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GASOLINE REPORT

Gasoline Report

The Gasoline Report is a roundup of consumer gasoline prices from across Ontario and Canada. The graph shows price trends for three Ontario cities for the previous 12 month period. The report and graph are updated weekly. This week's Gasoline Report is for the week ending November 15, 2010.

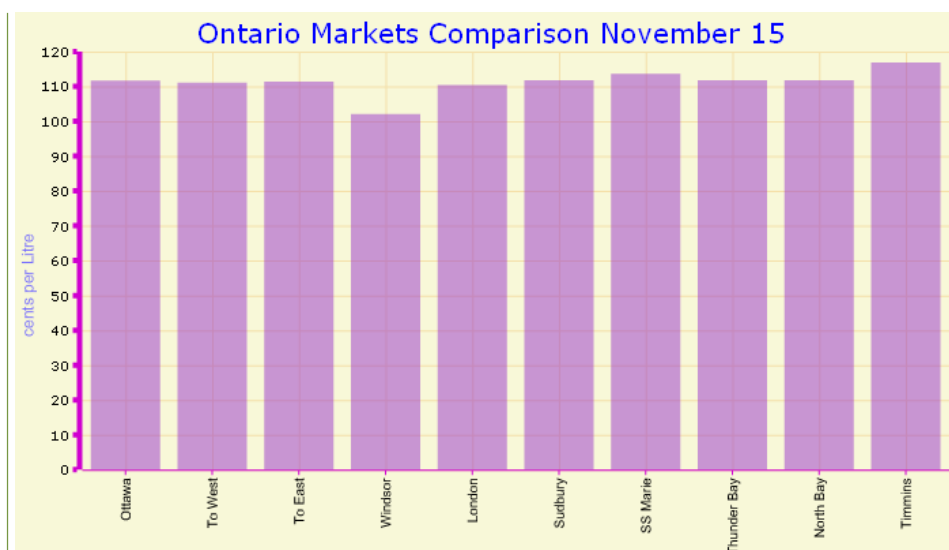
The Ontario average retail price of regular unleaded gasoline increased for the third straight week, by 4.4 cents to 110.9 cents a litre, its highest level since September 2008, as world crude oil prices touched a 25-month high of nearly US\$88 a barrel and wholesale prices rose.

Prices rose by 12.1 cents in Sudbury, 11.3 cents in North Bay, 4.8 cents in Sault Ste. Marie, 4.1 cents in both Toronto and Ottawa, 3.9 cents in Windsor, 3.7 cents in London, and 3.0 cents in both Thunder Bay and Timmins. Prices were at 26-month highs in Toronto, Ottawa, and London, and at 25-month highs in the other cities. Windsor had the lowest average price for the nineteenth straight week. Prices in northern Ontario were 1.7 cents higher on average than in the south, a reversal of the previous week's situation when they were 1.4 cents lower. The Ontario average retail diesel price increased for the second straight week, by 2.1 cents to 108.2 cents, its highest level since November 2008.

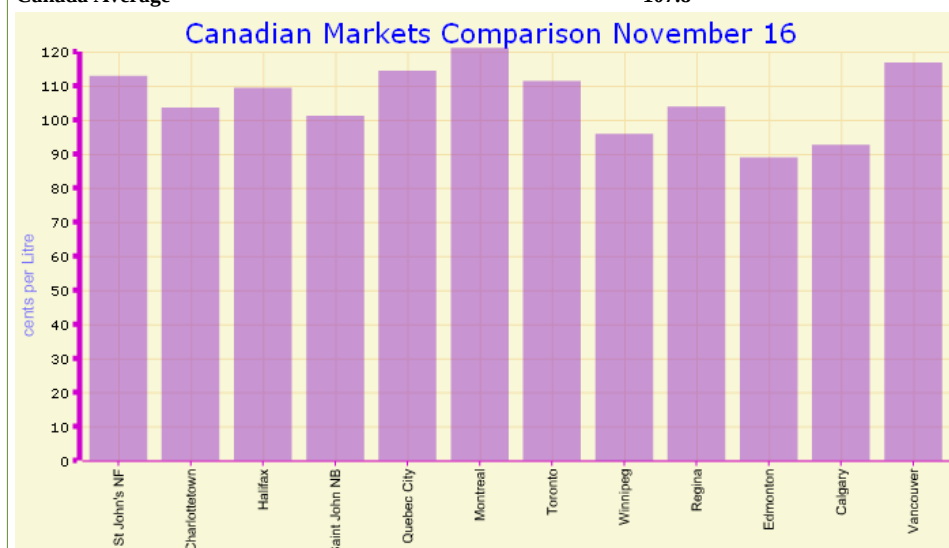
The Canadian average retail gasoline price increased for the third straight week, by 2.3 cents to 110.1 cents, its highest level since October 2008. Prices rose by 7.0 cents in Quebec City (to a 25-month high), 3.8 cents in Montreal (to a 26-month high), 3.5 cents in Toronto (to a 26-month high), 2.6 cents in Charlottetown (to a six-month high), 1.8 cents in Halifax, 1.5 cents in Vancouver (to a two-month high), 1.3 cents in St. John's, and 0.3 cents in Saint John. Prices fell by 0.9 cents in Edmonton. The Canadian average retail diesel price increased for the second straight week, by 2.0 cents to 109.5 cents, its highest level since November 2008.

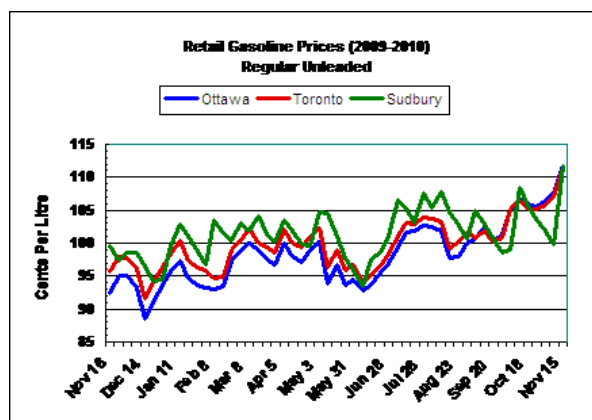
