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# INTRODUCTION

## By the Numbers: 2015 WSIB Statistical Report

Being the leading compensation board means striving for and delivering excellence for injured workers and employers. Transforming the way the WSIB communicates information to maximize value for Ontarians is a meaningful step toward this goal. By the Numbers: WSIB Statistical Report provides a wealth of useful information for both the wider prevention system and individual workplaces. The contents of this annual report provide more insight into what is happening in Ontario workplaces. It is intended to be a valuable resource for workers and employers as they continue the important work of making their workplaces safer and healthier. By the Numbers helps fulfill our ongoing commitment to open and transparent data.

Starting with the 2015 report, we are including a page in the Fatalities chapter dedicated to Day of Mourning fatality statistics. In keeping with past years, we have increased the data available in our online downloadable tables as well.

Beyond necessary updates and content addition, we are developing innovative ways to add value for consumers of the By the Numbers report and WSIB stakeholders. This year, we are introducing a Report Builder on the By the Numbers website. This innovative feature lets you choose the information you need to build your own report, making it easy to customize our information to meet your needs and interests. In keeping with an overall shift toward more open and transparent data, we plan to expand and adapt this feature, making the Report Builder into a core part of the By the Numbers experience.

## Who We Are and What We Do

We are legislated by the Provincial Government of Ontario and are responsible for administering the *Workplace Safety and Insurance Act, 1997 (WSIA)*. We are completely funded by employer premiums, and to a lesser degree, income earned on our investments. The province does not provide us with any funding. We are a trust agency that is governed by an independent Board of Directors made up of representatives from employers, workers and others.

The WSIB administers the province's no-fault workplace insurance system for Ontario workplaces. We provide return to work, medical coverage, and wage loss benefits for workers injured on the job or contracting occupational diseases while working for Schedule 1 and 2 employers.

## Schedules 1 and 2

Employers who are registered with the WSIB, are covered under either Schedule 1 or Schedule 2 of the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act, 1997 (WSIA). *By the Numbers* presents 10 years of statistics on Schedule 1 and 2 separately.

Schedule 1 employers are:

- those for whom the WSIB is liable to pay benefit compensation for workers' claims.
- required by legislation to pay premiums to the WSIB and protected by a system of collective liability.
- relieved of individual responsibility for actual claim costs, since the WSIB pays benefits to injured workers out of money pooled in the insurance fund.

Schedule 2 employers are:

- employers who self-insure the provisions of benefits under the WSIA.
- liable to pay all benefit compensation and administration costs for workers' claims. The WSIB administers the payment of benefits for workers of Schedule 2 employers and recovers the cost of these benefits plus administration fees from the employers.

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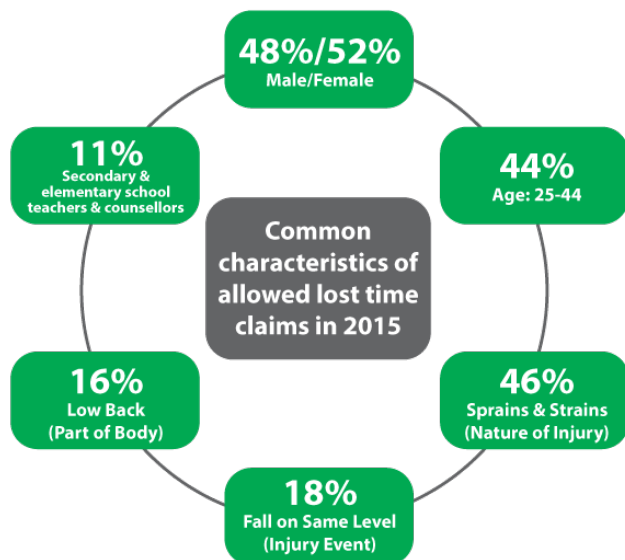
## DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The WSIB is one of the most comprehensive workers' compensation benefit systems in North America. Under Schedule 1 and Schedule 2 combined, we cover 16 industries and employers that are self-insured with in the province of Ontario. In 2015, we served almost 5.3 million workers and more than 300,000 employers, registered almost 230,000 claims, and issued \$2,582 million in benefit payments. The WSIB is committed to ensuring a sustainable insurance system for employers and workers, and improving outcomes for injured workers.

### Summary of Performance for Schedule 2

The WSIB's integrated recovery and return to work approach continues to result in positive outcomes for both workers and employers. Overall, more injured workers are able to safely and quickly return to work. This year, the lost-time injury rate dropped to 1.80, lower than both 2014 and 2013. Over the past decade, the covered workforce has grown by 15% while the number of registered claims has decreased by 16%. In 2015, registered claim volumes decreased by 2.5% compared with 2014. These figures seem to demonstrate that the workplaces of Ontario are becoming safer work environments.

### Continued Focus on High Impact Claims

High impact claims are a subset of allowed lost time claims identified by WSIB that have significant impacts on workers and employers in recovery and return to work time. These claims involve injuries to the low back, shoulders and fractures; typically, costs are higher and recovery times are longer for high impact claims. Over the past five years, high impact claims continue to represent, on average, more than 30% of Schedule 2 total benefit payments, and almost 30% of all Schedule 2 lost time claims. The WSIB recognizes that access to timely, quality health care is an important factor in supporting return to work and recovery for injured workers and employers, and therefore continues to enhance the network of specialized assessment and treatment services across the province for low back and shoulder injuries. .

These improvements in health care approaches have enhanced our overall case management of high impact claims. In addition, high impact claims as a percentage of both lost time benefit payments and claims have been declining over the past five years. The average days lost for all high impact claims within three and six months post injury or illness continue to remain higher than all other lost time claims combined.

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## DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

### Another solid year for Recovery and Return to Work Outcomes

The average number of days lost within one month post injury or illness remained unchanged in recent years while the average days lost within three months has started to rise since 2013.

After successive decline in recent years benefit payments increased by 4% in 2015 compared to 2014. This is mainly due to a 7% increase in Loss of Earnings (LOE) benefit for the year.

Though short and long-term durations have increased since 2014, Schedule 2 claim durations are considerably shorter than their Schedule 1 counterparts. The percentage of workers receiving LOE benefits at three months of an injury or illness increased to 8.6% in 2015 from 7.5% in 2014; the percentage of workers receiving LOE benefits at six months of an injury or illness increased to 4.2% in 2015 from 3.6% in 2014, where it had held steady for three years.

Contributing to improved durations is the WSIB's ongoing emphasis on an integrated approach to recovery and return to work, including specialized medical assessment and treatment services. The WSIB's Work Transition ("WT") program also continues to result in positive outcomes. Approximately 93% of injured and ill workers returned to work upon completion of their WT plan in 2015.

In 2015, WSIB's Return to Work staff made more than 21,000 visits to Schedule 1 & 2 employers to build case specific plans on behalf of workers and employers early in the claim. This is approximately 16% fewer visits than in 2014. This reduction is in part a result of fewer lost time injury claims and an enhanced focus on return to work in case management. In addition, improved return to work outcomes by Return to Work Specialists has meant fewer cases have required a referral to Work Transition Services. In 2015, approximately 91% of Schedule 1 and 2 injured workers were off full LOE benefits within a month of a Return to Work Specialists visit, a 4% increase since 2014. In addition, we have more than 200 professionally designated Work Transition Specialists who provide additional return to work support in circumstances where the worker requires a longer plan. Our vision is to return workers back to productive and safe employment. For employers, our approach ensures minimal disruption to their workforce as they continue to have an experienced and productive employee stay within their company. The WSIB is proud of the improvements we've achieved in improved RTW and recovery outcomes.

### Improved Outcomes for Workers and Employers

The WSIB continues to make investments in service quality and timeliness. We have an ongoing commitment to improving systems and making a more sustainable and transparent compensation board that provides effective and efficient service to workers and employers.

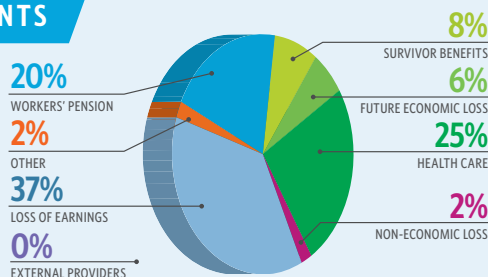

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# WORKPLACES - EMPLOYERS

## Overview

Over the past 10 years the number of Schedule 2 employers has decreased by 9% while the percentage of Ontario's workforce covered for these employers has been fairly consistent at 10%.

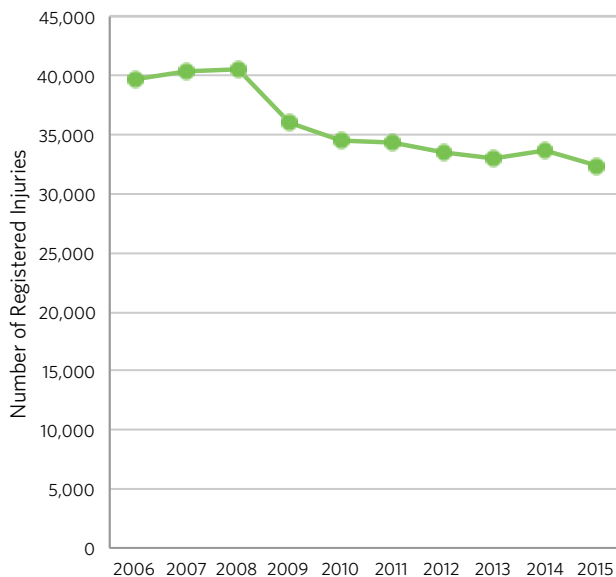
Illness claims, unlike injuries, have continued to increase overall in the last 10 years including the number of claims resulting from occupational Noise Induced Hearing Loss (NIHL).

Comparing 2015 with 2014, the numbers of both employers and claims registered have decreased, despite the increase in WSIB covered employment.

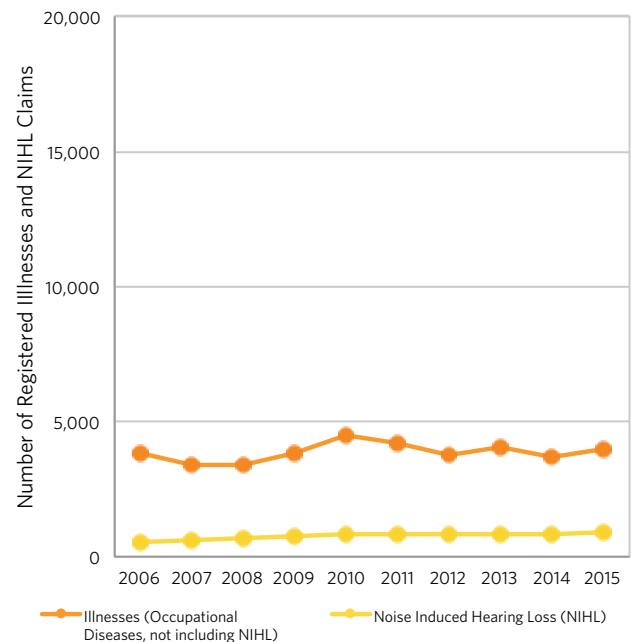

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# CLAIMS

## Overview

The lost time injury rate (LTI) takes into account the number of allowed lost time claims and the number of workers employed in order to represent the number of lost time claims per 100 workers.

Since 2006, the lost time and no lost time injury rates have both declined by approximately 30%, while the number of workers covered by WSIB has increased by approximately 15%.

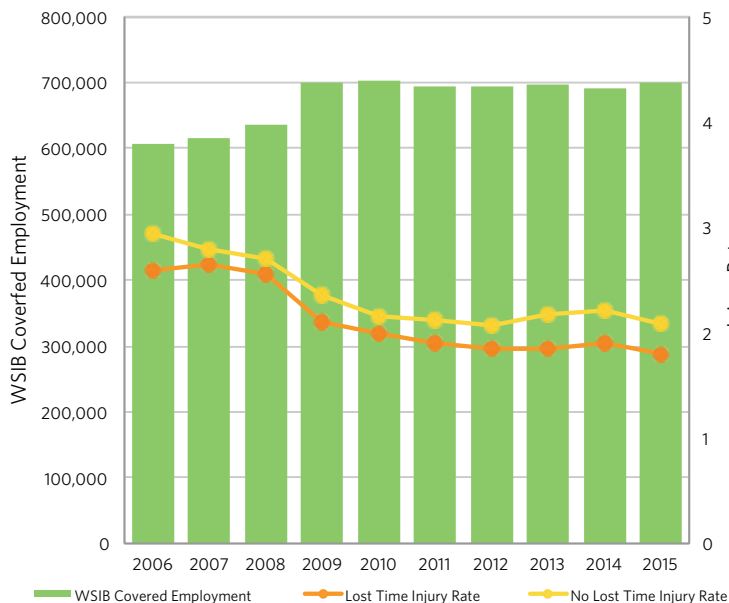
Comparing 2015 to 2014, Allowed lost time and no lost time claims have decreased. Similarly, the lost time injury rate and the no lost time injury rate both decreased this year each by 3%.

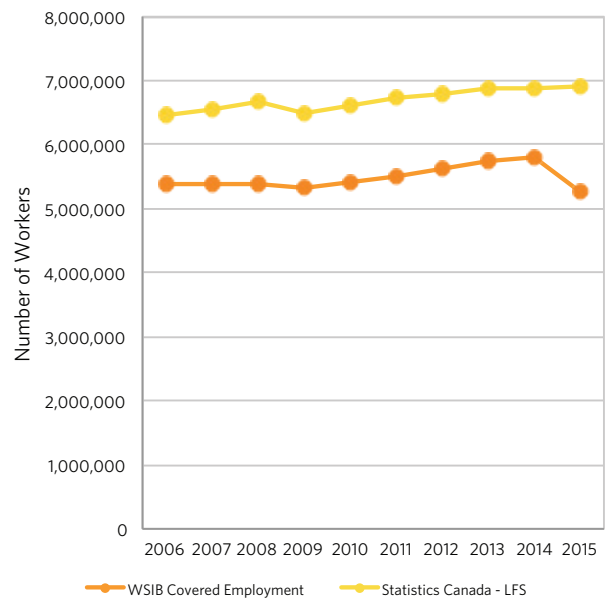

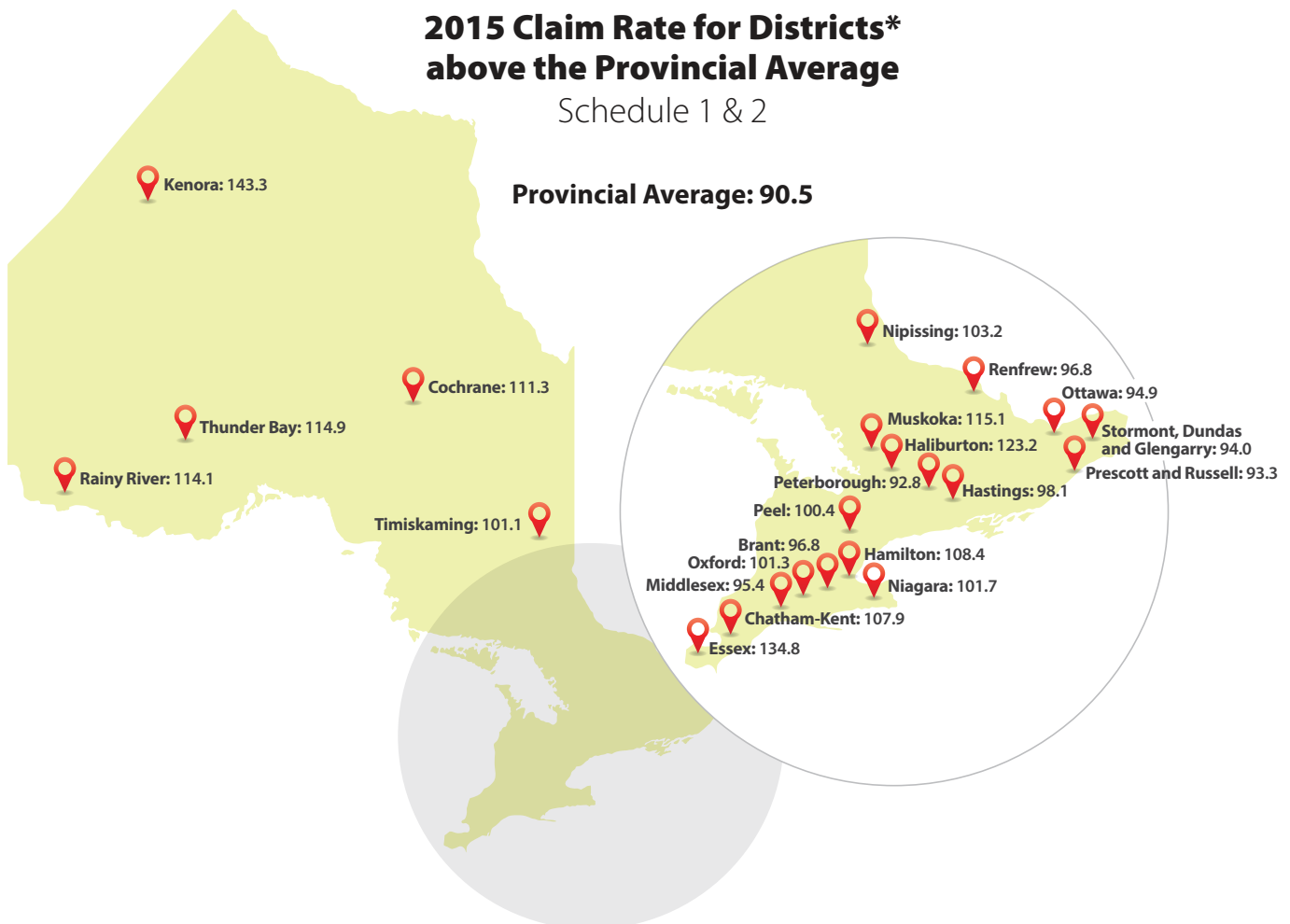


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## CLAIMS – LOCATION

### 2015 Allowed Lost Time Claims by Location

The map below highlights the number of 2015 Schedule 1 and 2 allowed lost time claims per 10,000 employed workers by accident location. The number of employed workers used in this calculation is sourced from the Statistics Canada 2011 National Household Survey. WSIB accident location has been mapped to Statistics Canada 2011 Census Districts for the province of Ontario. The 2015 Provincial Average for Ontario is 90.5 allowed lost time claims per 10,000 employed workers.

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## CLAIMS – AVERAGE DAYS LOST

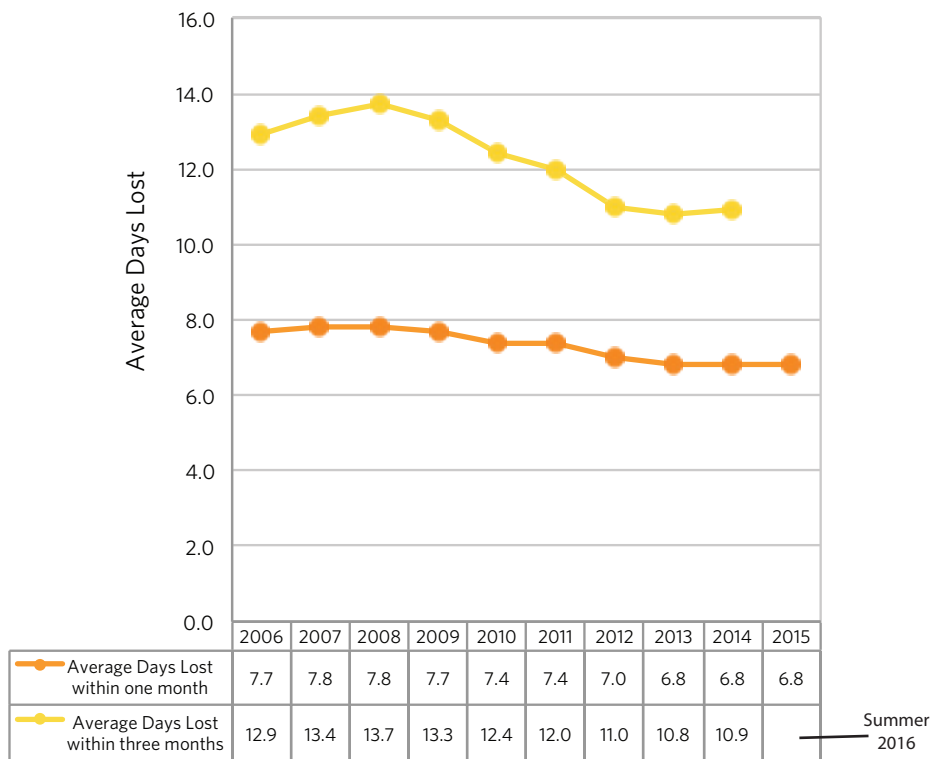
### Allowed Lost Time Claims Average Days Lost

The average days lost is the average number of days for which wage loss benefits were paid. Improved recovery and return to work outcomes are reflected in both the one and three month measures.

Since 2006, the average days lost within one month and three months has been on the decline. Over the past three years, the average days lost has remained fairly stable.

Comparing 2015 to 2014, there has been minimal change in the average days lost within one month. The average days lost within three months will be available in the summer of 2016 and a steady state trend is expected to continue .

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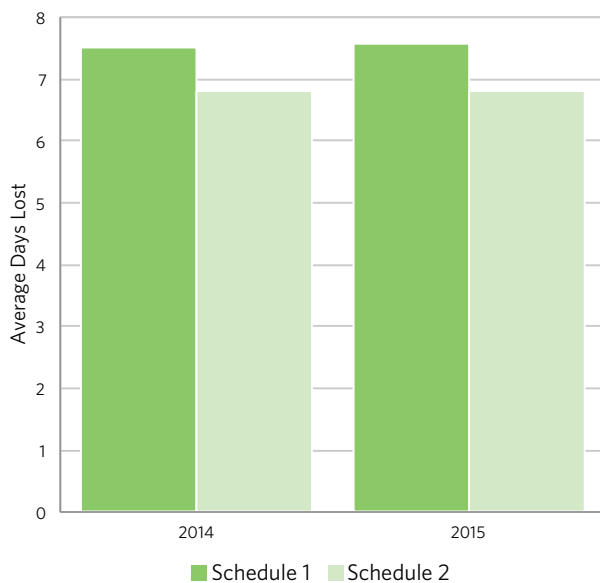

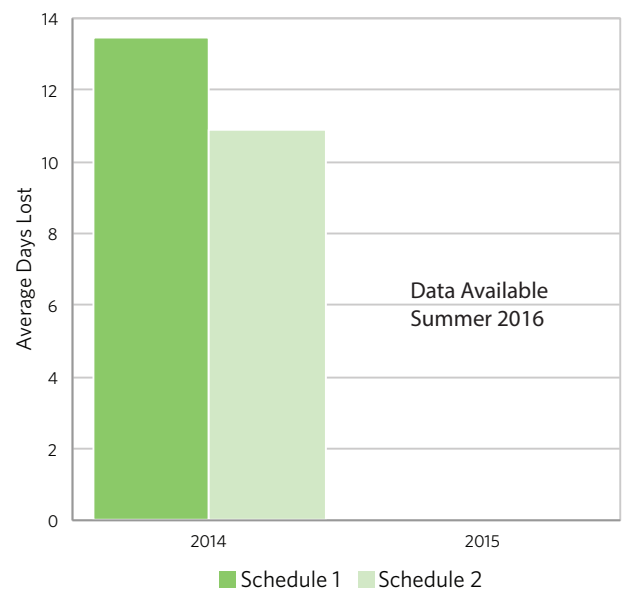
Comparing 2015 to the prior year, the average days lost within one month post injury or occupational disease for both Schedule 1 and Schedule 2 is 7.6 and 6.8 respectively.

Schedule 2 continues to have lower than average days post injury or occupational disease, when compared to Schedule 1.

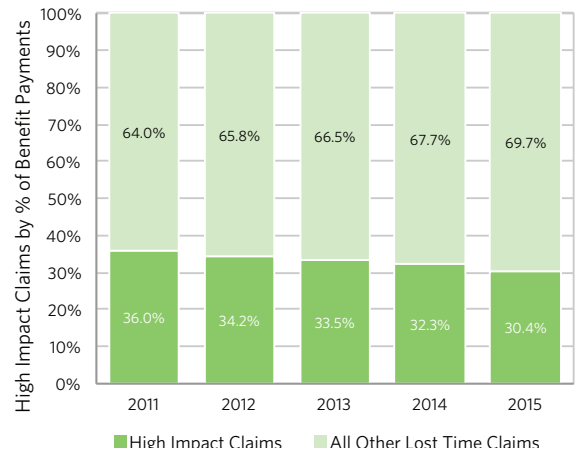
## High Impact Claims by Benefit Payment Percentage

High impact claims is a term used to identify allowed lost time claims that have been shown to have significant impacts on workers and employers. The WSIB is focused on mitigating the risks for these claims by maximizing return to work and recovery outcomes. The WSIB has implemented many initiatives to improve outcomes in these claims, including specialized case management teams, new evidence-based health services and expedited access to expert medical intervention.

We have identified three types of high impact claims, those involving the low back, shoulder, and fractures. These claim types represent just over 30% of all benefits payments and approximately 28% of all allowed lost time claims.

Similar to Schedule 1, the proportion of high impact claims has marginally decreased year over year compared to all other claims.

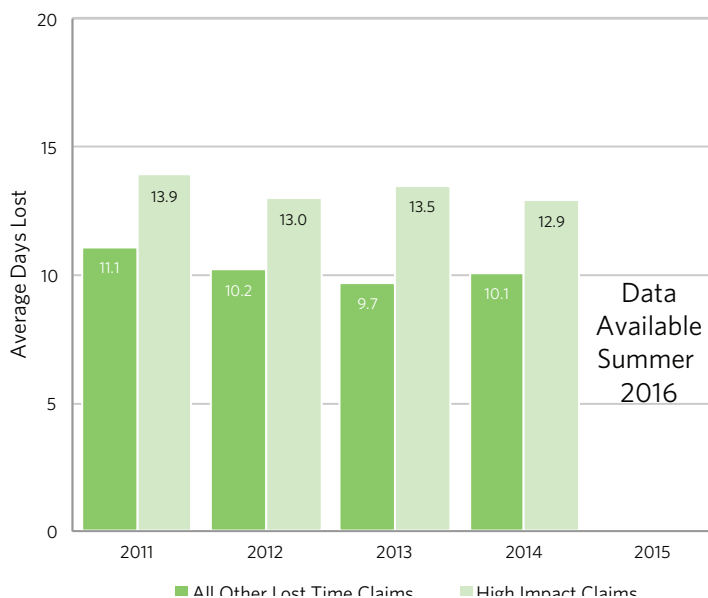
## High Impact Claims Average Days Lost

Due to the nature of high impact claims, the average days lost within three and six months post injury or illness has historically been higher for these claim types than for all other lost time claims combined.

The WSIB continues to focus on programs aimed at improving recovery and return to work outcomes for high impact claims. The average days lost within three months and six months will be available in the summer and fall of 2016, respectively.

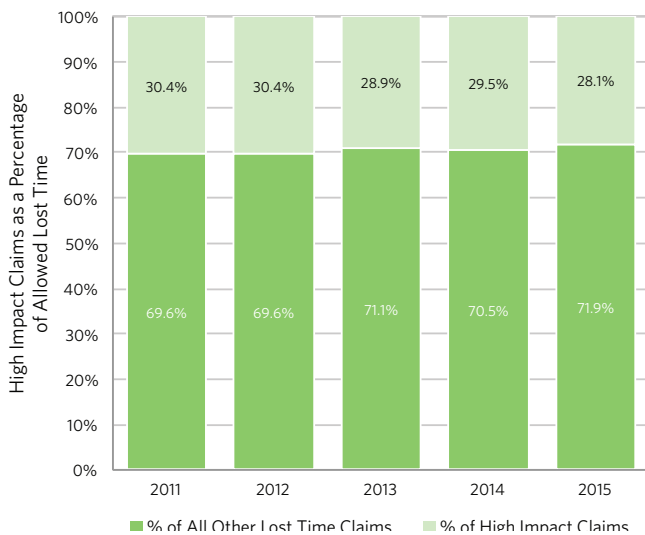

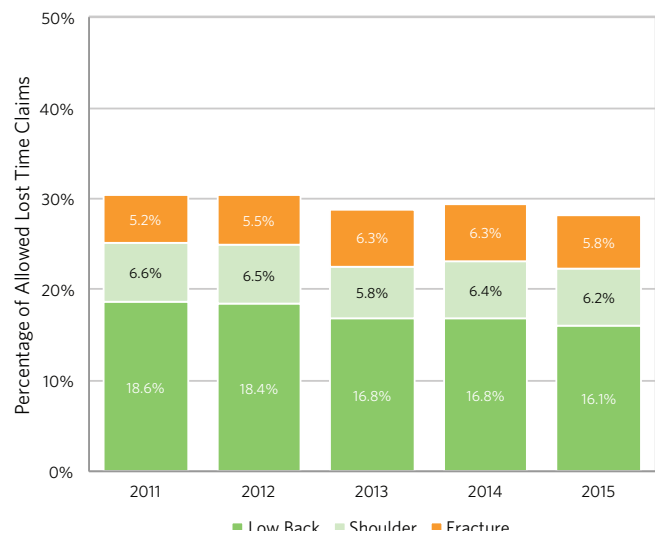
## High Impact Claims as a Percentage of All Lost Time Claims

In 2015, the three types of high impact claims accounted for 28% of all lost time claims, of which low back claims accounted for 16%. From 2015 to 2014, all three high impact claim types decreased as a percentage of all allowed lost time claims. The number of high impact claims for Schedule 2 has decreased in 2015 compared with that for 2014 and is at its lowest level of the past five years.

In 2015, the percentage of high impact claims made by male and female workers was 53% and 47%, respectively. This distribution differs from Schedule 1, where 65% of male workers experienced a high impact injury. Those in the 50 to 54 age group account for the highest proportion of these injuries at 17%.

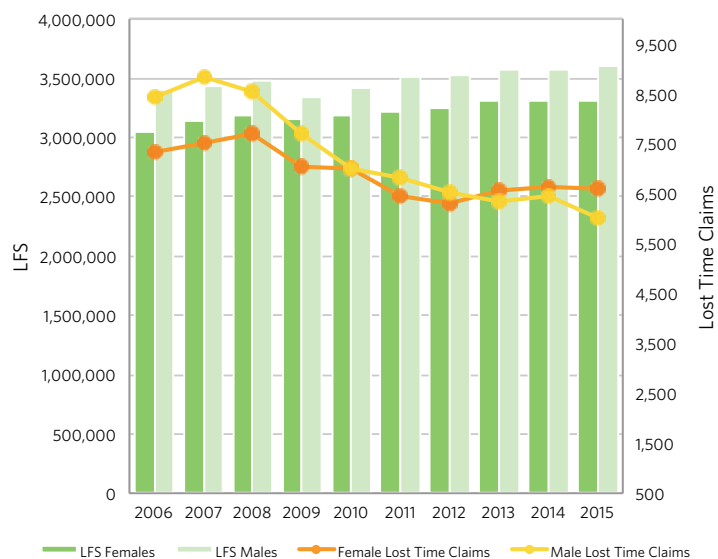
## Allowed Lost Time Claims by Age and Gender

Over the last 10 years, the average percentage for all allowed lost time claims for males and females was 51% and 49% respectively. While Schedule 1 had a greater proportion of lost time claims from male workers (62%), Schedule 2 presents a more even distribution of allowed lost time claims by gender over the same time period. Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey (LFS) on employment shows that over the past decade, the average gender distribution of Ontario's employed workforce was 52% male and 48% female.

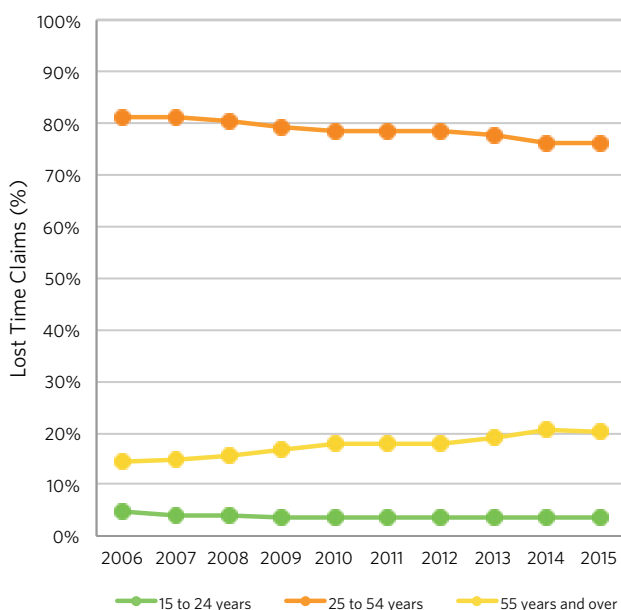
Since 2006, the two older age groups (55 years and over) have continued to represent a growing proportion of all allowed lost time claims, whereas the age group of 25 to 54 accounts for decreasing percentage of these claims. In the past two years allowed lost time claims for those under 25 have slightly increased.

Those aged 25 to 54 continue to account for the majority of lost time claims in 2015.

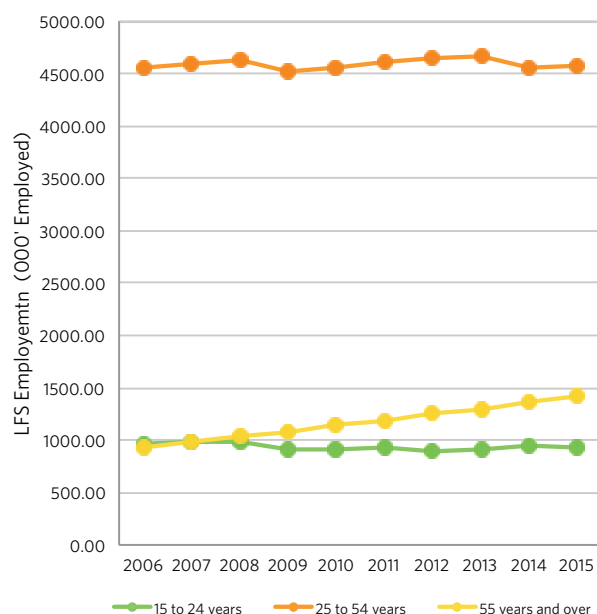
**Allowed Lost Time Claims by Gender and Statistics Canada's LFS Employment Trends**

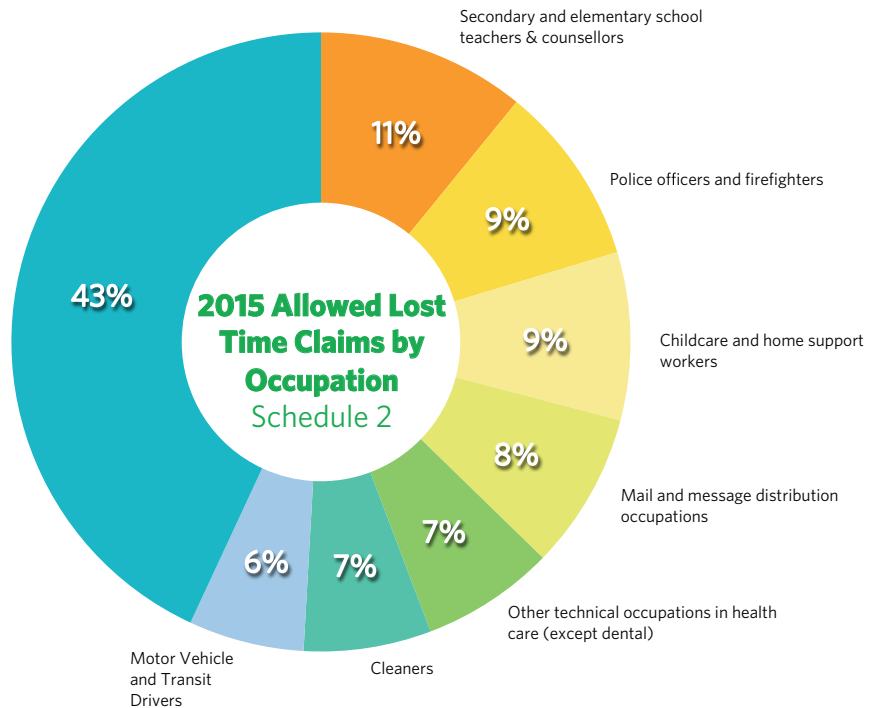
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## WORKERS – LEADING OCCUPATIONS

### 2015 Allowed Lost Time Claims by Leading Occupations

More than 155 occupations make up Ontario's diverse workforce. Over the past 10 years, Secondary/Elementary School Teachers/Counsellors and Police Officers and Firefighters have been the two occupations with the highest number of allowed lost time claims.

In 2015, in the seven leading occupations, workers between the ages of 50 to 54 represented the leading age group for three of these occupations. The leading occupation for female workers was Secondary and Elementary School Teachers and Counsellors, whereas Police Officers and Firefighters were the leading occupations for male workers. In all cases the leading nature of injury was sprains and strains.

## RETURN TO WORK – REFERRALS

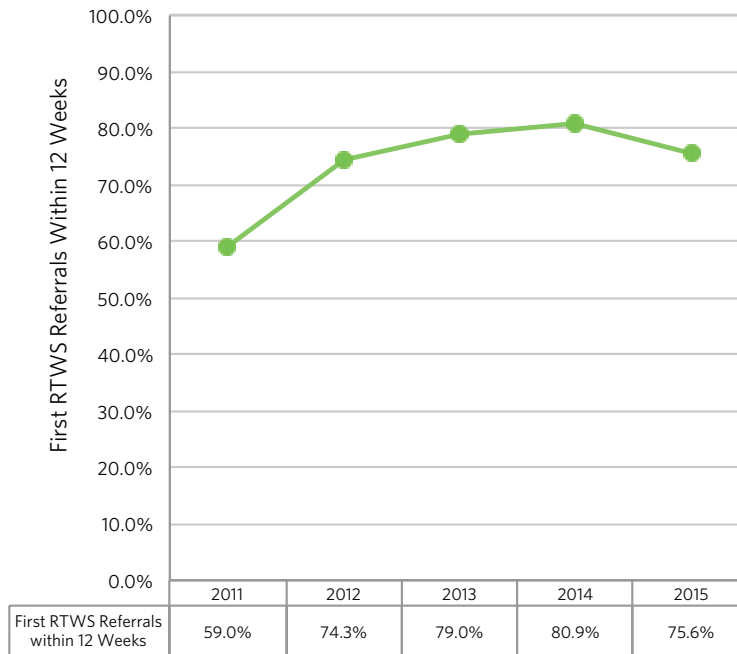
In 2015, our Return to Work staff made more than 21,000 Schedule 1 and 2 workplace visits to help workers and employers negotiate a successful, safe return to work.

### Referrals to Return to Work Specialists

Initial referrals to a Return to Work Specialist within 12 weeks of the date of injury or latest recurrence have increased steadily to 81% since the role was first introduced in 2009 but fell to 76% in 2015. This decrease is a result of Case Managers doing more around return to work and considering the most optimum time for referral to RTW Services.

In 2015, approximately 91% of Schedule 1 and 2 injured workers were off full Loss of Earnings (LOE) benefits within a month of a Return to Work Specialist's involvement.

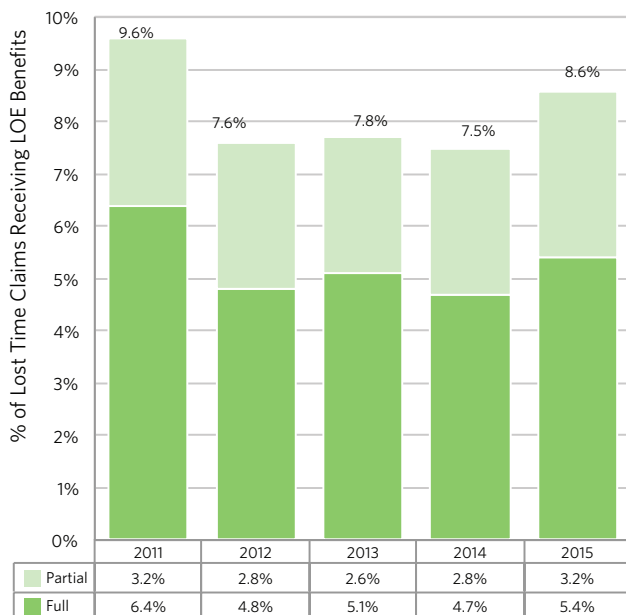
# RETURN TO WORK – LOSS OF EARNINGS BENEFITS

## Allowed Lost Time Claims Receiving Loss of Earnings (LOE) Benefits

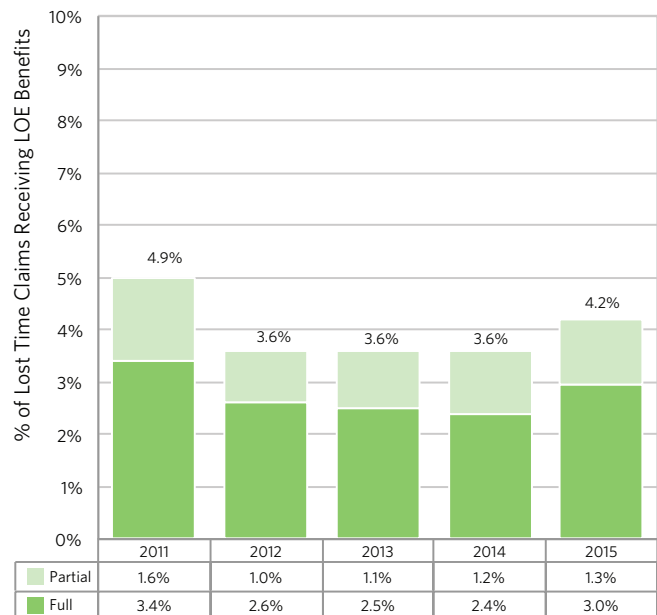
Loss of Earnings (LOE) benefits are the wage loss benefits for time lost from work due to a work related injury or occupational disease occurring on or after January 1, 1998. Improved recovery and return to work outcomes are reflected in this measure.

The bar graphs below illustrate the percentage of claims receiving LOE benefits at three and six months post injury or occupational disease. Each bar is split by level of LOE benefits – full and partial. Over the past five years, there has been a shift in claims durations for both three and six month to levels lower until 2015 when short term durations increased. This is generally due to the increase in the percentage of claims receiving full LOE benefits.

## RETURN TO WORK – WORK TRANSITION

### Work Transition (WT)/Labour Market Re-Entry (LMR)

The WSIB's "Better at Work" philosophy guides our Return to Work Services Strategy, comprising of our Return to Work and Work Transition programs. The Work Transition program replaced the Labour Market Re-Entry (LMR) program with enhanced services for workers and employers. Statistics show that this new strategy is working to improve outcomes for injured workers and reduce costs.

Since this new strategy was introduced in 2010, the Work Transition program has continued to evolve. Work Transition staff have received extensive upgrading of their skills specifically in the areas of job analysis and job accommodations. With these enhanced skills, Work Transition specialists are better able to identify and secure job opportunities for injured workers with their injury employers.

Additional improvements to the program include better integration and alignment with case management resulting in coordination of return to work and recovery plans, earlier referrals to the program and a better overall experience for workers. In 2015, 60% of workers who reached 6 months on benefits had already been referred to Work Transition Services. This compares to an average time to referral of 24 months under the former Labour Market Re-entry program.

Earlier referrals, improved coordination of return to work and recovery and more workers being accommodated at their pre-injury employer has meant fewer workers require retaining services. As a result, year over year, program costs.

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## RETURN TO WORK – WORK TRANSITION

### Completed Work Transition/Labour Market Re-Entry Plans

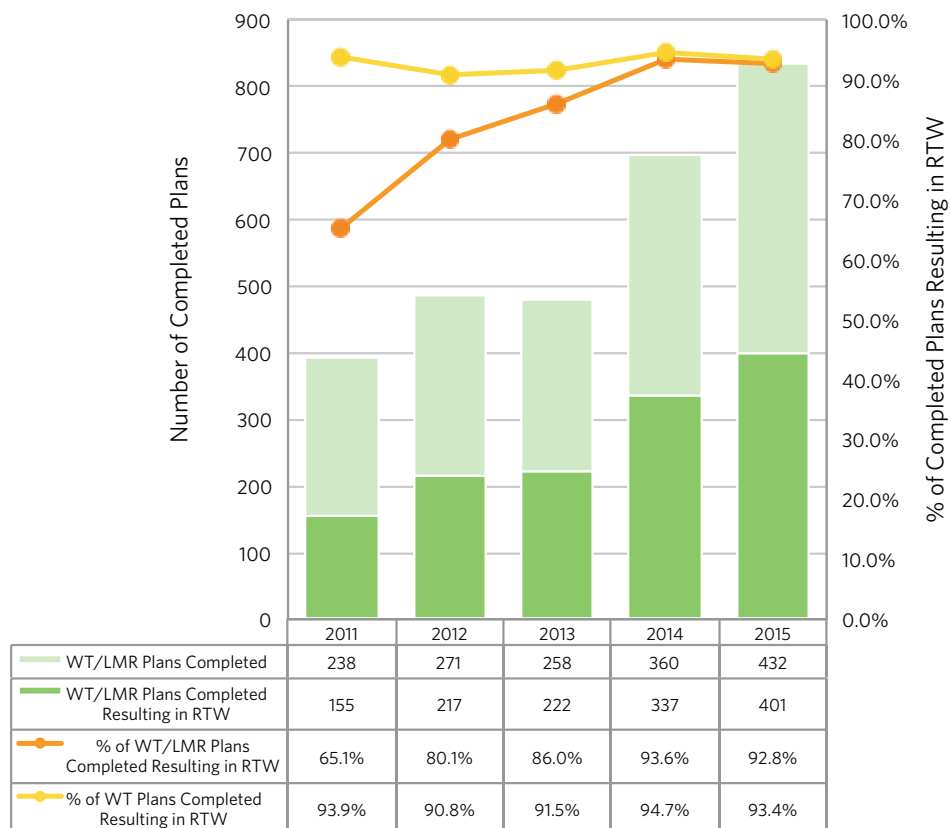
Since the implementation of the Work Transition (WT) program, the percentage of cases with completed plans resulting in return to work either with the employer when the injury had occurred or with a new employer is showing converging results with employment outcomes achieved under the earlier Labour Market Re-entry (LMR) program.

As a number of cases were transitioned from the LMR program to the WT program, results over the past five years have demonstrated employment outcomes achieved by both programs. Since 2011, the number of cases completed under the LMR program has significantly decreased. This trend was expected, and is evident in the percentage of completed plans for the combined WT/LMR program becoming more closely aligned with that of the WT program alone.

Cases serviced exclusively by the WT program have declined marginally from 94.7% in 2014 to 93.4% in 2015. The combined results of the WT/LMR programs have shown a slight decrease from 93.6% to 92.8% in 2015.

## 2015 Leading Injury Characteristics

Most Workers' Compensation Boards and Commissions in Canada code the injury details of a claim using the National Work Injuries Statistics Program (NWISP) coding standard (NWIS). This standard is based on the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) Z795-96 codes which allow for more detailed coding injury details. The WSIB adheres to this standard and codes all lost time claims using four categories: Nature of Injury, Event, Source and Part of Body.



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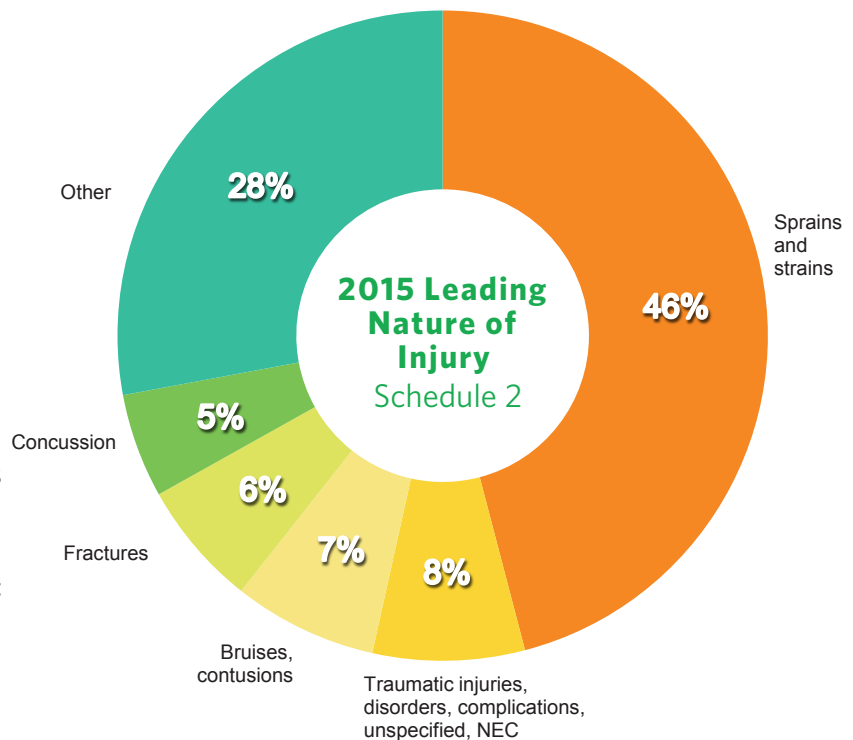
## INJURIES – NATURE

### 2015 Allowed Lost Time Claims by Leading Nature of Injury

Over the past 10 years, Sprains and Strains have consistently been the leading nature of injury. In 2015, they represented 46% of all lost time claims, compared with 53% in 2006. Traumatic injuries, disorders, complications, unspecified, NEC was the nature of injury that accounted for the next greatest percentage of lost time claims in 2015, at 8%.

Unlike Schedule 1, female workers in Schedule 2 represented the greatest percentage of lost time claims in four of the five leading nature of injury categories in 2015. These types of injuries tended to be highest among the 50-54 age group, and concentrated within two occupations: Secondary/Elementary School Teachers and Counsellors (female workers), and Mail and message distribution (male workers).

Of the five leading natures of injury, the leading event was Fall on Same Level.

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## INJURIES – EVENT

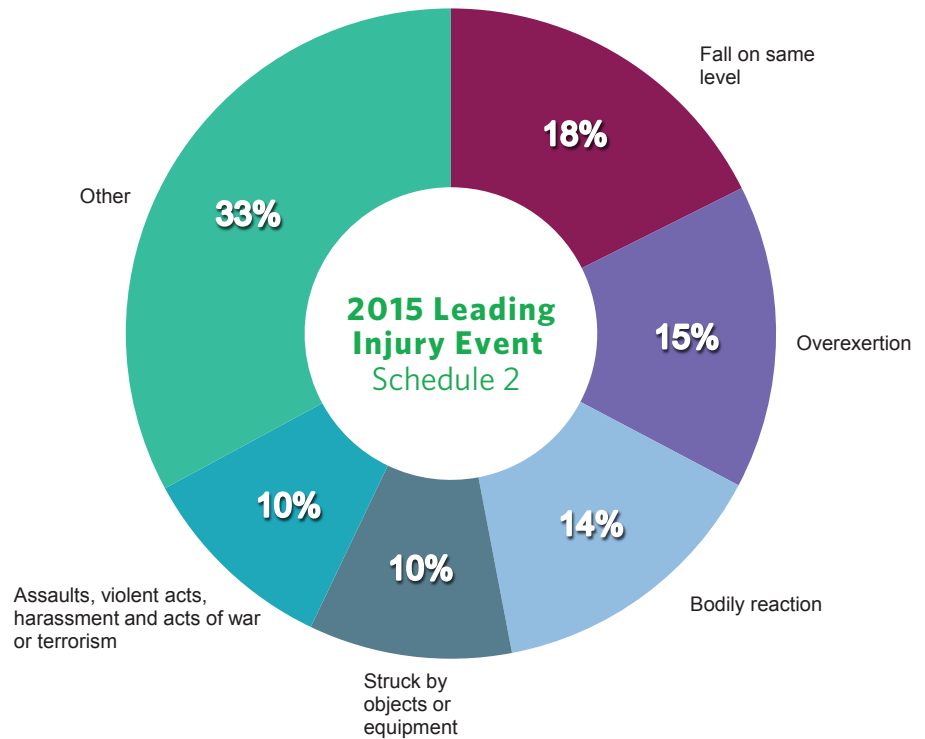
### 2015 Allowed Lost Time Claims by Leading Injury Event

The leading injury event for Schedule 2, for the past three years, has been fall on same level. Prior to 2013, overexertion trended as the leading event. In 2015, Fall on Same Level accounted for 18% of all lost time claims, down 3% from the prior year. Overexertion (the second leading injury event) again accounted for 15%, as it did in 2014.

When comparing Schedule 1 and 2, assaults and violent acts were leading events for Schedule 2, accounting for 10% of all lost time claims in 2015, whereas in Schedule 1 they accounted for less than 3%.

In 2015, female workers in Schedule 2 accounted for the greatest percentage of lost time claims for the following three leading injury

events: Fall on same Level, Assaults and Violent Attacks, and Struck by Objects or Equipment. Of the five leading injury event categories, workers aged 50 to 54 represented the highest number of lost time claims.

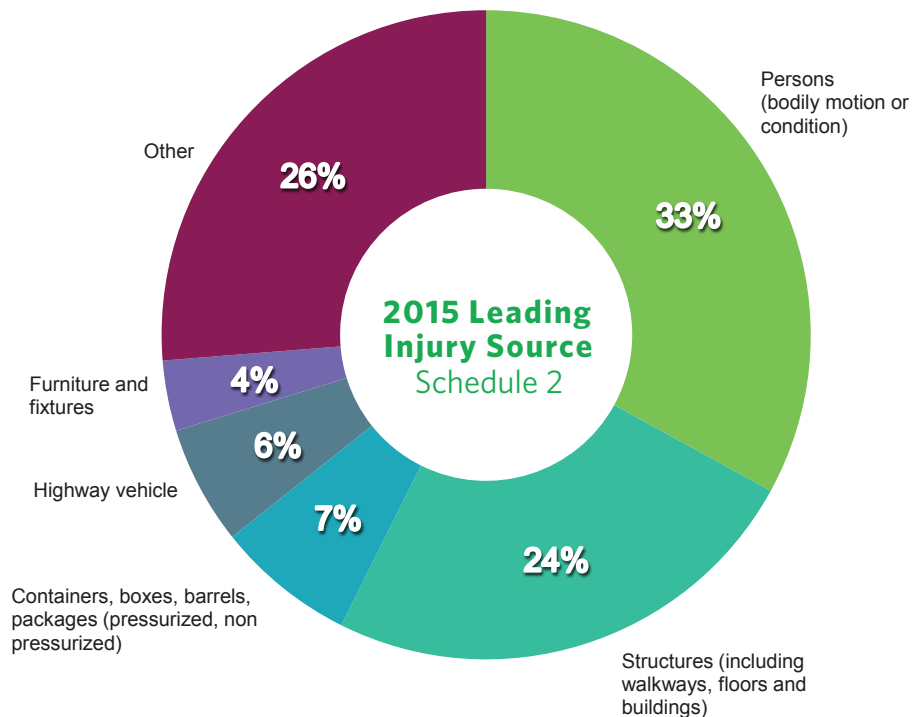

## INJURIES – SOURCE

### 2015 Allowed Lost Time Claims by Leading Injury Source

Over the past 10 years, persons (bodily motion or condition) have consistently been the injury source with the greatest number of lost time claims, and accounted for 33% of all lost time claims in 2015.

In 2015, the three leading sources of injury, female workers accounted for the highest percentage of lost time claims for two of these (Persons and Structures). For both Schedule 1 and Schedule 2, the leading injury sources were highest among the 50 to 54 age group, and the leading nature of injury for all three leading sources was sprains and strains.

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## INJURIES – PART OF BODY

### 2015 Allowed Lost Time Claims by Part of Body

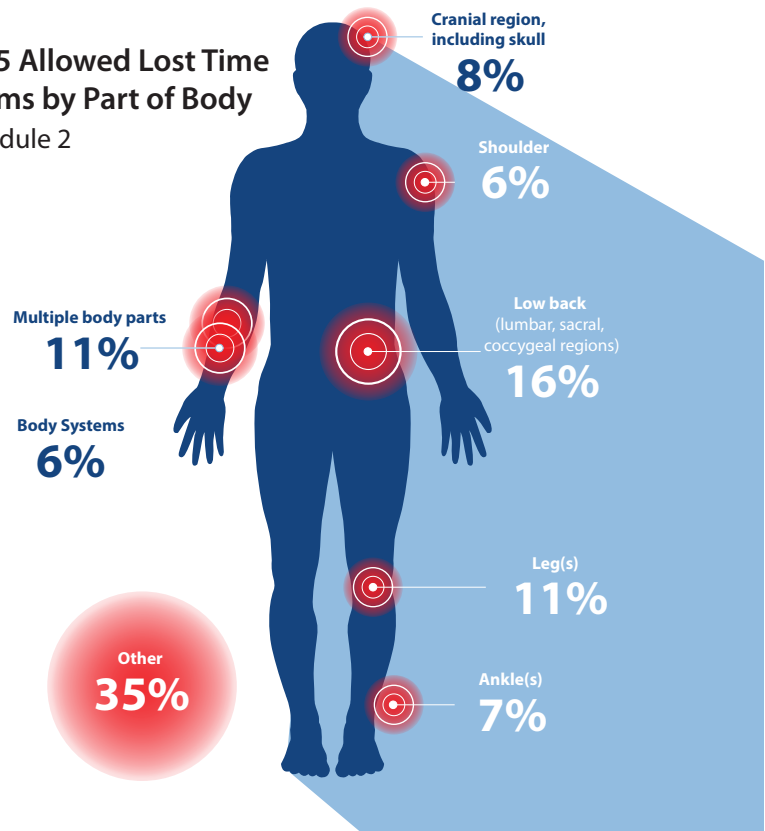
Similar to Schedule 1, the low back has consistently been the leading part of body injured over the past 10 years.

In 2015, injuries to the low back accounted for 16% of all Schedule 2 lost time claims, followed by multiple body parts, and leg(s), each accounting for 11% of lost time claims.

In 2015, injuries to these parts of body were the highest among male workers and affected workers in older age groups (40 to 44, 50 to 54).

The leading nature of injury for these seven parts of body was sprains and strains, and the leading source was persons.

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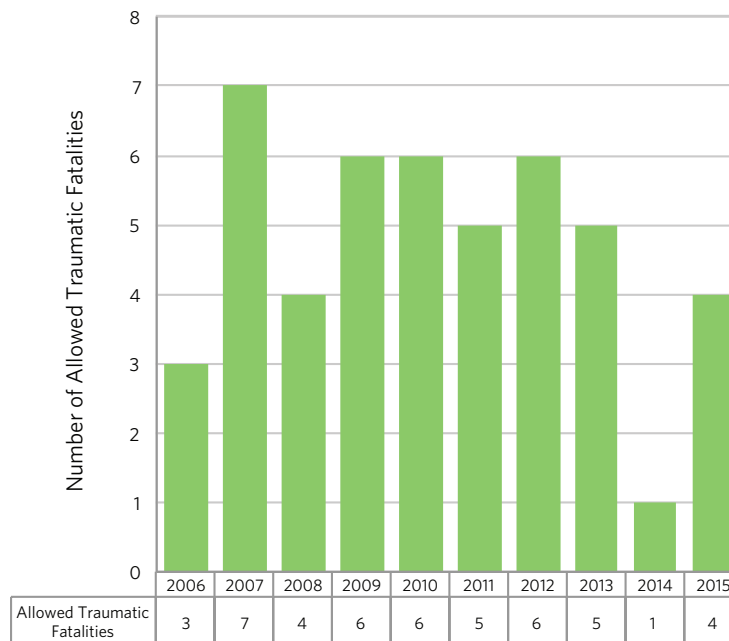
## FATALITIES – TRAUMATIC

### Allowed Traumatic Fatalities by Year of Death

Traumatic fatalities are allowed claims for workers who died of a work-related traumatic incident. For Schedule 2 employers in 2015, four workers lost their lives due to a workplace fatality.

Over the past 10 years, 85% of all traumatic fatalities occurred among males, with the predominant age group being 50 to 54. The leading cause of traumatic fatalities continues to be motor vehicle incidents, which accounted for 36% of these deaths over the 10 year period.

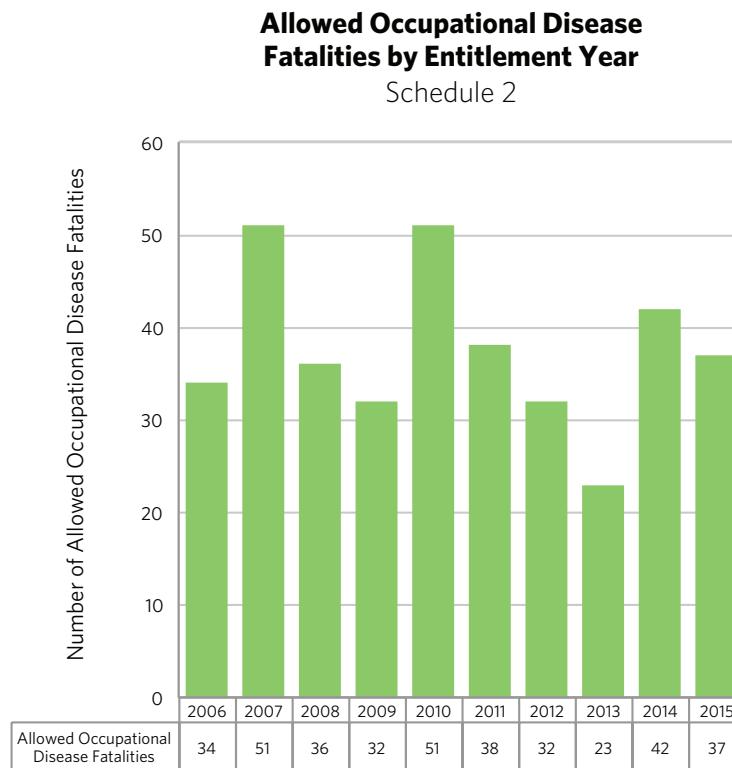

## FATALITIES – OCCUPATIONAL DISEASE

### Allowed Occupational Disease Fatalities by Entitlement Year

Occupational disease fatalities are allowed claims for workers who died of a work-related disease or condition. In 2015, 37 fatality claims were allowed for workers who lost their lives due to an occupational disease within Schedule 2.

Over the past 10 years, occupational disease fatalities predominantly occurred among males. During this period, more than 25% of occupational disease deaths were caused by mesothelioma.



**Over the 10 year period from 2006 to 2015, the following industry sectors, disease types and gender accounted for the highest occupational disease fatality percentages:**

- Diseases: Mesothelioma (25.3%), Lung Cancer (8.0%), Non-Hodgkin's Lymphomas (7.2%), Esophageal Cancer (6.9%).
- Gender: Males (97.1%)

# FATALITIES – DAY OF MOURNING

## Reported Fatalities for the Day of Mourning

The National Day of Mourning occurs annually on April 28th, to honor those workers who died, been injured or suffered an illness in a workplace. The Day of Mourning was enshrined in national legislation by an Act of Parliament on February 1, 1991.

Every year on the Day of Mourning, the WSIB, in conjunction with the Ministry of Labour, reports workplace fatalities which have occurred in Ontario workplaces. The Day of Mourning fatality statistics is a province wide fatality number and includes all workplaces in Ontario, not just those covered by the WSIB. The number is fully reconciled with the WSIB, the MOL and the Chief Prevention Office. In 2015, there were 226 individuals who died from a work related injury or illness in the province of Ontario.

It is important to note that the different methodologies used for reporting fatalities for various purposes can result in different statistics being reported. The following describes why WSIB fatality statistics differ from the Day of Mourning statistics.

WSIB Traumatic and Occupational Disease fatality statistics only include those workplaces covered by the WSIB under the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act. They include traumatic fatalities that occurred in the year specified as well as Occupational Disease fatalities for which entitlement was granted in the prior year, although the fatality may have occurred years earlier. Workers who passed away while in receipt of 100% permanent disability benefits granted under a pre-1990 legislative framework are not included. WSIB recognizes these individuals were employed in an Ontario workplace, suffered from a permanent disability and have since passed away. WSIB is unable to confirm these deaths as being related to the original injury or illness, and therefore are not included in our annual fatality reporting).

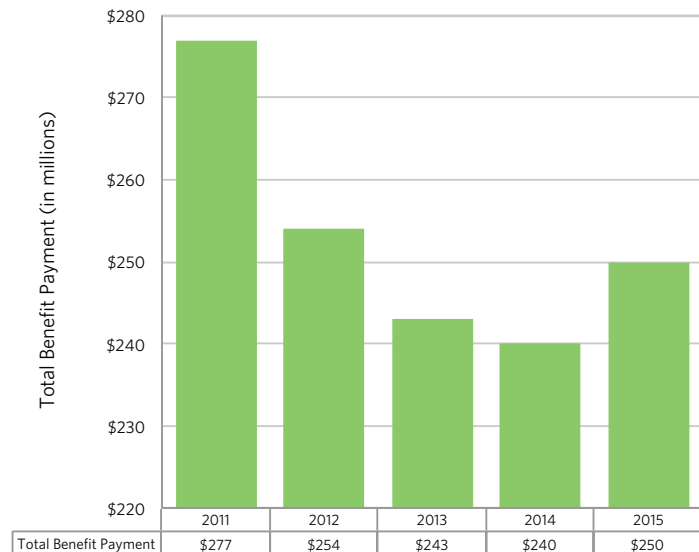
## Benefit Payments by Benefit Category

The WSIB administers the payment of benefits to injured workers of Schedule 2 employers. The WSIB recovers the cost of these benefits from those Schedule 2 employers. Benefit payments are payments made during a specific year to or on behalf of injured workers and are detailed by the eight benefit categories found in the table below.

After successive decline in benefit payments since 2011, this year has seen an increase of 4% compared with 2014. This is mainly due to a 7% increase in Loss of Earnings (LOE) benefits for the year.

LOE, workers' pensions and health care continue to represent the highest percentage of benefits paid to injured workers. In 2015 these three benefit categories contributed to 82% of all benefit payments made to or on behalf of injured workers (excluding Loss of Retirement Income Fund expense).

# BENEFIT PAYMENTS – LOSS OF EARNINGS

## Loss of Earnings Benefit Payments

Similar to Schedule 1, Loss of Earnings (LOE) was consistently the leading benefit category for payments administered by the WSIB on behalf of Schedule 2 employers. LOE benefits are wage loss benefits for time lost from work due to a work-related injury or illness occurring on or after January 1, 1998.

Similar to Schedule 1, Locked-in claims have increased in recent years as a percentage of all claims receiving an LOE benefit; however, with improved return to work outcomes, over time fewer claims will require a locked-in loss of earnings award.

A claim is considered locked-in if a lock-in payment occurred at any point within the benefit payment year. The claim population includes Bill 99 Legislation only.

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# BENEFIT PAYMENTS – NON-ECONOMIC LOSS

## Non-Economic Loss Benefit Payments

Non-Economic Loss (NEL) benefits are based on the age of the injured worker and the severity of the permanent impairment sustained by him or her. They are awarded to recognize that, beyond a wage loss, an injured worker has also suffered a physical, functional or psychological loss and are calculated as a percentage of whole body impairment.

The yearly total of allowed claims receiving a NEL benefit has decreased by 21% since 2011. This decrease is a reflection of improved health care outcomes for injured workers, and of fewer claims entering the system in recent years.

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## BENEFIT PAYMENTS – HEALTH CARE

### Health Care Payments

Health care payments are made to, or on behalf of, injured or ill workers for Schedule 2 employers and in 2015 represented 25% of total payments. Health Care payments for Schedule 2 employers increased over those of the previous year. This can be attributed mainly to the increased expenditures related to the Specialized Clinical Services and Programs. These services and programs are associated with the overall Health Care Strategy, an important systemic change that has had a large impact on recovery outcomes for injured workers. Our expanded province-wide network of expert, specialized medical assessment and treatment services ensure that injured workers have access to high quality providers and, when needed, specialized hospital-based clinics for more complex injuries or occupational illnesses.

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## BENEFIT PAYMENTS – EXTERNAL PROVIDER

### External Provider Expense Payments

Since the implementation of the Work Reintegration Program in November 2010, which focuses on delivering Return to Work services and oversight internally, there has been a significant decrease in the payments for external providers. Education/training continues to be the largest category, representing approximately 43% of external provider payments in 2015.

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## FOCUS – OCCUPATIONAL DISEASE

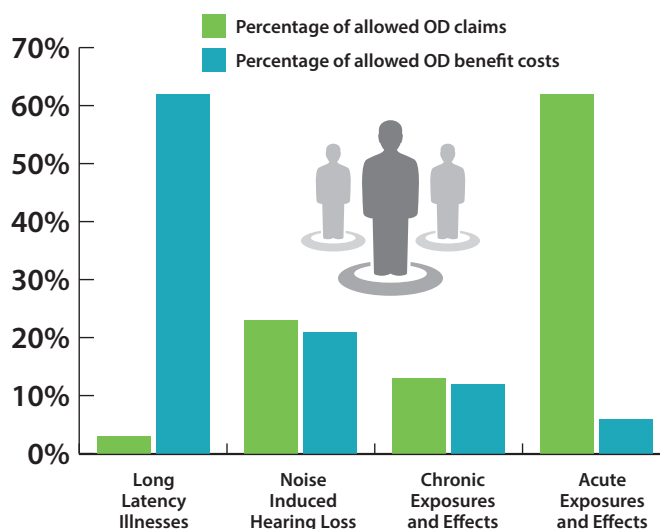
### Overview

Occupational diseases are caused by exposure to physical, chemical, or biological agents in the workplace. This chapter delivers an overview of allowed occupational disease claims registered at the WSIB over the past 10 years.

Between 2006 and 2015, the WSIB allowed approximately 125,000 occupational disease claims which accounted for over \$950M in benefit costs. As a broad spectrum of conditions are included in what is meant by an Occupational Disease, we have grouped these claims into four major categories: Long Latency Illnesses, Noise Induced Hearing Loss, Chronic Exposures and Effects, and Acute Exposures and Effects.

When comparing 2015 to 2014, the number of allowed claims for both Acute Exposures and Effects and Noise Induced Hearing Loss remained stable while those for Chronic Exposures and Effects and Long Latency Illness increased by 11% and 20%, respectively.

### Long Latency Illness Claims

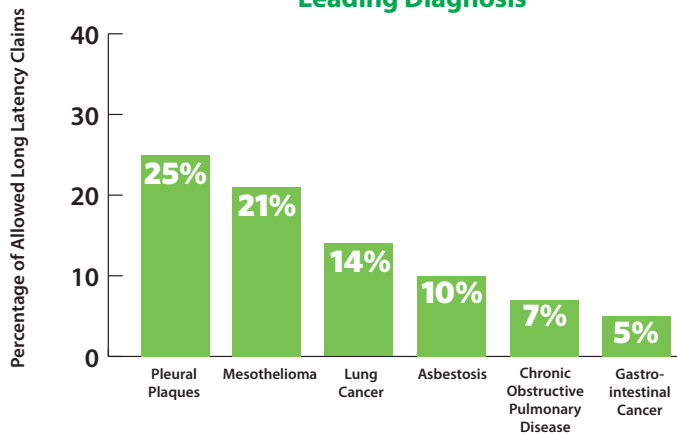
Many occupational diseases do not develop until long after a harmful exposure took place. Long latency illnesses can involve a delay of many years between the period of exposure to a disease-causing agent and the appearance of disease symptoms. While long latency illnesses account for only 3% of all allowed occupational disease claims registered at the WSIB between 2006 and 2015, they account for the largest proportion of allowed benefit costs and include some of the most serious illnesses. An example is mesothelioma which is a cancer of the pleura or peritoneum that can develop today from exposure to asbestos decades ago.

Pleural plaques, mesothelioma, lung cancer, asbestosis and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) are the five leading diagnoses which account for over 75% of all allowed long latency claims over the past 10 years. The leading causal agent for these diagnoses is asbestos.

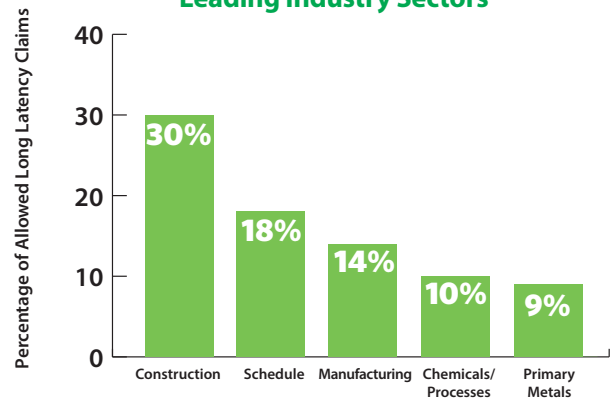

The construction sector is the leading industry sector, accounting for 30% of allowed long latency illness claims. Workers are predominantly male and are generally retired, with an average age of 67 years when diagnosed with a long latency illness.

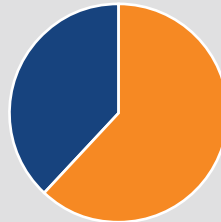

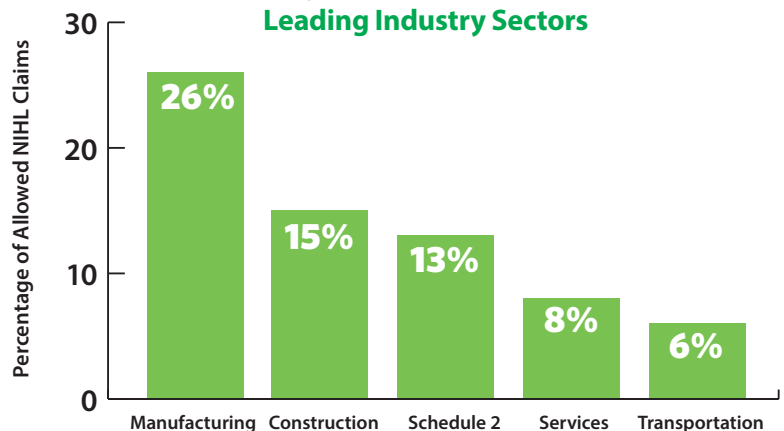

## Noise Induced Hearing Loss Claims

Noise Induced Hearing Loss (NIHL) is a permanent loss of hearing usually in both ears resulting from inner ear damage due to prolonged, continuous or intermittent hazardous noise exposure. This type of hearing loss is a cumulative process that develops over many years. As a result, noise induced hearing loss often does not become apparent until workers are older and often retired from the workforce.

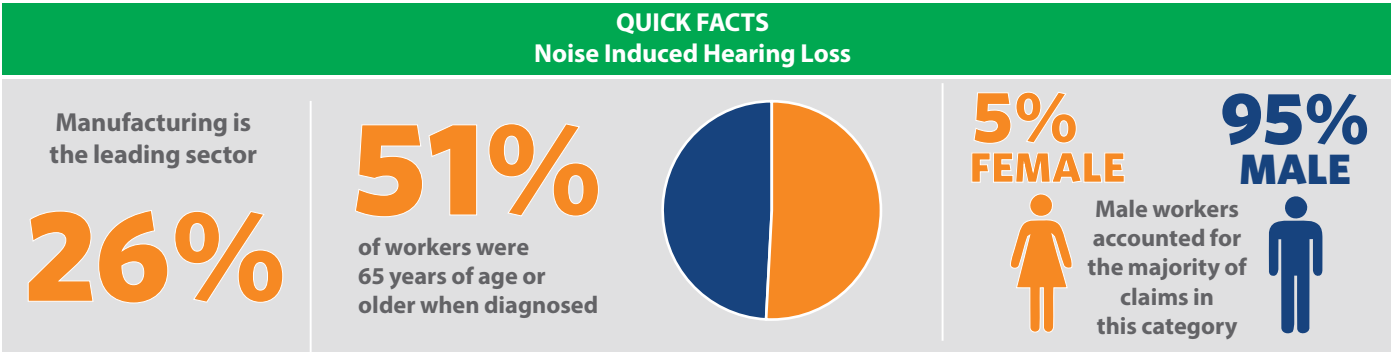
### Allowed NIHL Claims Registered 2006 to 2015 Leading Industry Sectors

Allowed NIHL claims registered between 2006 and 2015 accounted for about 23% of all allowed occupational disease claims. The top 5 sectors for allowed NIHL claims over the last 10 years are: Manufacturing, Construction, Schedule 2, Services, and Transportation.

Workers with an allowed NIHL claim are predominantly male and generally retired, with an average age of 65 years at diagnosis.



### Claims For Chronic Exposures And Effects

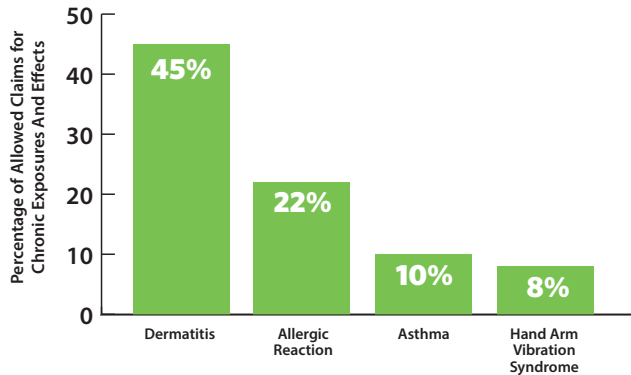
Occupational diseases in this category involve medical conditions that develop gradually over time from prolonged or chronic exposures in the workplace. Symptoms often have a temporal association with workplace exposures; the disease often becomes apparent while the individual is still working in the exposure environment.

Chronic exposures can occur through inhalation or skin absorption. Conditions like dermatitis and some respiratory diseases can be caused by chronic exposure to chemical or biological agents in the workplace. Allergy to latex is an example of a condition that can develop in workers exposed to that agent in the workplace. Dermatitis claims make up 45% of the allowed chronic exposures and effects cases.

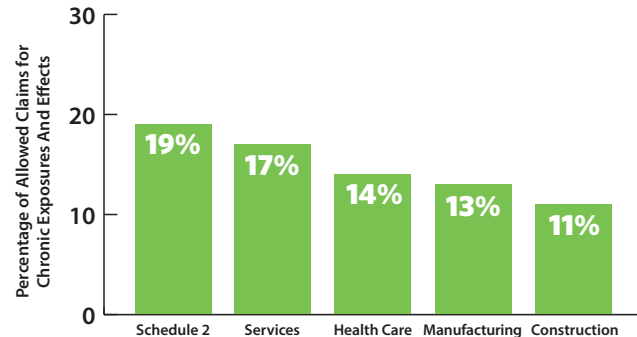
Overall, allowed claims for chronic exposures and effects experienced a minimal increase over the past 10 years. Workers aged 25-54 form the majority of allowed chronic exposures and effects claims over the past 10 years. The leading industry sector was Schedule 2 followed closely by Services. There is a more even split in the percentage of allowed claims for male (56%) and female workers (44%) in this category.

Leading Industry Sectors**



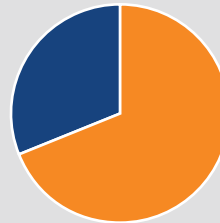

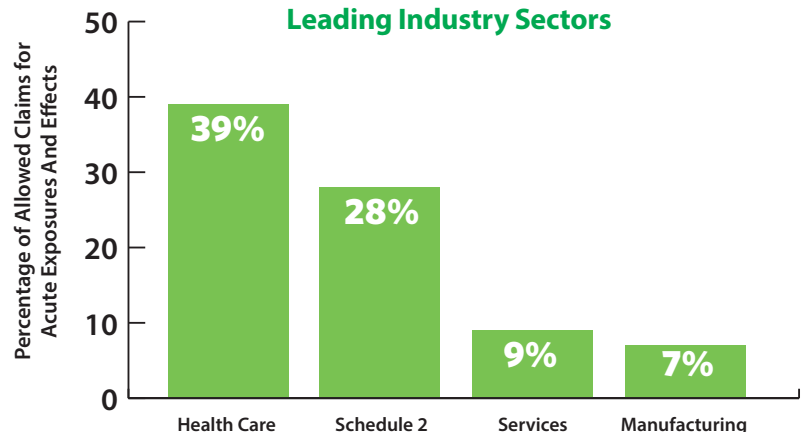


## Claims for Acute Exposures and Effects

Claims for acute exposures and effects describe medical conditions that arise immediately after exposure to a chemical, biological or physical agent in the workplace. Between 2006 and 2015, these claims accounted for more than half of allowed occupational disease claims while still having the smallest proportion of benefit costs. Exposures to infectious disease from needlesticks, sharps or bites accounted for the majority of these claims.

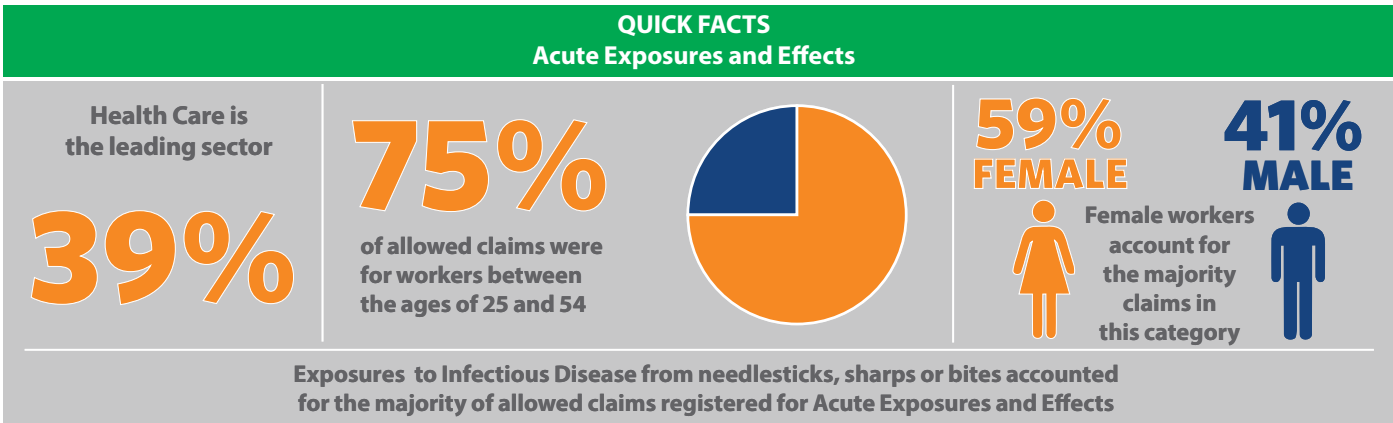
Health Care and Schedule 2 were the two leading industry sectors in the last decade. These two sectors combined accounted for 67% of allowed claims for acute exposures and effects.

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The two leading age groups were 25-39 and 40-54. Female workers accounted for a higher proportion of allowed claims for acute exposures and effects compared with their male counterparts.
