

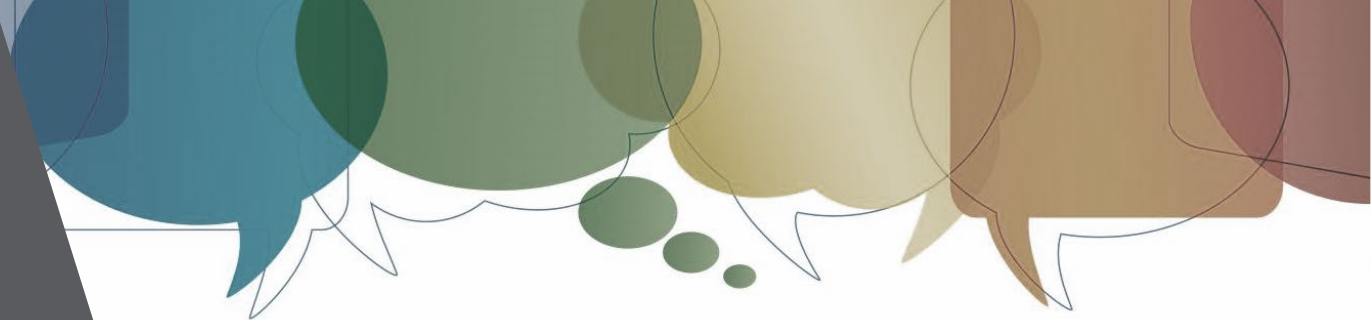

KEY FINDINGS

Key Findings

1 Over the past week, the government's 'right track' scores have improved slightly to 79% after dipping to 75% the previous week.

2 Managing the reopening of the economy continues to be a key strength of the government.

Most Ontarians continue to believe that the pace of moving to Phase 3 has been appropriate, although there is a sizeable - but decreasing - minority who thinks it is too fast.

3 Similarly, Ontarians continue to give the government very positive scores on delivering quality health care and keeping Ontarians safe through the COVID-19 pandemic.

4 Paradoxically, an increasing number (now at 31%, up from 8% in April) of Ontarians feel the government is not doing as much as they should.

One area where Ontarians feel the government is not doing enough: planning for the return to school. This perception increased this week despite the government's announced plans last week.

5 When the government was announcing Phase 3 regional re-opening, trust in the government's messaging about the economic re-opening and general COVID-19 situation peaked. Since then, there has been a slight erosion. This bears monitoring.

6 Ontarians are cautious about a COVID-19 vaccine at this point given that no vaccine has been proven to be effective.

Just over 1-in-2 (52%) say they would be 'very' likely to be vaccinated when a vaccine is available, while another 22% say they would be 'somewhat' likely. About 1-in-4 say they are not likely to be vaccinated.

Key Findings

7 A slight majority prefer a variable rate approach for electricity pricing compared to the fixed option. Among those who review their electricity bill closely, about 6-in-10 continue to opt for the variable scenario.

8 Overall, Ontarians continue to have a positive view on the performance of the government on managing electricity prices for Ontario consumers.

9 A slight majority (51%) believe that the federal government should allow international students into Ontario to study during the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, most Ontarians believe that international students paying more in tuition are making a significant contribution to Ontario universities and colleges.

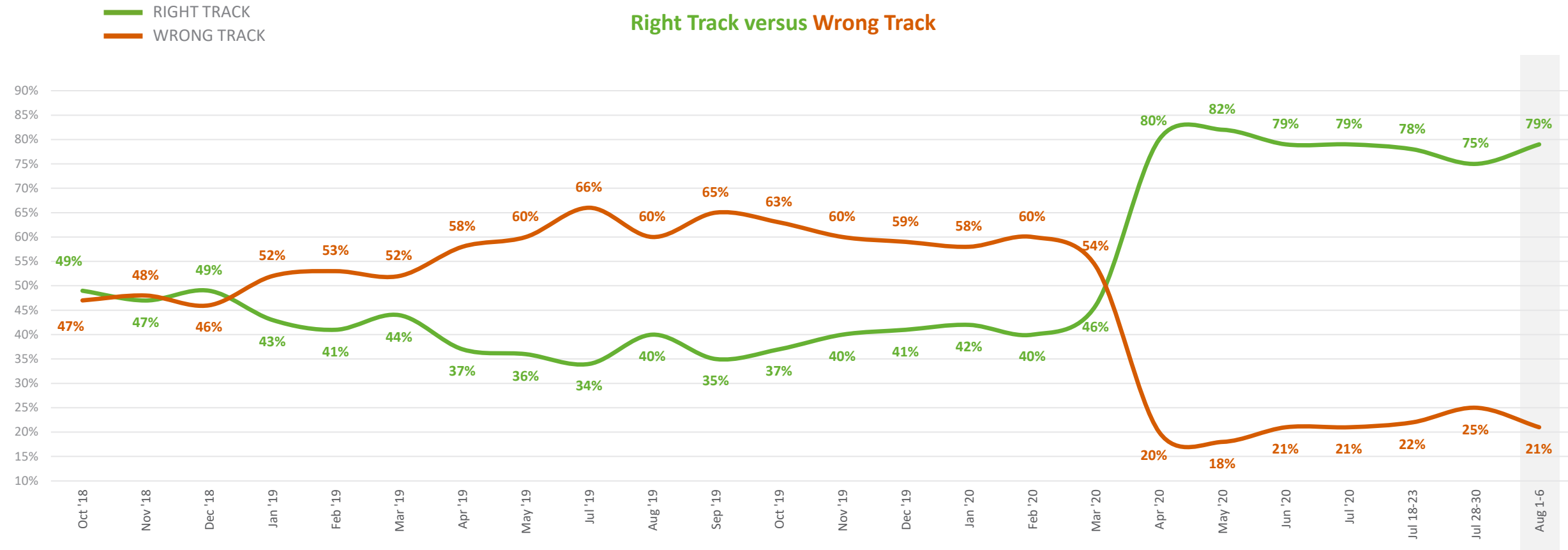
Most Ontarians also believe that international students should be allowed to enter Ontario to study if they have taken a COVID-19 test or quarantine for 14 days upon arrival.

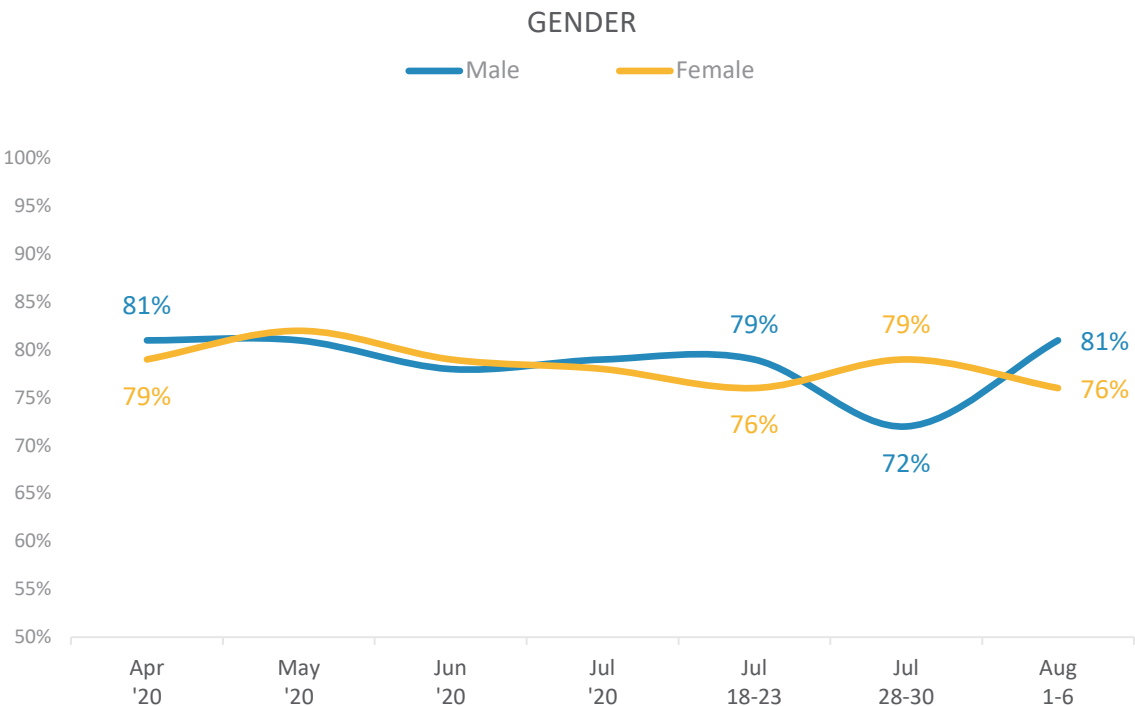
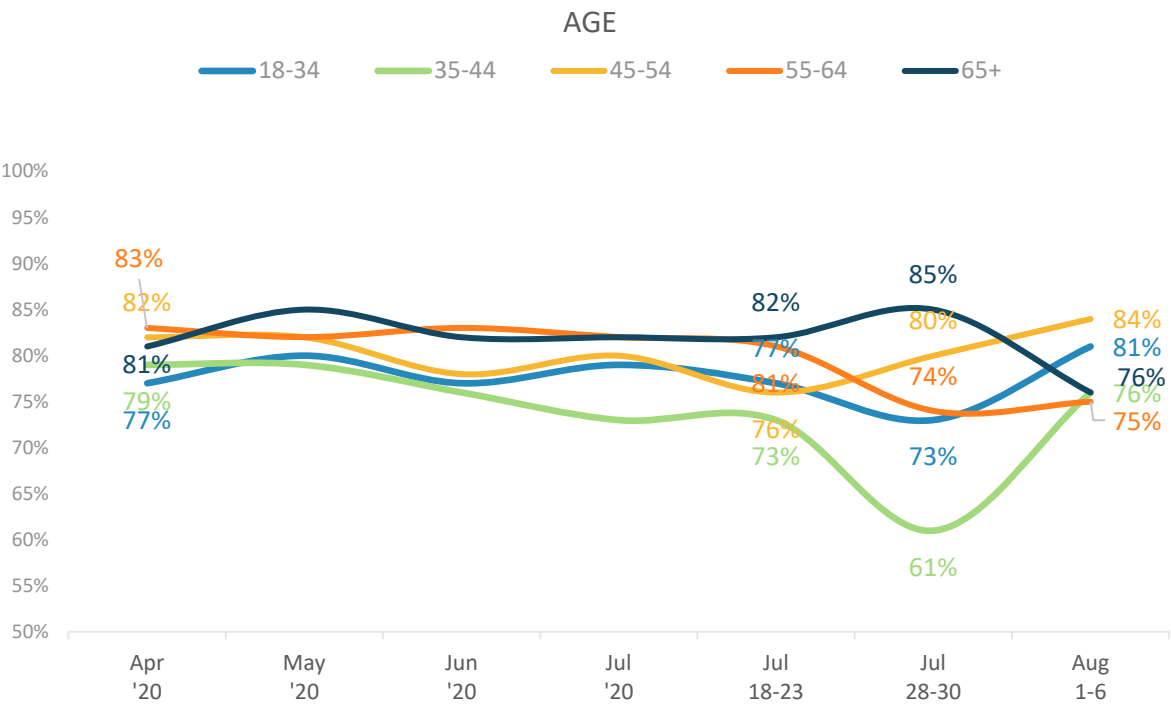

Right Track Scores – 6-Day Roll

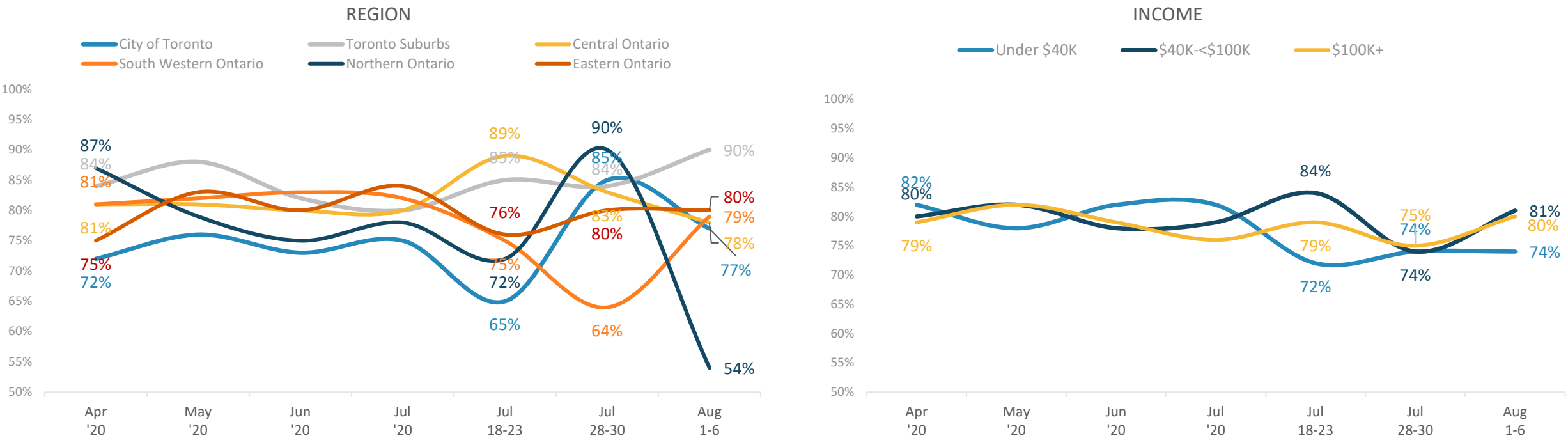

Right Track Scores – 6-Day Roll

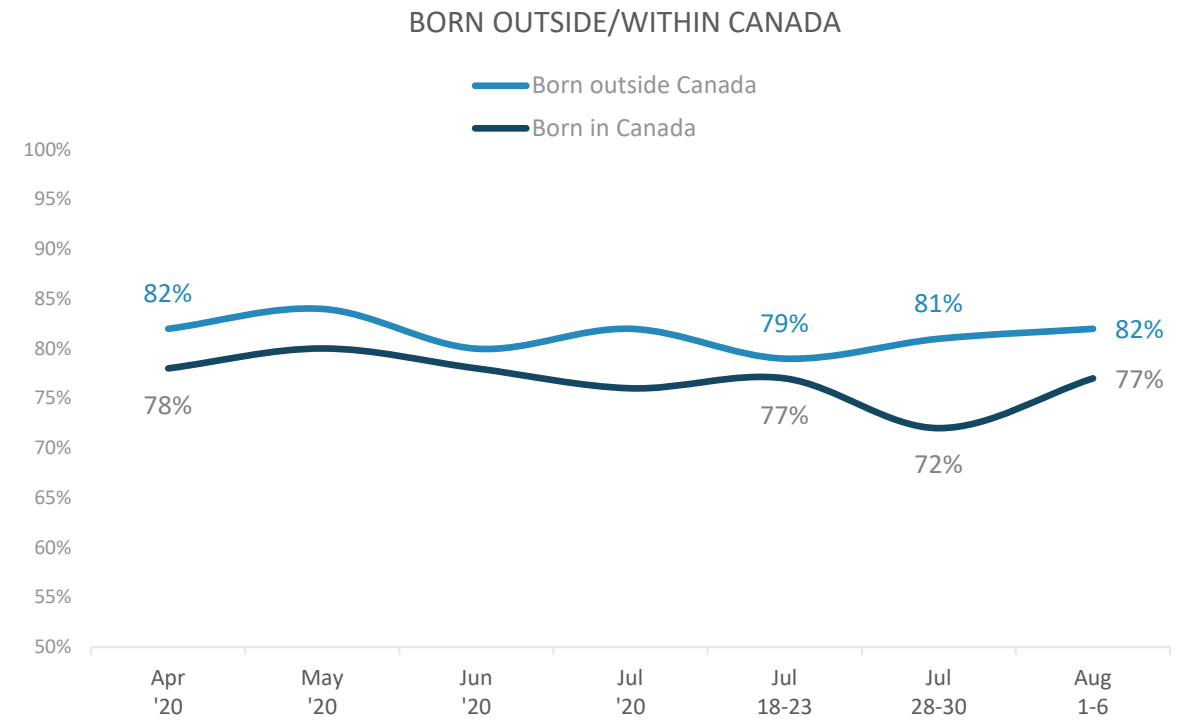
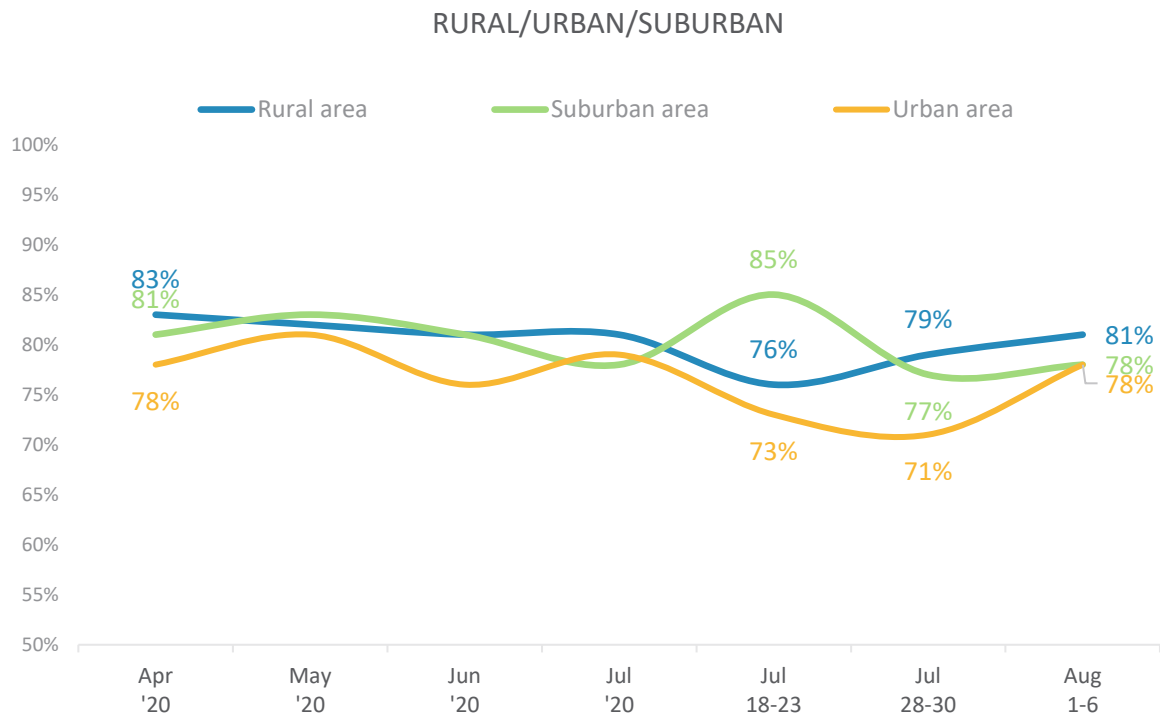

Right Track Scores – 6-Day Roll

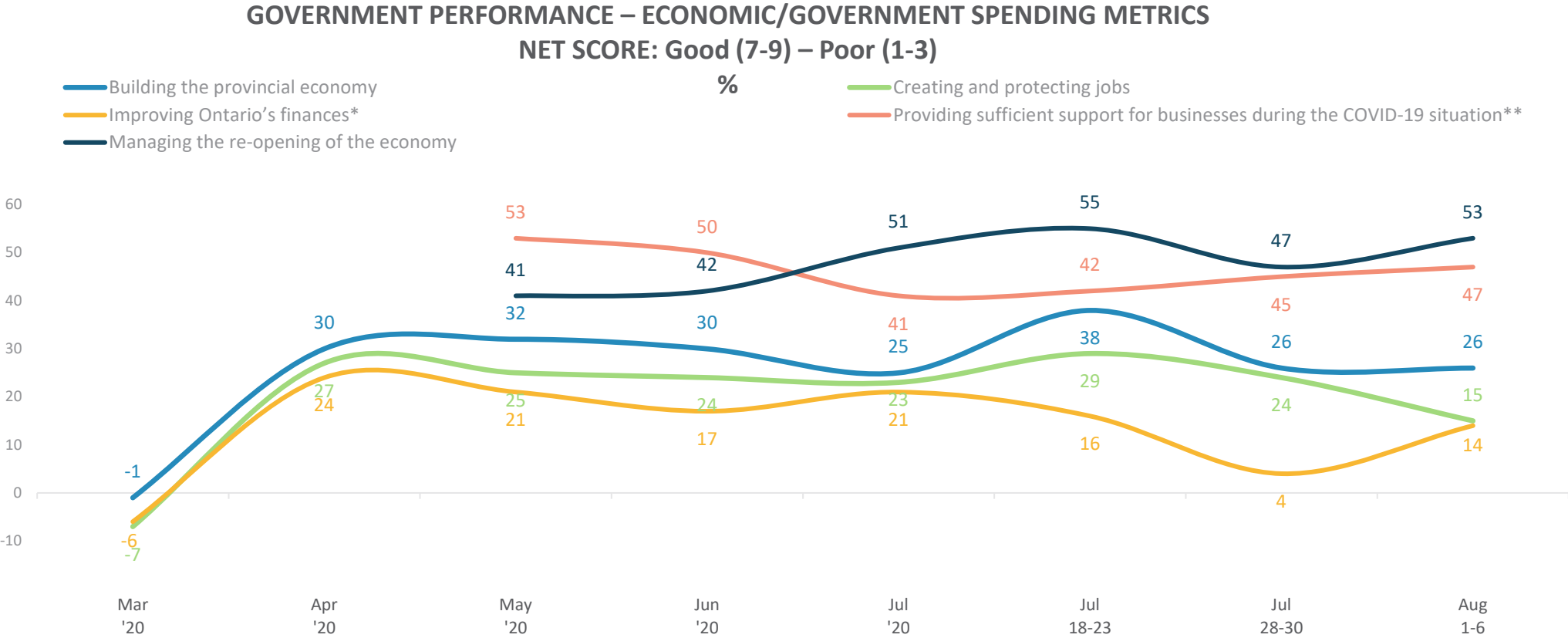

PERCEPTIONS OF GOVERNMENT PERFORMANCE DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC



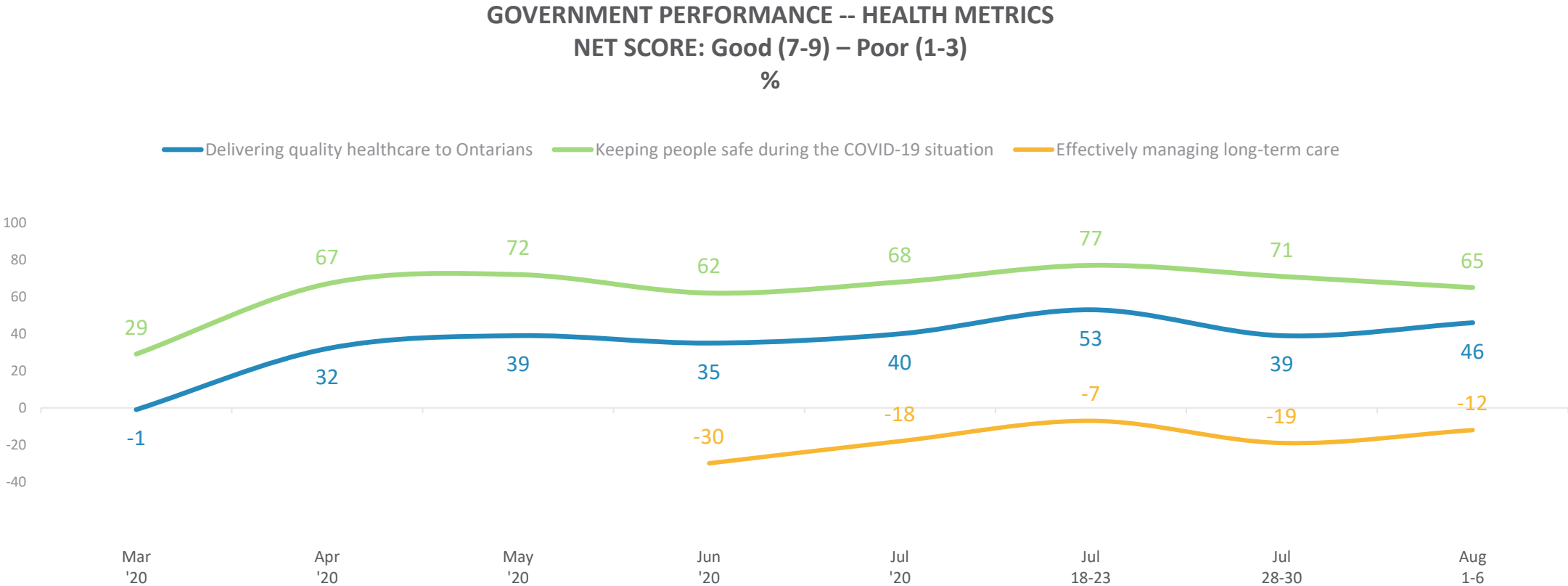
Over the past week, perceptions of the government’s performance on ‘managing the reopening of the economy’ continues to be the most positive economic metric. ‘Improving Ontario’s finances’ has improved, while ‘creating and protecting jobs’ is softening.

Virtually all Ontarians continue to think the government’s gradual and careful reopening has been the right approach compared to the process in the United States.

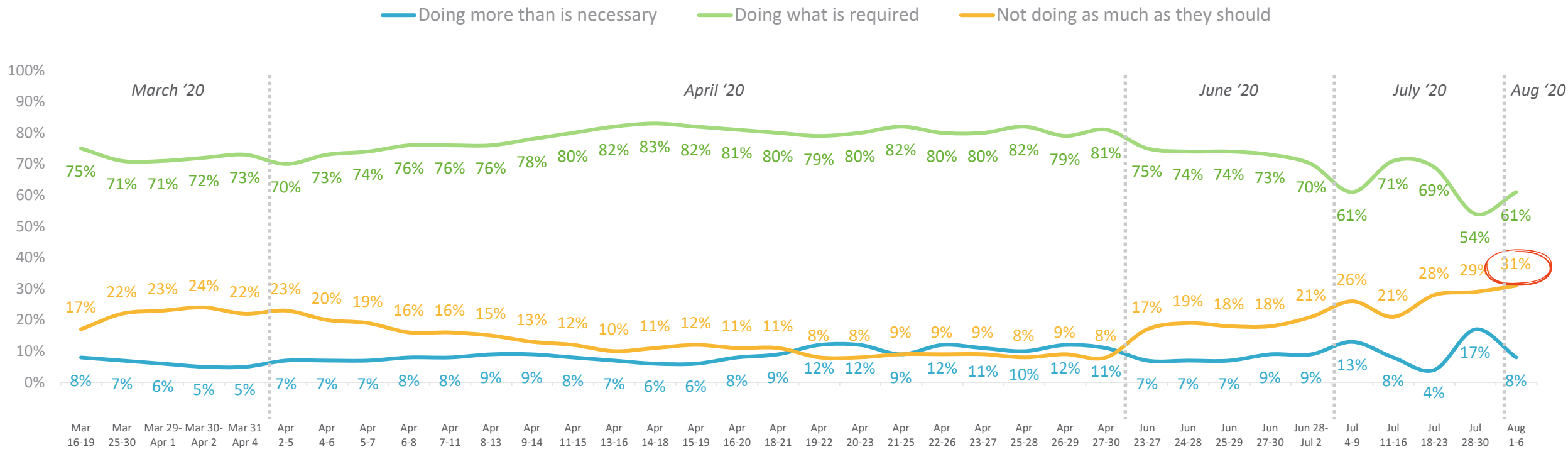

‘Planning for the return to school in the fall’ continues to be the one area where many Ontarians feel the government is ‘not doing as much as they should’. This view increased over the past week since the announcement of the province’s plans for re-opening schools in Ontario.

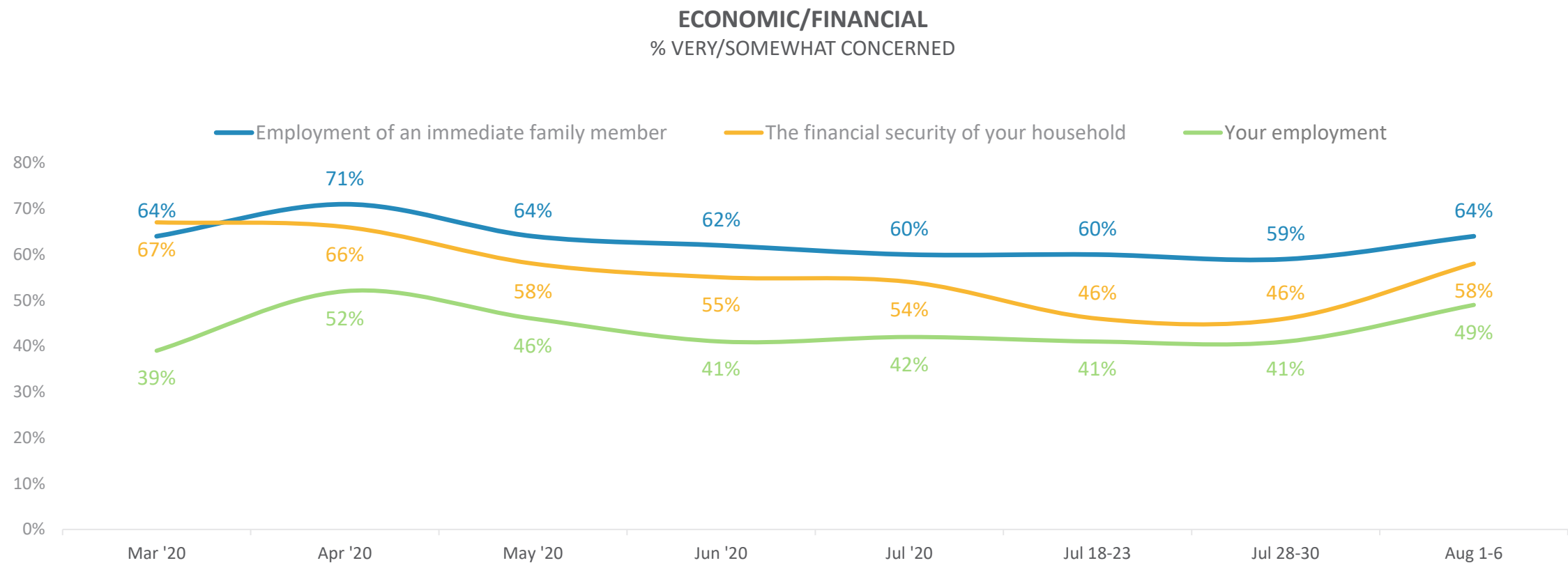

CONCERNS ABOUT IMPACT OF COVID-19



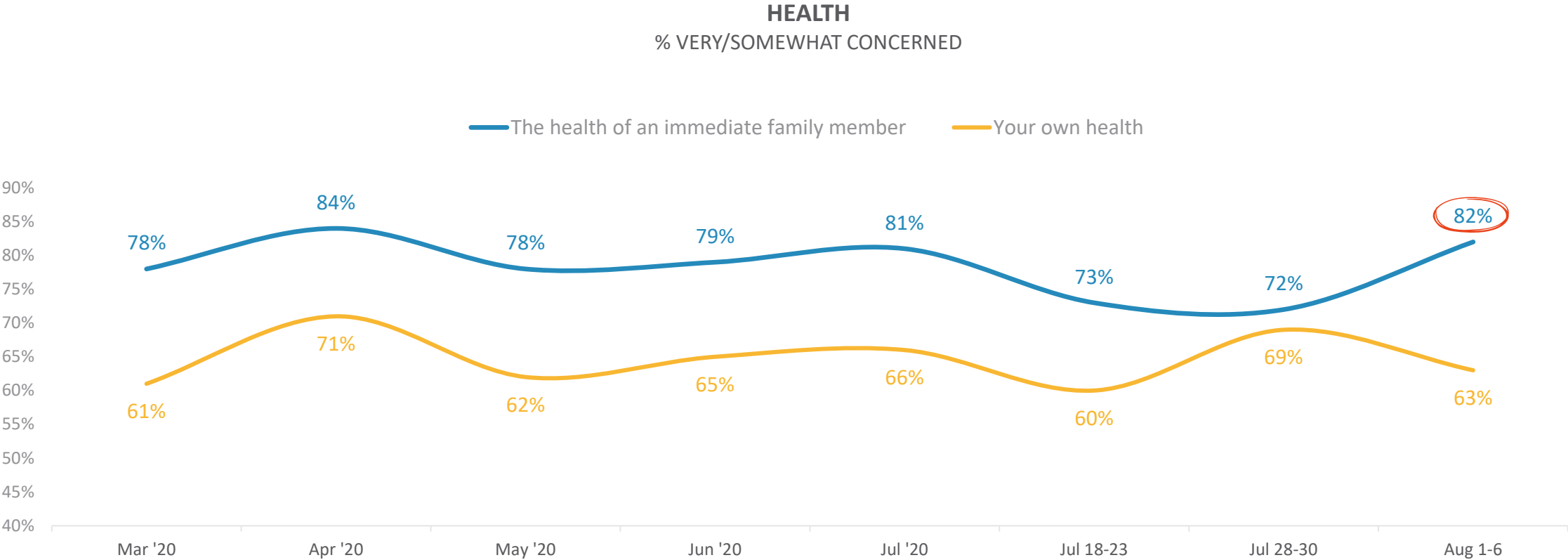
Ontarians’ concern about financial security and employment remains deep and has increased over the past week even though the province has moved more fully into Phase 3.

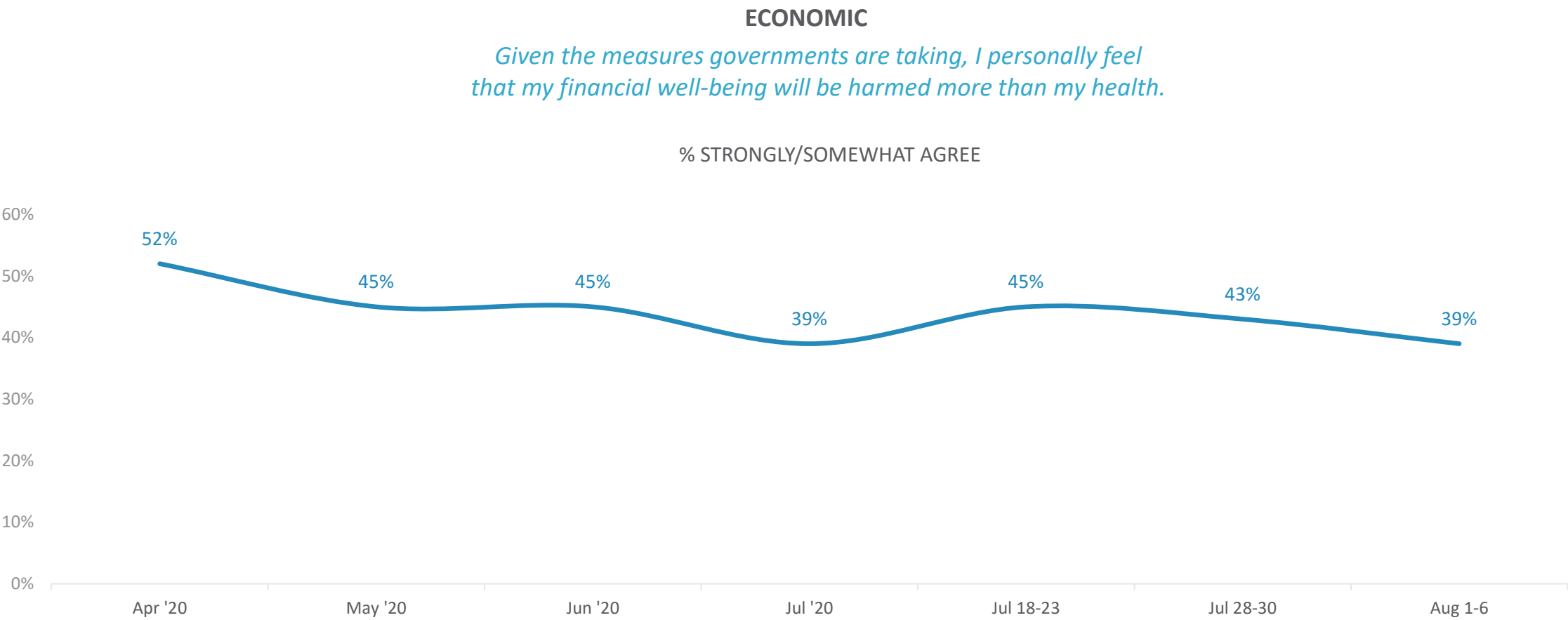
Moreover, concern of Ontarians about the health of an immediate family member has increased, while concerns about their own health have declined over the past week.

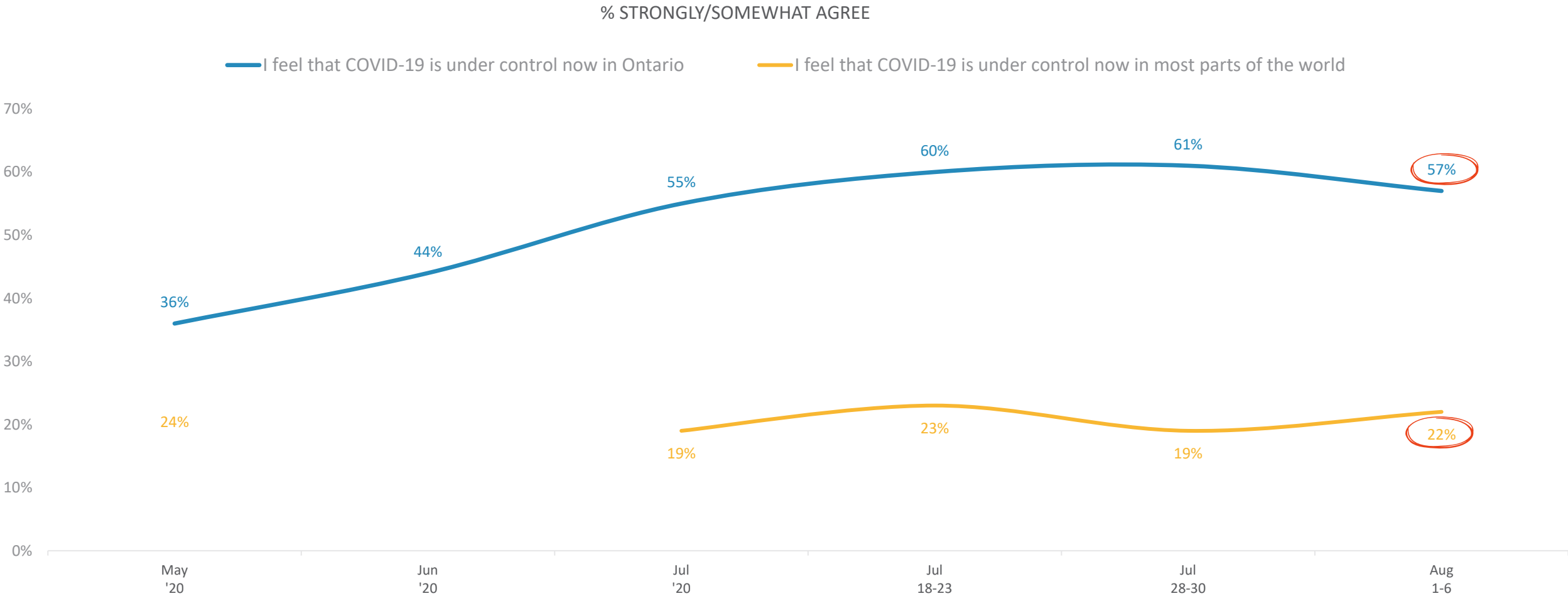

A majority of Ontarians continue to believe that COVID-19 is under control in the province. And, the gap between Ontario and the rest of world remains wide.

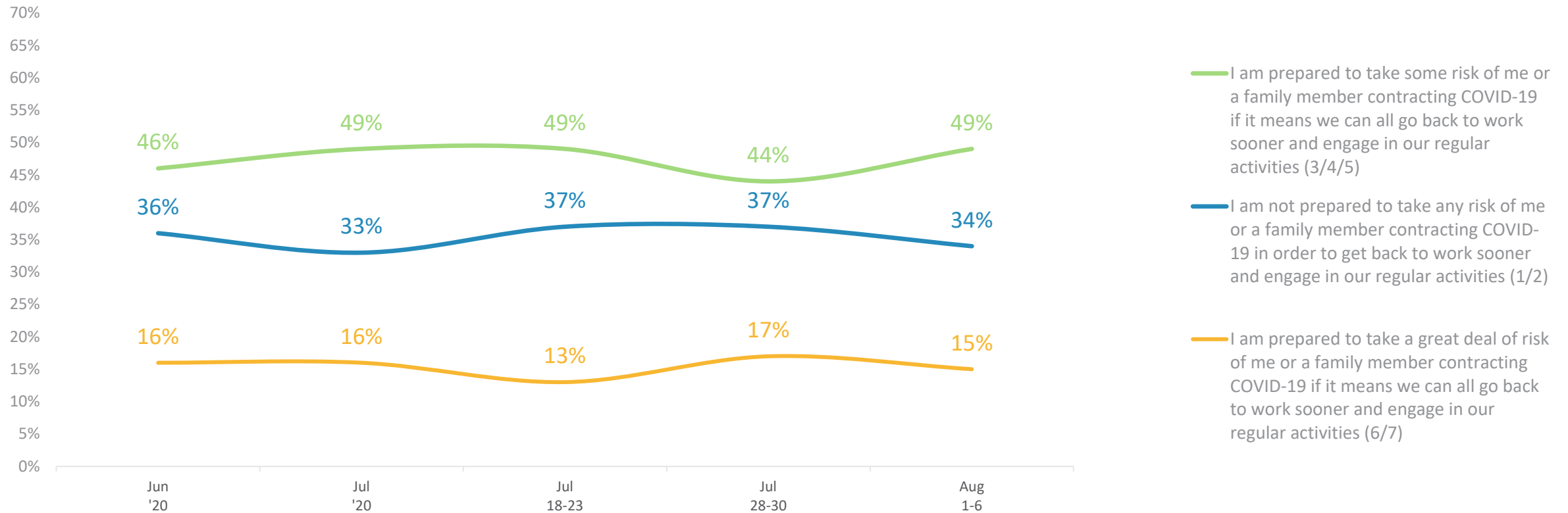

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MOVING TO PHASE 3 – PACE OF THE SHIFT

Almost 6-in-10 Ontarians feel the shift to Phase 3 is at the right pace. However, there is a large - but declining - minority (33%) who think the move to Phase 3 has been too quick. Only 5% feel the shift has been moving too slowly.

QCV-112. Many parts of Ontario are now into Phase 3 of the reopening of the economy and this means that bars, gyms, indoor dining facilities and casinos, among other facilities, are open or soon will be open with restrictions, such as social distancing and wearing a face covering. As the province entered into Phase 3 activities, ‘going inside to an indoor bar’ or ‘to a casino’ are perceived to be ‘very’ risky behavior, while ‘eating on a restaurant patio’ or ‘returning to work at an office’ are perceived to be less risky.

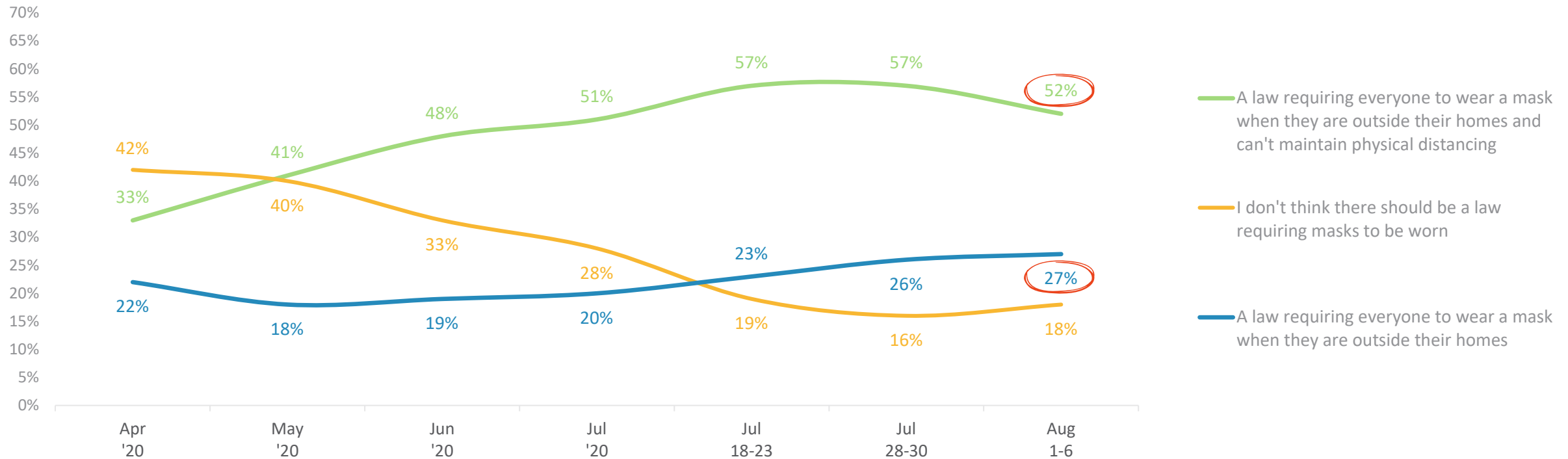

MAKING THE WEARING OF A MASK A LEGAL REQUIREMENT

An increasing number of Ontarians would like some level of legal codification of face mask wearing: about 8-in-10 continue to want some legal enforcement for this way of stopping the virus spread.

- Over one-quarter (27%), the highest level, want an across the board law on face mask wearing.
- In contrast, now only 18% (down from 42% in April) do not want an across the board law on mask wearing.

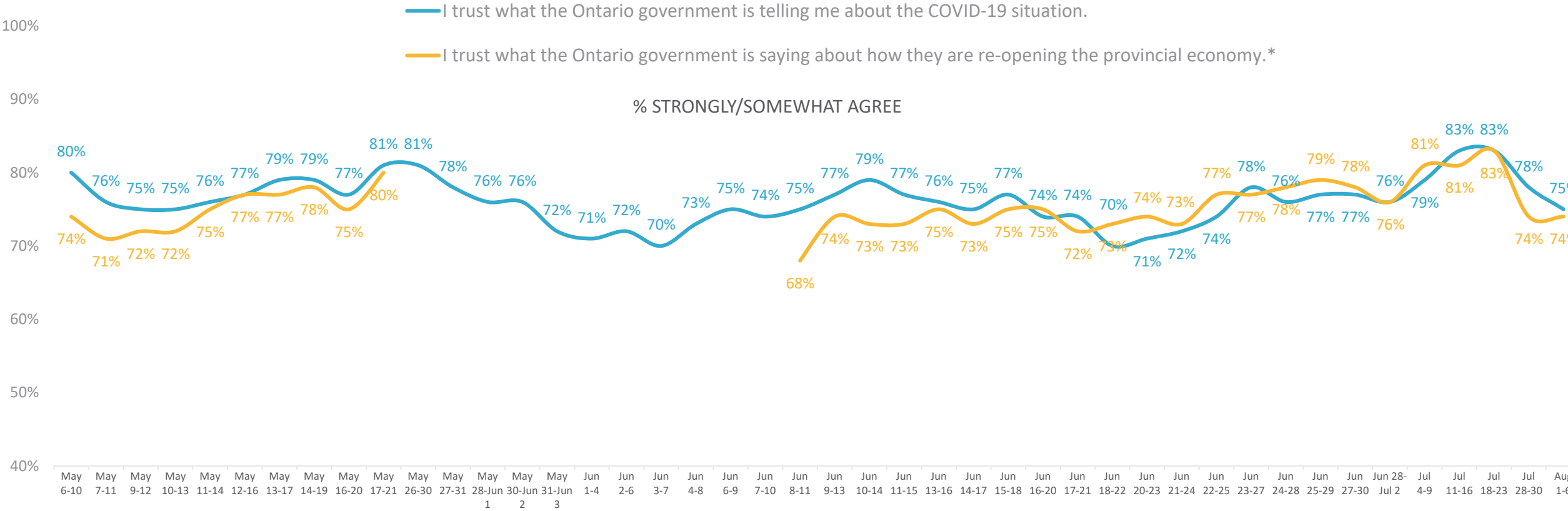
