.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests give very serious consideration to any request, whatsoever, for the resumption of commercial fishing on the Lake Superior Shoal until the predations of the Sea Lamprey have been checked; or, that the necessity of protecting any species of Lake Trout on said shoals has been decided against by the Department of Lands and Forests.

11. And be it further resolved that the Department endeavour to establish the Slate and Leadman Island groups and an appropriate area of water surrounding as a fish sanctuary to protect all species of Lake Trout in these waters, during their spawning season. Such an interval to be declared by the Department at their discretion with restrictions applying to anglers and

commercial fishermen alike, having in mind that no commercial fishing licence is currently being worked in these waters.

12. (No. 59-1-F2) LAKE TROUT AND PICKEREL:

The body of water known as Mazokamah Bay in Nipigon Bay proper has heretofore been closed to commercial fishermen.

It is a known fact that the Sea Lamprey are attacking other game fish in Lake Superior to the point that all game fish may soon require protection on all their spawning grounds.

Be it resolved that the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters go on record as being entirely opposed to the opening of the body of water known as Mazokamah Bay to commercial fishing for a full season, and further, should commercial fishing be allowed, the dates be so set as to provide a maximum of protection for spring spawning species, particularly Pickerel.

13. (No. 59-1-F3) LIVE BAIT:

Request for stricter enforcement of regulations relative to use of live minnows as bait.

Be it resolved:

(1) That the Department of Lands and Forests be requested to enforce to the maximum existing regulations prohibiting the importation of live bait fish into this Province, by a stricter control at all border crossings.

14. LIVE BAIT—*Continued*

(2) That a stricter control system be maintained on the types of live fish supplied to the general public by live bait dealers, with a view to reducing wherever possible the distribution of coarse fish and perch minnows to Speckled Trout waters in Ontario by innocent purchasers of live bait fish.

15. (No. 59-2-F4) LAKE NIPISSING:

Owing to the fact that our fish populations in Lake Nipissing are decreasing at an alarming rate and the fish that are left are so much smaller than the ones caught in previous years, it is quite evident that the fish are being deprived of their natural food by commercial seining and trapping of Minnows in this lake.

Be it resolved that all commercial licences for seining or trapping Minnows in Lake Nipissing be cancelled immediately in order to protect the food and thereby maintain the Pickerel fishing in this lake.

16. (No. 59-6-F6) RAINBOW TROUT SPECIAL AREA:

The concentration of anglers during the extended open season for Rainbow Trout (Sept. 16th to Nov. 30th) is extremely heavy, and whereas successful anglers continue to angle until a full count is obtained for each member of their party.

Be it resolved that during the extended season for Rainbow Trout (Sept. 16th to Nov. 30th) in the waters of Norfolk County, the creel limit be set at two (2) fish per person for Rainbow Trout.

17. That the minimum size of Rainbow Trout in these waters be set at twelve (12) inches.

18. (No. 59-6-F7) PUBLIC ACCESS:

In view of the ever-decreasing areas of stream trout fishing waters which are available to the general public in Southern Ontario due to lease, purchase or other agreements by individuals or groups of individuals, who have on many streams completely, or almost completely, barred the general public from the use of said streams,

Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.

And in view of the fact that most streams in Southern Ontario are in need of stream improvement work, which cannot be successfully accomplished unless the control of such streams is guaranteed for a substantial number of years.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests take the necessary action to secure the rights to at least fifty feet of land adjoining each bank of suitable trout streams in Southern Ontario, said lands to be in keeping with the amount of such areas as are necessary for the use of the general public.

19. LAKE TROUT SEASON:

42. (No. 59-1-H1) INCREASED PENALTIES FOR JACK
LIGHTING:

The practice of jack-lighting deer or moose is a pre-
determined and deliberate violation of the game laws
of Ontario. The practice of jack-lighting is a definite
menace to those living in hunted areas and to their
live stock. Many wounded deer, shot by jack-lighters,
are never found, thereby causing a waste of our deer
population.

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Be it resolved that any person convicted on a charge of jack-lighting in addition to those penalties to which they are subject under The Game and Fisheries Act, be also subject to an automatic thirty days jail sentence and a three years suspension of all hunting privileges. The higher penalty to apply on the first offence.

43. (No. 59-1-H2)

The present interpretation of subsection 4 of section 32 of The Game and Fisheries Act (Ontario) defines a separate set of conditions applying in and out of deer and moose seasons, with the result that the apprehension of jack lighters and other violators is proven to be more difficult during the seasons.

Be it resolved that subsection 4 of section 32 be changed to read:

No person shall have in his possession in any area inhabited by deer and moose, between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise, any device capable of throwing or casting rays of light upon an object, and any rifle or other firearms or weapon capable of killing deer or moose unless the rifle, firearm or other weapon is unloaded, encased or dismantled.

44. (No. 49-4-H5) DEER—LONGER SEASON:

A longer season would give a hunter a chance to choose a time in which the weather would be more suitable to his particular requirements and would tend to lessen the congestion in certain areas.

Be it resolved that where the deer season is two weeks duration this be extended to a season of three weeks on an experimental basis.

45. (No. 59-4-H6)

Be it resolved that the opening dates for the deer season in that part of the Province of Ontario, referred to as section 11 in 1957, be permanently set as the Monday in November falling on or between November 5th and 11th.

Hunters use this as a reason to be in the field and are hunting in the soy bean fields which have not been harvested at this early date and are causing, besides the destruction of crops, considerable hard feelings among the farmers, who in turn post their land.

49. DEER AND MOOSE SEASON IN RAINY RIVER DISTRICT:

Whereas the southern half of the Kenora District and the Rainy River District have the same climatic conditions;

50. NON-RESIDENTS EMPLOYING GUIDES WHILE HUNTING MOOSE:

Whereas moose have been protected for many years and are still not too numerous in many localities of the Kenora District.

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ability of alleviating the hardships of the trappers to the best of the province's ability by reducing the royalties on all furs; and that immediate action be taken to reduce the royalties on beaver and mink pelts.

58. Recommends that the owner of privately-owned land within a registered trapping zone must give permission to the owner of the trapping zone to trap on his land.

Be it resolved that the Department of Lands and Forests review The Game and Fisheries Act with a view to increase the minimum penalties in all instances of wildlife infractions from the present ten dollars to twenty dollars.

61. Whereas the deer population of Lincoln and Welland Counties has increased to the extent that it would be advisable to have an open season; and

We propose that an open season on deer in these two counties be declared and that the shooting or taking of deer be restricted to archery tackle.

62. Whereas the weather in the Niagara Peninsula has shown a decided change in the past few years; and

Whereas the local hatch of ducks is not sufficient to warrant an open season; and

St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protection Association.

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Whereas the state of New York has a split season covering the shooting in the areas bordering the Niagara River;

We propose that the season on ducks for Lincoln and Welland Counties be changed to the 1st Saturday in October to the last Saturday in October and from the 2nd Saturday in November to December 31st.

63. Whereas the hunting of pheasants in the Niagara Peninsula is dependent on the goodwill of the farmer; and

St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protection Association.

Whereas certain lands and farms are posted because the farmers are still harvesting their grapes and pears; and

Whereas the Niagara Township Council has been approached by a delegation requesting them to pass a by-law to restrict hunting in some areas due to the late harvesting;

We propose that the pheasant season in Lincoln and Welland Counties be restricted to three Wednesdays and three Saturdays. The season to be October 21st, 28th and November 4th, and October 24th, 31st and November 7th.

64. Whereas some bodies are making presentation to have the resident and non-resident licence fees increased, and

St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protection Association.

Whereas most of the monies collected at the present time, of \$1.00 and \$4.00, are being used for purposes other than conservation, and

Whereas the collecting of licence fees was to try to maintain our dwindling game supply;

We propose that the increase in fees is not warranted until such time as the Department of Lands and Forests regulate that the money collected must be used for restocking purposes or conservation projects.

65. Whereas the game overseers have apprehended many persons for infractions of the Game and Fish Regulations, and

St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protection Association.

Whereas many judges and magistrates continue to impose only minimum penalties on the accused;

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We propose that the time is long overdue for a revision of the minimum penalties imposed for all infractions of the Game and Fish Regulations.

66. Whereas at the present time it is lawful under a \$10.00 licence fee to shoot moose in some parts of Ontario, and

St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protection Association.

Whereas in the areas where the deer and moose seasons run concurrently the licence fee is \$26.00;

We propose that the licence fee of \$10.00 for moose be made a uniform charge for all parts of Ontario.

67. Whereas the Department of Lands and Forests has seen fit to remove the minimum size limit on many species of fish; and

Whereas the trout fishing in many of our local streams is getting to be a put-and-take proposition because of silting and pollution,

We propose that the size limit on Speckled Trout be removed.

68. Whereas the quantity of Lake Trout and Whitefish in our Great Lakes is so small as to be almost non-existent; and

St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protection Association.

Whereas the blame for this condition is continually said to be due to the lamprey eel; and

Whereas the Commercial Fishermen, because of their knowledge of the spawning beds, continue to net these areas so efficiently that the species of fish they are after cannot withstand the pressure; and

Whereas the blue and yellow pickerel have already shown results of this type of operation and continue to grow scarcer.

We propose that the netting of blue and yellow pickerel in the Great Lakes by Commercial Fishermen be closed for a two-week period during the spawning season. The two-week period in the various localities to be determined by the Department of Lands and Forests.

69. Against Recommendation 66 by St. Catharines and Lincoln County Game and Fish Protective Association.

Whereas at the present time we have two game overseers for the three united counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, one working from Winchester, the other from Applehill; and

Whereas the City of Cornwall now boasts a population of some 40,000 people, and the majority of the citizens of the three counties live in heavy concentrations in and around the surrounding areas of Cornwall; and

Whereas we feel that more public relation and educational work should be done by the representatives of the Department of Lands and Forests in the three united counties; and

Whereas it would give closer control and closer supervision to the heavily populated and heavily fished or hunted areas.

Be it therefore resolved that we urge the Department of Lands and Forests to employ another game overseer in this area and that *he should be stationed in the City of Cornwall or its suburbs.*

71. SUNDAY SHOOTING FOR WATERFOWL:

Whereas the waters of Lake St. Francis, St. Lawrence River and Lake St. Lawrence border the waters of Quebec and New York State; and

Conservation Council

and Glengarry.

Whereas Sunday hunting and shooting of waterfowl is legal in said border waters of Quebec and New York.

Therefore be it resolved that it be made legal for Ontario residents to shoot ducks in the waters of Lake St. Francis, St. Lawrence River and Lake St. Lawrence, said waters bordering the Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, during the legal season for hunting ducks.

72. DEER SEASON FOR ARCHERS OPEN IN LARGER PART OF PROVINCE:

Whereas the government set aside a short season for the convenience of archers to hunt deer on Manitoulin Island; and

Conservation Council

Whereas we are of the opinion that the deer population would not be substantially reduced if a larger area of the province was opened to the archer.

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Therefore be it resolved that the Department open a larger portion of the Province, and that this portion be in the south-eastern part of the Province.

73. Concurs with Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters Resolution No. 42 on increase in penalties for jacklighting deer.

74. Concurs with Resolution No. 44 by Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters for a longer season on deer, but would like to see that postponed for a year because of the heavy snowfall this winter.

75. Concurs with Resolution No. 48 by Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters on bag limit of six (6) European hare or jack rabbit.

76. Suggests abolition of .22 calibre rifles, especially during the deer season.

77. Suggests that a recommendation go forward from the Game and Fish Committee to the Minister of the Federal Department of Transport, pointing out the anxiety of the sportsmen with regard to safety on the water, with special reference to Lake St. Francis, Lake St. Lawrence and the St. Lawrence River in general.

81. Read and restated their Recommendation of two years ago, as follows:

"SANCTUARIES FOR MIGRATORY WATERFOWL:

"If every area where migratory waterfowl may rest and feed is open to hunting, the birds are at a serious disadvantage when migrating between their nesting grounds in the north and their wintering grounds in the

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south. Little has been done in Ontario to assure adequate feeding and resting grounds for migratory waterfowl. It is true that the Federal Government has some responsibility in this matter, since migratory birds are the direct responsibility of the Federal Government because of the Migratory Birds Treaty with the United States. However, they are also the property of Her Majesty in the right of each Province when they occur within a provincial boundary. Both the Federal Government and the Province are therefore directly concerned.

"If the Federal Government is not discharging its responsibilities by assuring adequate feeding and resting grounds for waterfowl, the Government of Ontario should press for appropriate action after making certain that it is discharging its own responsibilities in the matter.

"THE COUNCIL RECOMMENDS:

- (a) That a survey of wetlands be made to determine which areas should be preserved to afford *sanctuary* during the migration and nesting of Ontario's waterfowl.
- (b) That Ontario discuss with the proper federal authorities the possibility of undertaking a co-operative project for assuring adequate feeding and resting grounds for migratory waterfowl."

82. In case there should be any suggestion made to you of alteration of Law in respect to Sunday hunting and fishing, permit us to place our point of view before you as in former years.

We submit that Sunday hunting would create a hazard for the thousands of residents and visitors in this Province who take advantage of Sunday to get out of doors. The number of these people far exceeds those who might wish to hunt on Sunday. The wishes and the rights of the vast majority should be respected.

Inasmuch as the youth of our country should have every encouragement in obtaining the benefits of church and Sunday School association, and inasmuch as hunting undoubtedly has an appeal for boys and young men, we would request hunters to refrain from any action which might draw youth away from these good influences. We would hope that sportsmen will, rather, do everything to encourage the youth of our land to

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cultivate a close and helpful relationship with those religious agencies which make for the up-building of character.

We would appreciate your decision being made in line with these two important considerations.

83. Most important! *Retain Ban on Sunday hunting.* Farmers and landowners object very much to presence of noisy, undisciplined city people on that day.

89. Due to the excessive fox population in the regulated areas of the Province and the prevalence of Rabies throughout the Province, it is respectfully requested that consideration be given to having all restrictions removed from foxes and that they be placed in the vermin category.

Such action would permit foxes to be destroyed at any time without the necessity of obtaining a Town-

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ship licence in regulated areas and under the authority of a Vermin Licence at times when gun licences are not valid.

90. Since the end of World War II there has been a rapid expansion in size of many of the larger urban centres in Ontario. This has resulted in a heavier population of the rural areas surrounding these centres as the growth spilled over into the surrounding countryside. Parallel with this has been a large increase in the number of hunters who now take to the field. High wages have placed cars and hunting equipment in the hands of many people who were formerly denied access to these, and shorter working hours have provided more leisure time. As a result the hunting pressure, in what were formerly strictly rural areas around these cities, has increased tremendously. These districts still provide good hunting, but a problem is arising with respect to the discharge of rifles (in particular .22 rim fire). Rifles, rather than shotguns, are responsible for most of the damage to signs, hydro insulators and buildings, and because of the distance these bullets will carry there is an increasing danger that stray bullets may cause loss of life.

We realize that many farmers use .22 rifles to combat the ground hog and other varmint menace, and that the right of the farmer on his land should not be restricted. In addition, a rifle in the hands of certain trained hunters may be perfectly safe but in the hands of an untrained hunter could cause a serious problem in the built-up areas and be a danger to life and property.

It is felt that as the cities grow, and hence pressure increases, that unless careful control is exercised there may eventually be a ban on hunting in many of these districts because of the carelessness of a few, but that this likelihood would be curtailed if shotgun hunting only were permitted, except for certain restricting conditions.

In view of this problem which no doubt will become more acute as time passes, we urge that a study be made by the Department of Lands and Forests to see if legislation should be provided to allow the townships surrounding metropolitan areas to restrict the use of rifles, but allow the discharge of shot guns, or whether this matter could be regulated on a provincial level.
