CFTO (Toronto)

1) Police raids have led to three more arrests in the Manchester bombing. The number of injuries has now reached 216 and 8 people are still missing. The threat level in the UK has been raised to critical and military troops have been deployed across the country.

2) Members of Manchester's Muslim community held a vigil in honour of the victims today and made a statement denouncing the bombing.

3) The bombers parents knew their son had been radicalized and had reported their son to security officials. He had recently travelled to Syria and had returned from Libya only days before the attack.

4) Chelsea Football Club has cancelled their victory parade out of respect for the victims of the bombing.

5) A Toronto artist created a mural showing support for Manchester outside of the British Consulate in Toronto. He is also creating a mural at City Hall today.

6) The downtown relief transit line will be the focus at Toronto City Hall today as councillors kick off their three day meeting. Mayor John Tory was at Pape Station this morning handing out flyers to commuters urging them to call Transportation Minister Steven Del Duca and ask for his support.

7) Weather.

8) The Financial Accountability Watchdog confirmed today that the Fair Hydro Plan will reduce rates until 2021 and then they will increase yearly by nearly 7 for 7 to 8 years.

9) Fire crews remain at the scene of a fire in a high rise in Scarborough.

10) A SUV drove into a convenience store in the city's east end early this morning.

14) Residents of an apartment building that staged a rent strike have been issued eviction notices if they do not pay. The landlord is raising rents but tenants claim the landlord does not keep the building in liveable condition.

20) An update on Story #8: NDP MPP Peter Tabuns says that the Fair Hydro Plan is a slap in the face and simply pushing the costs down the road by a few years. The Auditor General has said that the

plan doesn't keep up with Canadian Account Standards.

Global (Toronto)

1) A downtown subway relief line is being discussed by council at Toronto City Hall today. Mayor John Tory says that if a line is approved, the Ontario government needs to provide more money to actually build it. Mayor Tory was at Pape Station today lobbying the public to try to get his message out to push the province for more funding.

2) Students and their parents protested the construction of a 35-storey residential building next to John Fisher Public School this morning.

3) The westbound lanes of the QEW have reopened after being shut down for most of the morning commute.

4) Police are dealing with fentanyl traffickers who are using the internet and mail system to ship the drug into Canada.

5) Police have made several more arrests after a suicide bomber killed 22 young concert-goers in Manchester, England.

6) Jay Gray reporting from Manchester on the ongoing investigation into the bomb attack.

7) Toronto band, Broken Social Scene, took to the stage in Manchester last night just a day after the bomb attack.

8) Prime Minister Justin Trudeau is headed to Brussels for tomorrow's NATO summit. The Manchester bombing and security threats are expected to be on the agenda.

9) The family of a girl yanked into the water by a sea lion in B.C. say they were not feeding the animal before the incident.

10) The Global panel discusses Canada's preparedness for a terror attack.

CKCO (Kitchener)

1) Manchester police have made four more arrests in the suicide bombings at the Ariana Grande concert on Monday.

2) Police say a collision between a van and a dump truck is reportedly the cause of a major fire in Guelph yesterday that left one man dead and another in hospital.

3) Provincial police are investigating a single vehicle crash near Brantford last night on Hwy 54.

4) A Waterloo police officer is facing domestic battery charges after an off-duty incident that happened in Las Vegas on Friday.

5) Windsor police, the Coroner and the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services are investigating the death of a female inmate at the South West Detention Centre.

6) Weather preview.

7) Regional police are investigating a serious crash that has closed a part of Cheesefactory Rd. south of Cambridge.

8) Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has departed for Europe this morning to begin a series of high-level diplomatic meetings including a NATO leaders' summit in Brussels.

9) An Alberta woman has been charged for making online threats against Sophie Trudeau online.

10) U.S. President Trump has met with Pope Francis for the first time today in the Vatican.

17) A report was released by Ontario's Financial Accountability Officer today that states while hydro rate payers are expected to save \$24 billion over 29 years, the Fair Hydro Plan will cost \$45 billion over the same time.

23) The Toronto Zoo strike continues as talks broke off over the weekend. More than 400 unionized workers remain off the job.

CJOH (Ottawa)

1) Procter and Gamble announced today that they will close its operations in Brockville within the next few years. Almost 500 workers will lose their jobs with this closure.

2) More taxpayer money will be required to fix the Federal Phoenix Pay system.

3) The Ottawa Senators are going to Game 7 in their playoff series.

4) The Quebec government has determined that a number of Gatineau homeowners will not be allowed to rebuild on the same property after recent flooding.

5) The Ottawa River is under a flood advisory this week with rain the forecast.

6) Experts say that it will be a cooler, wetter summer in the Ottawa region this year.

7) Weather.

8) There are new developments in the Manchester bombing. Three more people have now been arrested and the number of those injured has increased to 119.

9) Prime Minister Justin Trudeau departed for Europe today to attend a NATO meeting in Brussels and a G7 Summit in Sicily.

10) Construction workers are on strike in Quebec.

14) Ottawa Mayor Jim Watson has written to Attorney General Yasir Naqvi asking for a new Access to Abortion Services Act to be enacted in Ontario that would protect staff and patients from harassment at abortion clinics.

17) Ottawa has been designated a risk area for Lyme disease after 20% of the ticks analysed last year tested positive for the bacteria that causes Lyme disease.

1) Police in Manchester say they are investigating a network of people now in connection with the bomb attack on Monday.
