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GASOLINE REPORT

Gasoline Report

The Gasoline Report is a roundup of consumer gasoline prices from across Ontario and Canada. The graph shows price trends for three Ontario cities for the previous 12 month period. The report and graph are updated weekly. This week's Gasoline Report is for the week ending April 4, 2011.

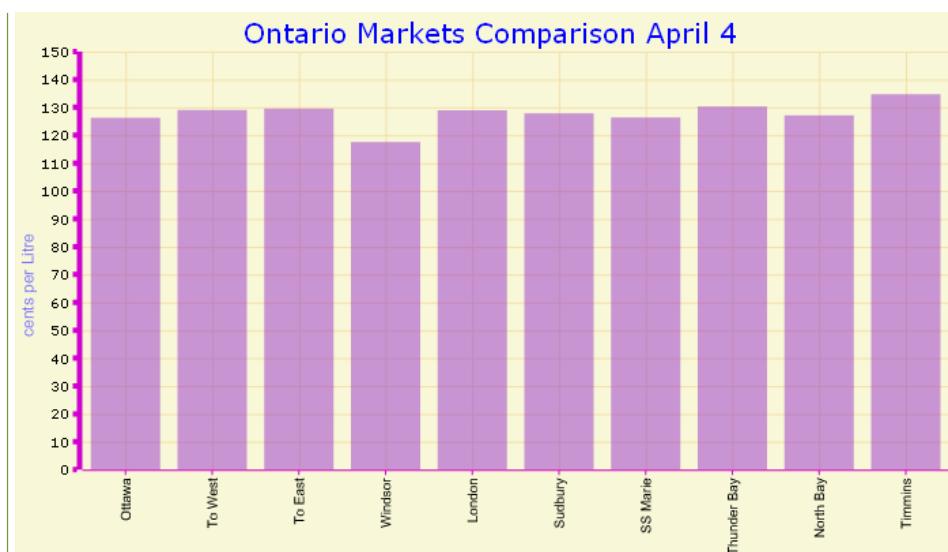
The Ontario average retail price of regular unleaded gasoline increased for the second straight week, by 4.6 cents to 128.1 cents a litre, its highest level since September 2008, reflecting West Texas crude oil prices of nearly US\$108 a barrel and higher North American wholesale prices.

Prices rose by 11.0 cents from a three-month low in Sault Ste. Marie (to a 30-month high), 5.7 cents in Toronto (to a 31-month high), 5.5 cents in London (to a 31-month high), 4.3 cents in Sudbury, 3.8 cents in North Bay, 2.7 cents in Ottawa (to a 31-month high), 1.0 cents in Timmins (to a 31-month high), and 0.3 cents in Thunder Bay (to a 30-month high). Prices fell by 1.5 cents in Windsor (from a 30-month high). The average price gap between northern and southern Ontario narrowed for the third straight week, from 1.7 cents to 0.8 cents, a five-month low. The Ontario average retail diesel price rose for the sixth straight week, by 0.2 cents to 129.1 cents, its highest level since August 2008.

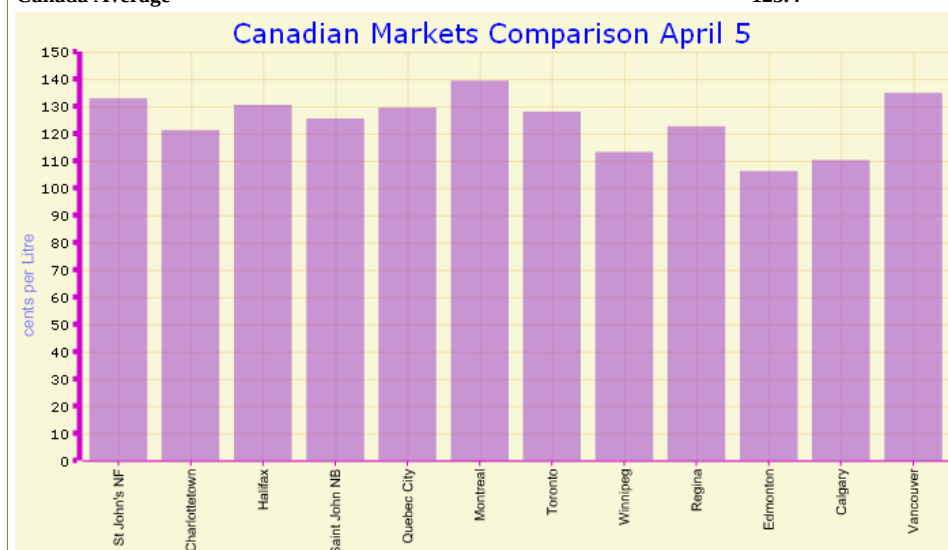
The Canadian regular gasoline price rose for the second straight week, by 2.3 cents to 127.7 cents, its highest level since September 2008. Prices rose by 4.7 cents in Toronto (to a 31-month high), 2.7 cents in Regina (to a 30-month high), 2.5 cents in Montreal (to a 31-month high), 2.0 cents in Saint John (to a 31-month high) and St. John's (to a 30-month high), 1.3 cents in Halifax (to a 31-month high), and 0.3 cents in Vancouver (to a 31-month high). Prices fell by 2.3 cents in Winnipeg, 1.7 cents in Quebec City (from a 30-month high), 1.2 cents in Calgary, and 0.5 cents in Edmonton. The Canadian diesel price rose for the sixth straight week, by 0.1 cents to 127.5 cents, a 30-month low.

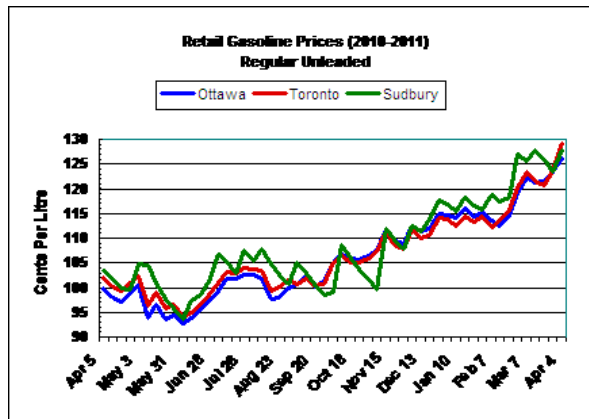
