Doug Ford, Ontario PC Leader: They're having a secret meeting to double their compensation in case they get fired? How shameful and how disgusting are these people to do something like that?

Anchor: Topping our news at six tonight, more fuel for anger over hydro prices in Ontario. PC Leader Doug Ford says the executives at Hydro One, who he has threatened to fire, have given themselves more severance money if the government intervenes. Jamie Mauracher is live outside Hydro One with a reality check on all of this tonight. Jamie?

Reporter: Well Alan, you heard it there. Doug Ford attacking the man that he's dubbed the \$6 million man once again, CEO Mayo Schmidt, the CEO of Hydro One. Now Ford alleges that Schmidt as well as the utility board had a secret meeting where they increased the severance provisions of Schmidt's, meaning that if he were to be let go he would get \$10.7 million, making it essentially more costly if Ontario tried to take control of Hydro One again if he were to lose his job. Here's what Ford had to say earlier today and how the Minister of Energy responded.

Doug Ford, Ontario PC Leader: I'm here calling on those people to resign. And if they don't, let me tell you something. When I am Premier, you better believe I'm kicking each and every one of them out the door.

Glenn Thibeault, Ontario Energy Minister: Decisions made by executive compensation at Hydro One are made by the Hydro One board. We are not micromanagers of it.

Reporter: So Ford tapping into a lot of anger again. But you have to remember that the reality here is that even if they were to get rid of the board, the Minister of Energy says that would never lower hydro prices. It should also be noted that this didn't happen just last week. This actually happened, this meeting took place in November of 2017, meaning it likely had nothing to do with Ford coming after Hydro One. We did reach out to Hydro One's board members as well as Hydro One itself, we did speak with one board member who refused to comment but did direct us to the chair, David Denison, who says that they speak for the board. We are waiting on getting a comment back from Hydro One and Denison, but don't have one yet. However, we did speak to an employment lawyer today who says basically, this is just business as usual.

Daniel Chodos, Employment Lawyer: You have to be cautious to make sure that you're paying your employees an amount that will allow you to retain your good people. That applies to the CEO and it applies on down the line from them.

Reporter: Even when it comes to severance pay?

Chodos: Particularly when it comes to severance pay. We do a lot of work with executives and severance pay is a major source of conversation and a major discussion point when you're drafting and discussing and negotiating contracts with them.

Reporter: So this isn't unusual at this level?

Chodos: No at this level it's not unusual at all.

Reporter: So you might be sitting there at home thinking how would this affect you? Well in the case of a termination some of the money would be public money, some of it private of course, because the government still does hold shares in the company. So it does have that slight effect.

Anchor 1: To the race to become the next Premier of Ontario, and today the issue of corporate tax cuts took centre stage.

Anchor 2: It's a promise from PC leader Doug Ford, but his opponents are questioning who will benefit from slashing income tax rates. Our John Musselman is following the latest campaign developments. He is live at a Wynne event at the Liberty Grand. John?

Reporter: That's right, Zuraidah. The Premier just left a short time ago after making some remarks here at a private dinner, but you're right. All the talk today was about that corporate tax policy. There is the Wynne version and then there's the Doug Ford version.

Reporter: The election campaign hasn't officially started yet, but it sure feels like it. Liberal Premier Kathleen Wynne and Ontario PC Leader Doug Ford are exchanging daily jabs over issues like the minimum wage, hydro rates, and tax cuts. Today Ford pledged to cut the corporate income tax rate by 1 per cent if elected. The Premier says that move only helps the wealthy.

Premier Kathleen Wynne: The reality is that lowering that corporate tax rate will help the big guy. It helps big corporations. Doug Ford is a wealthy man. He has always been a wealthy man. And so he thinks like a wealthy man.

Reporter: At a news conference today Ford once again vowed to fire the CEO and the entire board of Hydro One, calling the executive salaries disgraceful. He was also asked about the corporate tax cut proposal and if it would benefit his family's Etobicoke label company. Here is Ford's response.

Doug Ford, Ontario PC Leader: I don't benefit a penny. Matter of fact, if anything I'm losing money doing this job, but it's worth it.

Reporter: Meanwhile, NDP Leader Andrea Horwath put out a statement about hydro rates. She claims Wynne and Ford are missing the point. She says privatization isn't working. "New Democrats will bring Hydro One back into public hands, rein in executive salaries, and lower everyone's hydro bills by about 30 per cent." Now back to Doug Ford. He says he would put his family business in a blind trust. He's also saying he's hearing all across the province that businesses want a break. That's why he is proposing cutting the corporate tax rate.

Unidentified 1: Members on the board though.

Unidentified 2: Do you agree with what they've done? Is this okay?

Minister Thibeault: I've always said that I get and I recognize that executive salaries and the compensation being brought forward is, you know, vast compared to what many Ontarians, you know, will ever see in their lifetime. But, you know, it makes me wonder as to what – what is Doug Ford trying to accomplish by this? Because when he's talking about saying he wants to fire the CEO of Hydro One, that doesn't do a thing to actually reduce bills.

Anchor: The provincial election campaign hasn't officially started yet but the premier has warned that it will be a vicious one. Kathleen Wynne and PC leader Doug Ford continue to throw punches today. Nicole Martin has that story.

Reporter: Premier Kathleen Wynne is facing a tough re-election campaign but she is making it clear that there'll be no backing down on this war of words.

Premier Kathleen Wynne: I'm not going to allow smears to stand. I'm just not going to allow that.

Doug Ford, Ontario PC Leader: She's destroyed this province for the last 15 years.

Reporter: Ford's statement earlier this week triggered growing tensions between the two leaders. Anchor: Let's bring in political commentator Keith Leslie from Queen's Park. Now Keith, you've been covering Queen's Park for more than 20 years. Do you remember an election campaign this nasty?

Keith Leslie, Political Commentator: No I don't. Not out of the gate. This one got nasty in a hurry, didn't it? Election campaigns in Ontario tend to be kind of stayed and almost boring affairs. Leadership campaigns tend to be where you get to the real bitter fights and more personal attacks cause they're not talking policy. Elections tend to be a bit more, as I say, stayed and almost boring in Ontario. Even when Dalton McGuinty was running against Mike Harris, he didn't portray him as an evil man, he just attacked his policies. This one, right out the gate, you're a liar, you're a bully, I'm not going to go high, I'm going to go low. This is some pretty nasty stuff right out the gate. I don't think I've ever seen anything quite this harsh right away.

Anchor: Now that says something. Who's to blame for the malicious kind of tone of the campaign?

Leslie: Well I guess you know, it's a pox on both Mr. Ford and Ms. Wynne's houses for doing this. Mr. Ford has obviously got a bombastic style. I mean he's obviously been compared with Mr. Trump and that's where Ms. Wynne went with this and you know, Ms. Wynne said she thought Michelle Obama had the right thing when she said you know when they go low, we'll go high but I'm not going to do that because it didn't keep Donald Trump out of the White House and it won't keep Doug Ford from becoming premier of Ontario. So she's saying I'm going to keep this nasty and saying he's already running a vicious campaign. So both of them I think are really going at each other pretty in very personal ways which is normally not the way in Ontario.

Anchor: Let's talk about the third party leader, NDP leader Andrea Horwath. She has managed to stay out of the line of fire but in doing so, she's also staying out of the spotlight. So does she stand to benefit or gain from this war of words?

Leslie: Well that's the real question; can she even be heard above this war of words as these two grab all the headlines? Ford and Wynne going at each other with such personal attacks. Ford really attacking the Liberal policies but coming very, very close to using things like, almost saying "lock her up," saying that she should be jailed or other Liberals should be jailed because you're a corrupt government. So hopefully Horwath in her mind can get above all that, stay above the fray and get heard. But I suspect if she doesn't, at some point she's going to have to join in and maybe come out fighting just as hard as the other two. She's already pretty critical of Mr. Ford and of course attacks the Wynne government but playing nice is not going to get her heard when these other two are really, really fighting so hard and so viciously.
