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GASOLINE REPORT

Gasoline Report

The Gasoline Report is a roundup of consumer gasoline prices from across Ontario and Canada. The graph shows price trends for three Ontario cities for the previous 12 month period. The report and graph are updated weekly. This week's Gasoline Report is for the week ending June 27, 2011.

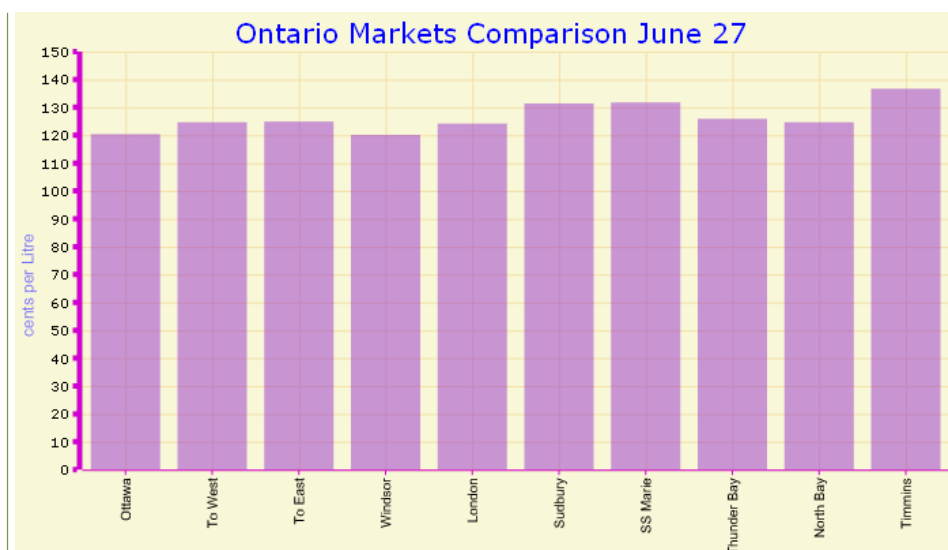
Lower world crude oil and North American wholesale prices caused the Ontario average retail price of regular unleaded gasoline to decline for the fourth straight week, by 3.2 cents to 124.1 cents a litre, a three-month low.

Prices fell by 8.2 cents in Thunder Bay (to a four-month low), 4.4 cents in Ottawa (to a four-month low), 3.8 cents in Windsor (to a three-month low), 3.4 cents in London (to a three-month low), 2.8 cents in Toronto (to a three-month low), 1.1 cents in Timmins (to a three-month low), and less than a cent in Sault Ste. Marie and Sudbury (the latter to a three-month low). Prices rose by 1.0 cents in North Bay (from a three-month low). The Ontario average retail diesel price declined by 1.7 cents to 123.3 cents, a four-month low. In the second quarter of 2011, the Ontario regular gasoline price averaged 130.3 cents, up 32.2 cents from the same period in 2010, and the Ontario diesel price averaged 126.8 cents, up 31.3 cents.

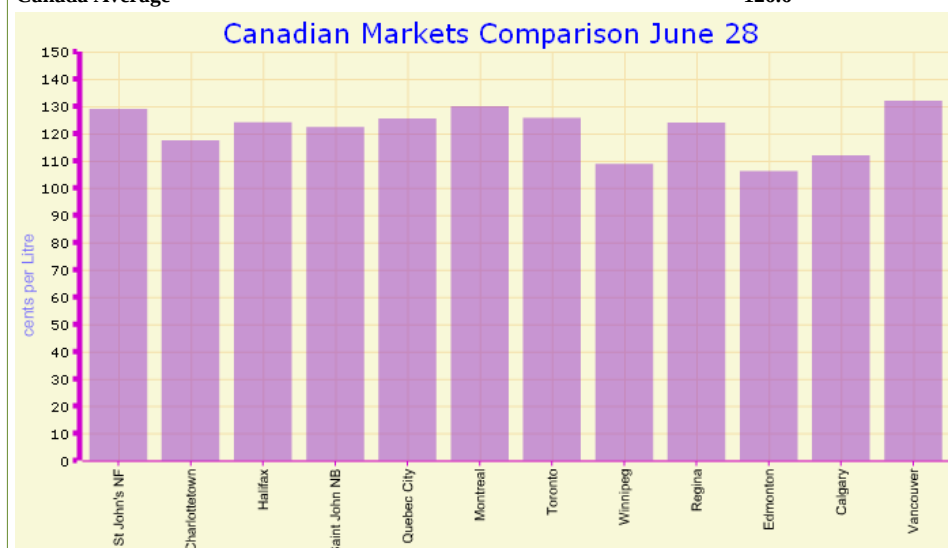
The Canadian average retail gasoline price declined for the fourth straight week, by 2.1 cents to 124.5 cents, a three-month low. Prices fell by 7.7 cents in Winnipeg (to a four-month low), 3.9 cents in Quebec City (to a three-month low), 3.3 cents in Charlottetown and Vancouver (both to a three-month low), 2.8 cents in Edmonton (to a three-month low), 2.7 cents in Halifax (to a four-month low), 2.5 cents in St. John's, 2.2 cents in Saint John, 2.0 cents in Regina (to a three-month low), 1.9 cents in Montreal, 1.8 cents in Calgary (to a three-month low), and 1.4 cents in Toronto (to a three-month low). The Canadian average retail diesel price, after rising three straight weeks, declined by 2.5 cents to 122.8 cents, a four-month low. In the second quarter of 2011, the Canadian regular gasoline price averaged 130.0 cents, up 28 cents from the same period in 2010, and the Canadian diesel price averaged 126.1 cents, up 27.6 cents.

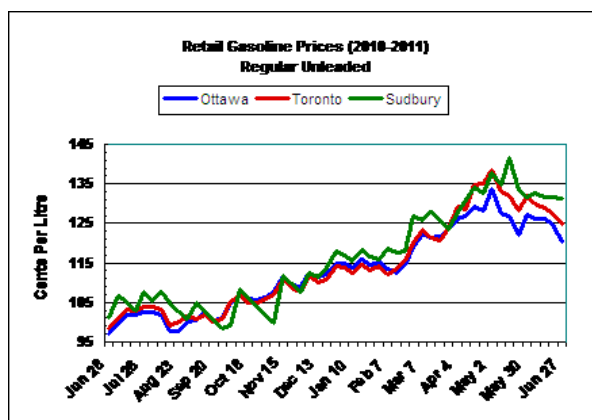
