OUR STORY

- Electricity is essential, and people needed help
- Our plan delivers:
 - Substantial relief – 25% on average
 - It will last – increases no more than inflation for 4 years
 - It is built on structural change to the system
- We rebuilt our system; \$50B invested, eliminated coal
 - But asked one generation to pay for it all
- This Plan is a fairer way to pay for our system
- We have introduced legislation to deliver on this Plan – will the opposition support real relief for families?

OPPO CONTRAST

- PCs voted against our plan to lower bills.
 - Now, they've included it in their own platform—so why didn't they vote for it when it counted?
 - Their biggest idea – ripping up contracts – would actually increase bills (through penalties, lawsuits)
 - The PCs repeat the myth that ownership of Hydro One affects rates
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- NDP voted against our plan to lower bills, and have no realistic plan to replace it
 - Want to spend \$4B buying back Hydro One shares, which won't take 1 cent off hydro bills
 - In their plan, Low-income Ontarians are asked to "wait and see," and First Nations aren't even mentioned.
 - **These groups should be a pillar of any plan, not an afterthought**

Details on the Plan

- Some households will see more than the 25% reduction, depending on other programs
 - Bills can be reduced as much as 40-50%
- GA refinancing – like a new “mortgage”
- Relief for those with the highest distribution rates (RRRP)
- Support for low-income
 - Expanded OESP (increase credits by 50%, expand eligibility)
 - A new affordability fund (\$200M to help for retrofits for those who don’t qualify for other support)
- Support for First Nations (eliminating delivery charge for on-reserve – average \$85/month savings)
- Expanding ICI to help medium-sized manufacturing (reducing threshold from 1MW to 50kW)

Financial Cost

- Moving social programs to the taxbase – estimated \$2.5B over next three years
 - This is in addition to the cost of the 8% rebate
- GA financing estimated to cost \$21B over thirty years

Non-Residential Beneficiaries

- Every single household will receive the 25%
- But so will many others
 - Hundreds of thousands of small businesses
 - The vast majority of farms
 - Small offices of all kinds (non-profits, charities)
 - Retirement homes
 - Long-term care homes
 - Housing co-ops
 - Community agencies

- Those on retail contracts or with sub-meters
- If you receive a bill with Time-of-Use prices, you get the reduction

MUSH sector, other ratepayers

- Will receive benefit of tax-basing social programs - \$3/MWh, or about a 2-4% reduction
- Eligible for incentives and rebates for energy efficiency

Advertising

- The government has a responsibility to raise awareness about programs and services that affect Ontarians
- This includes informing them of changes to their electricity bills so that they can plan for the future
- Using a variety of channels to encourage people to visit the website dedicated to informing Ontarians
- We strengthened the legislation around this issue – and we are following it here
