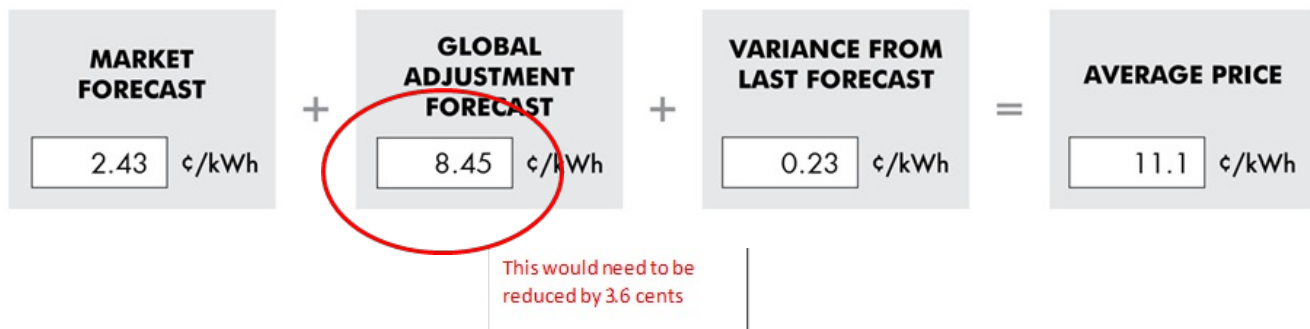
The first thing that I noticed was the assumption for what a total bill would be for a Toronto consumer using 750kWh, seems higher than it should be. The ministry chart indicates that the 2017 total bill excluding HST would be \$153. The first image below from the OEB online calculator shows the total charges (excluding HST) to be \$140. It is a bit challenging to reconcile with their numbers because I can't figure out how they arrived at a the higher total bill impact. That said how about this for an approach, that is likely better aligned with how this smoothing could be implemented:

The GA has a direct impact on the TOU rates. A Toronto Hydro customer who uses 750kWh pays \$83.54 for electricity which is equivalent to **11.1 cents per kWh**. This makes perfect sense and is aligned with what the OEB's RPP forecast.

The Ministry slide contemplates a \$27 reduction that must come from the global adjustment smoothing, this means the customer needs to pay **7.5 cents per kWh**. A difference of 3.6 cents.

Below is an image of the factors in the current RPP price.

Forecast of Average Price to be Paid by Each RPP Consumer





An estimate of what this would cost is: 8.45 cents/kWh represents \$5 billion dollars of GA for RPP consumers, therefore 3.6 cent/kWh reduction would represent **\$2.13Billion** this year. I suspect that what I have described here is how this program will be implemented. Therefore perhaps the best way to update the profiles is to use the total GA reduction that is contemplated for RPP consumers and translate that into a price per kWh? See below for the 750 kWh example. The electricity charge is simply 750kWh multiplied by 7.5 cents.

Hey Spencer,

Thank you yet again for another iteration! These look great.

We have a further request, and this one will require some calculations that are a bit tricky. Attached is a slide which estimates the cumulative impact of our new initiatives for a 750kWh/month Toronto Hydro customer. This has been what our staff have been using in pursuing a 25% decrease in bills.

As you'll notice, the amount of GA smoothing has been calculated backwards from the bill total. That is, GA smoothing has not been calculated to lower RPP rates by 25%; instead, staff have added up the impact of our various efforts, and then increased the GA financing until arriving at a total reduction of 25% in the bottom line. This means that in our bill mock-ups, it will be a little too simplistic to simply reduce the commodity cost by 25%, as we've done so far.

In our Ministry's estimates in the attached slide, they do not break out commodity cost from the total bill, so it's tricky figuring out exactly how much the commodity cost has been reduced through the GA financing. I'm hoping you might have some ideas on how you could back out this number, to find a generalized % reduction in commodity cost that can be used in the bill mock-ups? Then we could update the bills to a more accurate representation.

Let me know if you think this might be possible. Again, thanks for all your help on this! We are all operating at capacity to get this done as quickly as possible, and the help makes a big difference.
