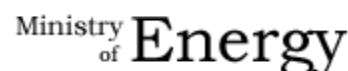


Weekly Gasoline Report



The Gasoline Report is a roundup of consumer gasoline prices from across Ontario and Canada. The graph shows price trends for three Ontario cities for the previous 12 month period. The report and graph are updated weekly.

This week's Gasoline Report is for the week ending January 29, 2007

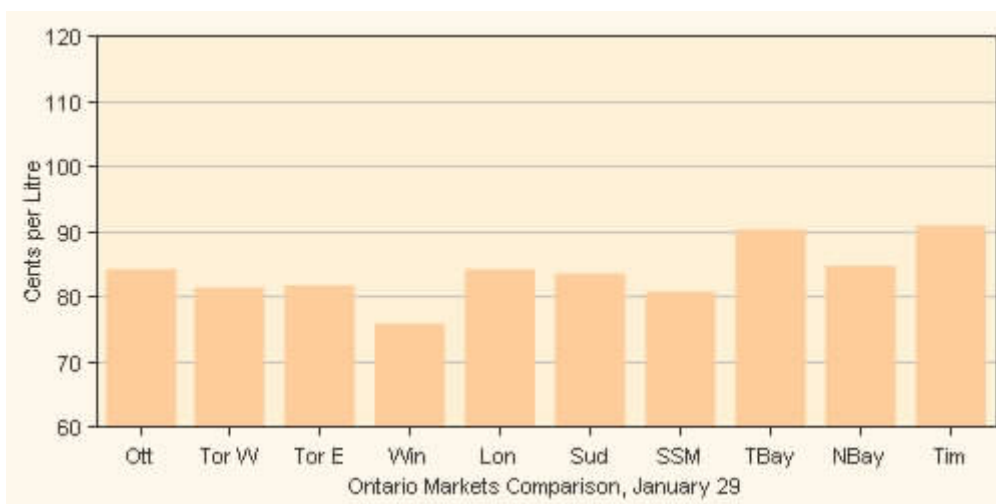
After declining five straight weeks, the Ontario average retail price of regular unleaded gasoline increased by 2.9 cents from a 23-month low to 82.4 cents a litre, reflecting a rebound in crude oil and wholesale prices and the end of price wars in some markets.

Prices rose by 6.1 cents in Sault Ste. Marie (from a 36-month low), 3.7 cents in London (from a 23-month low), 3.4 cents in Toronto (from a 23-month low), 2.8 cents in Ottawa (from a 23-month low), 2.5 cents in Windsor (from a 25-month low), 1.1 cents in Sudbury (from a three-month low), and 0.9 cents in North Bay (from a two-month low). Prices fell by 7.2 cents in Thunder Bay (to an eleven-month low) and 3.1 cents in Timmins (to a 19-month low). Windsor was the lowest-priced market for the third straight week. The average price gap between northern and southern Ontario narrowed for the third straight week, from a revised 8.1 cents to 4.0 cents. The Ontario average retail diesel price declined for the fifth straight week, by 0.5 cents to 86.2 cents, a 20-month low.

The Canadian average retail gasoline price, after declining five straight weeks, increased by 0.4 cents from a 23-month low to 84.1 cents. Prices rose by 2.0 cents in Toronto (from a 25-month low), 1.5 cents in Montreal (from a three-month low), and 0.5 cents in Edmonton (from a thirteen-month low). Prices fell by 3.4 cents in Vancouver (to an eleven-month low), 2.4 cents in Saint John (to a 24-month low), 2.0 cents in Regina (to an eleven-month low), 1.7 cents in Winnipeg (to a 24-month low), 1.6 cents in Quebec City (to a three-month low), and 0.2 cents in Calgary (to a 23-month low). The Canadian average retail diesel price declined for the fourth straight week, by 1.0 cents to 92.0 cents, a two-month low.

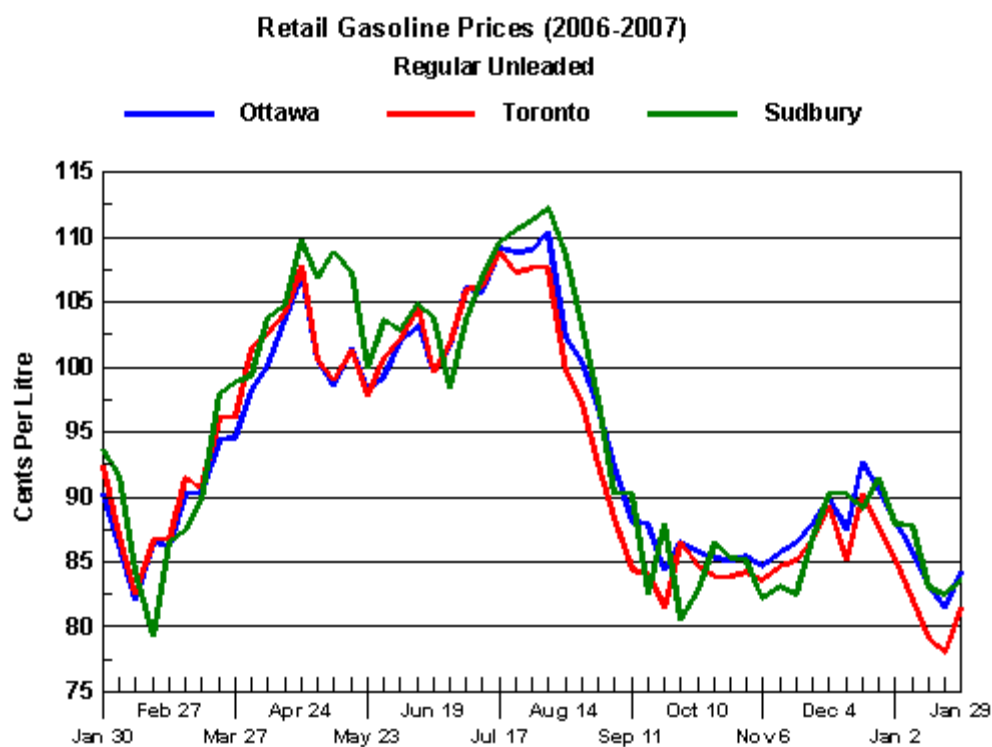
