

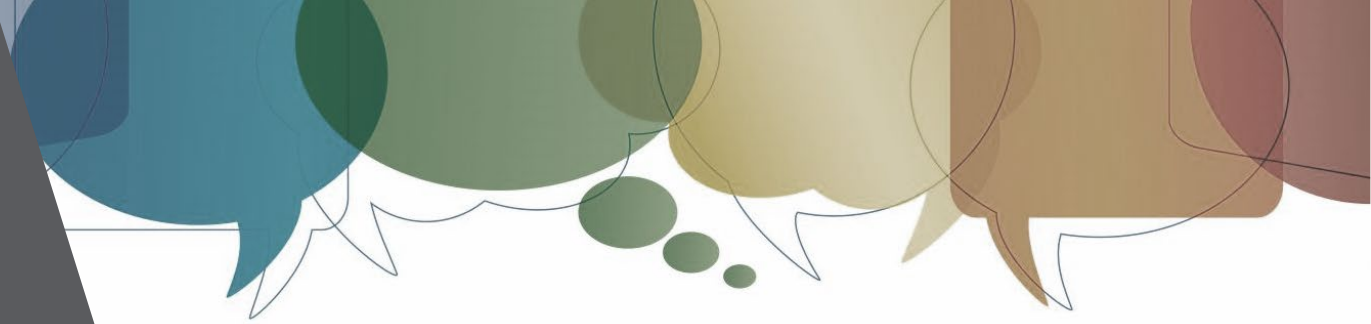

KEY FINDINGS

Key Findings

1 Over the past week, the government's 'right track' scores have inched upwards to 78% after dipping to 74% a week ago.

2 The rising rate of infection in Ontario has caused a significant drop in the proportion of Ontarians who believe that COVID-19 is under control in the province.

Mirroring the perceptions about whether COVID-19 is under control, over the past three weeks there has been a significant increase in the belief that Ontario is not over the worst of the pandemic.

As it stands now, Ontarians' primary concern is about the second wave of COVID-19.

3 Consistent with recent government actions, a plurality of Ontarians support imposing fines on those hosting social events that violate public health regulations, followed by public education and increased enforcement.

Most Ontarians think that the recent increase in infections is expected as a result of the loosening of restrictions and that this is acceptable and not a sign of losing control.

4 In light of the rising infections, there has been a sharp drop over the past five weeks (from 71% to 28%) in the proportion of Ontarians who believe the threat of contracting COVID-19 is much less now.

5 As the COVID-19 landscape has changed quickly, there has been a drop (to its lowest level) in Ontarians' trust in the government's messaging about the re-opening of the provincial economy: 63%.

6 Ontarians remain divided on the current state of the economy. However, there may be some creeping pessimism: there has been an increase in the view that 'the economy continues to get worse', while there is a decline in the view that 'the economy is starting to recover'.

Similarly, there is declining confidence among Ontarians regarding an economic recovery over the next year.

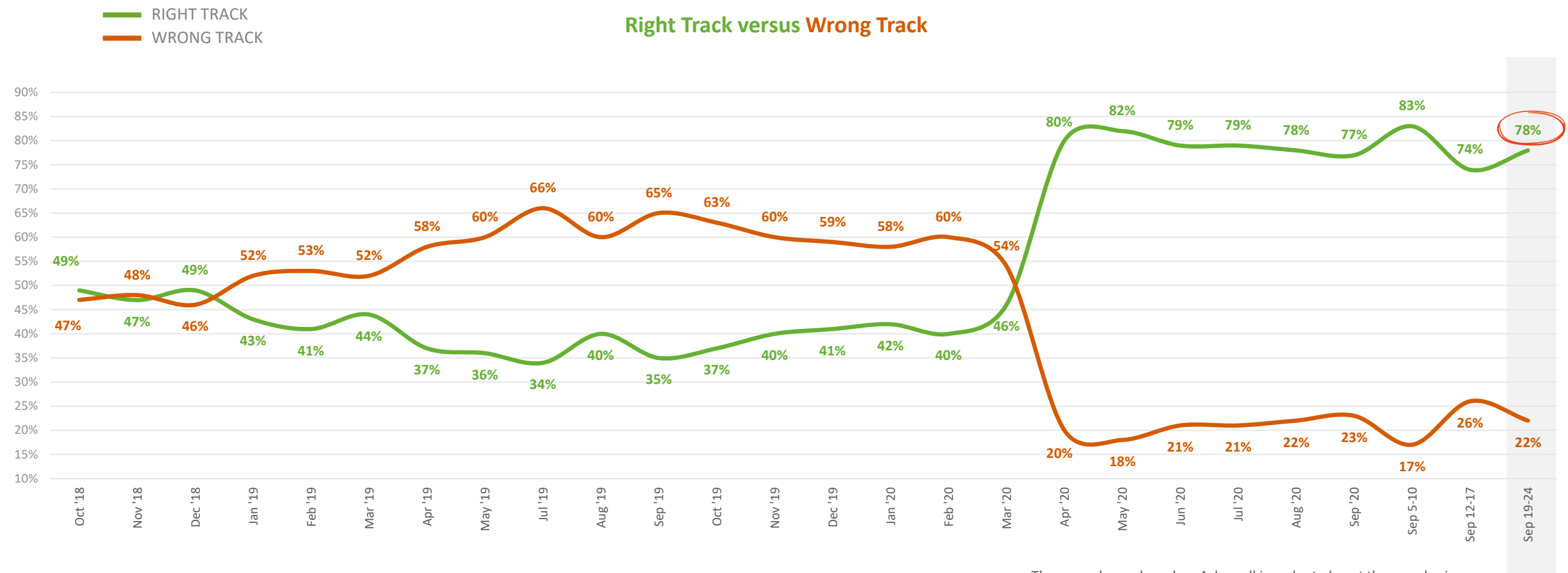
Ontarians support the 32% rebate on their electricity bills and that the \$4.8b rebate comes directly from taxpayers' dollars.

The results indicate that Ontarians are open to supporting the 32% rebate being reduced slightly if the funds are allocated to health and education.

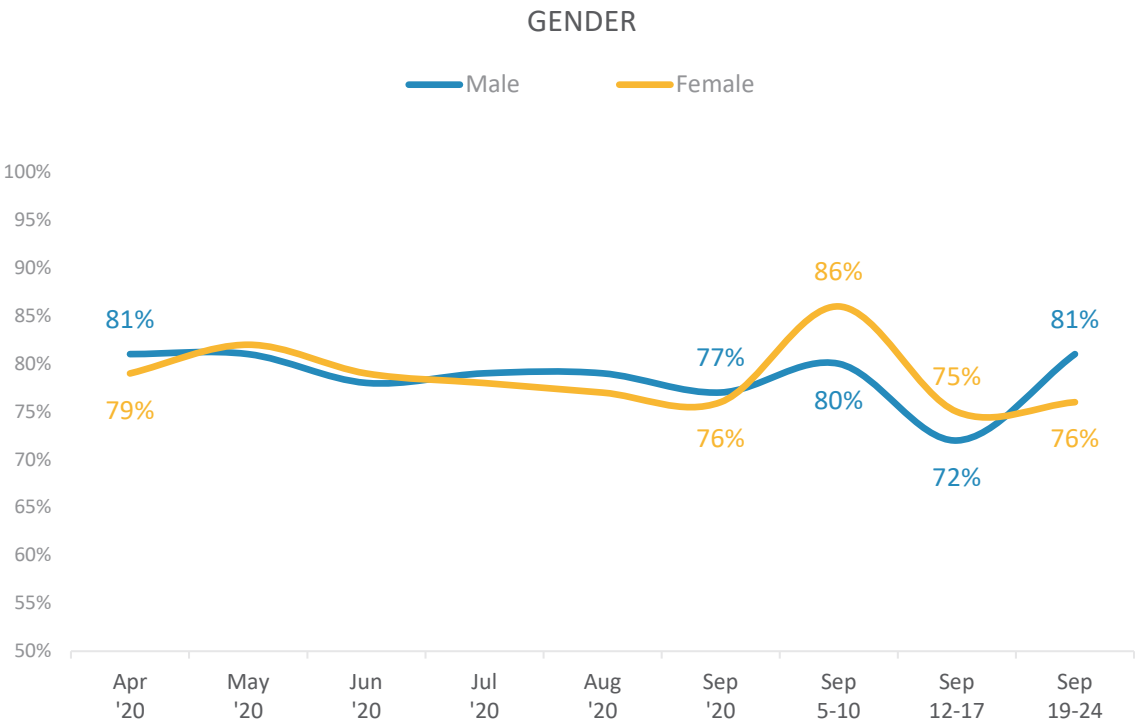
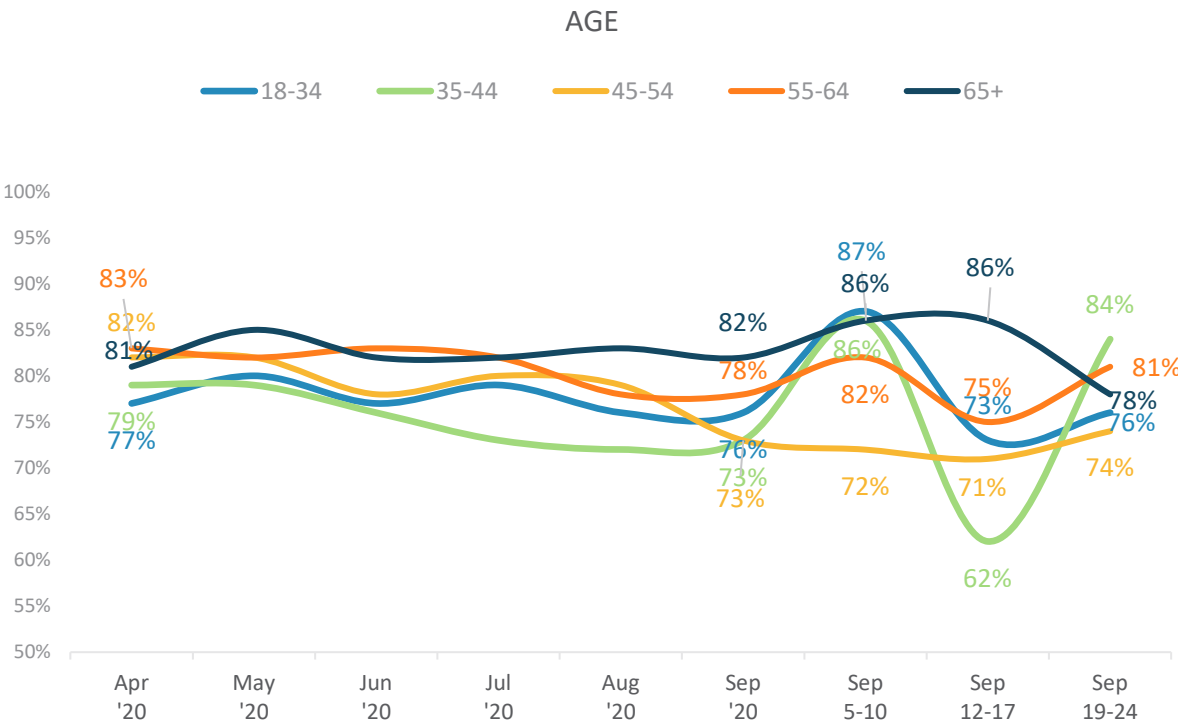

Right Track Scores – 6-Day Roll

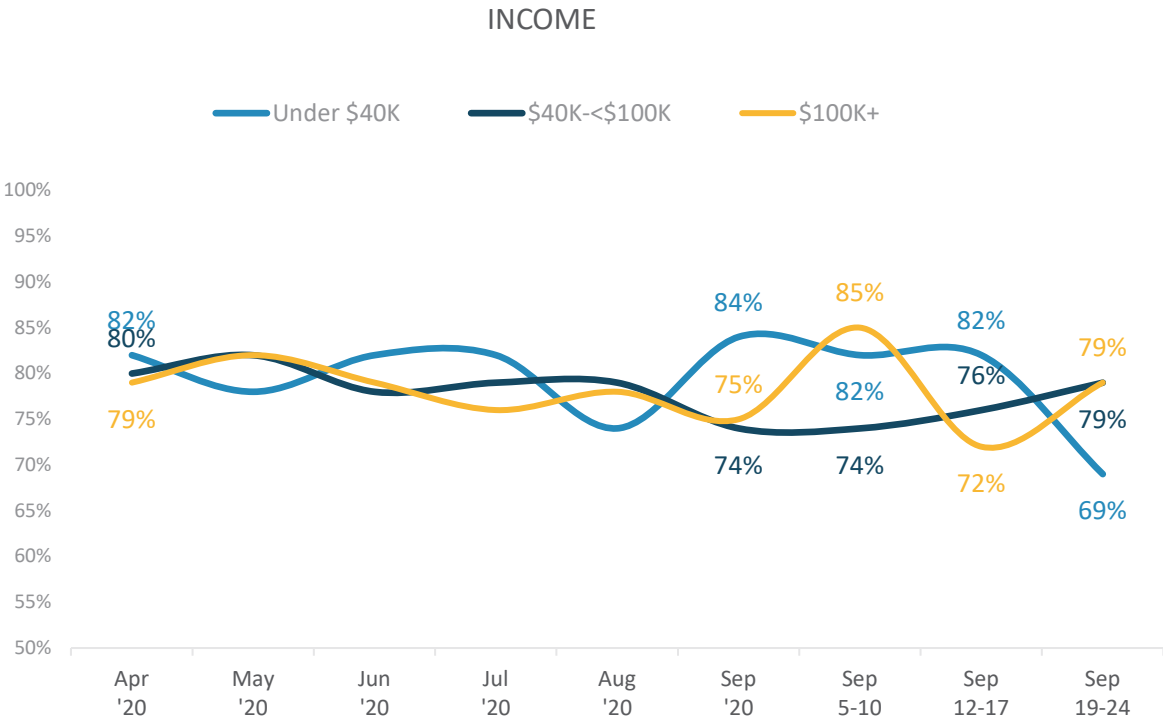
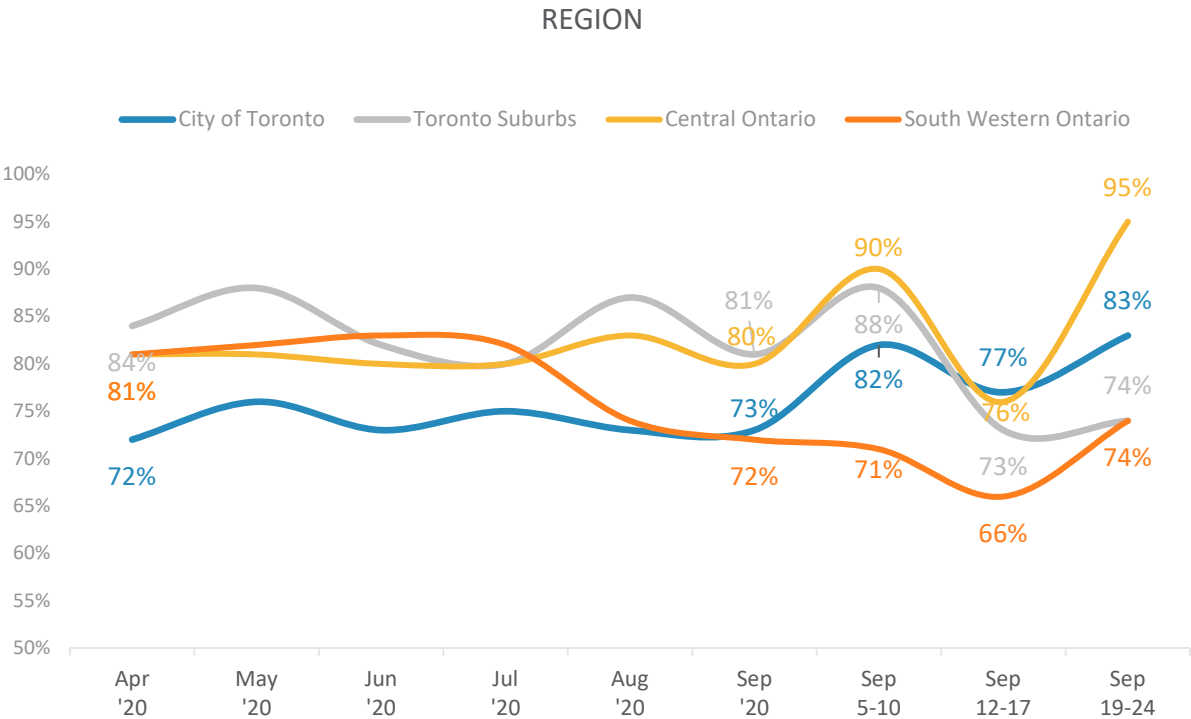

Right Track Scores – 6-Day Roll

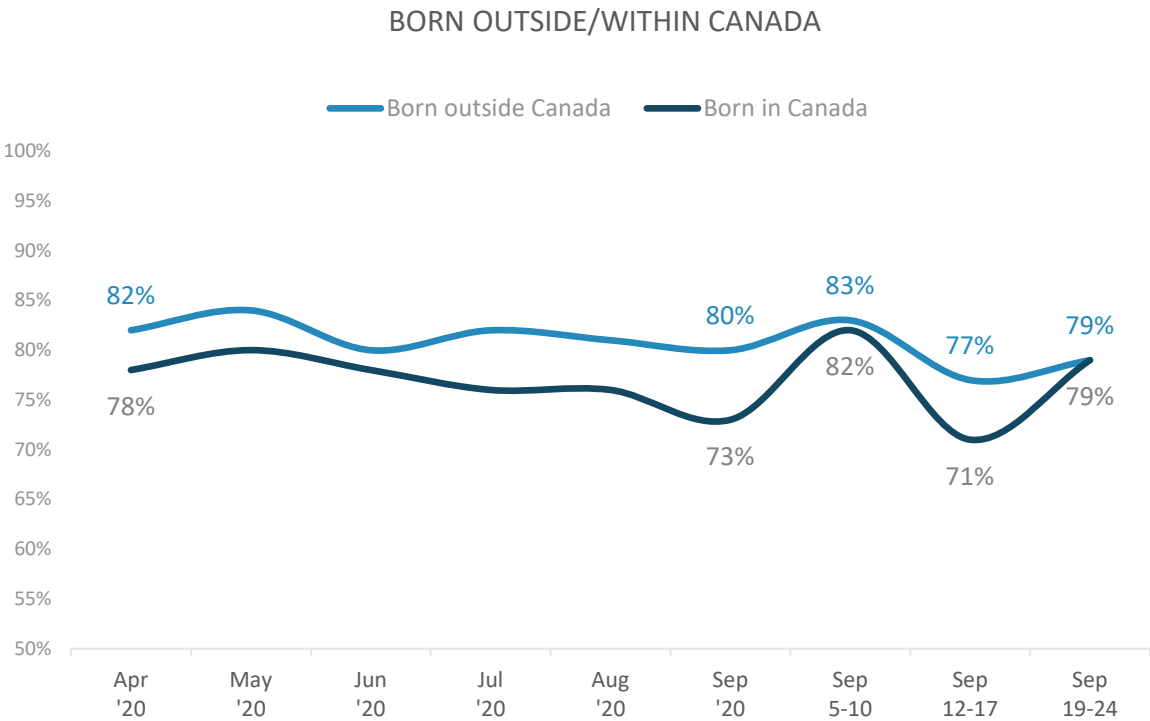
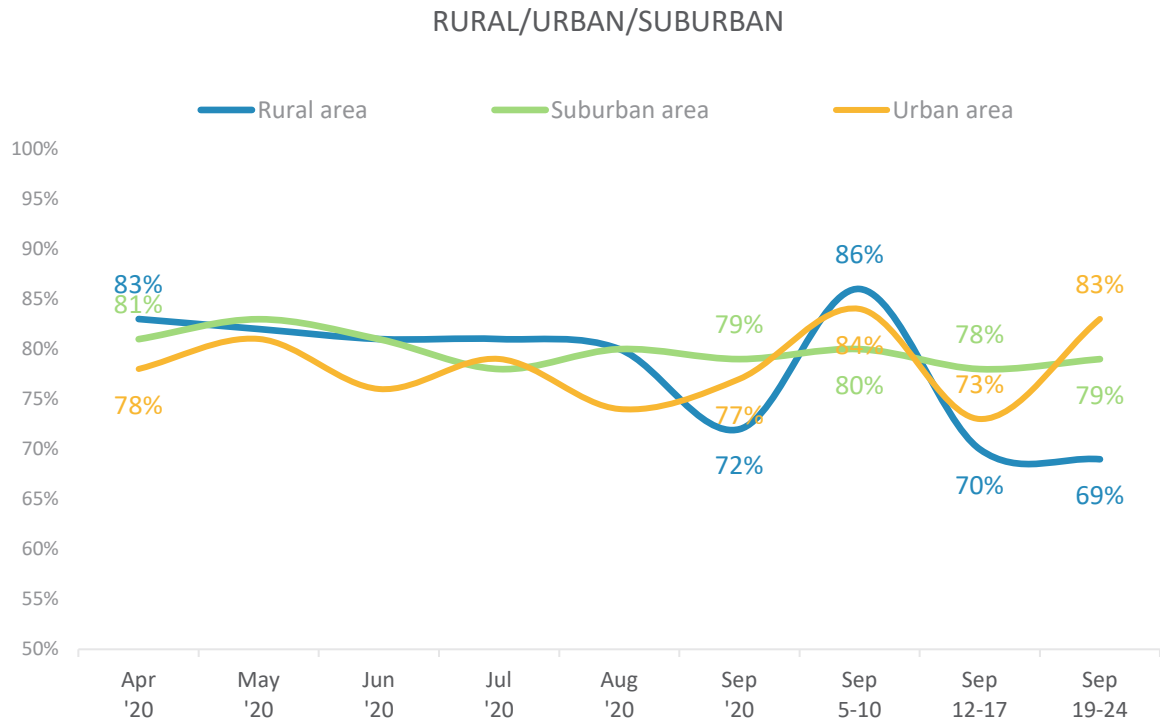

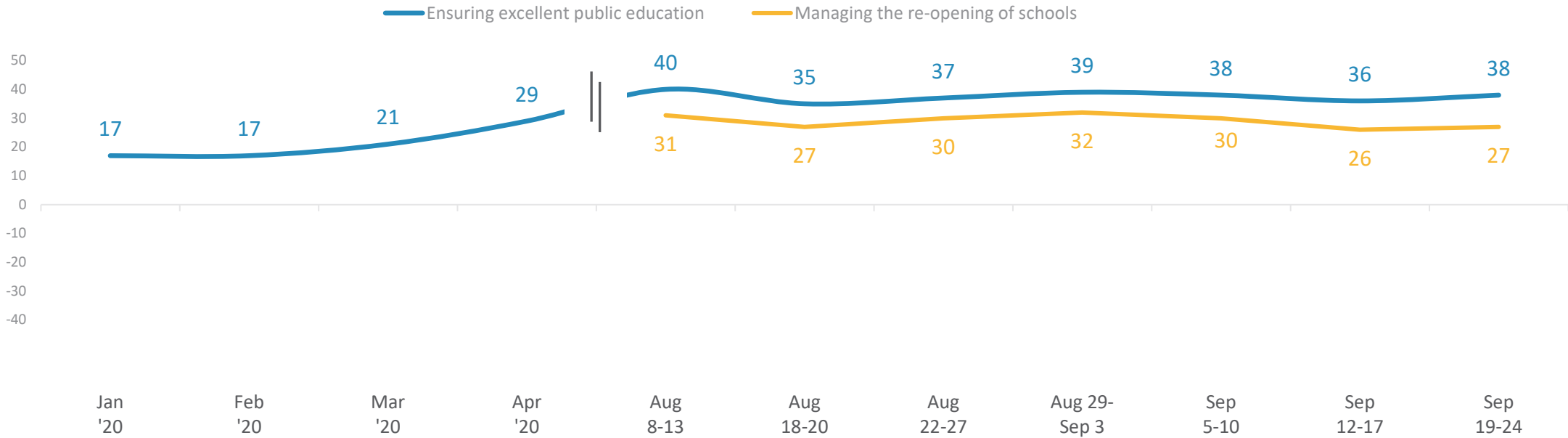
PERCEPTIONS OF GOVERNMENT PERFORMANCE DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC



The government continue to receive positive scores on ‘ensuring excellent public education’ and ‘managing the re-opening of schools’.

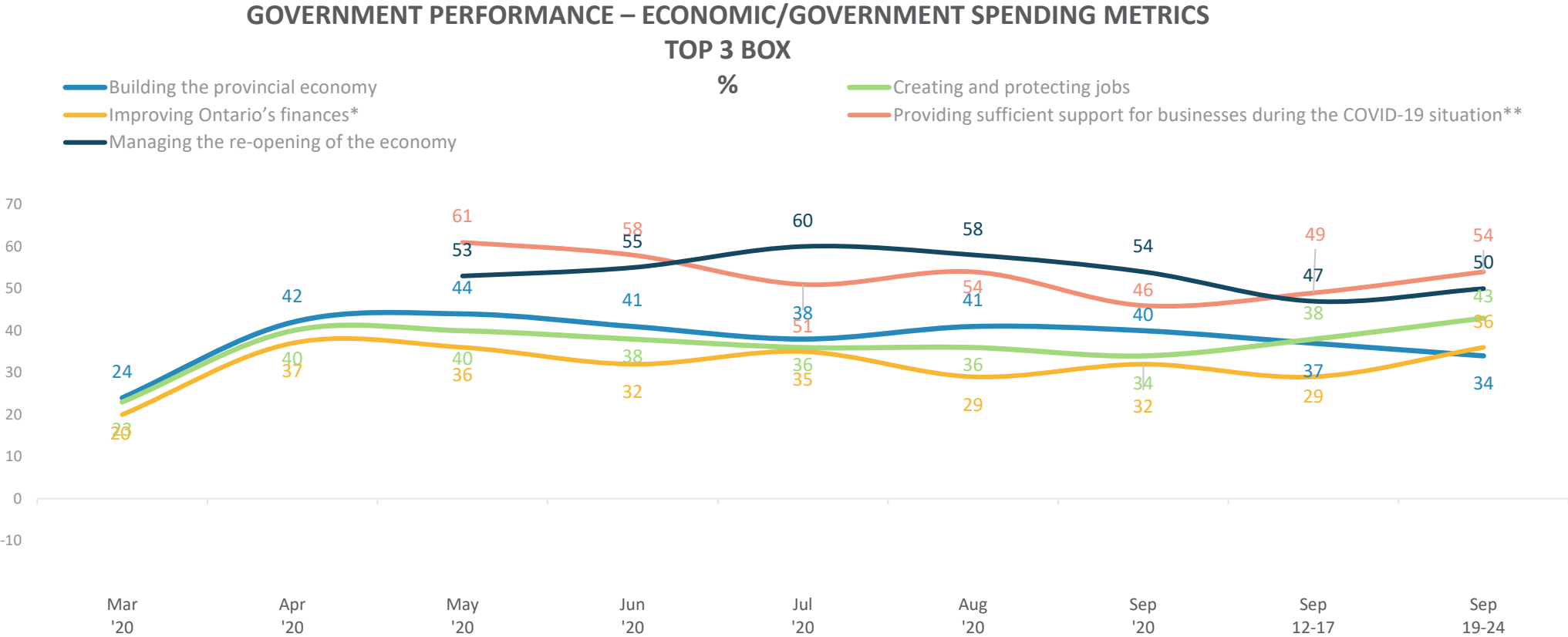

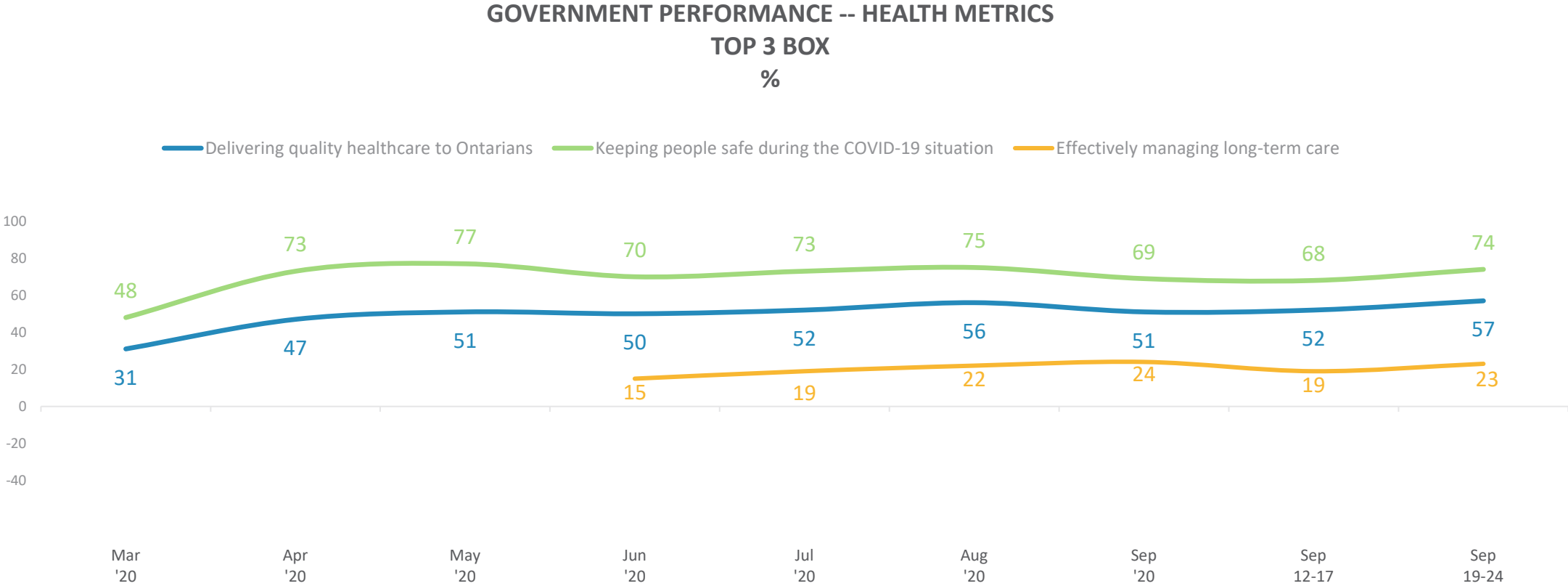
Despite rising infections, perceptions toward the government’s performance on most economic metrics, except for ‘building the provincial economy’, have risen.

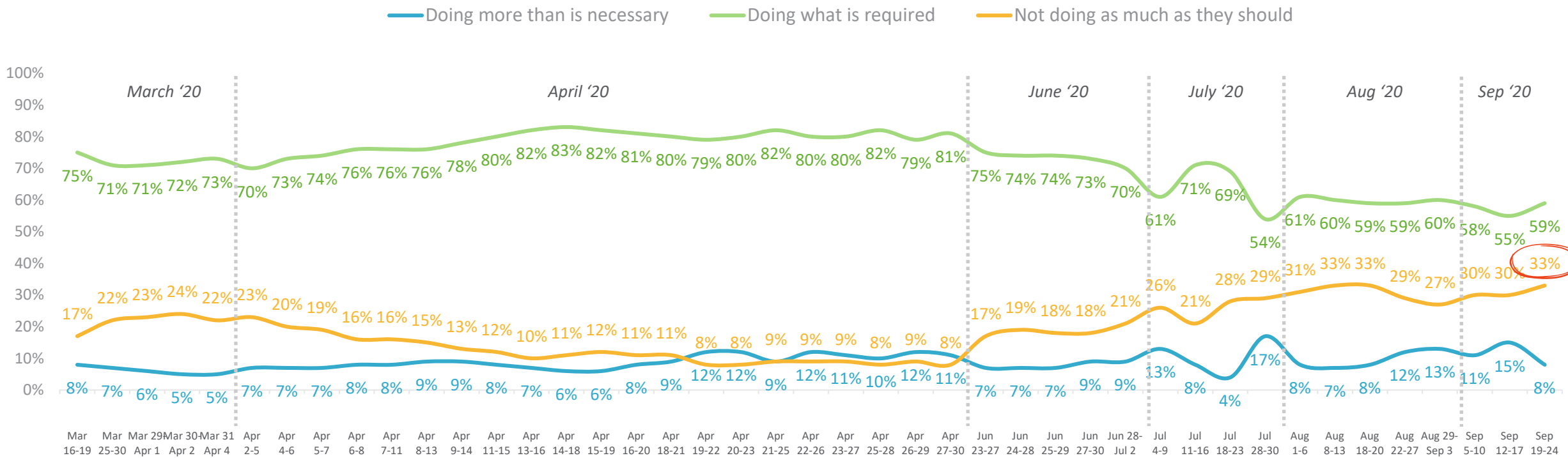

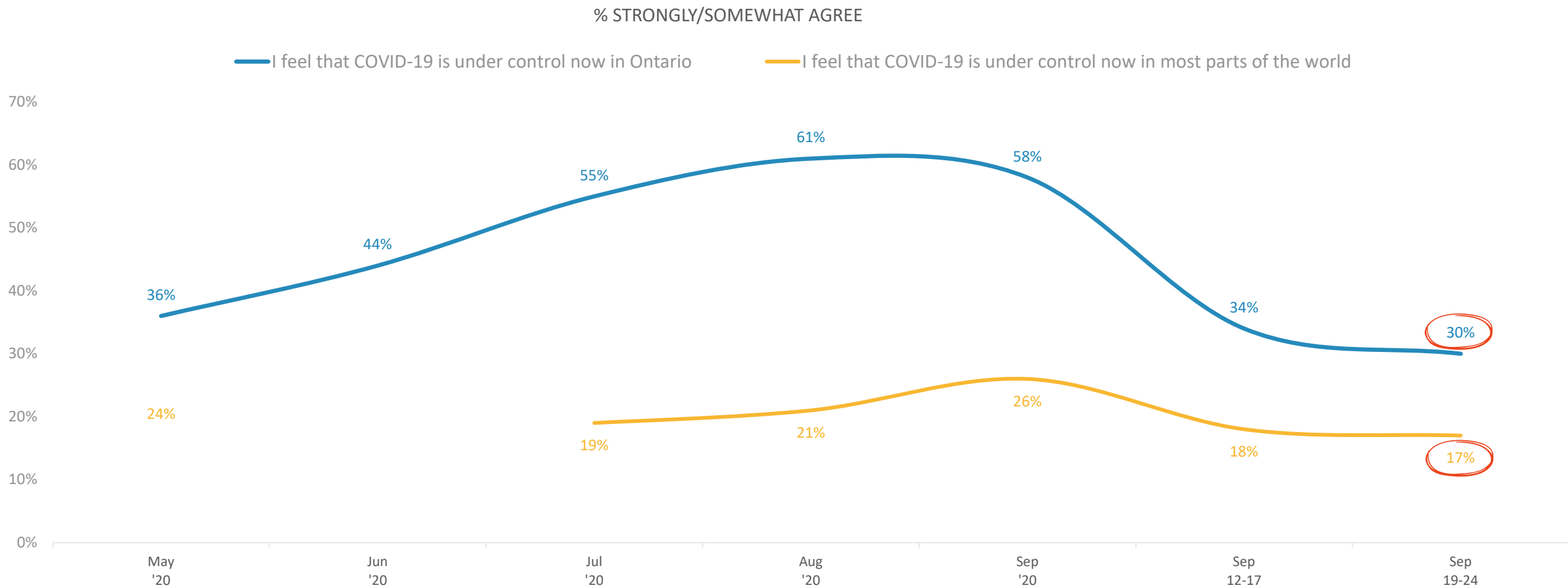

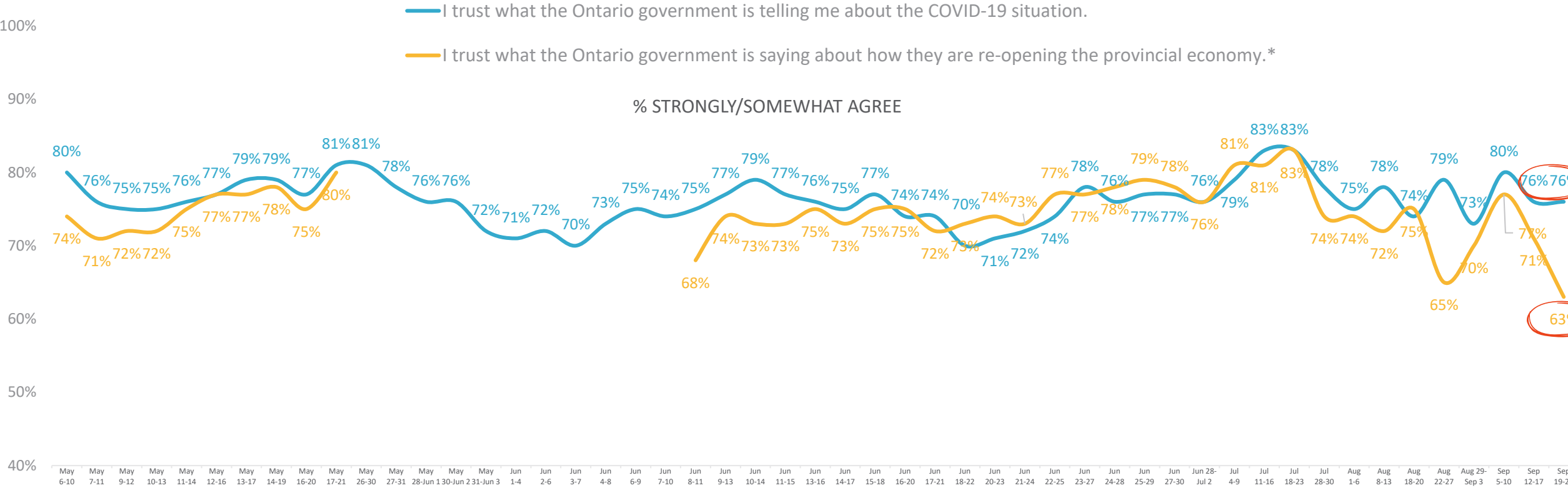

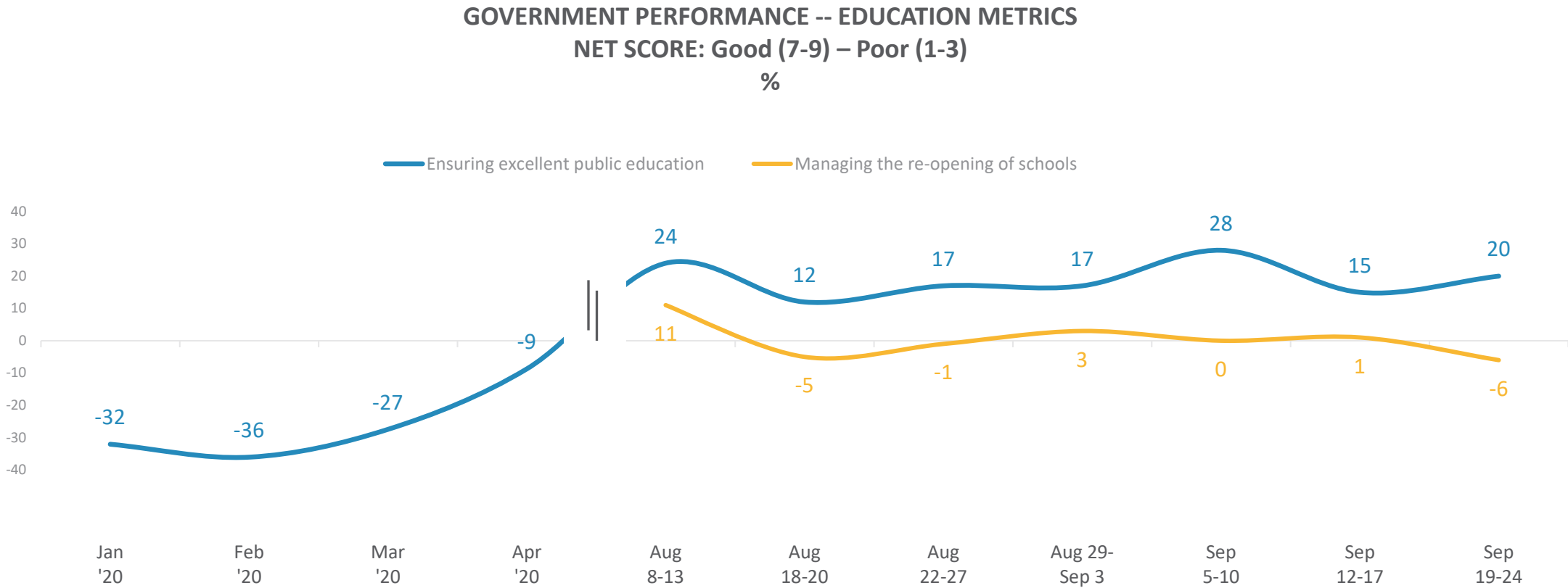

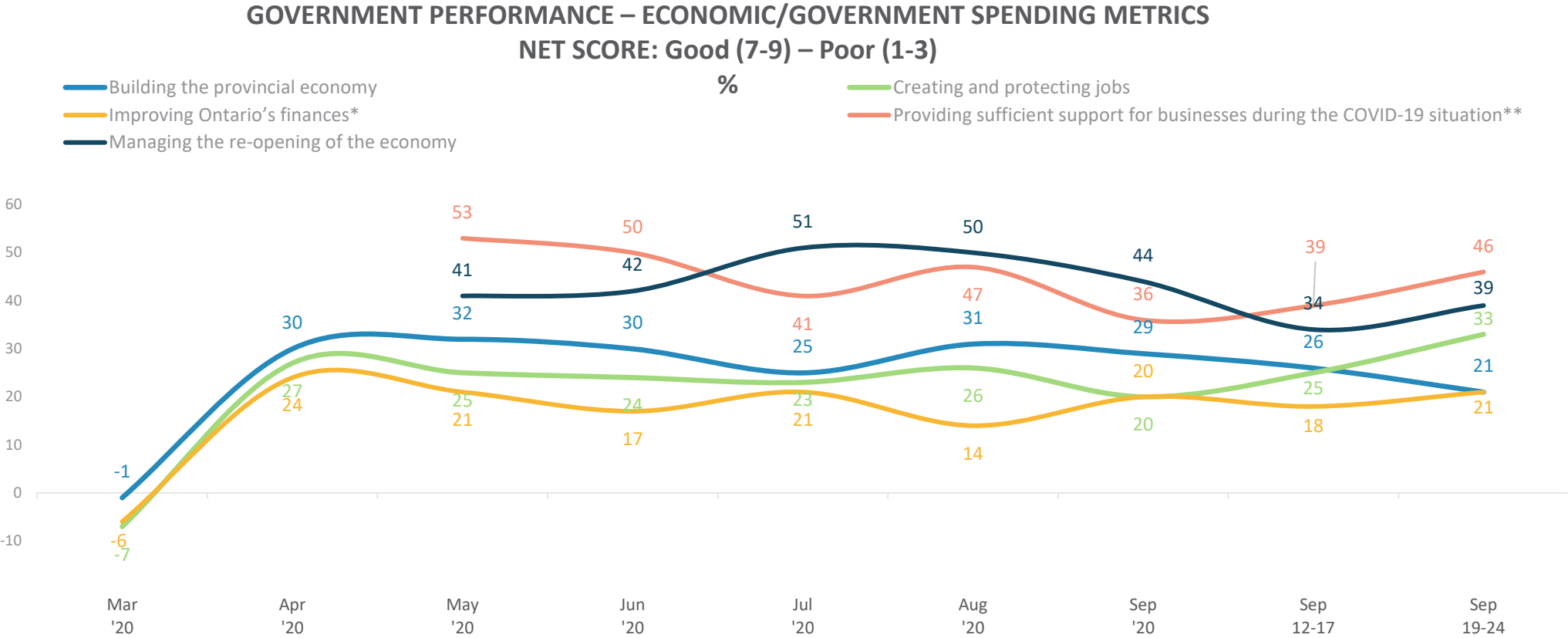

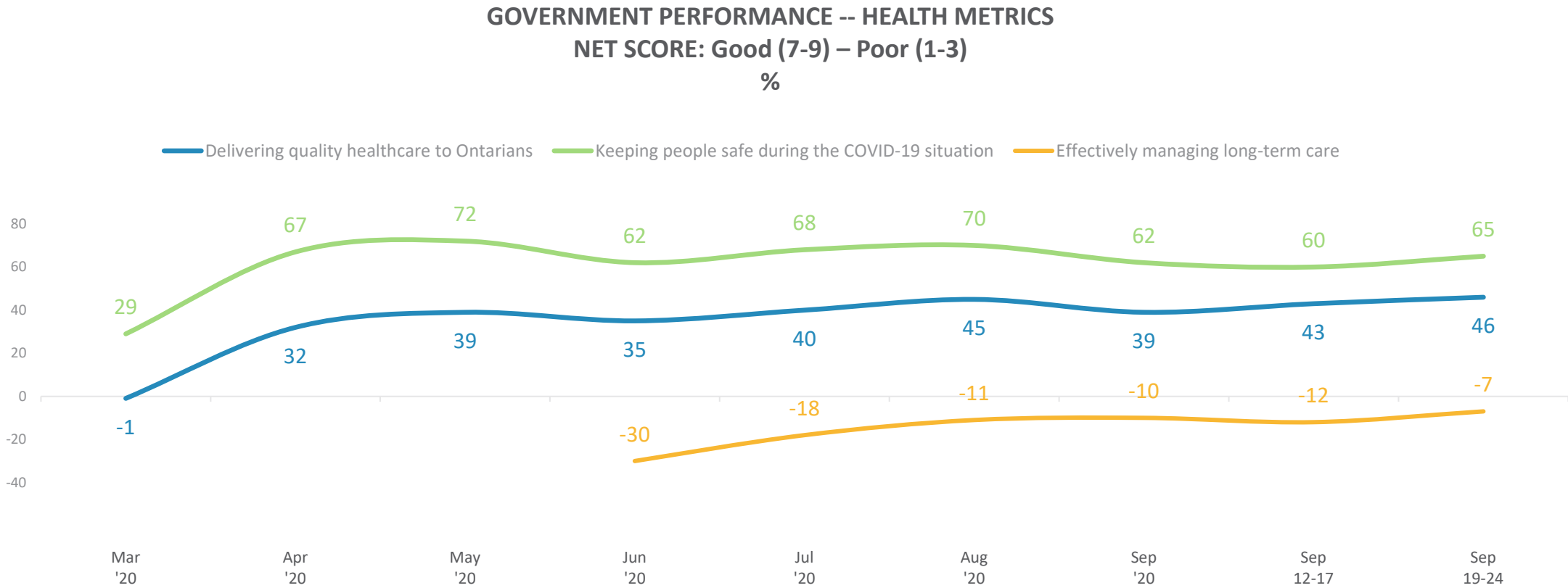

Moreover, perceptions toward the government’s performance on key health metrics have trended upward slightly.
