And the House having met,

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor, having entered the House, took his seat on the Throne.

Mr. Yaremko, the Provincial Secretary, then said:

"I am commanded by the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor to state that he does not see fit to declare the causes of the summoning of the present Legislature of this Province until a Speaker of this House shall have been chosen according to law, but today at a subsequent hour His Honour will declare the causes of the calling of this Legislature."

His Honour was then pleased to retire.

And the Clerk having called for nominations for the office of Speaker, the Prime Minister, Mr. Davis, addressing himself to the Clerk, proposed to the House for their Speaker Allan E. Reuter, Esquire, Member for the Electoral District of Waterloo South, which motion was seconded by Mr. Nixon (Brant), and it was,

*Resolved*, That Allan E. Reuter, Esquire, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker.

The Clerk having declared the Honourable Allan E. Reuter duly elected, he was conducted by the Prime Minister and Mr. Nixon (Brant) to the Dais, where, standing on the upper step, he returned his humble acknowledgment to the House for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon him by choosing him to be their Speaker.

And thereupon he sat down in the Chair and the Mace was laid upon the Table.

The House then adjourned during pleasure.

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The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then re-entered the House and took his seat on the Throne.

Mr. Speaker then addressed His Honour to the following effect:

*May it please Your Honour,*

The Legislative Assembly have elected me as their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me and not to the Assembly whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and Country, hereby claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to your person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from you the most favourable consideration.

The Provincial Secretary then said:

*Mr. Speaker,*

I am commanded by the Honourable the Lieutenant Governor to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the Assembly to Her Majesty's person and Government, and not doubting that the proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temperance and prudence, he grants and upon all occasions will recognize and allow the constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you that the Assembly shall have ready access to His Honour upon all suitable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

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The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to open the Session with the following gracious speech:

*Mr. Speaker and Members of The Legislative Assembly of Ontario:*

I extend warmest greetings and a sincere welcome to each and every one of you.

On behalf of our Sovereign, I extend congratulations to the Prime Minister and his Ministry, as well as a special welcome to those Honourable Members who attend their first Session of the Legislature.

During this First Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario, the Government will place before you its supplementary estimates, incorporating many special programs to alleviate winter unemployment and other expenditures designed to reinforce the positive economic impact of the budget.

You will also be asked to approve amendments to The Income Tax Act to implement tax reductions to further increase demand in the economy, changes in the Province's Succession Duty Act, The Corporations Tax Act, and legislation to reduce the burden of health insurance premiums.

Bills will also be introduced to implement changes in pension legislation. Finally, you will be asked to approve legislation concerning the structure of government.

May Divine Providence guide you in your deliberations.

God bless the Queen and Canada.

*Ordered*, That, as the Legislature has been convened in this special Session for the purpose of considering only those matters which have been laid before you in the Address of the Honourable, the Lieutenant Governor, the House hereby resolves to dispense with the customary Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne and the formal debate thereon as the subject matters of the Speech may be debated during the consideration of the motion and the legislation submitted to the House.

Before the Orders of the Day Mr. Speaker delivered two rulings as follows:—

On Monday last the Member for High Park raised what he alleged to be a matter of privilege, under which he made certain allegations relating to the recent Election in three electoral districts, and asked me, as Speaker, to refer his allegations to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

Firstly, I must repeat what has been said by my predecessors on several occasions—A matter of privilege must pertain to one of those special privileges that the Assembly and its Members individually enjoy which are not enjoyed by other citizens. I refer you to Standing Order No. 42. The matter raised by the Member for High Park is of equal interest to the whole electorate and is not one of those special parliamentary privileges.

Secondly, I, as Speaker, have no authority to refer any matter to a Committee for consideration. Such referral can only be made by Order of the House on motion properly moved after notice and passed.

Thirdly, if offences and irregularities, as alleged, have taken place, the proper remedies exist under Federal and Provincial law; for example, if any person has evidence that another person is guilty of the offence of personation, he should lay a charge under the Criminal Code of Canada. The Ontario Election Act defines those things which are election offences and prescribes the proper procedure to be taken. Similarly, it provides the action to be taken if serious irregularities are alleged.

---

The Deputy Speaker referred to me a matter raised in Committee of Supply by the Leader of the New Democratic Party, as a matter of privilege.

At the outset I must point out that privilege only relates to those special privileges which the Members of the House enjoy individually and the House enjoys collectively, that are not enjoyed by non Members. I refer you to Standing Order No. 42. The matter raised by the Honourable Member does not appear to relate to any of those special privileges.

The question then arises—could it have been raised as a Point of Order. Again it appears that the Standing Orders and precedents are against this procedure. Standing Order No. 16 (a), item 8, states clearly that one Member may not make allegations against another, and item 10 prohibits a Member from charging another with uttering a deliberate falsehood. Moreover, May's Parliamentary Practice, 18th Edition, at page 419, cites a number of cases supporting the proposition that one Member may not accuse another of misrepresentation, although some cases hold that to be out of order the accusation must be deliberate misrepresentation. It would, therefore, appear that the Leader of the New Democratic Party himself committed a breach of order in making his accusation.

There are, of course, other ways that the New Democratic Party Leader could have made his point without offending the rules and precedents of the House. If he could not find a proper vehicle in the Supplementary Estimates, he could, of course, during the Oral Question Period, ask the Ministers concerned if they would not agree that there was an inconsistency in the statements they had made to the House.

---

This First Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario concludes after undertaking, in a period of only one week, an extremely worthwhile and significant program of legislation.

I congratulate you on the diligence with which you have attended to your duties on behalf of the people of Ontario.

In declaring this Session prorogued, I pray that under Divine Providence each of you will enjoy to the full, with your families, friends, and constituents, the pleasure and relaxation of Christmas and the New Year.

In our Sovereign's name, I thank you.

God bless the Queen and Canada.

Ross Macdonald, P.C., C.D., Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant Governor of the Province.

And the House having met,

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then entered the House and, being seated on the Throne, was pleased to open the Session by the following gracious speech:—

*Mr. Speaker and Members of The Legislative Assembly of Ontario:*

On this occasion of the opening of the second session of the 29th Parliament of Ontario, I extend warmest greetings to you.

The people of Ontario, having been recently consulted as to their wishes with respect to their representation in this Legislature, have assigned to each of you a most solemn duty and charge which I know you will serve steadfastly



and well, whatever your place and part in our democratic process. On behalf of our Sovereign, I convey my best wishes to the Premier, and to his Ministers in their several new responsibilities, and to all members of the Legislative Assembly.

Laissez-moi vous exprimer mes vœux les plus chaleureux en ce jour d'ouverture de la deuxième session de la vingt-neuvième Législature de l'Ontario.

La population de notre Province ayant été récemment consultée quant au choix de ses représentants au sein de cette Législature, a confié à chacun de vous un mandat et des responsabilités d'une importance on ne peut plus capitale. Je demeure persuadé que quelles que soient vos positions respectives et votre rôle individuel dans le processus démocratique qui est le nôtre, vous accomplirez tous votre tâche avec constance et efficacité. Je transmets, au nom de notre Souveraine, mes meilleurs vœux de réussite à notre Premier Ministre et à ses Ministres ainsi qu' à tous les membres de l'Assemblée Législative, dans les nombreuses et nouvelles responsabilités qui sont les leurs.

My Government wishes to outline to the Legislature the various proposals it intends to submit to your scrutiny and consideration during this session. These and other measures, to be placed before you in due course, will be designed to carry forward the major purposes of the Government in response to present conditions of our society and its more urgent requirements at this time in our history.

My Ministers believe that as a result of their recent mandate, they have a renewed responsibility to make the growing complexity and scope of government services more efficient and productive while, at the same time, bringing government closer to the people, so that it may be more responsive to the continuing needs for change and reform.

My Ministers are aware of the widespread concern over the condition of the national economy of which Ontario's industry and commerce are such a vital part. To maintain public confidence in the basic strength and vigour of our own economy requires the Government to use fiscal prudence and restraint in the areas of its responsibility and to encourage individual incentive, endeavour and entrepreneurship in the private sector.

My Ministers believe it their duty to give leadership and provide purposeful means by which our people may continue to enjoy the natural beauty and serenity of our Ontario landscape and a daily life in a healthy and wholesome environment. As well, my Ministers believe it their duty to maintain a standard of life for all citizens, the quality of which will reflect the compassionate and generous spirit of our people. My Government will also seek new ways to encourage the achievement of excellence in the many fields of citizen endeavour from which all of Ontario's people may draw inspiration and example.

It is expected that our Province will continue to enjoy a substantial expansion of its economy in 1972, with a real growth rate in excess of 6%. Such an achievement will represent a significant improvement over the past year. Despite such growth, my Government considers the present and projected unemployment levels to be unacceptable. It is therefore the primary objective of my Government's economic, social and fiscal policy to attain the highest possible rate of employment.

Budgetary and fiscal strategy will be designed to maintain a rate of expansion in all areas of economic policy in order to effect substantial improvements in the employment rate. While much has been done, and more will be done, to achieve this objective, the speed with which it can be achieved depends in large measure on the improved co-ordination of federal and provincial policies and programs.

My Government will continue to make constructive proposals to the Federal Government in order to improve inter-governmental co-operation in such specific areas of current concern as fiscal and monetary policy, and in areas relating to competition and foreign trade, including the vital consideration of the auto pact between Canada and the United States.

My Government has proposed to the Federal Government that effective means of dealing with longer term economic issues be created through regular meetings of Ministers of Finance, which would be constituted as a joint economic committee.

My Government is convinced of the need for both federal and provincial action in order to sustain and develop an internationally competitive secondary manufacturing sector, a matter of critical importance to Ontario.

The Government is also committed to the pursuit of policies which will encourage more economic activity and greater participation by Canadians in the development of their own resources and in the utilization of their own skills. Further action in this regard will follow the report of the Select Committee of this Legislature on economic and cultural nationalism.

My Ministers will continue to devote their attention to the many important economic, fiscal and trade matters in which Ontario, the Government of Canada, and our sister provinces have a common interest and responsibility, and in which the co-operation of all is essential. In particular, my Government is eager to achieve federal-provincial agreement in the following areas:

1. tax sharing, so that the basic imbalance in our federal system between revenue sources and expenditure responsibilities can be corrected;
2. constitutional reform, and particularly the distribution of powers, a matter closely related to tax sharing, so that government responsibilities and institutions are more in accord with the contemporary needs of Canadians; and
3. shared-cost reform, so that the provinces can assume full financial responsibility for existing shared-cost programs if they so desire.

In a broader, but no less significant area of inter-governmental affairs, Ontario intends to make strong representations to the Federal Government, emphasizing the need for full provincial consultation and participation in formulating national policies of vital concern to the provinces, including future considerations of national policy relating to agriculture, communications, energy, foreign investment, international trade and urban affairs, with particular emphasis on urban renewal and housing.

To this end, my Government proposes to offer to host a tri-level conference this year in Ontario, in which federal, provincial and municipal governments will be represented. Such a conference will advance the important work begun last year, which my Government has supported and helped to sustain.

In the major reorganization which follows the study undertaken by the Committee on Government Productivity, a new Ministry of Treasury, Economics and Inter-Governmental Affairs will be established, with special responsibility for urban and regional planning, provincial-municipal relations and finance, and federal-provincial relations. The implementation of these activities will be integrated in the annual fiscal plan through the provincial budget. The Ministry recognizes the need for stronger and more independent local governments, and, in preparing future urban and regional plans, my Government will be able to avoid a fragmented approach and piece-meal planning by achieving a closer partnership with municipal representatives.

Proposals will be made to the Legislature on many specific urban and regional matters and a series of design for development reports will be made available, which will indicate the potential pattern of development in all regions of the Province. Plans will be introduced to create regional governments in Sudbury and Kitchener-Waterloo. Action will be taken to further the implementation of the Toronto-Centred Region Plan and the Design for Development of North-western Ontario.

As a result of the study by the Committee on Local Election Law, the Government will introduce a bill designed to reform election procedures, which will include the abolition of property qualifications for voters in municipal elections.

My Government, recognizing the significant role of the Ontario Municipal Board and believing it now appropriate to examine relationships of this Board with the municipalities, will conduct a review of the functions, responsibilities and practices of the Board, including consideration of appeals and petitions from its decisions. Municipalities, municipal organizations and the general public will be invited to participate in this review.

My Government will continue, in the summer months, the Employment for Youth Program and will increase the scope of this program by providing additional funds for its activities. The Summer Employment for Youth Program, which provides jobs for students and also funds alternative volunteer activities, is designed to complement the Opportunities for Youth Program of the Federal Government. The success of the various provincial programs including the retardation student volunteer program, project SWEEP, and the summer volunteer program of the Department of Social and Family Services, all initiated last year, is a tribute to the energy, enthusiasm and diligence of the young people of Ontario who were involved.

New activities will be added to the existing program, among them a correctional rehabilitation program involving student participation, as well as the project Youth and the Law, which has been designed to involve young people in an appreciation of law enforcement and the administration of justice.

In the present year, the substantial and practical task of restructuring the organization and processes of administration will be pressed forward as the Government implements the major recommendations of the Committee on Government Productivity. My Ministers are convinced of the need for such a reorganization in order to improve over-all effectiveness, and to develop new and better processes by which future policy may be considered and created, and existing policy can be reviewed and reformed.

To this end, new legislation will be introduced in order to provide for the implementation of these far-reaching recommendations. This legislation will be incorporated in an omnibus bill and Honourable Members will have the opportunity to debate its provisions, both in principle and specific detail.

The publication of other reports arising out of the continued work of the Cronyn Committee on Government Productivity will be forthcoming in the near future, including studies and recommendations on automatic data processing, communications and information, and on human resource utilization.

My Government will propose to Honourable Members that a Commission be appointed to review the functions and processes of the Legislature, and means by which these might be improved to give elected members better opportunities to serve their constituents and to enhance the role of the private member in this Legislature.

My Government will introduce legislation to prohibit the holding of more than one elected public office by any individual.

Legislation will be introduced allowing for reforms in the Ontario school record system, and providing greater safeguards to ensure the confidentiality of student records. This will establish the right of students and parents to have access to these records, based on the principle that such information is the private property of the individual concerned.

Legislation will be introduced that will enable school boards and municipal authorities to share in the development of various facilities for both school and community use. Through such arrangements the use of school buildings should be considerably enhanced and the concept of the school as a community resource will come closer to being a reality.

My Government intends to extend bilingual services, as required, to the municipal level, and in court proceedings. The report of the Ministerial Commission of French-language Secondary Education is expected in the near future, and the Government will consider its recommendations and consult the Legislature as to appropriate action. A senior position will be created in the Department of Education with specific responsibilities for integrating and co-ordinating the various existing programs and activities which the Department provides in support of the French-language instructional programs in the elementary and secondary schools of Ontario.

As part of a general review of over-all economic policy, my Government considers it urgent that there be a re-evaluation of its role and responsibility with regard to the Ontario housing industry, and will seek further means by

which housing construction can be encouraged so that more homes are available to more people at the lowest possible cost.

My Government will continue to give close attention to the needs of the agricultural industry, with increasing emphasis on the business aspects of farming, particularly farm management. Further initiatives will be taken to increase and diversify the use and sale of Ontario-grown agricultural and food products in domestic and export markets.

The Farm Products Marketing Act and The Ontario Milk Act will be amended to reflect the principles of recommendations contained in the recent report of the Royal Commission Inquiry into Civil Rights. Amendments to The Edible Oil Products Act to permit the blending of certain dairy products with edible oil products will be proposed.

In the field of health services, the recommendations of the Grange Report on Hospital Privileges will be implemented by legislation, which will provide an appeal mechanism for physicians who may be refused courtesy privileges in a hospital.

Legislation will be introduced providing insured services in nursing homes and homes for the aged, allowing the Province the necessary authority to expand its health care insurance program to cover needed medical care in this area.

My Government will take steps to improve the availability of essential dental and medical services to people in more isolated parts of the Province.

My Government, in considering the observations and recommendations of the Williston Report, will accelerate its efforts to provide improved treatment and facilities for the mentally ill, and expand the scope and availability of training programs for the retarded within their home communities.

My Government shares fully the concerns of the people of Ontario in respect to the protection and enhancement of our natural environment. The Ontario Water Resources Commission has maintained constant liaison with officials of the Federal Government, and has been involved in the discussions with the Government of the United States on co-operative measures to clean up the Great Lakes. The Government of Ontario will continue to press for the signing and implementation of an international agreement with respect to the control of pollution on the Great Lakes system.

My Government has completed a study on the many and increasing problems of waste and litter. A proposal to eliminate various unsightly conditions in our environment will be placed before you. A program will be implemented to remove the blight of abandoned automobile hulks and automobile graveyards from our landscape.

Substantial program expansion in outdoor recreation is planned over the next five years, to include the development of parks and land acquisition both for public open space and for environmental protection.

A Select Committee of the Legislature will be asked to consider proposals with regard to public safety and convenience in relation to motorized snow vehicles and all-terrain vehicles.

Experiments will be undertaken to test promising new systems and equipment in the field of urban transit, in the anticipation that Ontario may achieve technological leadership which can become the basis for new types of industries.

The Government will be proceeding with proposals to develop the lignite deposits at Onakawana in Northeastern Ontario, which are capable of supporting a 1000 megawatt power plant to help meet Ontario's continuing need for increased power. Such a development would create a much-needed focus of industry and employment and provide a stimulus for the whole James Bay area. Further exploration and testing will be carried out as a joint undertaking by the new Ministry of Natural Resources, the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, and a Canadian-owned corporation.

It is the intention of my Government to extend its program of annual achievement awards, which has existed for some years in the field of sport. The expanded program will cover other areas of citizen endeavour and recognize the contribution of the individual to our society.

In the field of the arts, such awards will be coupled with scholarships to permit further studies, and to encourage further achievement in this important area of our daily lives.

The Government believes greater recognition must be given to the fact that many of our cultural organizations are resources to be enjoyed by the whole Province, and means will be provided to make them more accessible to people throughout Ontario. To facilitate these and other programs, the various forms of provincial government support to individuals and cultural organizations will be reviewed and integrated.

My Government proposes to establish a community programs division within the Department of Correctional Services. This year, regional detention centres are to be completed at Ottawa and Niagara, construction will begin at London, and new centres in the Toronto and Hamilton areas are being planned.

Group homes for juveniles will be established in a number of communities in the coming year, sponsored by community-based organizations, in keeping with the policy of my Government to increase its involvement in support of community programs.

New clinical facilities are being provided to expand on the present treatment programs for prisoners with drug abuse and other problems. These new facilities will ensure that treatment in a modern clinical setting is available to all such offenders.

My Government will continue the mineral exploration assistance program initiated last year as a means of encouraging mining exploration in Northern Ontario.

The Government's resources transportation program in the North of our Province will include the construction of major roads in a northwesterly direction from Pickle Crow and Red Lake.

The Board of Directors of the Ontario Development Corporation and the Northern Ontario Development Corporation will be enlarged and their membership further diversified.

New policies concerning investments and loans, giving preference to Canadian-owned enterprises, will be introduced, and loans under the Venture Capital Fund, for businesses employing new technologies and for assistance in the growth of smaller enterprises, will be broadened.

My Government is aware of the current changes in world trading patterns and their possible effect on Ontario. Particular attention will be given to the changes affecting our exports to Great Britain, the European Common Market and to the United States.

To facilitate the gathering and dissemination of information for our business community, additional trade offices will be opened in new locations, as warranted by our export interests, including the establishment of an office in Washington, D.C.

It is my Government's intention to expand its activities in the field of industrial research and development, metric conversion and international standards and specifications, and to take all effective and practical steps to decrease Ontario's reliance on imported technology.

The Legislature will be asked to consider further amendments to the Ontario Paperback and Periodical Distributors Act, designed to encourage the distribution and sale of our own national or provincial publications.

The Government will have ready its proposals for a system of off-track betting facilities to be administered by a provincial government board with representatives from the various areas of the racing industry, as soon as the Criminal Code of Canada is amended to permit this. The Government's belief is that this Province, and any other Province which desires to do so, should be given the exclusive jurisdiction, by federal enactment, to control and administer this activity.

My Government believes, as do the people of Ontario, that our political system has been well served by municipal representatives, many of whom have accepted public office and responsibility at some personal sacrifice. A few of these elected officials from time to time have found themselves, inadvertently or otherwise, in a conflict of interest position between their public responsibilities and their private interests. Due to the wide area of public concern in this matter, studies have been circulated to a number of municipalities and organizations, seeking their reactions. These are presently under consideration and it is my Government's intention to introduce legislation during the current session to clarify any ambiguities that presently exist.

The programs outlined on this occasion have been the object of intensive scrutiny and thought on the part of the Government, as being in the best interests of the people of Ontario. We look forward with confidence to a fresh and revitalized approach to many complex problems of our society, and to the purposeful deliberations of the Honourable Members of this House.

May Divine Providence guide you in this task.

God bless the Queen and Canada.

Replying to a point of Order raised by the Member for High Park, Mr. Speaker ruled as follows:—

On Friday I undertook to take into consideration the allegations made by the Member for High Park and others respecting an answer of the Minister of Public Works in the oral question period.

At the outset, I feel that I should point out to the House that the rules governing the conduct of Members are based on the assumption that all Members are ladies and gentlemen and, as Lewis says at page 24 "the conduct of Members in the House is based on an etiquette of mutual consideration", and the 18th edition of May at page 418 says "good temper and moderation are the characteristics of parliamentary language", and it is for this reason that the Standing Orders and precedents specifically provide that no Member may accuse another of a deliberate falsehood or of deliberately misleading the House.

The Member for High Park attempted to circumvent this Standing Order by changing his expression to "dissembling to the House".

In the 1958 edition of Funk and Wagnall's Standard Dictionary, I find that the word dissemble is defined in part as "to conceal or disguise the true nature of intentions, feelings, etc., so as to deceive, to dissimulate."

While I feel that this comes very close to offending the Standing Order, it is not so clearly an accusation of misrepresentation or falsehood, that I feel it incumbent on me to deal further with that expression.

Referring to the Minister's response to the accusation, I can only say that, based on the presumption heretofore mentioned, parliamentary practice dictates that one Member must, as far as his conduct in the House is concerned, accept the explanation or denial of another Member. The Leader of the Opposition was quite correct in his observation that the Speaker cannot set himself up as a Judge as to who is telling the truth between two Members; he cannot and should not.

All Members are, of course, entitled to their own opinion, but as far as the procedure in the House is concerned the accusation having been made and answered that is the end of it.

Mr. Lewis, moved, seconded by Mr. Deans, that this House directs the Standing Committee on Resources Development to call before it the Workmen's Compensation Board, this Wednesday, March 15th, at 10.00 a.m. and any

I now find that precisely the same procedure was attempted on Tuesday, May 18th, 1971, by the same Member and was disallowed by the then Speaker, who proceeded on Thursday, May 20th, to deliver a very comprehensive ruling on this point, based in part on a ruling of the Speaker of the House of Commons of Canada, of Tuesday, May 2nd, 1961. In that ruling the Speaker of the House of Commons made two quotations from Beauschene which I consider very important; firstly, "It is a very fundamental rule that with the exception of certain matters dealt with under Routine Proceedings, no question can be considered by the House unless it has been previously appointed, either by a notice or a regular order of the House", secondly, "All motions referring to the business of the House should be introduced by the Leader of the House."

The ruling of Mr. Speaker Cass is very complete and precise and I refer the Members to it at page 74 of the Journals of 1971. The importance of that ruling at the present time is that the routine procedure MOTIONS is not open to Private Members, but is intended only for the routine motions respecting the business of the House and must be moved by the Minister leading the House at the time. I consider that ruling, well based as it is on sound authority, to be binding.

We reject the principle of increased prices for beer, wine, liquor and tobacco which provide manufacturers with windfall profits at the expense of the consumer without any justification.

We regret the intent of the Government to restrict access to post-secondary education through increased fees and reduced student aid, and urge as an alternative a student aid system which will assure equal access for all income groups based on ability to meet whatever standards are established."

Last week the Member for High Park stated that he had been informed that his telephone conversations with the Workmen's Compensation Board had been recorded on tape, and asked me to declare this a breach of privilege. While I am unable to find that it breaches one of those special privileges which the Assembly and the Members thereof enjoy, which other citizens do not, nevertheless, if proven, such action might well constitute a contempt, in that it might be considered to obstruct or impede a Member in the discharge of his duty. As the Honourable Member has asked me to deal with this matter, I wish to inform the House that I will write to the Chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board advising him that if such action has been taken in the past, it should be discontinued forthwith. This is, of course, without prejudice to any action that might be instituted in a Court of Law.

On the same day the Member for Scarborough West asked me to rule as to whether the speech made by the Chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board to the Empire Club constituted a breach of the sub judice rule. Obviously it does not. The sub judice rule, of course, applies only to things said in this House or the Committees thereof. I remind the Members of the reason for the rule. It is so that the rights of a person may not be prejudiced by remarks made in this Assembly, the governing body of the Province, which statements are privileged, so that the offended person does not have the normal right of recourse through the Courts.

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Mr. Davis moved, second by Mr. Winkler, That, for the purpose of its enquiry into the Workmen's Compensation Board only, the Standing Resources Development Committee be empowered to engage counsel to assist the Chairman and Members of the Committee in the enquiry, including the questioning of witnesses, and that persons whose interests may be affected by the enquiry, be allowed counsel to advise and assist them, which counsel may question witnesses only through the Committee counsel; also, that for the duration of this enquiry the Committee be authorized to sit concurrently with the House and have its proceedings recorded and transcribed by the Hansard Office.

(4) Some profound thought be given to the principle of "economic rent" as outlined cursorily by the said Committee and by the Select Committee on Taxation, as the fundament upon which to guide taxation policy in this area of our partially renewable resources.

Yesterday a question was raised regarding the exclusion of the Press from meetings of the Public Accounts Committee, and reference was made to Standing Order 7, which states that "All strangers may be excluded from the House on a motion properly moved and adopted by the House."

Rule 1 (a) states that the proceedings in the Legislative Assembly of Ontario and in all Committees of the Assembly shall be conducted according to the Standing Orders as adopted on April 22, 1970, and it, therefore, follows that Standing Order 7 would apply to proceedings in the Public Accounts Committee.

On February 15 of this year an opinion was provided to the Chairman of a Select Committee of this House, which opinion I had not read until late yesterday afternoon, to the effect that the word "strangers" as used in Standing Order 7 applied to everyone except the Members and the Officers of the House, and would therefore apply to members of the Press.

I am sure that Standing Order 7 was included in our rules for a purpose but I am equally sure that the provisions of that particular rule have not been applied in this House for a good many years at least. There are, however, precedents in other jurisdictions where the rule has been applied to proceedings in Committee, for various reasons, and in this Legislature it has been customary to exclude the public and the press from Committee Meetings at which their reports are being drafted. This is essential as any publication of the contents of a Committee Report prior to its presentation in the House would not be proper.

My attention has been drawn to the fact that the Public Accounts Committee, without so much as the adoption of a motion to do so, had barred the press and public from their deliberations at yesterday's meeting. The Hansard reporters were also asked to "remain in the hall outside". In these busy times it does seem somewhat undesirable to arrange public meetings at which Hansard coverage has been requested, and then, without notice, to bar the public, press and Official Hansard staff for indefinite periods of time.

In view of the foregoing, I, therefore, rule that Standing Committees of this Assembly may properly continue the practice of excluding the public and the press from their meetings at which their reports are being drafted but that exclusion of the public and the press at any other times be only on a motion properly moved and adopted by the House.

I might add that, while the rulings of a Speaker may not be debated, they may, of course, be challenged. In my opinion there is a lack of clarity in our



Standing Orders in respect to the ruling I have just made and I recommend that, if the House does not agree with my ruling and does not challenge the same, the entire matter should be referred to the Procedural Affairs Committee with a view to clarifying the rules.

They need only refrain from taking action in any given case; but, I suggest that before any positive step is taken to permanently rescind this privilege, the Members should think about it very seriously.

We reject the principle of increased prices for beer, wine, liquor and tobacco which provide manufacturers with windfall profits at the expense of the consumer without any justification.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and faithful subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, in Session assembled, approach Your Honour with sentiments of unfeigned devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty's person and Government, and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance a Bill intituled, "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain additional sums of money for the Public Service for the fiscal year ending the 31st day of March, 1973."

To this Act the Royal Assent was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:—

"The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor doth thank Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, accept their benevolence and assent to this Bill in Her Majesty's name."

---

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to deliver the following gracious speech:—

*Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:*

The conclusion of the second session of the twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario marks just over a year of activity and endeavour in the life of this Assembly, and also affords an appropriate opportunity for a year-end review of events pertinent to the members of this House and to the people of Ontario.

Three serious natural misfortunes have afflicted portions of our population in recent months. In mid-June, frost severely damaged crops in southwestern Ontario's farm lands. Farmers in Eastern Ontario suffered crop losses as a

result of torrential rains in July. Last month's storm and flooding in the south-western counties of Essex and Kent happily took no lives, but brought great hardship on the residents. Ready assistance was given to those who suffered losses in these circumstances as a result of deep concern by both the Government and people in other parts of Ontario. We commend highly the steadfastness and courage of individual families and local organizations in the face of these difficulties.

At the onset of another winter season, we face the lingering problem of a less than happy employment situation. Accordingly, my government has taken steps to provide for approximately 29,000 jobs at this time in structured and worthwhile activities that will be of value both to the community and to those employed. The greater share of this assistance, amounting to \$35 million, will be allocated to local municipalities for the municipal employment incentive program. Another \$15 million will be spent directly in provincial ministerial programs.

While such pressing needs must be met, government is also faced with the task of not placing too great a burden on those who are able to contribute in larger measure to the community as a whole. Through a new Property Tax Credit Plan announced early in the year, the province will refund \$160 million to property owners and tenants as part of the government's continuing effort to make taxation more equitable. The recently completed Guelph study confirmed that property taxes bears heavily on low-income families and pensioners, and offered the assurance that the Ontario Tax Credit Plan will offset this regressive effect by delivering tax reliefs where it is most needed. The new plan replaces the Residential Property Tax Reduction system which was in effect over the previous four years.

In the interest of accurately determining the province's long-term economic objectives, my government has established a joint Committee on Economic Policy, composed of business, labour and government representatives. This measure was taken in response to the work of the Select Committee on Economic and Cultural Nationalism, as were a series of proposals announced in June for a sound foreign investment policy, and specifically with respect to companies that are within the jurisdiction of this province.

Last spring a complete reorganization of the structure of the government was made with the aim of improving and updating its policy-making and operational functions. My government is pleased with the new organization, which has resulted in a revitalized and flexible administrative system. We look ahead with high expectations for the proposals with respect to the Legislative Assembly itself, as will be made by the Commission appointed last June for this purpose.

Our achievements in the expanding area of social services include the creation of a new comprehensive Ontario Health Insurance Plan for all health care services, and the provision of extended health insurance in nursing homes and homes for the aged.

In recent weeks my government announced measures to improve the efficiency of our health delivery systems, which, as a result of government



responsiveness to public need in this area over the past few years, have provided an adequate network of hospital and health care facilities for the people of Ontario.

The same is true in the field of education, where the construction of facilities over the past decade has kept pace with a rapid rise in school, college and university enrolments. My government is confident our school and university administrators will put all facilities to their best and fullest use, so that scarce funds may be used to best advantage.

At the start of the current academic year, the government provided increased financial assistance through the Ontario Student Aid Program by lowering the requirement for independent students to age 24, a step that will be of benefit mainly to our graduate students and students in the long-term professional programs. An expanded summer employment program provided 18,500 student jobs at a cost of \$21.4 million.

A few days ago the government announced future plans for programs affecting the young people of this Province, and especially for student summer employment projects both within government and in the private sector. Coordinating responsibility in this area is being entrusted to a member of the Cabinet, with individual ministries retaining operating responsibility for any youth-oriented programs within their portfolios. The existing Interdepartmental Committee on Youth will act in an advisory capacity to the new Youth Secretariat.

My government is pleased to record progress in a \$10 million province-wide day care project in which it offered to pay 100% of the cost of centres approved for construction during the past winter and completed by July 31, 1972, with support to 80% of costs after that date. As a result of the program, 62 new day care centres are almost completed with planned accommodation for about 3,000 children.

Of these 62 new facilities, 44 are being operated by municipalities, 9 by Indians Bands and another 9 are being run by groups associated with the Ontario Association for the Mentally Retarded.

The Ministry of Community and Social Services shares in changing public attitudes on the need for these facilities. About 880 centres are now in operation across the province, and are caring for an estimated 37,000 children.

Efforts have been continued toward ensuring that all citizens have good shelter and toward reducing the financial barriers, brought about by spiralling prices, that face many families who wish to own a home. In September the Ontario Housing Corporation announced an adjustment to some of its mortgage lending regulations in a speedy reaction to new ceilings for mortgage lending under the National Housing Act. One adjustment now allows 100% of a working wife's total income to count towards total family earnings under provincial lending regulations of the Home Ownership Made Easy program. In addition, the maximum proportion of family income now allowed for principal, interest and taxes in mortgage funding is raised from 27% to 30%. Possible inflationary effects of these changes are expected to be minimal because of the comparatively low cost of houses under the HOME plan and the added fact that the land is leased at cost to the purchaser.

My government fully appreciates the problems that remain to be tackled in this area. To this end, an Advisory Task Force on Housing Policy was appointed in mid-November, to examine the current housing situation in the province. The Task Force, under the chairmanship of Professor Eli Comay of York University, is also charged to report on the appropriate role of the Ontario Government in relation to other levels of government, the business sector and private citizens.

My government has made significant advances with respect to its resources policies. Basically, many of these reflect on the vital issues of land use and land use controls. An agricultural land use study is under way in Southern Ontario to provide guidance for public planning in the preservation of farm land for food production.

As announced just weeks ago, the government expects publication shortly of the report of the Niagara Escarpment Task Force, which will undoubtedly have far-reaching effects on land use planning for other areas of the province as well.

Growing public concern for the ecology has been matched by strong measures by the Ministry of the Environment, ranging from a regulation banning disposable 3-quart polyethylene milk jugs to the province's role in encouraging negotiations that culminated with the signing of a United States-Canada Great Lakes Anti-Pollution Agreement in Ottawa last spring.

The year has not gone by without its share of labour problems and strikes. My government is taking steps to minimize these occurrences in future and the hardships they impose on the workers involved and on the general public. In the construction industry, in recognition of the need for more effective settlement machinery in collective bargaining, a review panel has been established to work for a program of settlements on a year-round basis. In this way the government hopes a measure of peace will be brought to major bargaining negotiations scheduled to take place next year.

The 15th of June was the tenth anniversary of the proclamation of the Ontario Human Rights Code. The event is being marked by a comprehensive overhaul of the code to strengthen and clarify it and bring it up-to-date in terms of the needs and requirements of the many newcomers to our province. Equal opportunity in employment is still the cornerstone of the Ontario Human Rights Code. But above and beyond this, equality of opportunity must be assured to all residents, enabling all to give of their best to the economic, social and cultural enrichment of our province regardless of race, creed, colour, sex, nationality, ancestry or place of origin.

A new trade and travel centre, located in Toronto, was opened by the Ministry of Industry and Tourism in September. The main purpose of the centre is to stimulate Ontario business at home and abroad. Ontario's tourist industry will benefit from the existence of a travel enquiry facility in the centre. Business interests are able to secure information related to industrial programs, tariffs and transportation, as well as information for prospective buyers on Ontario's business capacity and potential.

Two intra-provincial agencies, the Ontario Development Corporation and the Northern Ontario Development Corporation, have been given decentralized lending authority for loans to small businesses throughout the province. Other initiatives in this area include the establishment earlier this year of a \$5 million fund for short-term loans to small and medium-sized manufacturers who sell to foreign markets but are ineligible for federal financing.

Phase III of the Government's Design for Development program as announced in June is geared to future government initiatives in the three following areas: provincial-regional social and economic planning policy; local government reform policy; and provincial-municipal fiscal reform policy.

Ontario is pleased to have been host for the first tri-level conference of federal, provincial and municipal representatives which took place last month as a medium for successful exchange and consultation on a variety of inter-related subjects.

One dilemma facing city governments all over the world is how to come to grips with already existing or potential problems of overcrowding, congestion and stress, and that twice-daily phenomenon of urban life—the rush hour. While it is recognized that the vitality of the city depends on cars and commercial vehicles continuing to play key roles in the overall transportation scene, their unrestricted use during the peak hours of travel to work and back has been making transportation problems critical. Additional and alternative means of moving people and goods must be found.

My government has committed itself to assist municipalities in a far-reaching urban transportation policy for Ontario, based on improvements to existing public transportation systems in all our cities, and a proposed new intermediate capacity system for the three most populated municipalities.

The proposals include increased provincial subsidies to municipalities for the purchase of buses, streetcars and trolley buses. More provincial resources are also being made available to upgrade and expand computer-controlled traffic systems and maximize the use of existing roadways. In summary, the province has undertaken to direct increased efforts and resources to the coordination of transportation planning among Ontario's municipalities.

The Ontario Government is confident that the implementation of recently announced measures will help preserve in our cities the capacity to ensure a full range of services for the people who live and work in them.

In the pursuit of an ideal of justice as perceived by our society as a whole, Ontarians can indeed be proud of the proclamation, on April 17, 1972, of legislative reforms clearly establishing the rights of the individual against the power of the state. This legislation culminated a long series of reforms since 1964, as a result of recommendations by The Honourable Mr. Justice J. C. McRuer in the Ontario Government's Royal Commission Inquiry into Civil Rights. The all-pervasive implications of the individual's rights in society as interpreted in these reforms are a reflection of the high ideals of the people of this province, and as such stand to be cherished and revered by all Ontarians.

The consumer credit system by which most people in our society are able to obtain some of the goods and commodities that go with a pleasant way of life has left itself open to abuse of the privacy of the individual. My government has therefore introduced new legislation to regulate the giving of consumer reports and govern the disclosure and review of such information. It is also intended to establish controls with respect to an individual's credit history, health and personal character.

This review of some of the achievements of the second session of the twenty-ninth Parliament of this province is evidence of its having been a full and productive one. Other legislation of great significance of the people of Ontario was placed before the members of this Assembly, examined and given approval and assent.

You hold in your charge the affairs of the people of this province who in turn look to you to continue to bear that trust with the dedication and will that you have shown in the past year. I share your hopes for the future of this province and of our country and join with its people in commending your contribution toward the achievement of these aspirations.

In declaring this session prorogued, I would take the opportunity, on your behalf, to express greetings of the season to all the people of Ontario. I pray also that Divine Providence may guide each of you through a safe and pleasant holiday with your families and with those whom you represent here.

In our Sovereign's name, I thank you.

God bless the Queen and Canada.
