Key Takeaways for the IESO

The **electricity** related areas are mainly on pages 46 and 57 and the can also be found here: [ontariondp.ca/hydro](https://www.ontariondp.ca/hydro); however, there is little that’s new that was not previously disclosed in a policy document released in February 2017.

Return Hydro One to public ownership:

- No rate increase would be required to finance the return of Hydro One to public ownership; financing repaid within 10 years through dividends
- Establish an expert advisory panel to provide the most responsible path towards public ownership of power and power generation
- Re-establishing independent, transparent public oversight of Hydro One
- Require public referendum before future private sale

Immediate steps:

- Move to uniform delivery costs whether urban or rural and exempt First Nations communities from electricity delivery charges
- End Mandatory Time of Use
- Cap private profit margins
- Bringing “real oversight” to electricity prices
- Using tax benefits to help ratepayers
- Make the HST rebate permanent, and negotiate with the federal government to remove the federal portion on hydro bills (5%)

Additional commitments:

- Ending oversupply
- Not renewing and renegotiating or cancelling bad private contracts
- Importing affordable renewable electricity when needed
- Reduce bills by 30% (from pre-Fair Hydro Plan levels) and cancel Fair Hydro Plan
- Double the Ontario Electricity Support Program (OESP) and fund this from general revenues, not rate base
- Renewables such as solar, water, and wind will be at the heart of the electricity system and integrated responsibly as needs grow
- Respect local decision-making and ensure that local communities have a stake in the benefits that come from low-cost, zero-emission renewables

Markets

Previously, the NDP has made unfavourable statements related to markets, targeted at capacity auctions as “failed” in other jurisdictions. The platform released today is silent on that.

Carbon Pricing

The NDP has committed to continue with cap and trade (previously the NDP did not specify a preferred carbon pricing model)

- Support polluters-pay principle
- Will set “clear” greenhouse gas reduction targets
- At least 25% of the revenues from cap-and-trade will:
 - support communities and individuals who today are carrying more than their fair share of the burden — such as northern, rural, and low-income Ontarians — and assist trade-exposed industries
 - support lower-income, rural, and northern households, and trade-exposed industries

Other Platform takeaways

- Introduce \$50 million no-interest and on-bill home retrofit program to help people consume less power at home
- Update the Environmental Bill of Rights [the platform is not specific on this]
- Committed to natural gas expansion to rural Ontario
- Will implement Auditor General suggestions

The Top 5 featured “*changes for the better*” are:

- Cut hydro bills 30% by bringing Hydro One back in public hands
- Provide drug and dental coverage for all Ontarians
- Protect middle class families by having the wealthiest people and most profitable corporations pay their fair share
- Take on student debt by converting loans to grants and creating thousands of student jobs
- End hallway medicine and fix seniors care
