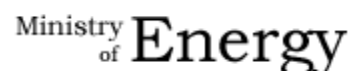


Weekly Gasoline Report



The Gasoline Report is a roundup of consumer gasoline prices from across Ontario and Canada. The graph shows price trends for three Ontario cities for the previous 12 month period. The report and graph are updated weekly.

This week's Gasoline Report is for the week ending September 25, 2006

Lower prices in southern Ontario offset higher prices in some northern markets, causing the Ontario average retail price of regular unleaded gasoline to decline for the seventh straight week, by 1.9 cents to 83.4 cents a litre, a seven-month low.

Prices fell by 3.5 cents in Ottawa (to a seven-month low), 2.8 cents in Toronto East (to a 19-month low), 2.4 cents in Toronto West (to a 16-month low), 1.8 cents in Windsor (to a seven-month low), 1.3 cents in Thunder Bay (to a seven-month low), 1.0 cents in Timmins (to a six-month low), and 0.3 cents in London (to a seven-month low). Prices rose by 8.1 cents in Sault Ste. Marie (from a 20-month low), 5.4 cents in Sudbury (from a seven-month low), and 5.1 cents in North Bay (from a nine-month low). The Ontario average retail diesel price declined for the seventh straight week, by 2.6 cents to 91.2 cents, a six-month low. In the third quarter of 2006, the Ontario gasoline price averaged 99.1 cents, down 0.9 cents from the same period in 2005, and the diesel price averaged 99.0 cents, up 5.0 cents.

The weekly Canadian average retail gasoline price declined by 2.3 cents to 87.9 cents, a seven-month low. Prices fell by 7.1 cents in Saint John, 4.2 cents in St. John's, 4.1 cents in Halifax, 4.0 cents in Montreal, 2.8 cents in Toronto, 2.1 cents in Quebec City, 1.4 cents in Calgary, 1.0 cents in Winnipeg and Regina, and 0.6 cents in Edmonton. Prices in all of these markets were at seven-month lows, except in Quebec City and Saint John, where they were at 19-month lows, and in Montreal. Prices rose by 2.3 cents in Vancouver. The Canadian average retail diesel price declined for the sixth straight week, by 5.6 cents to 91.5 cents, a seven-month low. In the third quarter, the Canadian gasoline price averaged 102.9 cents, up 0.8 cents from the same period in 2005, and the diesel price averaged 102.3 cents, up 6.3 cents.

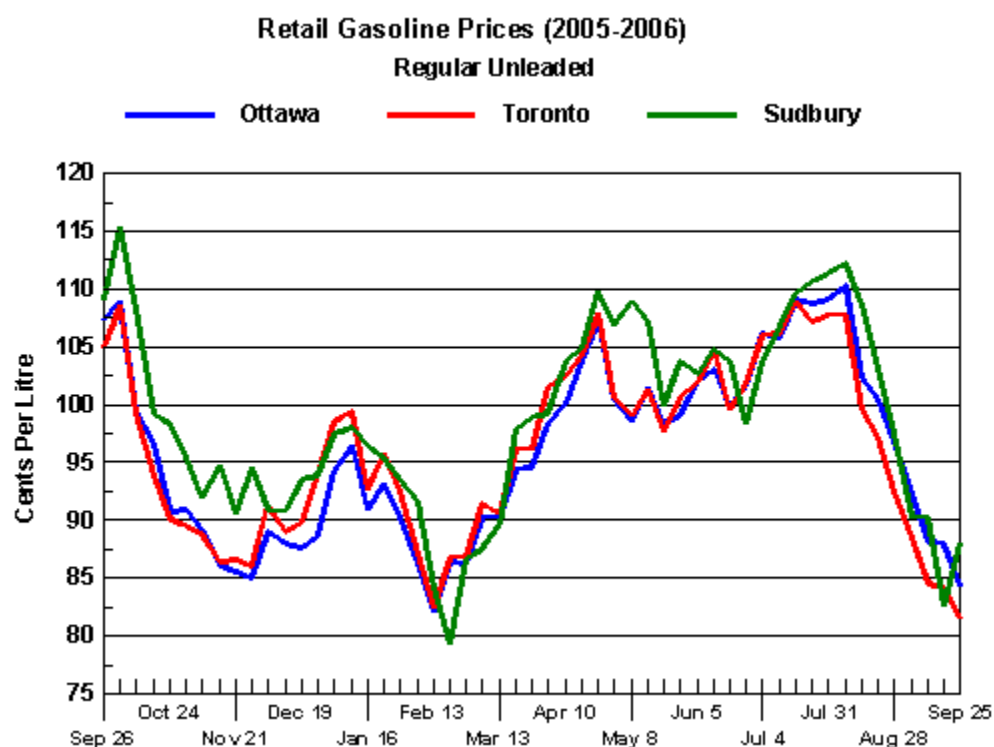
