President's Message

Since its incorporation in 1995, the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Foundation has raised nearly **\$340,000** for natural and cultural heritage conservation. In 2004, support for the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority's (LTVCA) programs and services was **\$21,160**. This was the result of the combined efforts of dozens of local citizens, businesses, service clubs and community groups working together to preserve and restore our fragile ecosystem for future generations.

Last year, **Mrs. A. Cobban** of Mt. Brydges generously donated money for the Longwoods Road and Sharon Creek Conservation Areas. The **McKinlay Funeral Home** in Chatham, the **John C. Badder Funeral Home** in Thamesville, the **Badder & Robinson Funeral Home** in Bothwell, along with private donors, funded 370 new trees in five memorial forests across our lower Thames River watershed. A partnership was developed with the **Tilbury and District Horticultural Society**, promoting the reforestation of local parkland through our memorial forest program. A River and Creek Safety Program was delivered to Grade two's in 12 schools, with funding from the **Delaware Lions, Delaware Lioness, Glencoe Lioness, IODE-Elgin West, Mt. Brydges Lioness, Mt. Brydges Optimist, Optimist of West Lorne, Rodney Kiwanis, Royal Canadian Legion Br. 251, Royal Canadian Legion Br. 598, Rose-Marie Ur, MP and Southwold Township**. Educational resource materials were improved with monies raised at our annual **Golf Tournament**. Local residents and businesses adopted nature trails at Longwoods Road through our **Interpretive Trail Sponsorship Program**. Grants from the **Federal Government's Human Resources and Skills Development Canada - Summer Career Placement Program** provided opportunities for summer students to work on natural and cultural heritage projects. The Foundation also commends the efforts of the **Friends of Sharon Creek** for their preservation of the Sharon Creek Conservation Area.

I extend my deepest appreciation to the Foundation's Board of Directors and volunteers for their dedication and countless hours of service. And thank you to the members and staff of the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority and our many "partners in conservation" who supported environmental outreach activities across the watershed. It is your commitment and outstanding effort that continues to turn conservation goals into realities.

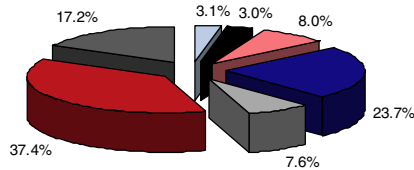

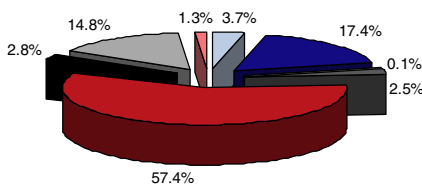

MEMORIAL FOREST PROGRAM *memories live on*

A focus of the Foundation over the years has been its memorial forest program with over 4,000 memorial trees planted. In 2004, \$11,108 in donations was received for 370 trees, dedicated to loved ones, in five Foundation memorial forests. The value of this memorial forest program has been reinforced, with less than two percent tree cover coupled with the demise of ash trees from the Emerald Ash Borer, in the lower Thames watershed. This program also helps support conservation lands and education programs of the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Authority. Recognized for their ongoing support of the memorial forest program are the **McKinlay Funeral Homes of Chatham, John C. Badder and Badder & Robinson Funeral Homes** of Thamesville and Bothwell, and the **Tilbury and District Horticultural Society**. Friends and families dedicate trees to loved ones who have passed away by contacting the Foundation, requesting a tree donation card and making a \$30 donation for each tree. Next of kin receive a certificate, and an invitation to an annual memorial forest service.

"Friends" Helping Out

The Foundation is appreciative of the hard work that is being done by local volunteer groups to help reforest our watershed and region. Of special mention are the **Friends of Sharon Creek** in Delaware and the **Tilbury and District Horticultural Society**. The partnerships that have developed are valued and of benefit to local communities.

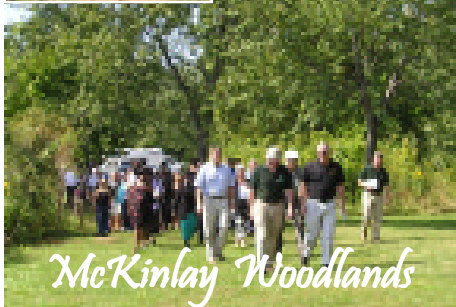


In 2004, the Tilbury and District Horticultural Society partnered with the Foundation to develop a new memorial forest in Tilbury Northside Park. The Horticultural Society promotes the memorial forest program in their local community and supports the reforestation of this property. The official opening of the Tilbury Northside Memorial Forest was held on October 3 at the first annual dedication service.



Some of the memorial forests are located in conservation areas. The Sharon Creek Memorial Forest is located in the Sharon Creek Conservation Area near Delaware. A volunteer group named the "Friends of Sharon Creek" support this conservation area by paying the annual taxes, and improving facilities. The Foundation offers its support to a variety of their projects such as accessing special funding for conservation activities.

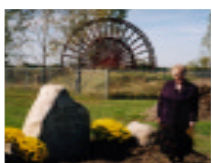
Memorial Forest Tree Dedications



McKinlay Woodlands

On September 12, the seventh annual dedication service was held at the **McKinlay Woodlands**, located at the C.M. Wilson Conservation Area, south of Chatham. Over 1,500 friends and family members attended.

Foundation Director Peter Snow offered greetings at the service. Over 200 memorial trees were dedicated in 2004 bringing the total of memorial trees now growing at McKinlay Woodlands to nearly 2,200.

Foundation Director Glenn Stott brought greetings to the service. Close to 100 trees were dedicated in 2004 bringing the total of memorial trees now growing in memory of loved ones at this memorial forest to over 400.

On October 3, the first annual dedication service was held at the **Tilbury Northside Memorial Forest**, located at the Tilbury Northside Park. Over 75 friends and family members attended. Foundation Director Al McGregor brought greetings from the Foundation. Nineteen trees were dedicated in memory of loved ones in 2004.

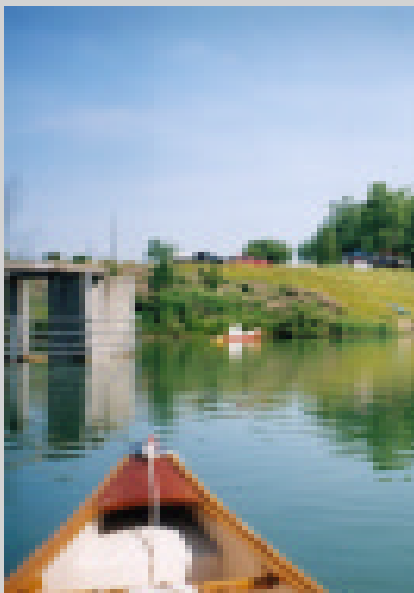


Partners with "friends"

The Foundation continued its productive working relationship with a Delaware volunteer group call the "**Friends of Sharon Creek**" (FOSC). Conservation projects take on a grassroots approach and welcome community involvement. The work that this group does is invaluable, and the Foundation applauds its efforts. The "friends" organization works hand-in hand with the Foundation.

Sharon Creek Trust Fund

Under the umbrella of the Lower Thames Valley Conservation Foundation, money is growing in a separate "trust" fund for Sharon Creek Conservation Area. The goal of this "fund" is to eventually have enough money to pay the annual maintenance costs and property taxes so that future generations are guaranteed the preservation of this beautiful conservation area. Each year, the Foundation makes a contribution towards this trust fund from a percentage of tree donations to the Sharon Creek Memorial Forest made by the Elliott-Madill Funeral Home in Mount Brydges. The FOSC also make annual donations to this trust fund from their fund-raising projects. At year-end, \$15,723 was growing "in trust" for Sharon Creek Conservation Area.



Supporting Conservation Lands

Over the past year, the Foundation invited service clubs, local businesses, charitable foundations and private citizens to become "partners in conservation" to support and improve conservation lands and facilities of the LTVCA. This is an opportunity for sponsors to have their name in publications and on signs, receive media attention, and to receive a tax receipt, all in recognition of their support. The Foundation applies for Government grants and corporate sponsorship on behalf of the Conservation Authority. This special funding hires summer students and helps to purchase equipment not covered through the LTVCA's budget, but needed to operate programs in the conservation areas. A trail sponsorship program at Longwoods Road Conservation Area raises money for the upkeep of the wheelchair accessible nature trails.

In 2004, the Foundation received a **\$5,000 donation from Mrs. Audrey Cobban of Mt. Brydges** to be split between the Sharon Creek and Longwoods Road Conservation Areas. Mrs. Cobban wishes her donation to be used for capital development and / or summer student employment. The Foundation recognizes Mrs. Cobban's ongoing generosity and support of these local conservation lands and will ensure that her donation is used appropriately.

Government Grants



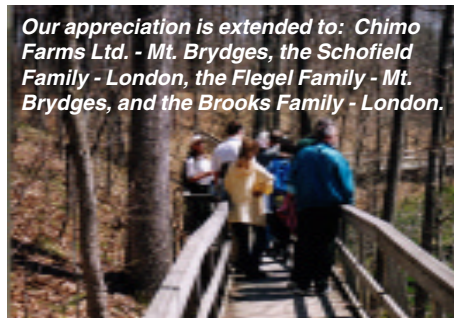
A summer day camp was popular at Longwoods in 2004. Youngsters enjoyed a visit to the Museum, an outdoor tour of Ska-Nah-Doht Iroquoian Village and nature activities. To coordinate the program, Erin Watson was hired on the SCP grant, applied for by the Foundation.

The Foundation recognizes the financial support they received for conservation projects, from private individuals, government programs and other charitable foundation grants. As a result of the Foundation's application to the **Federal Government's Human Resources and Skills Development Canada - Summer Career Placement (SCP) Program**, four summer students were hired with \$8,687 of special funding. One position was for Ska-Nah-Doht Iroquoian Village and the other three students worked at the LTVCA's

Chatham Administration Building and the C.M. Wilson Conservation Area. In addition, the Foundation supplemented three summer student positions for Ska-Nah-Doht with \$1,718 of funding.

Nature Trail Sponsorship

Groups sponsor the 6.5 km of nature trails at Longwoods Road Conservation Area. Two trails are wheelchair accessible. Donations are used to provide stone chips, repair boardwalks and stairs, and clear and prune trails. Sponsors are recognized on trail signs and receive tax receipts.

Supporting Education Programs

The Conservation and Ska-Nah-Doht Iroquoian Studies programs at Longwoods Road Conservation Area, are unique to our watershed and benefit from "partners in conservation" to be preserved for all to enjoy. Annually, over 7,000 students participate in these programs. Donations from service clubs, the golf tournament, foundations, corporations, and individuals, help maintain trails, supply educational equipment, sponsor new programs and provide e-mail and internet access at Longwoods. In 2004, local service club donations supported the River and Creek Safety Program: **Delaware Lions, Delaware Lioness, Glencoe Lioness, IODE-Elgin West, Mt. Brydges Lioness, Mt. Brydges Optimist, Optimist of West Lorne, Rodney Kiwanis, Royal Canadian Legion Br. 251, Royal Canadian Legion Br. 598, Rose-Marie Ur, MP** and the **Township of Southwold**. As well, **Wittland Investment** of Mt. Brydges sponsored birdseed for the feeders at Longwoods. Memorial forest funds also supported education programs as our Foundation provided \$1,750 towards the development of a Species at Risk Education Program for High School students.



*The Foundation worked on an application to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for the restoration of 3 heritage log cabins at Longwoods. The application is in collaboration with the **Upper Thames Military Re-enactment Society**. **Sherri Flegel**, a community volunteer, is recognized for her tremendous amount of time writing the application. Directors Peter Snow, Anne Smith and Glenn Stott have added significant research to this project.*
