THE LEGISLATION IN ONTARIO

The Law Enforcement Compensation Act, 1967, was given Royal Assent on June 15, 1967, and proclaimed in force on April 1, 1968. Under the Act, as passed in 1967, the Board was restricted to awarding compensation where a person was killed or injured assisting a peace officer.

The Act was amended in 1969, the amendments being given Royal Assent on June 27, 1969, and being made retroactive to April 1, 1968. The amendments broadened the Act so that compensation might be paid, not only where a person is killed or injured assisting a peace officer, but also where the person by himself lawfully engages in enforcement of the law, or where he is simply a victim of crime.

A new Act, The Compensation for Victims of Crime Act, 1971, proclaimed on September 1, 1971, repealed The Law Enforcement Compensation Act, 1968-69, but provided that with respect to claims for compensation arising from an act or omission that occurred during the period in which The Law Enforcement Compensation Act was in force, that is, during the period of April 1, 1968 to August 31, 1971, the said The Law Enforcement Compensation Act, 1967, as amended, with the exception of "Hearings and Procedures" (Section 29(2) of the new Act) would apply.

The intent of the new legislation remains unchanged from that of the earlier Act, namely, to provide compensation to victims of crimes of personal violence, or to those injured or killed in taking part in lawful law enforcement, or to dependants of such person, or to other persons qualified under the Act. The titles of the new Act, "The Compensation for Victims of Crime Act, 1971" and of the new Board, "Criminal Injuries Compensation Board" are more descriptive of the intent of the legislation and of the functions of the Board.

REASONS FOR LEGISLATION

The reasons which prompted the enactment of the legislation to compensate victims of crime have been given as:

- (a) The failure of the state to ensure the safety of its citizens (admittedly, the same reasoning extends to victims of fraud and loss of property due to criminal acts, but the cost would be astronomical),

and

- (b) A sense of responsibility which a humane society feels for victims of crime. We live in an era when society recognizes many new obligations. A somewhat analogous recognition in Ontario and other jurisdictions is the compensation paid by the province or state under an unsatisfied judgment fund for persons injured or killed through the negligence of car drivers. Unless the state

assumes the responsibility, the victim of crime usually will not be compensated. Generally speaking, it is the poor who commit crimes of violence and it is the poor who are the victims of crime. There is growing acceptance throughout the Western and English-speaking world that those who are injured, and the spouses and dependants of those who are killed by crimes of violence, ought to be compensated.

LEGISLATION IN OTHER JURISDICTIONS TO COMPENSATE VICTIMS OF CRIMES OF PERSONAL VIOLENCE

In 1964 New Zealand established the first scheme to provide compensation to victims of crimes of personal violence. Since that time a number of other jurisdictions including the United Kingdom, New South Wales, the States of Hawaii, New York, Massachusetts, Maryland, California, Nevada and New Jersey, have passed similar legislation. In Canada all the provinces, with the exception of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, now have compensation plans in operation. A number of other jurisdictions are actively considering the enactment of such legislation.

At an international conference held in Toronto on the 14th, 15th and 16th of September, 1972, at which the Ontario Board was host and convener, representatives attended from 22 countries, states and provinces. All the Canadian provinces, except Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan, were represented and delegates came from as far away as Australia, Great Britain, Hawaii and California. With respect to the conference we quote from the 1972 report of the Criminal Injuries Compensation Commission of Hawaii, just received:

“In its Fourth Annual Report, the Commission recommended that consideration should be given to increasing our participation in associations and conferences with other State and Federal agencies involved in similar programs to compensate the victims of crime. Unfortunately, the general tightening of the State's financial belt has prevented the funding of such activities. Yet the benefits of such participation with other administrators in similar programs cannot be doubted. It was with this thought in mind that our dedicated Executive Secretary attended at his own expense the Third International Conference on the Compensation of Innocent Victims of Violent Crimes, held at Toronto, Canada, on September 14 to 16, 1972. Most American and Canadian jurisdictions having legislation in this field, as well as leading scholars interested in the subject, were in attendance. The following topics were discussed:

- (a) new developments in the field of victims compensation,
- (b) administrative problems and solutions of existing programs,
- (c) victim behavior as a bar to recovery and (d) the role of the federal government in crime compensation.

Attendance by the Commission's Executive Secretary at the Third International Conference was extremely beneficial to our State program. The participation of a representative from Hawaii was helpful in establishing practical lines of communications and personal relationships with persons who are particularly knowledgeable, interested and expert in the field of compensating criminal victims. A spirit of co-operation prevailed among all the participants, and many useful ideas and comparative approaches to common problems were discussed. As a result, our Executive Secretary was able to get a good insight into the experiences, the problems encountered by other jurisdictions and the different solutions which have been utilized. The wealth of practical knowledge thus gained will be useful in improving and strengthening the Hawaii Criminal Injuries program."

All who attended the Conference have expressed like sentiments and we found the discussions to be of great benefit.

Recently the Government of Canada, through the Minister of Justice, submitted a proposed scheme in the form of an agreement to be entered into between a province and the federal government whereby the Government of Canada would assist the provinces by making financial contribution to the cost of compensation for victims of crime. The basis upon which compensation may be obtained under the federal proposal is practically the same as is set forth in the Ontario Act. An agreement, effective January 1st, 1973, has now been entered into between the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario whereby the Government of Canada will pay to the Government of Ontario, .05 cents per capita of the population of the province, or 90% of the actual amount paid by the province, whichever is the lesser, as a contribution toward the cost of compensation for victims of crime.

The Commissioners on uniformity of legislation in Canada, at a conference held in Charlottetown in 1970, prepared a model form of a statute for consideration by the various provincial and federal governments. The legislation in the various provinces conforms fairly closely to the model Act, but complete uniformity has not yet been achieved.

ADMINISTRATION

The Registrar of the Criminal Injuries Compensation Board is Mr. J.B. Lind and the Deputy Registrar is Mr. C.O. Huggard. They are supported by a staff of seven which includes an Investigator, Mr. J.H. Sheard.

In the statistical information to be found in this report it will be noted that on January 1, 1972, the number of cases outstanding was 380. This number was decreased during the year and as of December

31st, 1972 stood at 344. Since these applications are on file, they are to be regarded as cases pending which will eventually come before the Board for hearing, but they are not to be regarded as a "backlog" since a great majority of these outstanding cases are not yet ready for hearing for various reasons, such as lack of medical or police reports and the inability of applicants to attend through illness, etc.

It is to be noted also that the work of the Board increased greatly during the year, the number of applications being heard in 1972, being 484 as compared with 204 in 1971. Eligible applications received during 1972 were 488, as compared with 438 in 1971.

The Compensation for Victims of Crime Act provides (Section 8(b)) that, on the direction of the Chairman, an application may be heard by one member. It is provided by Section 10 (1) that, where an application is heard by a single member the Decision is subject to review. It is perhaps worthy of note that, in the period covered by this report, a total of 27 cases were heard by a single member. There was no request for review of any of these single member decisions. This result may point the way to achieving some economy in the cost of administration. We observe that in Great Britain approximately 90% of the applications are disposed of and the cases decided by a single member. The number of appeals from these single member decisions is not unduly large.

This leads us to comment on the value of complete investigation by competent personnel before the application is heard. In Britain a substantial part of the administrative staff is made up of investigators who marshal all the relevant facts in a very full and thorough way so that when the matter comes before the member he does not have to expend time or effort in searching for evidence. In fact, all of these single member decisions, in Britain, are made on documentary evidence only (without the applicant, counsel or witnesses being present). This type of procedure can save much time and expense, but it would not be possible to administer the legislation in this way, and achieve just and equitable results without the thorough investigation and compilation of facts which is done beforehand. It is this which we stress.

The Board, since its inception, has had only one investigator on its staff and with the great increase in the number of applications it is impossible for one man to properly, and thoroughly, do the necessary investigation and assembly of relevant evidence which is essential to proper adjudication of compensability and assessment of entitlement to compensation. Hearings before the Board are not adversary situations as in Court. There is no searching cross-examination by counsel and if the members of the Board, who preside at and conduct the hearing, do not have full and factual material before them, they cannot ask the necessary questions to discover the true circumstances of the incident or matter in question

and are, therefore, handicapped in trying to determine a proper award, or perhaps in deciding whether to consider or reject the claim because of the conduct of the applicant.

The Investigator also has the very important function of reviewing, at least once annually, all those cases where the award is paid on a periodical basis. He reports to the Board in each case so that, if circumstances warrant a change, the Board may take appropriate action.

A relatively small amount spent to ensure adequate investigation could save comparatively large sums which are likely to be disbursed where full investigation is lacking.

Of the 461 cases heard by the Board in the fiscal year covered by this report, there have been four applications for review by the Court of the Board's decision. Two of these have been heard and referred back to the Board for rehearing and two are pending review by the Court.

We have proposed to the Attorney General amendments which we believe will clarify certain sections of the Act and some which are new, and all of which we believe will improve our administration and enable us to better serve the public and those citizens who come before us as applicants. We anticipate that these amendments will be introduced in the Legislature during the current session.

So far no regulations have been enacted to define procedural and other matters under the Act. The matter of the need for regulations and their content is under study and discussion.

We draw attention to the fact that Section 25(2) of The Compensation for Victims of Crime Act provides that the Board is subrogated to "all the rights of the person to whom payment is made under this Act to recover damages by civil proceedings in respect of the injury or death." We encourage applicants to institute civil proceedings where there appears to be a fair possibility of recovery of damages from the offender, and we notify the Attorney General of all cases where we believe recovery can be made from the offender. The matter is then followed up by the law officers of the Crown and recovery has been obtained in a number of cases. The fact, however, remains that the great majority of offenders are judgment proof. Many are incarcerated for long periods of time and some can not be found. It is the policy of the Board to use every effort to have the offender pay for the injury he has caused.

We cannot conclude this report without expressing our appreciation and gratitude to the members of the Bar, the Police, Legal Aid, Crown Attorneys, Doctors, Dentists, the staffs of hospitals and members of the Press for the excellent assistance and co-operation which the Board has received.

Our own staff is capable, courteous and industrious, and the dedicated and efficient manner in which they have carried out their duties, has made it possible for the Board to accomplish the work described in this report.

SUMMARY OF DECISIONS
January 1, 1972 to March 31, 1973

Application Number 100-35

The victim died of asphyxiation from a fire in a London hotel room as a result of arson. Details of the award are contained in the Second Report of the Board. A second Hearing was requested and the applicant, the wife of the victim, was unable to establish any pecuniary loss and the original award was ordered to stand.

Supplementary Award: \$154.00 covering expenses incidental to the Second Hearing.

Application Number 100-48

The victim, age 20, when en route to his Toronto home from his place of employment, was attacked and assaulted by a group of youths. He sustained facial bruises and a chipped tooth. One offender was identified, convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$50.00 or thirty days.

Award: \$167.75

Application Number 100-84

The applicant was the mother of a 15 year old girl who was found in the river under a bridge near Tillsonburg. As a result of the incident the mother suffered a mental breakdown and required psychiatric treatment.

Award: \$2,162.00

Application Number 100-97

The victim, age 37, an unemployed plumber, when at a friend's home interceded in an argument between the man and his wife, and as a result, became embroiled. He sustained stab wounds to the face and abdomen. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm, and was sentenced to nine months imprisonment.

Award: \$807.00

Application Number 100-150

The victim, age 15, was struck by a bullet fired from the gun of a person engaged in target practice. The bullet struck the victim in the face, lodged in the brain and caused loss of sight in both eyes, partial paralysis to the right arm and hand and brain damage. The offender was charged with criminal negligence causing bodily harm and was given a two year suspended sentence.

Award: \$125.00 per month retroactive to date of occurrence, April 29, 1969, with \$100.00 per month to be held in trust by the Accountant of the Supreme Court and \$25.00 per month to the victim's father for incidental expenses.

Application Number 100-164

The victim, a 44 year old female, after accepting an invitation of a ride from a party she had attended, to her west end Toronto home, was assaulted with a tire iron. She sustained lacerations to the head and two fractured fingers on the right hand. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to fifteen months definite and six months indefinite.

Award: \$350.00

Application Number 100-176

The victim, age 43, was shot and seriously wounded by his wife in their Adjala Township home, sustaining gunshot wounds to his abdomen and right

leg. The offender after a period of psychiatric treatment was found guilty on a charge of wounding and was sentenced to two years less one day in Reformatory. The applicant received an award for loss of earnings and out of pocket expenses.

Award: \$4,200.90

Application Number 100-190

The victim, age 46, an O.P.P. Corporal, was fatally shot while assisting in the arrest of a deranged person in the Minden area. The offender was found not guilty by reason of insanity and was confined to the Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre.

Award: \$350.00 and to continue at \$366.00 per year to the applicant, the wife of the victim.

Application Number 100-192

The victim, age 67, was assaulted near his Kitchener home by two young men in a robbery attempt. He sustained a fractured right shoulder and facial lacerations. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$489.75

Application Number 100-214

The victim, age 31, was shot and killed at his farmhouse in Minto Township. The offender was charged with non-capital murder, and was found not guilty by reason of insanity and was committed to Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre.

Award: \$237.00 per month retroactive to July 1, 1970

Application Number 100-229

The victim, a 51 year old T.T.C. operator, when arousing an intoxicated man in one of the subway cars was assaulted. He sustained lacerations to the mouth and injury to his right hand. The offender was found guilty of common assault and was fined \$100.00 or ten days in jail.

Award: \$260.77

Application Number 100-230

The victim, age 24, a store investigator for the T. Eaton Company, when following two shoplifters on a street near the store, was jumped by four other assailants. He sustained lacerations to the face, a groin injury and body bruises. Three offenders were subsequently arrested, one was sentenced to a fine of \$100.00 or ten days, and two years probation, another to fifteen days imprisonment and the third to sixty days imprisonment.

Award: \$560.00

Application Number 100-232

The victim, age 49, when coming to the aid of a friend who was being assaulted in a Toronto rooming house, sustained two knife lacerations to his throat. The offender was convicted on a reduced charge of assault causing bodily harm and sentenced to nine months definite and six months indefinite.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 100-248

The victim, age 57, was assaulted in a parking lot at the rear of a Toronto hotel. He sustained six fractured ribs. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$351.50

Application Number 100-259

The victim, age 34, a floorwalker in a St. Catharines club, after ordering an

individual to leave the premises because he had been consuming liquor from a bottle was assaulted and beaten. He sustained a concussion and facial abrasions. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault and was fined \$25.00.

Award: \$809.36

Application Number 100-264

The victim sustained severe head injuries resulting in partial paralysis and permanent brain damage. He is now in a Toronto nursing home. The applicant, husband of the victim's niece, has been appointed Committee of his estate, and provides for his care and maintenance. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$10,835.00 covering arrears and continuing payments of \$100.00 per month to the applicant, Committee of the Estate of the victim.

Application Number 100-267

The victim was assaulted and beaten in a Mount Forest beverage room and sustained the loss of his left eye. Details of the award are contained in our Third report.

Supplementary Award: \$47.50 covering payment of medical account not foreseen at the time of the original hearing.

Application Number 100-281

The victim, age 60, after a day's hunting with two companions in McClure Township, was sitting in the back seat of their car pending departure, when he sustained a gunshot wound in the middle of his back, the shot coming from the weapon in the hands of one of the other hunters and first passing through the trunk of the car. He sustained injuries to the extent that he has a permanent disability. The offender was convicted on a charge of Careless Hunting and fined \$75.00 and costs of \$7.50.

Award: \$850.00 covering arrears and to continue at \$250.00 per month.

Application Number 100-286

The victim, age 26, was severely beaten in the washroom of a Kitchener hotel beverage room and was then thrown out the rear door into an alleyway. He sustained severe brain injury from which he will never recover and he requires constant care. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to fifteen months imprisonment.

Award: \$350.00 per month retroactive to January 1, 1970

Application Number 100-291

The victim, a 30 year old Sault Ste. Marie truck driver, was wounded by his father-in-law, who lived with the victim and his wife. He sustained a gunshot wound to the lower left thigh resulting in partial permanent disability. The offender was found guilty on a charge of wounding and was sentenced to ninety days in jail. Two Interim Awards were made. (See the Board's Annual Reports for 1970 & 1971).

Final Award: \$1,722.80

Application Number 100-322

The victim, age 45, after leaving the beverage room of a Toronto hotel in the company of four or five men, was assaulted and robbed. He sustained a fractured skull and body abrasions. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$740.00

Application Number 100-324

The victim, age 38, was viciously assaulted by a group of young persons

while walking in downtown Toronto with his family. The attack was so brutal as to produce a severe neurological injury. One offender was charged with and convicted of assault causing bodily harm and sentenced to two years less one day, plus two years indefinite.

Interim Award: \$5,871.82

Application Number 100-327

The victim, age 76, was beaten and robbed in his Wiarthon home by two men who forced entry. He sustained stomach, wrist and chest injuries. Two offenders were convicted of robbery with violence, one being sentenced to seven years in penitentiary and the other sentenced to four years.

Award: \$904.40

Application Number 100-328

The victim, a 78 year old female, was beaten and robbed in her Wiarthon home by two intruders who forced entry. She sustained lacerations to her knees, sprained thumb and multiple body bruises. The offenders were convicted of robbery with violence, one being sentenced to seven years imprisonment and the other to four years. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-327).

Award: \$500.00

Application Number 100-332

The victim, age 43, a member of the Hamilton Police Force, in company with three other members of the force, was attacked by a group of men who attempted to disarm them. In the ensuing struggle in which a police officer was killed, the victim was severely beaten sustaining a fractured right elbow, fractured nose and jaw and numerous lacerations and bruises. Five offenders were arrested and charged with manslaughter, two being sentenced to fourteen years in penitentiary, one to eight years, one to seven years and the fifth to six months in a reformatory.

Award: \$1,825.00

Application Number 100-337

The victim, age 59, a superintendent of a Toronto apartment building was assaulted and badly beaten when he apparently surprised burglars in the building. He sustained skull fractures, a broken hip, two broken legs and as a result is partially disabled. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$4,970.42

Application Number 100-338

The victim, age 15, after attending a baseball game at a Toronto park was assaulted for allegedly remarking on the umpire's calls. He sustained a fractured jaw. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 100-339

The victim, age 67, was assaulted and beaten in his Woodstock hotel room. He sustained bruises and contusions to the face and body. Two offenders were charged with assault causing bodily harm and each sentenced to one year in jail.

Award: \$136.93

Application Number 100-344

The applicant, a C.P.R. carman, was shot in the neck, left leg and right ear lobe while waiting at a Windsor bus stop. Another pedestrian was fatally shot at the same time. The offender remains unknown. This applicant had been

the offender in an unrelated incident some eleven months prior. As compensation of \$816.35 had been awarded, the Board exercised its right of subrogation under Section 7(2) of The Law Enforcement Compensation Act and reduced this award by a like amount.

Award: \$1,564.14

Application Number 100-349

The victim, age 23, after having engaged in a fight with another party in a Toronto hotel, was followed to a local restaurant by the same party. Subsequently another fight occurred and after an exchange of punches, the offender fired two shots, one striking the victim in the abdomen. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to two years less one day imprisonment, followed by one year probation.

Award: \$3,686.00

Application Number 100-350

The victim, age 35, a Scarborough hotel manager, was assaulted while attempting to evict a person who had forced entry by breaking a door. He sustained a fractured jaw, multiple facial bruises and damage to his teeth. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$50.00 or ten days.

Award: \$2,034.33

Application Number 100-353

The victim, age 32, a superintendent of a London apartment building, was assaulted without provocation and beaten by a young offender. He sustained lacerations and contusions to his head and face. A bench warrant is outstanding for the arrest of the offender who is believed to have left the country.

Award: \$379.26

Application Number 100-354

The victim, the wife of a London apartment building superintendent, sustained facial and body bruises and contusions, when coming to the aid of her husband who was being assaulted. A Bench Warrant is outstanding for the arrest of the offender who is believed to have left the country. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-353).

Award: \$75.00

Application Number 100-355

The victim, age 25, was forced at gunpoint to drive two assailants to various locations in the Niagara area and finally to an isolated area where he was assaulted and robbed. The victim sustained lacerations to the face and head, injury to the left eye and body bruises. The offenders were arrested, one being sentenced to four years imprisonment on a robbery charge, the other sentenced to six months on a charge of assault causing bodily harm.

Award: \$1,008.94

Application Number 100-359

The victim, an unemployed carpenter, was in jail for failure to pay a fine when he was beaten by three other prisoners for no apparent reason. He sustained a fractured nose and cheekbone plus minor bruises. As there were no independent witnesses to the assault, no charges were laid.

Award: \$534.00

Application Number 100-360

The victim, a 32 year old Toronto taxi driver, was assaulted by a group of

persons whom he picked up as fares in the early morning hours. He sustained bruises to the face and head. One offender was charged but as the victim did not attend to give evidence, the charge was withdrawn.

Award: \$163.00

Application Number 100-370

The victim, a 49 year old female, was assaulted in the laundry room of her Toronto apartment building. She sustained injuries to her face, eyes, ears, neck, head and multiple body bruises. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$876.50

Application Number 100-380

The victim, age 27, was assaulted and shot while a patron in a Port Hope Hotel. He sustained two gunshot wounds in the right leg. The two offenders were convicted of wounding and each was sentenced to two years imprisonment.

Award: \$606.04

Application Number 100-381

The victim, age 41, when in his Cornwall house, heard a noise outside and on looking out, noticed a person kicking his dog. Upon proceeding outside into the street, an altercation ensued between the victim and the intruder and his wife. The victim sustained injuries causing paralysis of the left arm and head injuries. Both of the offenders were found guilty of assault and were sentenced to thirty days suspended sentence.

Award: \$1,398.90

Application Number 100-383

The victim, age 49, while walking through a laneway connecting two Sudbury streets, was assaulted and stabbed without provocation. He sustained stab wounds to the left forearm, lower left chest and lower abdomen and as a result is disabled to the extent that he cannot return to his former employment. The offender was convicted on a charge of wounding and was sentenced to eighteen months in reformatory.

Award: \$6,960.00

Application Number 100-385

The victim, age 62, when about to enter the rear entrance of his Toronto home, was accosted from behind and in trying to defend himself, sustained knife lacerations to both hands. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$239.47

Application Number 100-386

The victim, age 18, after being given a lift in a car occupied by five youths, was robbed, viciously assaulted and was left in a state of semi-consciousness. He sustained a fractured cheekbone and facial lacerations and bruises as well as some permanent damage to his left eye. The five offenders were convicted of robbery with violence, one being sentenced to five years in penitentiary, three others being sentenced to four years and the fifth to two years in reformatory.

Award: \$2,385.00

Application Number 100-389

The victim, age 31, was drinking in a Toronto tavern when an argument commenced between himself and another person at a nearby table. The victim, after later leaving the hotel, was attacked by several persons including the one with whom he had argued previously. He sustained several knife

lacerations to the left side of his head and face, and on the palm of his right hand, requiring in all, 200 stitches to close the wounds. One offender was convicted of wounding and possession of a dangerous weapon, and was sentenced to nine months imprisonment.

Award: \$1,143.50

Application Number 100-393

The victim, age 27, was struck with the butt of a revolver following an argument in a Toronto Housing Unit parking lot. He sustained lacerations to the chin and injury to the left eye. The offender was placed on a one year suspended sentence.

Award: \$105.00

Application Number 100-394

The victim, age 48, was struck with the butt of a revolver when attempting to disarm an offender who had just struck his companion. He sustained lacerations to his hand. The offender was placed on a one year suspended sentence. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-393).

Award: \$85.00

Application Number 100-395

The victim, age 22, was assaulted outside a Cornwall café by five youths, and sustained fractures of both jaws. The offenders were unidentified and no arrests were made.

Award: \$527.40

Application Number 100-500

The victim, age 56, when coming to the assistance of an elderly gentleman who was being assaulted, was himself subsequently assaulted by the same offender. He sustained multiple facial fractures requiring surgery and with some residual deformity to his face. The offender was found guilty on a charge of assault causing bodily harm, was fined \$100.00 and placed on probation for one year.

Award: \$2,061.40

Application Number 100-401

The victim, age 18, while having words with an individual who had thrown an object through his car window, was assaulted by another party. He sustained lacerations to the face and damage to one tooth. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$75.00.

Award: \$345.00

Application Number 100-414

The victim, age 5, sustained a superficial head wound from a .22 calibre slug fired into his bedroom in his Windsor home in the early morning hours. The offender was never apprehended.

Award: \$145.00 to the applicant, mother of the victim

Application Number 100-416

The victim, a 71 year old female, was pushed down the steps of a Toronto subway station by two unknown youths. She sustained a fractured left wrist and head lacerations. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$630.60

Application Number 100-418

The victim, age 39, entered a Toronto hotel and was joined at his table by a person he did not know. When the offender suggested returning to a private home, the victim became fearful, called a cab and proceeded outside. He was

then viciously assaulted and robbed. The offender was found guilty of robbery with violence and was sentenced to one year in prison in addition to six months indefinite.

Award: \$606.67

Application Number 100-419

The victim, age 23, after leaving an Acton hotel, was assaulted by two persons who followed him from the premises. He sustained a fractured wrist and forearm and multiple body abrasions. Both offenders were arrested and convicted of robbery, one being sentenced to two years less one day, the second being sentenced to fifteen months definite and nine months indefinite.

Award: \$1,242.52

Application Number 100-428

The victim, age 23, after leaving a Sarnia restaurant in the early morning hours, was assaulted by a group of juveniles and an adult. He sustained lacerations to the mouth necessitating the removal of four teeth. The adult offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and given a two year suspended sentence. One juvenile was sent to training school and charges against the others were dismissed due to lack of evidence.

Award: \$968.00

Application Number 100-431

The victim, age 58, a Sudbury confectionary store operator, was pistol whipped by a masked individual during a robbery of the premises. He sustained a broken thumb and multiple bruises and lacerations. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$349.44

Application Number 100-432

The victim, the 59 year old wife of a Sudbury confectionary store operator, sustained a pellet gun wound to the face during a holdup of the premises by a masked man. The offender was not apprehended. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-431).

Award: \$505.95

Application Number 100-435

The victim, age 26, was assaulted and robbed by four assailants who forced entry into his Toronto apartment. He sustained lacerations to the head, legs and arms, and body bruises. Three offenders were convicted, two being sentenced to three months jail and twelve months probation, and the other to two years less a day.

Award: \$671.54

Application Number 100-438

The victim, a 68 year old female, while walking on a Port Credit street accompanied by a female friend, was assaulted from behind in a purse snatch. On being knocked to the ground she sustained multiple fractures of the right arm and abrasions to the left knee. The offender was never apprehended.

Award: \$871.25

Application Number 100-440

A 36 year old transport driver was the victim of an unprovoked assault in his London apartment. He sustained bruises and lacerations to the hands, face and body, and surgery was required to his right knee. The offender was found guilty on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and sentenced to two months in jail.

Award: \$1,580.00

Application Number 100-441

The victim, age 33, after leaving a Hamilton hotel accompanied by his wife and friends, attempted to intercede in an argument between two persons where one of them had drawn a knife. He sustained superficial wounds to the back and stomach. The offender was convicted of assault and sentenced to nine months definite and six months indefinite.

Award: \$164.00

Application Number 100-442

The victim, age 49, was viciously assaulted and beaten in his Toronto rooming house. He sustained injuries so severe that he remains in a coma in hospital. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to two years in penitentiary. The Board found that the victim was compensable under the Act, however, the applicant, a sister of the victim has incurred no expenses on his behalf to date. If at some future date expenses are incurred which are recoverable from the Board, the applicant can re-apply.

Award; \$60.00 to solicitor covering costs of presentation of case.

Application Number 100-443

The victim, a 40 year old female, after accepting a ride from the Niagara area to her St. Catharines home from an acquaintance, was assaulted en route. She sustained cuts and abrasions to the face and broken dentures. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and fined \$75.00.

Award: \$508.00

Application Number 100-445

The victim, age 88, while en route to his Toronto home in the early evening, was assaulted and robbed by two male assailants who were never apprehended. He sustained an abrasion to the eye and multiple body bruises.

Award: \$155.00

Application Number 100-446

The victim, a 78 year old female, while en route to her Toronto home from a bingo club, was assaulted from behind, knocked down and her purse was stolen. She sustained bruises and lacerations to her arms and scalp. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$133.00

Application Number 100-448

The victim, age 36, an accounting clerk with a Windsor firm, while attending at a local bank, sustained a gunshot wound to the pelvic region, during an armed hold-up of the bank. A suspect believed to be the gunman, has been arrested in the U.S.A. and in due course is scheduled to be returned to Canada to face a number of charges.

Award: \$785.00

Application Number 100-450

The victim, age 33, while sitting on a bench in a Toronto park, was attacked and beaten by three assailants. He sustained seven stab wounds to various parts of the body necessitating fifteen days hospitalization. The offenders were arrested, one being sentenced to five years imprisonment on a charge of wounding, one sentenced to six months on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and the third later sentenced in Nova Scotia to four years penitentiary.

Award: \$1,408.40

Application Number 100-455

The victim, a 36 year old Toronto taxi driver, after driving three persons to

their destination, was assaulted by one of them. He sustained a fractured left ankle which required a cast for approximately fifteen weeks. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$1,825.00

Application Number 100-460

The victim, age 44, a commercial art student was, for no apparent reason, assaulted by four persons in a hotel where he had been commissioned to draw sketches. He sustained severe lacerations to the face and head necessitating the removal of his left eye and cosmetic repair. One offender was found guilty of wounding and sentenced to three years, another was found guilty of assault and sentenced to six months, and the charges against the two others were dismissed.

Award: \$9,102.45

Application Number 100-464

The victim, age 44, while standing in the cloak room of a Toronto hotel, was struck on the forehead by a crutch and fell to the ground, as a fight broke out between two other persons. He sustained a 3 cm. laceration to the forehead. The offenders were unknown.

Award: \$225.00

Application Number 100-467

The victim, age 44, an employee of a Georgetown paper company was attacked and beaten into insensibility. He sustained permanent skull and brain damage rendering him mentally incompetent. The offender was found not guilty by reason of insanity and was committed to Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre.

Award: \$4,550.00 covering arrears, to claimant, Committee of the victim's estate, and to continue at \$200.00 per month.

Application Number 100-468

The victim, a 64 year old female employee of the Toronto Post Office, was assaulted when returning home from her employment. She sustained a fracture of the left shoulder and abrasions to the left knee. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$1,376.00

Application Number 100-472

The victim, a 38 year old female, was assaulted and beaten in her Toronto rooming house. She sustained a fractured nose and facial lacerations. Two offenders were arrested, one being sentenced to nine months definite and three months indefinite, and the other to twelve months.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 100-473

The victim, age 27, was assaulted outside a Toronto club sustaining facial lacerations and the partial loss of one of his fingers. The offender was found guilty of assault and was fined \$500.00 and eighteen months probation.

Award: \$934.55

Application Number 100-475

The victim, age 42, noticing a fight in progress on a Toronto street, remarked to the combatants that they should stop fighting. At this time he was assaulted by the brother of one of the participants. He sustained multiple fractures of the left orbit requiring surgery. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to fifteen days in jail.

Award: \$816.50

Application Number 100-477

The victim, a 24 year old female, was stabbed to death in her Agincourt apartment. The offender was charged with non-capital murder, and found not guilty by reason of insanity and confined to the Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre.

Award: \$1,383.83 to applicants, mother and father of the victim

Application Number 100-478

The victim, age 25, a truck driver for a Sudbury company was found floating in Ramsay Lake having been beaten to death. One offender was convicted of manslaughter and was sentenced to seven years imprisonment and another to six months on a charge of offering an indignity to a dead body.

Award: \$6,250.00 covering arrears and continuing payment of \$250.00 per month to the applicant, the wife of the victim.

Application Number 100-479 and 100-480

The victims, 12 and 13 year old sisters, were injured in a train wreck on the outskirts of Toronto which was attributed to sabotage. One girl sustained head lacerations and body bruises, the other sustained lacerations to the left knee. The offenders have never been apprehended. One Decision was rendered in relation to both applications.

Award; \$356.00 to the applicant, the father of the victims

Application Number 100-481

The victim, age 75, while in his room at a Toronto rooming house, was assaulted by another roomer. He sustained facial lacerations and bruises. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was given a suspended sentence and one year probation.

Award: \$210.00

Application Number 100-485

The victim, age 32, a night shift-worker in a Windsor automotive plant, while en route home from work was attacked and viciously assaulted by five youths. He sustained a fractured cheekbone, head lacerations and facial contusions. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$1,066.37

Application Number 100-486

The victim, age 15, when about to enter his car in the parking lot of a North Bay restaurant, was attacked by a group of youths. He sustained a fractured right leg and body bruises. Two of the offenders were arrested. One was given a suspended sentence and twelve months probation, the other died in a vehicle accident before coming to trial.

Award: \$1,122.50 of which \$600.00 was paid to the Accountant, Supreme Court of Ontario, in trust.

Application Number 100-488

The applicant, age 52, was assaulted in a Toronto hotel when he asked another patron to stop swearing. He then returned to his table and, without warning, was struck with a chair causing a fractured shoulder. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$617.18

Application Number 100-490

The victim, age 10, resides in Pittsburgh, Pa. While previously living in Thunder Bay, he was struck in the eye by a B.B. pellet causing the loss of an eye. The offenders were found not guilty under the Criminal Code of Canada

as the pellet had ricocheted while the boys were target shooting. The Board found that the injury was sustained as the result of an unfortunate accident. Award: \$115.50 covering travel expenses only.

Application Number 100-491

The victim, age 70, while waiting for a bus at a Sudbury street intersection, was hit over the head, assaulted and robbed. He sustained a fractured jaw and head lacerations. The offender was never apprehended.

Award: \$2,340.00

Application Number 100-492

The victim, age 61, was assaulted outside a Toronto tavern. He sustained facial bruises and the loss of six teeth. The offender was found guilty of assault and was fined \$25.00 or two days in jail.

Award: \$340.00

Application Number 100-493

The victim, age 42, after leaving a Toronto restaurant around midnight, was attacked by three assailants. He suffered a fractured rib, fractured nose and loss of two teeth. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$625.00

Application Number 100-495

The victim, age 39, was assaulted in his home while attempting to prevent a tenant from leaving without paying the rent. He sustained injuries to his side, back and left arm and contusions to other parts of his body. The offender was convicted of assault and sentenced to a fine of \$25.00 or ten days in jail.

Award: \$1,034.18

Application Number 100-496

The victim, an off duty O.P.P. corporal, was shot and injured during a hunting accident. As a result, he will remain permanently partially disabled because of paraparesis and sensory change. He is unable to return to his former occupation. The offender was convicted of careless hunting and hunting without a licence and was fined \$523.00.

Award: \$8,500.00 covering arrears and to continue at \$500.00 per month.

Application Number 100-497

The victim, a 24 year old female, an employee of a Toronto bank, while leaving for lunch was knocked to the floor of the lobby and then jumped on in an unprovoked assault. She sustained injuries to her right knee, left elbow and neck. The offender was arrested and absconded bail. A Bench Warrant for his arrest is outstanding.

Award: \$833.54

Application Number 100-499

The victim, age 44, after leaving a Toronto hotel accompanied by his wife and en route to their car in the parking lot, discovered a youth sitting in it. The victim, in attempting to hold the offender, became engaged in a scuffle, both falling over a six foot high wall to a lower level. The victim sustained a fractured right elbow and body contusions. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$1,147.50

Application Number 100-503

The victim, age 25, the manager of a Toronto golf course, was assaulted by one of the patrons. He sustained bruises and lacerations to his face, damaged

teeth and a whiplash type of injury to his neck. The offender was convicted of assault and fined \$100.00 or ten days.

Award: \$1,047.64

Application Number 100-504

The victim, a 64 year old licence issuer for the Ontario Ministry of Transport and Communications, was beaten and robbed while taking his day's receipts to the bank. The attack was so sudden and violent that he could not identify the two assailants. The victim sustained serious head wounds and still experiences severe headaches.

Application Number 100-505

The victim, age 33, while walking along a Toronto street, was suddenly jumped by four men. He was dragged into a laneway and beaten with an iron bar, and kicked into a state of semi-consciousness. The crime was reported to the police but the assailants were never apprehended.

Application Number 100-509

The victim, a 76 year old widow, was assaulted and knocked to the pavement near the entrance to her Toronto apartment. She sustained facial bruises, a twisted knee cartilage and bruises. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$350.00

Application Number 100-511

The victim, a 51 year old man, was injured while an innocent bystander during a fight on a Toronto streetcar. He sustained a sprained neck and minor bruises. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$131.60

Application Number 100-513

The victim, a 31 year old Fort Francis High School teacher, after a motor vehicle accident, engaged in a discussion with the other driver. As a result the victim was struck in the face, and his jaw was fractured in two places. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$100.00 or twenty days in jail.

The victim, age 54, alleges that he was beaten by three strangers on a Toronto street sustaining injuries around the left eye and forehead. Although the police could not supply any record of this assault, the victim maintains that it was reported.

The victim, a 63 year old Toronto post office employee, was assaulted by

two persons as he neared his home while returning from work in the early morning hours. The victim sustained multiple contusions and lacerations to his head. The offenders were not apprehended.

The victim, accompanied by a male friend, was en route from the Shannonville area to Highway 401 in his motor vehicle. Seeing someone standing on the road and waving his arm, the victim stopped to offer assistance at which time he was viciously assaulted by a group of young men from the Deseronto Indian Reserve. He sustained severe head and face lacerations requiring 48 stitches and the loss of three teeth. Four offenders were found guilty of mischief to private property, two were found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and all were fined \$200.00 and costs or two months.

The victim, age 57, was walking along a Hamilton street when he noticed a person lying in a doorway. As he tried to help this person, he was struck in the face sustaining a fractured nose. The offender was not apprehended.

The victim, a 34 year old male civilian employee, was on duty in the Ottawa Communications Centre of the Armed Forces when an explosive was detonated in a window well of the building. A female employee in an adjoining room was killed. The applicant entered the room, tripped over the body, pulled it from under a table and then fainted. The perpetrators of this bombing incident have not been identified or apprehended.

The victim, a 59 year old female, was assaulted during a robbery attempt on a Windsor street. She sustained a dislocated left shoulder. The offender was unknown.

The victim, age 28, when leaving a London hotel accompanied by his wife, was assaulted and beaten. He sustained a groin injury necessitating an operation. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

The victim, age 21, unemployed at the time of the occurrence, while at the campus centre of a Waterloo university, was assaulted by a student. He sustained facial lacerations and loss of three teeth. The offender was charged with assault causing bodily harm and fined \$25.00

The victim, a 24 year old female, while seated in a Toronto beverage room, was struck by a glass or an ashtray, thrown by a person unknown to the victim. The victim, age 78, was accosted on a St. Catharines street and when he refused a demand for money, was assaulted. He sustained a broken left arm. The offender was unknown.

The victim, age 19, while attending a dance at an Aurora tavern, accompanied by a male friend, was assaulted by two persons. He sustained lacerations to the left eye and facial bruises. One offender was arrested, found guilty of assault causing bodily harm, and fined \$200.00 and costs.

Application Number 100-544

The victim, age 67, a retired tailor, was assaulted in a robbery attempt on a Toronto street. He sustained lacerations to the face and body. The offender was on probation at the time and was returned to jail to finish his sentence.

The victim, a 39 year old bowling alley manager, struggled with and overpowered a would-be robber. During the fight he sustained a fractured finger and multiple bruises. The offender was convicted of attempted robbery and was sentenced to two years less a day in jail.

The victim, a 40 year old female proprietress of a Toronto jewellery store, was assaulted and robbed at her business establishment. She sustained lacerations to her head and face and a broken finger. The victim, a 76 year old female, was injured when knocked to the pavement in an attempted purse snatch on a Toronto street. She sustained bruises to the face and damage to her teeth. The offender was unknown.

Application Number 100-588

The victim, age 40, was travelling at night in a boat on Rice Lake, driven by an acquaintance, when it struck land. He sustained a fractured skull which resulted in his death two days later. The offender was found guilty on a charge of dangerous operation of a vessel and fined \$125.00

Award: \$379.60 and continuing payments of \$165.00 per month to the applicant, wife of the victim

The victim, age 39, after refereeing a soccer game in St. Catharines, was assaulted from behind by a disgruntled fan. He sustained a concussion and two fractured ribs. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$200.00 or 15 days in jail.

The victim, a 44 year old spray painter, became involved in an argument with his common-law wife who then stabbed him in the forehead resulting in serious injury. The victim, age 24, while riding his bicycle on a Toronto street swerved to avoid a car turning in front of him and in so doing impeded the progress of another vehicle. The driver of this vehicle then assaulted the victim knocking

The victim, age 21, sustained a gunshot wound to the abdomen, necessitating a long period of hospitalization. This was following an argument with an acquaintance. At the time he was in his own apartment in Oshawa. The offender was convicted on a charge of wounding and was sentenced to six years imprisonment.

Award: \$2,871.98

Application Number 100-648

The victim, age 32, was shot to death when he alighted from his car on Highway 44 near Carp. The three offenders were convicted of Non-Capital Murder and each was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Award: \$972.00 covering arrears and continuing payments of \$162.00 per month, to the applicant, the wife of the victim

Application Number 100-649

The victim, age 45, was in bed in his Toronto rooming house when a person whom he knew entered and fired several shots. He sustained gunshot wounds to the left hip and thigh. The offender was sentenced on a reduced charge of assault causing bodily harm, to seven months imprisonment.

Award: \$846.35

Application Number 100-650

The victim, age 48, a Toronto taxi driver, when visiting a friend's wife, was stabbed by the estranged husband (who was separated from his wife at the time). He sustained a stab to the chest and left thumb. The offender was convicted of wounding and was sentenced to four years imprisonment.

Award: \$1,056.00

Application Number 100-651

The victim, a 57 year old female, was awakened by an intruder who had gained entrance to her Port Hope home. On being discovered the intruder attacked her and she sustained a knife slash to the fingers of her right hand. The offender was found guilty of breaking and entering and assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to three years imprisonment.

Award: \$342.30

Application Number 100-652

The victim, age 64, was assaulted outside his Toronto home after an argument ensued over a mutual driveway. He sustained a fractured rib and contusions. A Summons was issued against the offender and has never been served as his present whereabouts are unknown.

Award: \$137.00

Application Number 100-653

The victim, age 61, while trying to stop the theft of his pick-up truck, sustained injuries as a result of being beaten over the head and falling from the

back of the truck. The juvenile offenders were apprehended, convicted of theft of an automobile and were placed on probation.

Award: \$1,095.00

Application Number 100-654

The victim, age 50, was assaulted and pistol whipped in his Windsor home during an attempted robbery. He sustained severe lacerations to his face, head and hand, multiple body bruises, and abrasions. Two offenders were charged with attempted robbery, one being convicted and sentenced to five years imprisonment, the other was shot and killed before coming to trial.

Interim Award: \$2,887.44 Final Award pending receipt of further submission.

Application Number 100-655

The victim, a 62 year old female, living with her daughter in a Toronto apartment, was violently thrown down eight steps from the landing to her second floor apartment. She sustained a fracture to the right knee requiring a bone graft, and was disabled for some four months. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to twenty-one months in reformatory.

Award: \$3,694.85

Application Number 100-660

The victim, age 25, was assaulted while in a Welland hotel beverage lounge. At the time he was accompanied by his fiancé and another couple. He sustained a displaced nasal fracture. The offender was found guilty on a charge of assault and fined \$150.00

Award: \$832.00

Application Number 100-662

The victim, age 19, an employee of a Toronto Mac's Milk Store, was assaulted by two persons who entered the store for the purpose of robbery. He sustained severe scalp lacerations. The two offenders were convicted of robbery, one being sentenced to five years imprisonment, the other to four years.

Award: \$333.00

Application Number 100-663

The victim, a 47 year old female employee of an Ottawa hospital, was assaulted during a purse snatch, being struck several blows and knocked to the pavement. She sustained lacerations to her head and nose. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$280.00

Application Number 100-664

The victim, age 27, was assaulted by an acquaintance after leaving a Sudbury Hotel beverage room. He sustained a serious wound to the left side of his face requiring 50 stitches to close. The offender was found guilty on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to two months in jail.

Award: \$1,078.04

Application Number 100-665

The victim, a 16 year old female, was assaulted in a Toronto park by another young girl. She sustained a fractured jaw and was hospitalized for four days. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was released in the custody of her mother.

Award: \$400.00 to be paid to the Accountant of the Supreme Court of Ontario in trust

Application Number 100-666

The offender came to visit the victim's babysitter and during the evening murdered the 16 year old babysitter and assaulted the 10 year old victim, inflicting severe lacerations to the back of her head. The 21 year old offender was convicted on a reduced charge of manslaughter and was sentenced to eight years in penitentiary.

Award: \$228.40

Application Number 100-667

The victim, a 71 year old female, while picking worms in a Toronto churchyard, was attacked by an unknown assailant. She sustained lacerations to her head and face. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$115.00

Application Number 100-668

The victim, age 22, was assaulted in an Ottawa apartment by an uninvited guest, sustaining facial bruises and loss of two of his teeth. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$150.00 or ten days.

Award: \$787.00

Application Number 100-669

The victim, age 18, while a patient in the Infirmary at Guelph Reformatory, was struck on the right side of his face with a crutch. He sustained a fracture of the cheekbone requiring an operation and insertion of a plastic plate. The offender remains unidentified.

Award: \$1,037.00

Application Number 100-672

The victim, age 30, an employee of a Toronto printing company was assaulted and stabbed by unknown members of a motorcycle gang while a patron in a local club. He sustained stab wounds to his left shoulder and back. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$736.03

Application Number 100-673

The victim, a 49 year old cab driver, picked up two young men in Toronto who assaulted and robbed him. He sustained severe lacerations and bruises as a result of this assault. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$754.00

Application Number 100-675

The victim, a 31 year old service station employee, had been drinking with his employer when he was assaulted. The employer inflicted three stab wounds to the victim's chest. The employer was charged with assault. He was convicted and sentenced to two years suspended sentence and probation.

Award: \$2,547.03

Application Number 100-677

The victim, a 64 year old widow, was viciously attacked by an unknown person who entered her West Hill home through an open window. She sustained a broken left arm and fractured fingers on the left hand, as well as head lacerations. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$3,127.66

Application Number 100-678

The victim, a Metro Toronto police constable, when attempting to arrest an individual, was attacked by another person. He sustained razor lacerations to the face and neck requiring twenty-eight stitches. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to seven years and nine months imprisonment.

Application Number 100-679

The victim, age 19, was standing in a Toronto shopping plaza when he and two companions were shot. He sustained wounds in the right chest and buttock. The offender was convicted of attempted murder and was sentenced to ten years in prison.

The victim, age 33, a Toronto taxi driver, after driving two fares to their requested destination, was assaulted with a tire iron. He sustained lacerations to the right eye and left ear. The offenders were unknown.

Award: \$155.00

Application Number 100-682

The victim, age 66, a Toronto clothing store manager was assaulted during an attempted robbery of his premises. He sustained lacerations and bruises to his face and the loss of three teeth. The offender was never apprehended.

Award: \$681.00

Application Number 100-683

The victim, age 26, entered a Windsor restaurant and became involved in an altercation with another patron. As a result, he was shot and wounded in the abdomen. The offender pleaded guilty and was sentenced to seven years in Kingston Penitentiary.

Award: \$2,672.00

Application Number 100-685

The victim, a female, while attending at the Dryden snowmobile races, was struck in the face by an assailant for no apparent reason. She sustained lacerations to her mouth and her dentures were broken. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and received a twelve-month suspended sentence.

Award: \$271.90

Application Number 100-686

The victim, age 21, after opening the door of his Windsor residence, in response to a knock, was shot in both legs. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to eighteen months imprisonment and eighteen months probation.

Award: \$2,750.50

Application Number 100-687

The victims, a 43 year old female and her 9 year old son, were assaulted on an Oshawa street by a person apparently under the influence of alcohol. The mother sustained bruises and contusions to her face and head, and the son had some hair pulled from his head. The offender was arrested. However, the charge was withdrawn when he verbally agreed to make restitution, which he did not do.

Application Number 100-689

The victim, a 29 year old female, was shot by a member of a motorcycle club while walking along a St. Catharines street. She sustained a gunshot wound in her left thigh. The offender was not identified.

Award: \$425.00

Application Number 100-690

The victim, a 23 year old male, was stabbed in the abdomen while waiting for a street car. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$1,000.00

Application Number 100-692

The victim, age 17, while walking on the main street of Huntsville was shot as a result of mistaken identity. He sustained shotgun pellet wounds in the head, back, neck and arm. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to twelve months in jail.

Award: \$555.50

Application Number 100-695

The victim, an 18 year old student, was returning home from a part-time job when he became involved in an argument with another driver. As a result he suffered a broken tooth. The offender was never apprehended.

Award: \$488.80

Application Number 100-696

The victim, age 70, witnessed the murder of her niece by the niece's husband. The husband threatened the applicant with death and then committed suicide in her presence. As a result of this traumatic experience she developed acute depressive reactions from which she continues to suffer.

Award: \$4,030.00

Application Number 100-697

The 15 year old daughter of the applicant was shot and killed in Port Colborne, Ontario. Evidence established that the death had resulted from the commission of an offence even though no offender was convicted. The father made application to this Board for re-imbursement of the funeral expenses.

Award: \$1,040.00

Application Number 100-698

The victim, age 19, while attempting to stamp out a fire caused by two young men filling a Javex bottle with gasoline and kicking it over, received first and second degree burns to his left leg. The offender received a suspended sentence for possession of an explosive weapon.

Award: \$1,331.57

Application Number 100-699

The victim, age 43, after drinking with a female in a Toronto hotel, accompanied her to her apartment. Shortly after arrival he was assaulted and robbed by three men. He sustained a hernia and injury to the right eye resulting in loss of vision in that eye. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$980.35

Application Number 100-703

The victim, age 22, was shot in the stomach when leaving a Welland hotel in which he had been a patron. Surgery was required to remove the bullet, repair five punctures in the large bowel and remove the right kidney. The

offender was convicted of attempted murder and was sentenced to eight years imprisonment.

Award: \$2,314.29

Application Number 100-706

The victim, a 15 year old female Dundas District High School student, was stabbed by a male student who had entered the girl's washroom. She sustained stab wounds to the neck, chest and stomach. The offender was convicted on a charge of wounding and was sentenced to two years less a day imprisonment.

Award: \$622.90 of which \$500.00 was paid to the Accountant of the Supreme Court of Ontario, in trust

Application Number 100-710

The victim, age 21, was visiting his girl friend at her Toronto home. A fight began between two men and while attempting to stop it, the victim was stabbed in the stomach. The offenders were tried and acquitted as there was some doubt as to who wielded the weapon.

Award: \$1,583.40

Application Number 100-712

The victim, a 49 year old female, was murdered in a Stratford home in which she did occasional housework. The offender then committed suicide.

Award: \$6,391.00 to the applicant, the husband of the victim

Application Number 100-713

The victim, age 23, while leaving a St. Catharines hotel, was shot in the right leg in what appears to have been a gunfight between members of a motorcycle club. He sustained bleeding and swelling of the leg. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$305.00

Application Number 100-714

The victim was at her Lakefield home when the offender entered and after some argument, struck her over the head with a tire iron. She sustained a skull fracture involving partial loss of hearing. The offender was convicted of wounding and was sentenced to thirty days in jail.

Award: \$2,031.50

Application Number 100-715

The victim, age 51, while a patron in the beverage room of a Kirkland Lake hotel, accompanied by a female, was stabbed to death by the estranged husband of the female. The offender was convicted of manslaughter and was sentenced to five years imprisonment.

Award: \$6,612.66 to the applicant, the wife of the victim

Application Number 100-716

The victim, age 23, was injured as the result of an unprovoked attack in a Timmins hotel. He was struck by a glass which caused severe facial lacerations. There was considerable suffering with residual scarring and nerve damage. The offender was convicted of bodily harm with intent and was sentenced to nine months imprisonment.

Award: \$1,878.08

Application Number 100-717

The victim, age 59, after having retired for the night at the Timmins home of a friend, was awakened by an acquaintance who demanded money. Upon

refusing he was assaulted with an axe, sustaining lacerations to the forehead and a fracture of the frontal bone. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to twelve months definite, and twelve months indefinite.

Award: \$726.00

Application Number 100-718

The victim, age 61, when attempting to intercede on behalf of a friend who was being assaulted in his Timmins home, sustained a broken left arm. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to twelve months definite and twelve months indefinite. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-717).

Award: \$377.00

Application Number 100-720

The victim, age 28, a Wells Fargo security guard was shot and killed during the hold-up of an Ottawa supermarket. The offender was found guilty of non-capital murder and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Award: \$1,592.80 to the applicant, the wife of the victim

Application Number 100-721

The victim, a 75 year old female, was assaulted when accused of improperly entering a lineup in front of a Toronto discount store. She sustained a fracture of the left hip and left pelvis when knocked to the ground. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$1,045.30

Application Number 100-724

The victim, age 24, while having coffee with friends in a London restaurant, was assaulted when a scuffle broke out amongst other persons intent on causing damage to the establishment. He sustained a compound fracture of the right jaw and loss of one tooth. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to three months in jail.

Award: \$1,063.93

Application Number 100-725

The victim, age 31, was returning to his automobile after shopping in downtown Toronto. He was attacked by two youths who remain unknown. He was struck so violently that he became unconscious. X-rays revealed a fractured jaw.

Award: \$548.00

Application Number 100-726

The victim, a 47 year old truck driver, returned to a Toronto restaurant to question the amount of change received when paying his bill. He was beaten by two of the restaurant's employees, sustaining a severe fracture of the right ankle. The offenders were found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and both were fined \$200.00 in addition to three months in jail.

Award: \$7,983.50

Application Number 100-727

The victim, a 63 year old female, when en route to her Niagara Falls home from a local grocery store, was knocked to the ground by two young assailants in an attempted purse snatch. She sustained a twisted right ankle and bruises. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$609.30

Application Number 100-728

The victim, age 41, left a party at a private home in Windsor. He was standing at a street corner with two friends when the offender appeared at the scene and struck him in the right eye and ribs. The offender was charged and convicted of assault and a fine of \$275.00 and costs was imposed.

Award: \$776.40

Application Number 100-729

The victim, age 21, while in a London park was assaulted and beaten by two assailants. He suffered a separated shoulder, lacerations and bruises, and temporary damage to the vision of his right eye. The victim, age 40, a Sudbury truck driver, was shot in a rooming house by a companion he had known for only a few days. He received a full shot gun charge above his right knee and as a result was hospitalized on two occasions. The wound remains painful and source of discomfort. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to eighteen months in prison.

Award: \$2,746.20

Application Number 100-733

The victim, age 49, was fatally wounded by a shot fired from a rifle in the hands of his deranged son. The offender was found not guilty by reason of insanity and was confined to Penetanguishene.

Award: \$1,500.00 arrears and continuing payments of \$300.00 per month to the applicant, the wife of the victim

Application Number 100-734

The victim, a 62 year old widow, returned to her Toronto apartment to find an inebriated neighbour present. Upon requesting him to leave, she was pushed down the stairs with the result that she sustained a fractured left leg. The offender pleaded guilty to assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$50.00 or ten days in jail.

Award: \$886.50

Application Number 100-735

The victim, a 19 year old truck driver, was assaulted on a St. Catharines street. Two men asked him for a cigarette and when he said that he did not smoke, he was beaten. The offenders each received six months in jail after pleading guilty to assault occasioning bodily harm.

Award: \$1,226.00

Application Number 100-736

The victim, age 71, accompanied by a friend and his three children were in Nathan Phillips Square, when a stranger grabbed the children and frightened them. When he told the offender not to scare the children, he was viciously

assaulted. He sustained a fractured left hip requiring the insertion of a plate, and body bruises. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to four months in jail.

Award: \$1,743.75

Application Number 100-738

The victim, a 13 year old female, while walking toward Highway 401 in Kingston was murdered. She received a fractured skull and possible suffocation. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$166.00 to the applicant, the father of the victim covering travelling expenses and counsel fee

Application Number 100-747

The victim, age 48, when leaving the Bayfield arena accompanied by his wife, after attending a dance, was suddenly attacked by an assailant wielding a piece of lumber. He sustained a concussion, the effects of which have impaired his memory. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to sixty days in jail.

Award: \$1,895.94

Application Number 100-748

The victim, a 48 year old female, while standing in the ground floor bathroom of her Windsor home was shot by her estranged husband who was standing outside. The bullet passed through both of her hands. The offender was found guilty of attempted murder and was sentenced to three years in penitentiary.

Award: \$1,151.67

Application Number 100-750

The victim, age 18, stayed with a girl friend overnight at her Southampton home. During the night, the offender broke into the house and, in addition, to murdering the girl friend, severely beat the applicant. She sustained multiple facial fractures. The offender was sentenced to life imprisonment on a charge of non-capital murder.

Award: \$3,226.35

Application Number 100-753

The victim, a 47 year old Windsor police sergeant, accompanied by other police officers, was investigating a suspected break and enter. He sustained gunshot wounds in his right side and forearm from bullets fired from a weapon in the hands of the intruder. The offender was convicted on a charge of causing bodily harm with intent and was sentenced to 8½ years in penitentiary.

Award: \$1,007.50

Application Number 100-754

The victim, a 47 year old Windsor police officer, accompanied by other police officers, was investigating a suspected break and enter. He sustained a gunshot wound to his left foot from a weapon in the hands of the intruder. The offender was convicted on a charge of causing bodily harm with intent and was sentenced to 8½ years in penitentiary. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-753).

Award: \$763.50

Application Number 100-755

The victim, age 29, was beaten and stabbed by a group of persons in an unprovoked attack while a patron in a Toronto discotheque. These injuries necessitated six days hospitalization and lengthy treatment. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$3,352.10

Application Number 100-756

The victim, age 16, when visiting the home of his girl friend was involved in an altercation with her father. As a result, he sustained knife lacerations to his face. The offender was convicted of wounding, fined \$300.00 and placed on probation for two years.

Award: \$419.00 to the applicant, father of the victim

Application Number 100-757

The victim, age 43, while walking through a Toronto park was knocked down and assaulted by three teenage youths. He sustained bruises and contusions and three broken teeth. One offender was apprehended, convicted of theft and was sentenced to two years probation.

Award: \$128.00

Application Number 100-760

The victim, age 62, while standing with a friend on the platform of a Toronto subway station, was without provocation, stabbed in the stomach. The injury required operative treatment and hospitalization for 38 days. The offender was never apprehended.

Award: \$1,735.00

Application Number 100-761

The victim, age 20, was assaulted by unknown male assailants on a Guelph street and as a result lost the sight of his left eye. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$5,784.37

Application Number 100-763

The victim, age 46, after leaving a Windsor tavern, was assaulted by a person who had previously been ejected from the establishment. He sustained scalp lacerations requiring thirteen stitches and severe body bruises. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and sentenced to fourteen days in jail and two years probation.

Award: \$981.00

Application Number 100-764

The victim was murdered by her husband from whom she was separated. A brother-in-law brought application before our Board on behalf of her two infant children. The offender was found guilty of manslaughter and was sentenced to seven years in prison.

Award: \$663.00 plus \$170.00 per month to the brother-in-law who stands *in loco parentis* for the two children.

Application Number 100-766

The victim, age 20, was, without provocation, assaulted and beaten by two youths after a football game in a Sudbury park. He sustained a fractured leg, that required several operations due to complications. One offender was arrested and charged with assault. However, a conviction was not obtained.

Award: \$3,318.07

Application Number 100-769

The victim, age 25, a roomer in a Timmins rooming house, was awakened by an explosion from lighted gasoline contained in bottles. On going to the window to investigate he was struck by buckshot on various parts of the head and in the left eye, losing the sight of the eye. The offender who had gone berserk was attempting to set fire to the rooming house, and later took his own life.

Award: \$2,075.00

Application Number 100-770

The victim, a 59 year old female, while attending the Ottawa Exhibition, was injured when her purse was snatched. She sustained abrasions and bruising to her left knee. The offender was charged with theft but died before coming to trial.

Award: \$50.00

Application Number 100-772

The victim, age 44, while in his trailer at Wasaga Beach, heard screams for help. He then went to the aid of the trailer-park owner who was being assaulted by an individual. Subsequently, the assailant returned with some friends and assaulted the applicant. He sustained lacerations to his back and multiple bruises to his head and body. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and fined \$50.00.

Award: \$1,410.00

Application Number 100-776

The victim, age 54, was assaulted by three persons at his Hamilton home when he told them that he had no wine for sale. He sustained cuts and bruises to the head and face. One offender was convicted of assault and was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

Award: \$169.00

Application Number 100-777

The victim, age 44, is a self employed variety store operator in Toronto. Two men entered and attempted to steal the money from the cash register. In the ensuing struggle, the victim sustained a stab wound in the chest causing two weeks loss of work. The offenders remain unknown.

Award: \$610.00

Application Number 778

The victim, age 57, was playing cards in a Toronto park, when the offender came and took some money from the table. The victim told him to leave the money alone. As a result, he was struck in the face and kicked. The offender was sentenced to six months in jail on a charge of assault causing bodily harm.

Award: \$749.68

Application Number 100-779

The victim, age 33, a waiter-manager of a Toronto hotel beverage room, after asking an intoxicated patron to leave the premises, was, without warning, stabbed in the stomach. The offender was convicted on a charge of wounding and sentenced to three months in jail.

Award: \$921.42

Application Number 100-780

The victim, age 61, when watering the back lawn of his Windsor home was

assaulted for no apparent reason by three youths who climbed over the fence. He sustained a broken shoulder, facial injuries, lacerations and bruises to his back and neck. One offender was convicted on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to thirty days in jail; the charges against the other two were withdrawn.

Award: \$3,022.19

Application Number 100-782

The victim, age 18, a student at a Cobourg high school, was assaulted by a fellow student in the school building. He sustained a fractured cheek requiring operative treatment. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

Award: \$703.70

Application Number 100-784

The victim, a 76 year old store keeper, was found lying unconscious in his store. He had been beaten on the head with a blunt instrument and was left with permanent brain damage. The offender was tried for attempted murder and sentenced to ten years in penitentiary.

Award: \$6,000.00 covering arrears and \$400.00 per month for 15 months and \$200.00 per month thereafter

Application Number 100-788

The victim, age 68, while en route to his employment as night cleaner and janitor of a Hamilton restaurant, was attacked and assaulted by four assailants. He sustained lacerations to the inside of his mouth and broken dentures. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$249.40

Application Number 100-790

The victim, age 76, was assaulted by the separated husband of a lady with whom the victim had been living common-law. He sustained a dislocation of the lens of the right eye with secondary glaucoma due to the injury, as well as lacerations of the face. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$300.00 or three months in jail.

Award: \$1,881.65

Application Number 100-791

The applicant, on returning to his home in Thunder Bay at lunch time, found the body of his 25 year old wife. A suspect was charged with non-capital murder but was found not guilty at a jury trial.

Award: \$1,885.00 to the husband of the victim

Application Number 100-793

The victim, age 43, had spent the afternoon at a Kitchener golf club. Later he went to a beverage room and got into an argument with another patron. A third party struck him suddenly and without warning. The applicant suffered a fractured skull and as a result lost twenty-two weeks employment. The offender was charged with assault and fined \$100.00. Since the behavior of the victim contributed to his own misfortune, no award was made for pain and suffering.

Award: \$3,762.58

Application Number 100-794

The victim, a 50 year old mechanic design engineer, while returning home from shopping with his wife, observed two small boys fighting. He interfered and was then chased by a gang of older boys throwing sticks. His left heel

was struck resulting in a ruptured Achilles tendon. The offender remains unidentified.

Award: \$1,356.50

Application Number 100-797

The victim, age 41, a Toronto vocational school instructor, was assaulted in his apartment building after wrongfully being accused of knocking on the door of another tenant. He sustained a broken left leg, bruises and contusions. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$50.00 or ten days in jail.

Award: \$835.95

Application Number 100-798

The victim, age 19, while parking his car at a parking meter on a Thunder Bay street, was struck with a bottle by a motor-cyclist who had told him to move his car. He sustained lacerations to his mouth and damage to his teeth. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$25.00 or five days in jail.

Award: \$300.00

Application Number 100-799

The victim, age 21, was walking along a Windsor street when he was attacked from behind by an unknown assailant. As a result of serious spinal injuries, he is now a quadriplegic. The victim, a 44 year old female, while in a motel near Pembroke, sustained a fatal gunshot wound from a bullet fired from a weapon in the hands of a male acquaintance. The offender was convicted on a charge of manslaughter and was sentenced to ten years in penitentiary.

Award: \$782.00 covering funeral expenses paid to the victim's grandmother

Application Number 100-803

The victim, age 30, was stabbed in the heart by an ex-girl friend while leaving his Toronto apartment. The offender was convicted of wounding and was sentenced to two years less one day.

Award: \$1,715.25

Application Number 100-809

The victim, age 22, was involved in an altercation in a Hamilton restaurant when he went to the defence of his sister who was being disturbed by another patron. He was struck a blow causing severe lacerations to his mouth and broken teeth. The offender was charged with assault, convicted and fined \$100.00 or thirty days in jail.

Award: \$1,300.28

Application Number 100-811

The victim, age 18, was assaulted while attending a dance at a high school in Port Dover. He sustained a fractured jaw. The offender was found guilty of assault. He was given a suspended sentence and put on probation for twelve months.

Award: \$343.00

Application Number 100-812

Applicant, age 19, was the victim of an unprovoked shooting on the

premises of a Willowdale Plaza. He sustained a bullet wound to the body necessitating surgical removal of the spleen. The offender was convicted on a charge of attempted murder and was sentenced to ten years imprisonment. Award: \$1,516.25

Application Number 100-814

The victim, age 63, a Toronto Transit Commission employee, was assaulted while on duty in one of the subway stations. He sustained two fractured ribs, a punctured lung and lacerations to the nose and knee. The offender was not apprehended.

The victim, age 42, a Toronto Transit Commission employee, on hearing a noise at the rear of the bus went to investigate. At this time he was assaulted by three youths. The victim, age 34, as the result of a long standing feud between himself and another person, was shot and fatally wounded on a concession road in West Zorro Township. The offender was convicted on a charge of non-capital murder and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Award: \$1,000.00 covering arrears and payments of \$200.00 per month to the applicant, the wife of the victim

Application Number 100-818

The victim, a 56 year old CNR employee, was walking home from work. He was struck in the right eye by a partially filled cardboard carton of milk which was thrown from a passing vehicle. Vision in his injured eye was reduced by 60%. The driver immediately sped off and was not apprehended.

Award: \$3,245.70

Application Number 100-822

The victim, a 19 year old high school student, was engaged in household duties when a bullet struck her in the right side of the face breaking the cheekbone and destroying the right eye. After seven operations over three years, an artificial eye was inserted. The offender was charged with careless hunting, convicted and given a two year suspended sentence.

Award: \$5,675.71

Application Number 100-824

The victim, age 47, was attending a retirement party at a London hotel. An uninvited guest entered and was asked to leave by the victim. He did so, but returned a short time later and assaulted the victim. The victim sustained a fractured nose, fractured cheekbone and facial lacerations. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$200.00 or thirty days in jail.

Award: \$2,878.85

Application Number 100-827

The victim, age 23, was awakened by an argument taking place at a party in the basement of his Windsor home. While investigating this disturbance, he was shot in the back just below the hip resulting in a lengthy absence

from work. The offender pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of wounding and was sentenced to one year probation.

Award: \$3,249.60

Application Number 100-828

The victim, a 20 year old female, while attending a house party with friends near Niagara-on-the-Lake, was assaulted without provocation. She sustained contusions to the head. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault and was fined \$155.00 or twelve days and was placed on probation for one year.

Application Number 100-830

The victim, age 43, after leaving the lounge of an Oshawa hotel, accompanied by a female, was viciously assaulted and robbed by several men. The victim, age 19, was assaulted while roller skating with his girl friend. He was knocked unconscious and sustained a stiff neck. The offender was found guilty of assault and was sentenced to forty-five days in jail.

He sustained a fractured nose, injury to the groin and left arm and multiple body bruises. The victim, age 26, while driving his car near Minden, picked up a stranger who was walking to a cottage. Upon arrival, the victim was invited in. While there he was attacked and fatally stabbed. The offender was convicted on a charge of manslaughter and was sentenced to eight years imprisonment. Award: \$2,826.75 covering arrears, and \$125.00 per month to the applicant, wife of the victim

Application Number 100-852

The victim, a 29 year old singer, was standing near the front door of a Pickering hotel when he noticed two youths removing a guitar from his car. When he tried to apprehend them, he was beaten sustaining multiple lacerations to the face and head. Each offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm. One was sentenced to four months definite and six months indefinite, the other was fined \$100.00 or twenty days in jail.

Award: \$3,403.37

Application Number 100-854

The victim, a 73 year old female, was working at a Hamilton dry cleaners when a gunman demanded money. She refused and was pistol whipped causing severe facial lacerations. The offender was convicted and sentenced to five years in penitentiary.

Award: \$809.25

Application Number 100-855

The victim, a 16 year old girl, was walking along a Toronto street when she was attacked by a youth wielding an ice pick. She sustained stab wounds in the breast and thigh. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 100-857

The victim, age 49, while entering the grounds of his employer in Brockville, was struck several times with a steel pipe by a man in hiding from the police. He sustained a fractured jaw, lacerations of the face, scalp and lower lip, and multiple bruises to the body, arms and legs. The blows to his head resulted in a cerebral concussion. The offender was apprehended and sentenced to two years.

Award: \$1,013.00

Application Number 100-858

The victim, age 31, while attending a social evening in the Mississauga Community Centre, was assaulted without provocation. He sustained a laceration to the mouth and the loss of four teeth. A charge was laid against the offender but was dismissed due to lack of evidence.

Award: \$848.18

Application Number 100-862

The victim, a 39 year old widower, was found lying adjacent to a rail track in the Kenora area. He had been thrown from a freight train resulting in a below-knee amputation of the left leg and brain damage causing permanent paralysis of the right arm. The offender was found guilty of wounding with intent and was sentenced to reformatory for two years less a day.

Award: \$200.00 per month

Application Number 100-864

The victim, a 32 year old motorcycle mechanic, and his brother, were in the victim's basement workshop when two members of a local Hamilton motorcycle gang entered. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-865).

Application Number 100-865

The victim, a 28 year old associate engineer, was in the basement workshop of his brother, a motorcycle mechanic, when they became involved in an argument with some members of a local motorcycle gang. A fight ensued and the victim was shot in the leg and was struck on his head. The offenders received eighteen months definite and eighteen months indefinite, plus a year probation. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-864).

Award: \$782.55

Application Number 100-867

The victim, age 51, was severely beaten outside a Caledonia hotel. He received brain damage which has resulted in a permanent disability. A warrant is outstanding for a suspected assailant.

Award: \$914.00 in arrears and \$130.00 per month thereafter to the mother of the victim

Application Number 100-868

The victim, age 7, was seriously injured when a firecracker exploded inside his shirt. The offender, also a juvenile, placed the firecracker inside the victim's shirt and then ran off. The offender was charged and convicted. A \$ 5.00 fine was imposed.

Award: \$732.40

Application Number 100-869

The victim, age 25, a third year medical student, was employed as a part-time doorman at a London restaurant. He asked two customers to leave because they appeared to be about to commence fighting. He was assaulted by one of the customers, and then pushed through a plate glass window by a third man. He sustained a cut artery in his left leg and, as a result of the extensive bleeding, his life was seriously endangered. One offender pleaded guilty to the charge of common assault, and was placed on probation for one year. The second offender was found not guilty.

The victim, a 15 year old student, went to the aid of a stranger who had been shot in the back with a pellet pistol. She was also shot, sustaining facial wounds. The offender remains unknown.

The victim, a 76 year old widow, was walking along a Toronto street when she was knocked down by an unidentified person. Prior to this occurrence she had had hip surgery which was severely aggravated by this incident.

Award: \$1,331.56

Application Number 100-873

The victim, a 27 year old female, was leaving a Wallaceburg hotel with her husband when she noticed three acquaintances sitting in a car. The applicant approached, spoke in a friendly manner and then one of the people made a derogatory reference to the victim's husband. She was then beaten into a state of unconsciousness, resulting in semi-paralysis of the arm and leg. Treatment improved her condition but her arm remains numb and she walks with a significant limp. Two persons were brought to trial but the charge was dismissed when a third admitted to being the assailant under the protection of the Canada Evidence Act.

Application Number 100-875

The victim, a 46 year old male, was struck on the side of the face, sustaining a fractured cheekbone. This assault resulted from an argument over payment of rent by the offender. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and fined \$150.00 or fifteen days in jail.

Award: \$1,106.85

Application Number 100-876

The victim, a 34 year old female, after leaving a party at a hotel in Hamilton with a friend, was stabbed by her separated husband. The victim was inflicted with multiple stab wounds to her left loin, left thigh, left chest wall and right abdomen. The offender was sentenced to three years in penitentiary for wounding.

Award: \$1,374.80

Application Number 100-877

The victim, a 13 year old girl, was attempting to prevent a fight between her younger brother and several other children. The mother of one of the children struck the victim in the face with her sandal. As a result, the victim required dental surgery with future dental work a possibility. The offender was charged with common assault, and was placed on six months probation. Award: \$647.22 to the applicant, the father of the victim

The victim, a 76 year old female, was knocked down while standing in a line at the Canadian National Exhibition. The assault was so violent and careless as to constitute criminal negligence. The victim sustained a fractured hip. The offender remains unknown.

The victim, a 41 year old miner, left the lobby of a Sudbury hotel where he had purchased cigarettes. Two strangers made an unprovoked attack on him breaking the applicant's nose. One offender was acquitted and the other was sentenced to thirty days at hard labour.

Application Number 100-899

The victim, age 44, was asleep in his Hamilton home when four men forced entry beating up he and his son. The applicant sustained multiple bruises and lacerations. No conviction was registered against the offenders. (Same occurrence as Applicant 100-898).

Application Number 100-901

The victim, age 16, was hitch-hiking with his brother in the Waterford area. They were picked up by five men who refused to let them get out of the car. He finally escaped but his brother was beaten. Physical injury was relatively slight but he sustained a considerable degree of shock. The offenders pleaded guilty to charges of assault causing bodily harm and were sentenced to prison for two years. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-902).

Award: \$100.00

Application Number 100-902

The victim, age 18, was hitch-hiking with his brother in the Waterford area. They were picked up by five men who refused to let them get out of the car. The victim was beaten sustaining a fractured nose, mild concussion and lacerations. Two offenders pleaded guilty to charges of assault causing bodily harm and were sentenced to prison for two years. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-901).

Award: \$365.00

Application Number 100-904

The victim, a 21 year old police cadet was assaulted in a Hamilton hotel during off duty hours. He sustained a fractured jaw and damaged teeth. The offender was found guilty of assault and sentenced to six months in jail.

The victim, age 36, had spent the evening in a Toronto hotel and had consumed, in his own words, more than sufficient beer. Towards the end of the evening he began to doze on the table, and for no obvious reason, was assaulted by the offender. The victim sustained a fracture of the right cheekbone. The offender was convicted of assault occasioning bodily harm and was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

The victim, a 20 year old male, was shot while at a Toronto plaza. The assault and shooting were unprovoked. The victim sustained a fractured ankle and a neck wound. The offender was convicted of attempted murder and was sentenced to ten years in prison.

The applicant, a 33 year old machine operator, was stabbed in the abdomen

in a Glencoe hotel. The offender was convicted of wounding and was sentenced to two years in prison.

The victim, age 71, was disturbed in the middle of the night by two men making noise outside his home. While requesting that they quieten themselves, he was beaten sustaining various injuries. The offenders were convicted of assault causing bodily harm and were sentenced to thirty days in jail plus two years probation. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-926).

The victim, a 63 year old female, went to the defense of her husband who was being beaten outside their home. She sustained extensive minor injuries. Application Number 100-932

The victim, a 66 year old pensioner, was shot in the left foot while he went to the rescue of a woman who was being robbed outside a Niagara Falls store. The offender remains unknown. The victim suffered a severe fracture of the second toe and to date experiences residual pain.

The victim, a 61 year old caretaker, was found stabbed to death and robbed in a laneway of a Toronto street. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$469.26 to the brother of the victim

The victim, age 51, accidentally struck a dog while driving along a Toronto street. The owner of the dog ran up, pulled him from his car and struck him on the face. The offender pleaded guilty to assault and was fined \$150.00.

The victim, age 49, was attacked by two assailants and was assaulted and robbed while walking on a Niagara Falls street. He sustained a sprained left wrist and body bruises. The offenders were never apprehended.

Application Number 200-3

The victim, age 27, while walking in a Toronto park, was approached by an

unknown person who requested a cigarette. Upon refusing the request he was assaulted and knocked to the ground sustaining a fractured right hip. The offender was not apprehended.

The victim, a 20 year old male student, was mistakenly shot by a man who thought the victim had been creating a disturbance at a friend's home. The bullet entered the lower back, passed through both kidneys and the liver and came out his right side. The offender was found guilty of causing bodily harm by criminal negligence and was sentenced to two weeks in jail in addition to three years probation.

Application Number 200-9

The victim, age 20, after leaving a Toronto beverage room was assaulted and robbed by a group of men. He sustained a fractured jaw. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$252.70

Application Number 200-10

The victim, a 27 year old male, was shot and killed in a Toronto hotel. The offender was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to ten years in penitentiary.

Award: \$1,383.00, covering funeral expenses, to the brother of the victim

Application Number 200-11

The victim, a 23 year old male, was assaulted in the parking lot of a Toronto technical school. He sustained facial bruises and loss of one tooth. No arrests were made due to the lack of identification.

Award: \$220.00

Application Number 200-12

The victim, an 18 year old female, while walking along a Hamilton street with two friends during the early evening, was wounded in the left eye by what was believed to be a pellet from a pellet gun. As a result of this injury she has virtually no sight in this eye and the condition is considered to be permanent. The offender was unknown.

Application Number 200-13

The victim, a 26 year old Toronto police officer, when questioning the two occupants of a motor vehicle was knocked to the ground and attacked. He sustained damage to his teeth and bruises and abrasions to the head and chest. The two offenders were convicted of assault causing bodily harm and each were sentenced to a fine of \$300.00 or two months and one year probation.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 200-14

The victim, age 29, was standing in a parking lot waiting for his employer who was going to give him a ride home. A car ran over his foot, reversed and passed over it again. Two men got out and began an argument and the victim was beaten. The offenders remain unknown.

The victim, age 39, a Kapuskasing taxi driver, when coming to the assistance of an elderly gentleman who was being assaulted by several persons, was himself assaulted and beaten. when she was attacked and beaten by two assailants. She sustained a cut lip and shock. The two offenders were charged with common assault and were sentenced to ten and thirty days in jail respectively.

The victim, a 51 year old female, while placing groceries in the trunk of her car in a Toronto shopping plaza, was suddenly attacked by a youth who had been standing nearby. She sustained a fractured nose requiring surgical repair. The offender was an out-patient from a psychiatric hospital and was returned to that institution.

Award: \$638.39

Application Number 200-35

The victim, a 28 year old Toronto police constable, when off duty and while attempting to prevent the robbery of a Brewers Retail store, sustained gunshot wounds to the right arm and elbow, requiring two periods of hospitalization for removal of the pellets. Three offenders were convicted on a charge of armed robbery, one being sentenced to fourteen years, one to ten years, and the third to five years.

Award: \$1,110.00

Application Number 200-36

The victim, a 20 year old male, was stabbed to death in a field in the Mississauga area. The two offenders were charged with non-capital murder and were found not guilty by reason of insanity and were committed to the Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre.

Award: \$677.95 to the applicant, the father of the victim

Application Number 200-39

A 25 year old man was shot to death in his home near Thamesville by an intruder known to the family. At the same time his wife was seriously wounded resulting in her being completely disabled due to paralysis. The offender then committed suicide.

The victim, age 41, while awaiting a Toronto bus, was approached by two men and assaulted without provocation. He sustained bruises to the head and face. The two offenders were convicted of assault causing bodily harm, one being fined \$100.00, and the other being given a suspended sentence.

The victim, a 23 year old female, was walking along a Hamilton street when she was struck over the head with a bottle. She sustained minor lacerations. The offender, a mental patient, was charged with assault and is presently receiving psychiatric attention.

Award: \$529.73

Application Number 200-44

The victim, age 74, was attacked by three youths who attempted to steal her handbag. When she resisted one of the boys hit her over the eye and then all three fled. They were never apprehended.

Award: \$268.30

Application Number 200-45

The victim, age 37, while walking on a Toronto street, was assaulted when he refused to hand over his money. He sustained injuries to the jaw and the right eye. The assailant was never apprehended.

Award: \$1,111.40

Application Number 200-46

The victim, age 35, a self-employed furniture refinisher was found on a Toronto street after having been assaulted. He sustained facial lacerations and multiple bruises and abrasions. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$500.00

Application Number 200-47

The victim, a 54 year old painter, while leaving a local Toronto hotel, was beaten by two men as he was about to get into his truck. He sustained a bruised stomach and right hand and an irritated eye. As a result of the assault he lost four weeks work. His assailants were apprehended and fined \$100.00 or 30 days in jail.

Award: \$764.56

Application Number 200-48

The victim a 40 year old female, was attacked without provocation in a Toronto hotel, sustaining knife slashes to her face, left arm and hand. The offender was convicted on a charge of wounding and was sentenced to two years less one day in jail.

The victim, age 55, was assaulted and beaten when he intercepted three burglars in a Kakabeka Falls store owned by his employer. He sustained a fractured skull and multiple contusions of limbs and face. All three offenders were convicted on a charge of break and enter with intent. Two were sentenced to two years imprisonment and the third was sentenced to nine months imprisonment.

Application Number 200-51

The victim, age 39, was walking down a Brantford street when he was asked by a youth for some money. He reached in his pocket and was pushed through a window, receiving multiple cuts and bruises. The offender was convicted of assault, and was sentenced to thirty days in jail.

Application Number 200-53

The victim, a 21 year old female, while a passenger on a Toronto street car was injured when a rock was thrown through the window. She sustained facial abrasions and a minor eye injury from the shattered glass. The offenders were pursued by the street car operator but he was unable to apprehend them.

A 23 year old female was found murdered in a Toronto apartment. Her parents had been maintaining her five year old daughter and will continue to do so. The offender was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to ten years in penitentiary.

The victim, a 26 year old male, was assaulted while playing shuffleboard in a Toronto hotel, sustaining facial lacerations. The offender pleaded guilty to assault causing bodily harm, and was placed on two years probation.

The victim, age 19, while in his North Bay business establishment was assaulted by an individual who claimed he had been overcharged for cleaning and alterations to a jacket. The victim sustained facial lacerations and body bruises. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault and was fined \$75.00.

The victim, a 20 year old auto worker, was standing at the bar of a Windsor hotel when a shotgun was fired through the window. One of the pellets ricocheted and struck him in the neck. He recovered in one week and returned to work. The offender remains unknown.

The victim, a 39 year old female, when investigating a noise in the hallway outside her Toronto apartment, was knocked down by two youths who were being pursued by a workman, who shouted to the victim to stop them. She sustained pulled muscles in her left leg and right shoulder and multiple bruises. The police investigated the incident, however, no charges were laid against the two juveniles.

Application Number 200-65

The victim, age 31, was assaulted in a Toronto parking lot when accosted by an individual. He sustained a fractured pelvis and facial contusions. The alleged offender was arrested, however, the charge against him was dismissed due to lack of evidence.

Application Number 200-67

The victim, age 54, was viciously assaulted by two teenagers while shopping in Toronto. One offender, a minor, was sentenced to three months and the other fined \$50.00 or ten days on a charge of common assault.

The victim, a 58 year old female, when nearing her Toronto home was knocked to the pavement by a purse snatcher. She sustained a fractured left shoulder and body bruises. The offender was not apprehended.

The victim, an 18 year old Toronto service station attendant, was beaten when refusing to sell a set of tires for \$20.00. He sustained a broken nose. Charges against the offender were withdrawn.

apartment when she was assaulted by another tenant. She sustained an extensive bruise to her right leg. The offender was convicted of assault and fined \$20.00.

The victim, age 34, when alighting from his car in the driveway of his North Bay home, was accosted by an individual and forced to drive that person to Sudbury. His life was threatened on several occasions en route. The victim, a diabetic, was unable to control his condition, which prior to the incident had been under control, but now fluctuates. The victim, while in the company of the offender en route to a Timmins house party, was assaulted in an attempted robbery. He sustained stab wounds to the neck and had his nose bitten. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault with intent to rob, and was sentenced to two years less one day imprisonment.

The victim, a 13 year old female, together with a 15 year old girl friend were found murdered in Pickering Township. The offender has never been apprehended.

The victim, age 46, was assaulted while opening his store in Toronto. He sustained a fracture of the right little finger, numerous bruises and a laceration of his scalp. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$511.75

Application Number 200-90

The victim, a 65 year old pensioner, was assaulted by a fellow tenant who was intoxicated. She sustained head injuries and still suffers from headaches. The offender was convicted of assault. She was given a suspended sentence, and was placed on six months probation.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 200-92

The victim, a 71 year old Sheriff's Officer was punched in the face while escorting a prisoner from his cell to the courthouse. He sustained a fractured nose and was unable to return to work for ten days. The offender was charged with assault, and was sentenced to six months consecutive to the sentence he was already serving.

Application Number 200-95

The victim, a 78 year old female, while walking on a St. Catharines street, was knocked to the ground in a purse snatch. She sustained a dislocation of the right shoulder. The offender was unknown.

Award: \$803.00

Application Number 200-96

The victim, age 34, was assaulted in a Cornwall restaurant. The victim's father and mother waited in a booth while he went to get a pizza. Some men were using foul language and when the victim objected, he was beaten. He sustained a fractured jaw and broken false teeth. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm, and was sentenced to three months imprisonment.

Award: \$1,821.98

Application Number 200-98

The victim, a 51 year old female, was a passenger on a Toronto street car when a snowball was thrown through the window. She sustained minor facial lacerations. The offender, a thirteen year old boy, was charged with common assault, and was placed on probation.

Award: \$238.44

Application Number 200-99

The victim, age 38, was spying on his former common-law wife when he was surprised by one of her friends. A fight ensued and the victim sustained lacerations and abrasions. The offender was put on a bond to keep the peace and the charge of assault was withdrawn. As the victim's conduct contributed to his injury, no award was made for pain and suffering.

Award: \$67.00

Application Number 200-101

The victim, a 36 year old waiter, was stabbed in the left groin as he went to his car, which was parked behind a Waterloo hotel. The person accused of the crime was acquitted on a charge of wounding.

Application Number 200-103

The victim, a 26 year old female, entered her Toronto apartment building after shopping. An unidentified man assisted her with her parcels and then forced entry into her apartment. She was robbed of six dollars and beaten, sustaining loss of several teeth. The assailant remains unknown.

Application Number 200-104

The victim, a 69 year old female, when fighting off a purse snatcher in a Sudbury church hall, sustained multiple bruises and contusions to her back, both arms and the right side. The offender was convicted on a charge of assault and was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

Award: \$546.95

Application Number 200-105

The applicant, a 29 year old taxi driver, was assaulted and robbed by a fare in Toronto. He was punched repeatedly, receiving multiple bruises and a swollen nose. The offender was convicted of assault and robbery and was sentenced to three years in penitentiary.

Award: \$341.35

Application Number 200-107

The victim, a 22 year old university student, was shot at his Toronto home. It was clearly a case of mistaken identity and the offender was never apprehended. The victim sustained a severe wound to the chest and lungs and was hospitalized for six days.

Award: \$651.14

Application Number 200-109

The victim, a 36 year old immigrant, was insulted by a young man for no apparent reason at a Toronto dance. He tried to placate this person but was beaten sustaining two fractured ribs. The offender was convicted of assault and was fined \$150.00.

The victim, age 24 and his 19 year old brother, emerged from a Brampton restaurant and were forced to take two young men for a ride. The brother was murdered and the victim was left for dead after being stabbed in the chest. The two offenders were charged with non-capital murder, and were found not guilty by reason of insanity. Both were placed in the Ontario Hospital at Penetanguishene.

Award: \$1,558.54

Application Number 200-111

The victim, age 17 years old, was visiting some relatives with his mother. When he was trying to help a woman guest leave the apartment, the offender, since deceased, deliberately slammed the door on his left hand. His third finger was nearly severed.

Award: \$336.56

Application Number 200-112

The victim, a 62 year old male, was shot through the shoulder by an unidentified hunter, while hunting in the County of Lennox and Addington.
Award: \$874.60

Application Number 200-113

The victim, a 48 year old factory worker, had reached the door of his Toronto home, when he was struck on the back of the head and robbed. He sustained lacerations to his face and lost several teeth. The offender was not apprehended.
Award: \$229.00

Application Number 200-114

The victim, age 54, was walking down a Windsor street when he was almost hit by a passing motorcyclist. The offender alighted from his vehicle and assaulted the applicant, causing a fractured wrist. The offender was charged with assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$200.00 or thirty days in jail.
Award: \$625.88

Application Number 200-118

When an argument took place in Windsor between the offender and his wife, she sought refuge in the victim's apartment. The offender then fired a shot through the front door. The victim, a 20 year old female, was wounded in the right leg. The offender was charged with intent to wound and was sentenced to the Ontario Reformatory for nine months definite and three months indefinite. Psychiatric treatment was required for the offender.

Application Number 200-119

While watching a fight outside a Williamsburg hotel, the victim, age 26, was struck in the face by a beer bottle, with the result that his eye was removed. The assault was unprovoked and the offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm, and was sentenced to one month in jail.

Application Number 200-122

The victim, a 34 year old storekeeper, disqualified one of the cars which was racing at the Brighton Speedway where he was acting as an official. The driver became incensed and broke the applicant's nose. As a result he was fined \$46.00 on a charge of assault causing bodily harm.

Application Number 200-123

The victim, a 26 year old female, was attacked in Toronto by her ex-common law husband. She was slashed in the face with a razor, sustaining a wound requiring thirty-eight stitches. The offender was convicted of wounding and was sentenced to two years in jail.

The applicant, a 26 year old keypunch operator, was the victim of an unprovoked assault while sitting in a Hamilton beverage room. As a result of the blows, she fell to the floor, cutting her hand when a glass which she was holding broke. The charge against the offender was dismissed.

The victim, a 42 year old woman, discovered that her common-law husband had been keeping company with another girl. A quarrel ensued. While ejecting her from their Toronto apartment he slammed the door on her hand. The resultant injury was so severe that it was necessary to amputate three-quarters of her right finger. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was required to post a five hundred dollar peace bond.

Application Number 200-130

The victim, a 25 year old drift miner, entered a Chelmsford restaurant with his brother. Five unknown young men ridiculed them and assaulted them when they left the restaurant. The applicant sustained dental injuries. No arrests were made. (Same occurrence as Application Number 200-131).

Award: \$1,091.50

Application Number 200-131

The victim, a 22 year old pipefitter, entered a Chelmsford restaurant with his brother and was assaulted by five unknown youths who made fun of his dress and hair. No arrests were made. (Same occurrence as Application Number 200-130).

Award: \$662.00

Application Number 200-132

A 71 year old female was the victim of a purse snatch in Toronto. She was pushed to the ground and sustained fractures to her right shoulder and hip. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$2,532.07

Application Number 200-136

The victim, age 59, was returning to his Toronto home when he was struck on the back of the head by an unknown assailant. The result was a severe laceration requiring seventy-five stitches.

Award: \$665.00

Application Number 200-141

The victim, a 17 year old Hamilton high school student, was assaulted by a fellow student while walking home. He sustained a very serious stab wound in the abdomen. The offender was found guilty of wounding and placed on one year's probation.

Award: \$865.59

Application Number 200-145

The victim, 31 years of age, was struck over the head with a bottle by the offender, with whom he had been sharing an apartment in Toronto. The unprovoked assault resulted in lacerations which required two hundred stitches to close. The offender was convicted of assault, received a suspended sentence, and was placed on probation for eighteen months.

Award: \$300.00

Application Number 200-148

The victim, a 39 year old Scarboro electrician, was cut off by another car which followed him to his home. Upon arriving there, four youths emerged from the other car and beat him. The victim sustained injuries to his left hand, knee and nose. Four youths were apprehended, two of whom were

acquitted. The other two were convicted of assault causing bodily harm and were sentenced to thirty days in jail.

Award: \$338.00

Application Number 200-149

The victim, a 35 year old female, surprised an intruder in her Hamilton home, and was struck in the face sustaining a severely lacerated forehead. The offender fled and remains unknown.

Award: \$386.35

Application Number 200-150

The victim, age 26, was unloading a truck which had passed through a picket line surrounding a Toronto firm. He was attacked by five men wielding 2 x 4's and sustained a ten-stitch laceration on his scalp. The offenders were all found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and each was fined \$300.00 or thirty days in jail.

Award: \$306.00

Application Number 200-151

The victim, a 26 year old Thorold resident, was shot following a series of minor disputes and quarrels which in no way warranted such a vicious attack. He was struck in the right elbow causing a fractured humerus. There were several complications and he still experiences lingering difficulty. The offender was convicted of assault and was sentenced to one year definite and two years on probation.

Award: \$1,945.15

Application Number 200-153

The victim, a 35 year old unemployed truck driver, when leaving a Mississauga restaurant, was assaulted by three men who allegedly had stolen a radio from his automobile. The applicant sustained a fractured nose and injured knee. The assailants remain unknown.

Award: \$500.00

Application Number 200-155

The victim, age 41, was sitting in a Stratford café with his daughter. Another girl struck his daughter, and while attempting to separate the two girls, he was struck in the eye by two other youths. The charges against one offender were dismissed and the other was convicted of common assault and sentenced to one month in jail.

Award: \$1,075.82

Application Number 200-158

The victim, a 29 year old male, was the object of an unprovoked attack in a Niagara Falls hotel resulting in severe facial lacerations. The offender was convicted of assault with intent to wound, and was sentenced to fifty days consecutive to a sentence of fourteen days then being served.

Award: \$1,007.00

Application Number 200-159

The victim, age 30, was working as the manager of a Becker's Milk Store in Toronto when he was approached by a man who demanded money. The victim struggled with and subdued this person. Although physical injury was slight, the applicant developed severe emotional difficulties. The offender was convicted of robbery, and was sentenced to three months indeterminate plus twelve months less one day definite.

Award: \$1,410.00

Application Number 200-160

The victim, a 52 year old carpenter, was beaten in a brutal manner and robbed while walking home in Thunder Bay. He sustained a fracture of the right leg, skull and orbit of the right eye. Extensive treatment was necessary to improve his condition. As he was knocked unconscious, he had little opportunity to observe his assailants and they remain unknown.

Award: \$5,642.76

Application Number 200-163

The victim, a 60 year old male, was assaulted in Toronto by the offender and sustained facial and neck injuries. At the time of the trial, the crown was unaware of the victim's presence in the court room. As a result the victim did not give testimony and the charge of robbery was dismissed. However, the offender was convicted on a second charge of wilful damage and was given a suspended sentence, plus two years probation.

Award: \$2,650.00

Application Number 200-165

The victim, age 68, was talking to his friend outside a Toronto restaurant when another acquaintance tried to enter the conversation. The applicant ignored him and as a result was pushed down sustaining a fractured right hip. This assault was not reported to the police. The Board considers it the duty and obligation of the injured person to co-operate with the police to bring the offender to justice. The award was therefore reduced.

Award: \$300.00

Application Number 200-168

The victim, a 40 year old self-employed lumber grader, was approached in Toronto by a casual employee demanding an advance on his wages. When this was refused, the victim was struck in the face sustaining a fractured jaw and broken teeth. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to three months in jail.

Award: \$508.72

Application Number 200-170

The victim, a 41 year old Toronto musician, was driving home from work and decided to purchase cigarettes. As he got out of his car he was assaulted without warning by an unknown person, sustaining dental damage and facial lacerations. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$1,499.50

Application Number 200-173

While walking on a Toronto street, the victim, a 24 year old male child-care worker, went to the assistance of an elderly man who was being beaten. The victim was slashed across the hands and abdomen. The offender was charged with wounding. He was convicted and sentenced to three months in prison.

Award: \$515.81

Application Number 200-176

The victim, a 54 year old female, had just left a Toronto subway station when a youth attempted to steal her purse. She was struck behind the ear and strained her shoulder while fighting him off. When she screamed, he fled and was not apprehended.

Award: \$250.00

Application Number 200-177

The victim, age 44, was walking home from a Toronto hotel when, to the best of his recollection, he was assaulted by four men. Medical examinations revealed minor sprains and contusions. The offenders remain unknown.

Award: \$125.00

Application Number 200-178

The victim, age 44, and his wife, accompanied by another couple, went to a Cochrane hotel to visit a friend. A fight erupted. While attempting to restore peace, the applicant was beaten, sustaining a severe fracture of his right leg, as well as other minor injuries. The healing process has been lengthy and he has not been able to return to his job as a garbage collector. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm, and was fined \$150.00 or one month in jail.

Award: \$5,463.00

Application Number 200-179

The victim, a 72 year old male, and a friend were walking along a Toronto street, when they were approached by two youths who demanded money from them. The victim was then struck in the face, sustaining lacerations. The two offenders fled and remain unknown.

Award: \$200.00

Application Number 200-180

The victim, age 28, was assaulted by a customer in a Hamilton hotel who mistook him for another person. He sustained stab wounds to the chest, abdomen and thigh. The offender was convicted of wounding, and was sentenced to three years in prison.

Award: \$756.40

Application Number 200-185

The victim, an 18 year old assistant carpenter, was accosted by four youths while walking in Toronto. As he had no money, he was beaten, sustaining fractured teeth. The victim failed to report this assault to the police as he suspected that the assailants were drug addicts and might retaliate. If the victim would have identified the offenders, the police might have apprehended them. The Board took this into consideration and substantially reduced the award.

Award: \$500.00

Application Number 200-186

The offender was in the back yard of his Hamilton home, when for some unknown reason, he fired twelve shots. The victim, age 11, and her mother live almost directly behind the house of the accused. She looked out the window and suddenly realized that she had been shot in the left leg. The offender pleaded guilty to dangerous use of a firearm, and was fined \$100.00 and twelve months probation.

Award: \$903.25

Application Number 200-192

The victim, a 37 year old machine operator, held a part-time job as a doorman at a Toronto hall. On the night in question, he was struck in the face with a beer bottle while attempting to eject several troublemakers. His right eye was severely lacerated. The offender was convicted of wounding, and was fined \$100.00 or twenty days in jail.

Award: \$1,806.10

Application Number 200-195

The victim, age 47, was waiting to be served in a Hamilton restaurant when a new car pulled in. Having never seen a car of that model, it attracted his attention. The driver ran into the restaurant and punched the applicant, driving his head through a plate glass window. He sustained fractured ribs and severe scalp lacerations. The offender was convicted of assault occasioning bodily harm and was fined \$250.00.

Award: \$1,970.91

Application Number 200-202

The victim, a 23 year old student attending Glendon College in Toronto, was the object of a vicious, unprovoked attack. He sustained a stab wound to his heart which was nearly fatal. The offender was convicted of wounding and was confined to a mental hospital.

Award: \$9,313.09

Application Number 200-207

The 18 year old victim was waiting for her boyfriend outside a Whitby hotel when some unknown person fired a shotgun from behind her. She was struck in the head and pellets were removed from her scalp and ear. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$653.15

Application Number 200-215

The victim, age 69, a retired carpenter, was assaulted while staying at a Smith's Falls hotel. He was approached by a youth who asked for some money. When he refused, he was beaten, sustaining a fractured nose and facial lacerations. The offender was convicted of assault occasioning bodily harm, was sentenced to thirty days in jail, and was placed on one year probation.

Award: \$885.85

Application Number 200-218

The victim, a 17 year old male, was struck in the mouth while drinking a bottle of beer at a private party in London. Extensive dental damage resulted. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$75.00 or three days in jail. In view of the circumstances, drinking under age, the Board applied Section 17 of the Act and made no award for pain and suffering.

Award: \$1,079.00

Application Number 200-219

The victim, age 42, was struck on the back of the head while showing a prospective tenant around his rooming house in Toronto. He was relieved of his wallet. He sustained a compound depressed skull fracture. The offender fled and remains unknown.

Award: \$3,961.00

Application Number 200-222

The applicant, age 64, was leaving a Toronto store when he was approached by a man who asked for a cigarette. The victim said that he did not have any. The offender then stabbed the victim in the chest and fled.

Award: \$780.50

Application Number 200-224

The applicant, age 23, was the victim of an unprovoked assault in a Toronto

parking lot. The police investigated but the offenders were not apprehended. He sustained minor facial injuries.

Award: \$465.20

Application Number 200-226

The victim, a 42 year old male, entered a Niagara Falls restaurant and was struck by another customer who apparently misunderstood something the victim had said. The offender was charged with assault and was acquitted.

Award: \$689.67

Application Number 200-227

The victim, a 17 year old female Hamilton student, was attacked and stabbed in the chest by an inmate of the Hamilton Psychiatric Hospital. The offender, a committed patient with ground privileges, was convicted of wounding with intent, and was sentenced to fourteen years in prison with the recommendation that he be committed to the Mental Health Centre at Penetanguishene.

Award: \$1,261.50

Application Number 200-237

The victim, a 66 year old pensioner, was in the stockroom of a Niagara Falls Mac's Milk store, when two youths entered demanding money from the owner. The victim took the owner's pistol and confronted the offenders. He was then shot in the face with the bullet eventually lodging in his left shoulder. The offenders were both sentenced to prison on armed robbery charges. One received two years and nine months; the other, three years on one charge and two years consecutive on a second charge.

Award: \$918.00

Application Number 200-239

The victim, a 66 year old Toronto widow, was attacked by a purse snatcher while walking along a Toronto street. She sustained multiple bruises and an injury to her right hand. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$453.71

Application Number 200-244

The applicant, age 24, was leaving her Ottawa apartment when the offender knocked on her door identifying himself as a deliveryman. When she answered, he forced entry and stabbed her several times. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was placed on three years probation.

Award: \$1,245.00

Application Number 200-245

The victim, a 23 year old female nurse's aid in Pickering, was struck in the face and bitten on the hand by a fellow employee during a quarrel. Although charges of assault causing bodily harm were withdrawn, the offender was bound over to keep the peace for one year.

Award: \$415.91

Applicant Number 200-246

The victim, a 47 year old labourer, stopped in a Hamilton hotel for a few beers. As he left, he was assaulted and relieved of his wallet by two unknown persons. He sustained a slight concussion in addition to multiple abrasions.

Award: \$374.00

Application Number 200-250

The applicant, a 64 year old Toronto woman, was injured when an object was thrown through the window of the streetcar on which she was riding. She sustained lacerations to the face and scalp. The offender has not been identified.

Award: \$484.00

Application Number 200-251

The victim, age 29, was assaulted while attending a Barrie hotel. He sustained a fractured nose and multiple lacerations. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm, and was fined \$300.00 or three months in jail.

Award: \$424.36

Application Number 200-253

The victim, a 25 year old labourer, was walking along a Toronto street, conversing with his companion in Italian. An unknown man, under the influence of alcohol, made some derogatory remarks about their being Italian and punched the victim in the mouth breaking his jaw. The offender fled and has never been apprehended.

Award: \$909.20

Application Number 200-254

The victim, a 40 year old woman, suffered a fractured nose when she discovered an intruder in her Toronto apartment. The offender fled and remains unapprehended.

Award: \$545.15

Application Number 200-255

The victim, a 21 year old female, was assaulted outside a Toronto restaurant by three unknown youths, sustaining a fractured nose and dental damage. The offenders were never apprehended.

Award: \$773.00

Application Number 200-256

The victim, a 14 year old boy, was assaulted by a fellow student at a London Ontario high school. The victim was struck in the face and sustained dental injuries.

Award: \$173.00

Application Number 200-259

The victim, a 51 year old Peterborough hotel manager, was shot and killed in the course of an attempted hotel robbery. The offender was sentenced to life imprisonment on a charge of non-capital murder.

Award: \$1,541.00 arrears and continuing payments of \$109.00 per month to the applicant, the widow of the victim

Application Number 200-260

The victim, age 34, was the object of an unprovoked assault while walking down a Toronto street. He sustained minor facial lacerations and a fractured nose. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$100.00 or twenty days in jail.

Award: \$535.00

Application Number 200-263

The victim, age 50, had ordered his daughter's boy friend out of his home. The boy friend then punched the victim in the face breaking his nose. The

offender was found guilty of assault occasioning bodily harm and was fined \$200.00 and placed on probation for one year.

Award: \$727.66

Application Number 200-267

The victim, a 52 year old lady, was struck from behind as she walked home from her job at a Toronto hotel. The offender, who was not apprehended, grabbed her purse and fled. She sustained a large gash to her skull and a wrenched back.

Award: \$1,081.60

Application Number 200-269

The victim, age 35, was sitting in a Toronto restaurant when he was told to move from his booth to a stool by a woman and two men. As he was on crutches, he protested and was stabbed with a fork in the right eye. The offender, the female, was found guilty of wounding and was sentenced to three years in prison.

Award: \$4,191.00

Application Number 200-277

While walking down a Toronto street, the victim, a 47 year old cabinet maker, was struck in the arm and leg by pellets from an airgun. The offender pleaded guilty to assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to sixty days in jail.

Award: \$100.00

Application Number 200-279

The victim, a 66 year old woman, was the object of a purse snatching while walking along a St. Catharines street. She resisted, and while doing so, injured her left leg. The offender was not apprehended.

Award: \$128.00

Application Number 200-285

The victim, age 24, was returning to his car after shopping at a Mississauga mall, when he was struck from behind, sustaining a cut on his scalp. He managed to fend off his attackers, who jumped in their car and fled the parking lot. They were never apprehended.

Award: \$150.00

Application Number 200-294

The victim, age 33, while carrying out his duties as a Toronto police officer, attempted to apprehend two men who were in possession of stolen property. Before making their escape, they beat the victim breaking his nose and inflicting a serious back injury.

Award: \$1,000.00

Application Number 200-302

The victim, age 24, returned to his Hamilton apartment, where he was the superintendent. Upon arrival, he noticed two men who were yelling up at two girls on a balcony. When he requested that they be quiet, he was beaten, sustaining a twenty-nine stitch wound to his face. The offender was charged with assault causing bodily harm and was fined \$250.00 or two months in jail.

Award: \$1,706.93

Application Number 200-312

The applicant, age 29, of Sarnia, was stabbed in the heart by his common-law wife following an evening of shopping and drinking in a beverage room. The offender was convicted of assault causing bodily harm and placed on probation.

Award: \$3,857.50

Application Number 200-327

The victim, a 10 year old girl, was riding in a Toronto streetcar when a snowball was thrown through the window opposite her. She received cuts to her chin, left arm and left index finger. The offender was not apprehended. (Same occurrence as Application 200-351).

Award: \$100.00 paid to the victim's mother and to be used to the benefit of the child.

Application Number 200-331

The applicant, a 39 year old Mt. Hope bulldozer operator, gave evidence that during the course of a party he had been struck on the head with the butt of an unloaded pellet gun wielded by the offender. The offender was convicted of assault and was fined \$200.00 in addition to signing a \$500.00 peace bond. When arriving at a decision, the Board took into consideration Section 17(1) of the Act.

Award: \$706.55

Application Number 200-332

The victim, a 44 year old Windsor teacher, was shot four times by a prowler who had entered his home. The applicant sustained wounds to his left leg, left arm, left shoulder and the left side of his abdomen. The offender fled and remains unknown.

Award: \$2,204.91

Application Number 200-351

The victim, a 12 year old girl, was accompanying a friend on a Toronto streetcar. The window opposite where the girls were sitting was shattered by a snowball. A piece of glass which was embedded in her right eye was removed and she completely recovered. (Same occurrence as Application Number 200-327).

Award: \$75.00

Application Number 200-385

The victim, age 26, was visiting his sister-in-law's Hamilton home, when the offender began bragging about his exploits with a gun. He then pointed a .22 rifle at the victim who, in fear, jumped through a ground floor window sustaining a minor cut to the left thumb. The offender was placed on a 12-month peace bond on a charge of threatening.

Award: \$60.00

**DECISIONS WHERE PUBLICATION OF EVIDENCE
WAS ORDERED TO BE RESTRICTED**

Application Number 100-373

The victim, age 31, was fatally wounded while in a truck driven by an individual with whom she had been keeping company. The offender was arrested. After an intensive police investigation the only charges laid were failing to report the finding of a restricted weapon and possession of a restricted weapon in a motor vehicle. The Board after hearing the applicant, husband of the victim, and taking into consideration all the available evidence, concluded that the victim, by her own conduct, had set up a train of circumstances which resulted in her death. The application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-402

The victim, age 24, when deer hunting with three companions, was fatally shot having been mistaken for a deer. The offender was charged with Dangerous Use of a Firearm and the charge was dismissed. The Board found that on the facts as stated, a finding of causing death by criminal negligence seems inevitable.

Award: \$2,030.84, an Interim Award had previously been granted to the applicant, the wife of the victim and to continue at \$250.00 per month.

Application Number 100-457

The victim, a 36 year old female, was attacked and thrown to the floor in a rape attempt when about to enter her apartment. She sustained a back injury, body bruises and the loss of two teeth. The offender was found not guilty by reason of insanity and was committed to Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre.

Award: \$1,055.00

Application Number 100-474

The victim, age 14, was en route to his home after refereeing a soccer game, when he was accosted and assaulted by another minor, who had been heckling him at the game. He sustained facial lacerations and damaged teeth. The offender was found guilty of assault, and was placed on suspended sentence.

Award: \$1,378.00 to the applicant, father of the victim

Applicatin Number 100-512

The applicant, age 30, was at home waiting for his wife to return from work. When she failed to do so by supper time, he went to her place of employment and found her strangled. The offender remains unknown. The claim has been filed on behalf of the applicant and his three small children. He has now found it necessary to hire a housekeeper at a cost of \$30.00 weekly.

Award: \$4,400.00 covering arrears and continuing payments of \$150.00 per month to the applicant, husband of the victim

Application Number 100-527

The victim, age 22, was viciously assaulted and beaten to death. One offender was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to twenty years in penitentiary. The other was convicted of assault causing bodily harm, and was sentenced to four years.

Award: \$1,339.83 to the applicant, wife of the victim

Application Number 100-545

The victim, a 38 year old female, was raped and murdered in her home. The offender has never been apprehended.

Award: \$10,000.00 to the applicant, husband of the victim on behalf of himself and his three children

Application Number 100-546

The victim, a 17 year old female, was badly beaten and raped by an unknown offender. Although a lengthy investigation was carried out, no arrests were made.

Award: \$4,340.92

Application Number 100-591

The victim, a 49 year old wife of a garage owner, when attempting to intercede on behalf of her husband who was being assaulted, sustained bruises of the left shoulder and right arm and a sprained wrist. The offender was arrested, released on bail and absconded. A Bench Warrant is still outstanding. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-592).

Award: \$201.00

Application Number 100-592

The victim, a 55 year old garage owner, was assaulted by an individual who had not paid the bill for repairs to his car. He sustained facial lacerations and heavy bruising to both eyes. The offender was arrested, released on bail and absconded. A Bench Warrant is still outstanding. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-591).

Award: \$555.88

Application Number 100-693

The victim, age 29, a taxi driver, was assaulted in a hotel washroom after having received a call to attend at the hotel. He sustained lacerations to his head, requiring twenty-four stitches. The victim withdrew the charges against the offender, stating he was fearful for his safety in the face of threats.

Award: \$339.00

Application Number 100-711

The victim, a 27 year old female, was walking home from a local hotel when she was assaulted and raped. She was struck such a savage blow that the facial bones in her right cheek were fractured. The offender pleaded guilty to a charge of indecent assault, and was sentenced to three years in penitentiary.

Award: \$2,665.37

Application Number 100-722

The victim, a 24 year old female, when entering an office building in the early evening, en route to her brother's upstairs apartment, was assaulted and beaten in an attempted rape. She sustained multiple lacerations to her head and face. The offender was found guilty of armed robbery, other charges being withdrawn, and sentenced to four years imprisonment.

Award: \$686.10

Application Number 100-739

The victim, age 42, when en route out of a hospital after visiting a relative, sustained gunshot wounds in his right hand and elbow, right thigh and left leg, fired from a revolver in the hands of his sister-in-law. The offender was convicted of wounding and sentenced to eighteen months imprisonment.

Award: \$2,721.50

Application Number 100-785

The victim and his family were bound and robbed by two masked men. The applicant is claiming compensation for psychological trauma as a result of this incident even though he has continued at his normal occupation. The offenders were convicted of robbery and were sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-786).

Award: \$355.80

Application Number 100-786

The victim, a 44 year old sales clerk, and her family were bound and robbed by two masked men. She sustained no physical injury but claimed compensation for psychological trauma. The offenders were apprehended convicted of robbery and sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment. (Same occurrence as Application Number 100-785).

Award: \$175.00

Application Number 100-834

The victim, age 16, was returning home from school and was verbally abused because of his cadet corps uniform. An argument developed and he was struck in the mouth by another student, sustaining dental injuries. The offender was convicted of assault and placed on probation for one year.

Award: \$419.50

Application Number 100-850

The victim, a 19 year old medical secretary, was sexually assaulted by two men from whom she had asked directions. Both offenders pleaded guilty to indecent assault and were sentenced to two years less one day in reformatory.

Award: \$651.83

Application Number 100-853

The victim, a 22 year old woman, was raped by a man whom she had met in a bar. She sustained several minor bruises and lacerations. The offender was found guilty of rape and was sentenced to four years imprisonment.

Award: \$1,596.66

Application Number 100-909

The victim, a 36 year old waitress, hailed a taxi and was assaulted by the driver and a passenger. She lost consciousness and woke up in a desolate area with her clothes removed. The offenders were not apprehended.

Award: \$1,205.00

Application Number 100-944

The applicant, a 47 year old widow and her six year old son, were bound and tortured by her daughter and her daughter's boy friend. After several days of this inhuman treatment, the young son was murdered. The victim sustained a multitude of severe injuries and ultimately required psychiatric care. The boy friend was convicted on two charges of non-capital murder and was sentenced to life imprisonment. The daughter pleaded guilty to the charge of accessory after the fact and wounding with intent. She was sentenced to two years less a day on each charge.

Award: \$8,469.12

THE FOLLOWING APPLICATIONS WERE DEALT WITH
UNDER THE COMPENSATION FOR VICTIMS
OF CRIME ACT, 1971

Application Number 200-8

The victim, a 14 year old female, suffered multiple bruises to her face and body as well as three broken teeth in an attempted rape. There is a suspect. However, the police have been unable to ascertain his whereabouts.

Award: \$878.38 with \$300.00 to be paid to the Accountant of the Supreme Court of Ontario in trust

Application Number 200-74

The victim, a 41 year old female, was attacked and raped while walking home from shopping. She also sustained multiple bruises and a laceration to her scalp. Fortunately she noted the offender's licence number and as a result, he was convicted of attempted rape and was sentenced to four years in penitentiary.

Award: \$2,390.89

Application Number 200-86

The victim, a 30 year old male, seduced an 18 year old immigrant. She confided in her parents and they arranged a meeting with the victim. When confronted with the question of marrying the young girl, he refused. At this point, the mother became irate and assaulted the victim with a hammer. She was charged with common assault, pleaded guilty and received one year's probation.

This application was rejected on the basis that the applicant's behaviour was reprehensible and he was, in a large part, the author of his own misfortune.

Application Number 200-93

The victim, age 44, was stabbed twice in the back by his assailant while walking home from a party. He turned, faced the offender and asked "Why did you stab me, I didn't have any money." He was then stabbed in the chest. The offender was subsequently sentenced to life imprisonment as a result of a separate crime.

Award: \$1,630.00

Application Number 200-117

The victim, a 43 year old nurse, was returning to her Toronto apartment. She was stopped and attacked by a man who stabbed her and attempted to rape her. The offender was apprehended by two plainclothes policemen. He was charged with wounding and indecent assault, and sentenced to seven years in jail.

Award: \$1,440.00

Application Number 200-120

The victim, a 9 year old female, was the object of a brutal rape. The offender was sentenced to six years in prison.

Award: \$5,587.00 of which \$5,000.00 was paid to the Accountant of the Supreme Court of Ontario in trust

Application Number 200-124

The victim, age 16, was beaten by another juvenile resulting in a rupture of the right kidney. Apparently there had been police investigations concerning drugs and other matters in the area, and the offender thought he was an

informer. The offender was found guilty of wounding and was sentenced to the Bowmanville Training School.

Award: \$665.00

Application Number 200-125

The applicant, age 47, became embroiled in an argument with a companion whom he was giving a ride to a nearby restaurant. The victim was assaulted resulting in lacerations to the nose, face and cheek. The offender was found guilty of assault causing bodily harm and was sentenced to 30 days in jail.

When granting the award, the Board applied Section 17(1) of the Act.

Award: \$1,022.00

Application Number 200-135

The victim, a 27 year old female, had retired for the night when a man broke into her home, threatened her with a knife and raped her. The offender was convicted and sentenced to four years in penitentiary.

Award: \$638.00

Application Number 200-161

The offender in this case had decided to visit his wife from whom he was separated. Upon arriving at her home, he found the applicant, age 41, present. An argument developed and during the ensuing scuffle, the offender stabbed the applicant with a small penknife resulting in wounds to the chest and abdomen. The offender was charged with assault causing bodily harm and fined \$200.00. When granting the award, the Board applied Section 17(1) of the Act.

Award: \$527.59

Application Number 200-206

The applicant, age 18, was the victim of an unprovoked assault while walking in the Yorkville area of Toronto. He sustained extremely severe abdominal stab wounds. The assailant has not been apprehended.

Award: \$1,511.00

Application Number 200-345

The victim a 44 year old woman, was attacked and raped by a customer in her book store. She sustained severe lacerations to her head and has continued to suffer from this traumatic experience. The offender remains unknown.

Award: \$2,150.00

APPLICATIONS DISMISSED

Application Number 100-168

The victim, age 40, alleged that he was assaulted in the washroom of a bar lounge of a Toronto hotel. He alleges he sustained a head injury and body bruises. He did not seek medical attention nor did he report the incident to the police. The application was set down for a Hearing on two separate occasions but the claimant failed to appear. The Board dealt with the application on documentary evidence assembled and due to the lack of medical and police evidence, the Board could not find the applicant a victim of crime. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-203

The victim, age 43, alleged that he was assaulted on a Toronto street by persons unknown, sustaining three broken ribs and injuries to the left eye. The victim did not report to the hospital for a week after the incident and the assault was not reported to the police. The Board found that the evidence did not establish the claimant as being a victim of crime within the meaning of the Act. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-216

The victim, age 41, alleged that he was assaulted in Toronto on two separate occasions sustaining a fractured jaw in the first incident, and a fractured pelvis in the second incident. No complaint or charges were registered with the police, and after two Hearings, the Board found that, due to the unsatisfactory nature of the evidence, they could not find a crime had been committed within the meaning of the Act. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-300

The victim, age 41, a Toronto fireman, suffered a heart attack after running some distance to an isolated area in Whitchurch Township. He had been told by a neighbour's daughter that a man was indecently exposing himself. The offender was dismissed on a charge of indecent exposure. The Board, after considering all available evidence and hearing witnesses, found that the claimant was not a victim of a crime of violence, nor did he qualify under Section 3(1)(b) or (c) of the Act. The Application was, therefore, dismissed.

Application Number 100-302

The victim, age 62, alleged that while proceeding to his place of employment in Ottawa in his motor vehicle, he was struck in the rear by another car forcing him partially into a ditch. He sustained injury to his knee. No vehicle or person was identified. The Board found he did not qualify under the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-315

The victim, age 59, alleged that he was robbed and beaten by four assailants when crossing through a Toronto park in the late evening. He did not report the matter to the police, and hospital records indicate treatment dates different than those indicated in the application. The Board found that the evidence fell far short of establishing that the applicant was a victim of crime. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-387

The victim, a 36 year old male, was assaulted by inmates during a prison riot.

Having regard to both Section 5 of the Act and the fact that Provincial law enforcement agencies have no jurisdiction over a Federal Penitentiary, the Board dismissed the Application.

Application Number 100-392

The victim, age 25, alleges that he was assaulted without provocation outside an Erieau hotel. He sustained a broken ankle, concussion and brain damage. The charge against the offender was dismissed. The Board, heard the evidence, including that of the offender, and read the transcript of the criminal trial. It found that on a preponderance of the credible evidence, the applicant had not proven he was a victim of crime. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-465

The victim, a 68 year old male, after an altercation in a Toronto tavern, followed the individual outside and as the result of a further altercation, was pushed to the pavement and sustained a broken leg. The incident was not reported to the police. The Board found that the victim failed to meet the onus of establishing that a crime had been committed within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-470

The victim, age 52, while riding his bicycle on a rural road in the Lake Wilcox area, was struck by a car which failed to stop. He sustained a fractured knee and hip. The Board found on the evidence that the injuries sustained resulted from the operation of a motor vehicle but was not an assault by means of such vehicle. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-487

The victim, age 27, alleges that he was assaulted outside a Toronto tavern, when, during a pushing and shoving match, he was given a push, slipped on the ice, and fell into the street where he was hit by a car. He sustained a fractured right leg. No arrests were made and no charges were laid. The Board found that on a preponderance of the credible evidence, the applicant had not established that he was a victim of crime within the meaning of the Act. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-507

The victim, a 51 year old female, was allegedly assaulted by her next-door neighbours after words had passed between the two families. She sustained bruises to her nose and right shoulder. The charge against the offenders was dismissed. The Board found that there was insufficient evidence to prove that a crime had been committed within the meaning of the Act. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-514

The victim, age 41, after leaving the beverage room of a Weston hotel, alleges that he was assaulted in the parking lot when about to enter his car. He sustained lacerations to his left arm and back. The incident was not reported to the police and the Board found certain discrepancies in his evidence. It therefore held that he had failed to prove that he was an innocent victim of crime. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-524

The victim, age 54, alleged that he was assaulted in a Toronto rooming house after a quarrel with a person regarding the return of a shirt that had been

loaned. The incident was not reported to the police and no charges were laid. In view of the circumstances, the Board found that he did not qualify for compensation as a victim of crime. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-536

The victim, age 59, after returning home to Little Current from work, consumed a substantial amount of wine in company with his common-law wife, her brother and another person. He and his wife went to bed and during his sleep, he began to choke her. The brother heard her cries and went to her rescue by pushing the victim off her with his right leg. This action damaged the victim's eye to the extent that it was enucleated. The offender was charged with assault occasioning bodily harm and was found not guilty. The Board shares the opinion of the presiding Judge that no crime was committed and makes no award.

Application Number 100-548

(Same occurrence and disposition as Application Number 100-387 – Kingston Penitentiary riot).

Application Number 100-563

The applicant, a 40 year old fireman, was injured in the course of his duty while fighting a fire at a Toronto store. The owner of the store was charged with fraud and subsequently was acquitted. Application was made on the basis that the criminal offence of arson was committed, however, this fact was not established to the Board's satisfaction. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-570

The victim, a 22 year old female, when hitch-hiking on a Toronto street, was picked up by a passing motorist. They visited various locations in the city, ending up the evening in a beverage lounge. The victim alleges that she was assaulted when being driven home afterwards, but also states she can remember nothing about the details due to the alcohol she consumed. She sustained a fractured nose and a broken toe, apparently when exiting from the vehicle. Upon the evidence and the material filed, including the police occurrence report, the Board was not convinced that a crime had been committed within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-574

(Same occurrence and disposition as Application Number 100-387 – Kingston Penitentiary riot).

Application Number 100-575

The victim, a 40 year old male, acting as a voluntary bartender at a stag party in Baden, sustained a fractured elbow while breaking up a fight. Unfortunately he did not make a direct complaint to the police. The Board, although sympathetic with the applicant, could not find him a victim of crime. The case was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-585

The victim, age 31, was shot in the leg while attending a party in Toronto. There had apparently been an argument between the victim and the offender several hours prior to this incident. The victim stated on several occasions that he "would get this guy himself." The offender was identified and at

what was to be a preliminary hearing, the victim on the basis, that he was not prepared under oath to positively identify the offender, left the presiding Judge with no option but to discharge the offender.

The Board stressed that there is a responsibility on the injured person to assist with law enforcement prior to seeking compensation at the expense of the taxpayer. The Board, therefore, made no award.

Application Number 100-604

The victim, age 32, after registering in a Toronto hotel in the early evening, then went out for a walk. He alleges that he was approached by a female impersonator asking directions. Subsequently a third man appeared with a gun, forcing him to take them to his room. There, so he alleges, he was assaulted and robbed. There were no arrests. The explanation given by the victim was not consistent with the explanation given by him to the police, and other statements given at other times, thus the Board was not satisfied that the applicant was a victim of crime within the terms of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-606

The victim, age 26, alleges that he was assaulted on a Windsor street in the early morning hours. There were no arrests and the police investigating pointed out several discrepancies and cast serious doubts on the story told by the applicant to the police. Also there were discrepancies in his statements to the Board. The Board found there was such serious doubt that the applicant was a victim of a criminal offence that he could not be found compensable under the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-609

The victim, age 64, attended a party at a friend's Toronto home. On leaving in the early morning hours en route to his own home he stopped in at an all night restaurant where he struck up an acquaintance with two men, and remained several hours consuming wine. All three men then proceeded to the victim's apartment where an argument broke out. As a result he was beaten up by these two persons and robbed. He sustained three fractured ribs and facial lacerations. The charges against the offenders were dismissed. Although the Board found the applicant a victim of crime within the meaning of the Act, they took into consideration Section 5 and could only find that the victim was the author of his own misfortune. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-617

The victim, age 28, after being in various Hamilton hotels drinking with his companions, was assaulted and beaten by one of them. He sustained facial lacerations so severe that his right eye had to be removed. The suspect was arrested. However, the victim refused to give the police any assistance, with the result that it was not possible to charge the offender. The Board, taking into consideration Section 5 of the Act, and the victim's refusal to co-operate with the police, considered an award was not justified. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-619

The victim, age 18, while attending a high school dance in Ernestown, alleged he was assaulted with a chain during a fight outside the building. He sustained injury to his right eye and shoulder. The charges of assault causing

bodily harm and possession of an offensive weapon were both dismissed. The Board having heard the evidence of the victim, and the offender, and having studied the Provincial Court transcript of evidence, found that the applicant was not an innocent victim of crime within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-630

The victim, age 60, a Toronto resident, but employed in Saskatchewan, alleges that a succession of people were guilty of forgery, conspiring against him, and obstructing the course of justice. As a result the applicant contends that he suffered physically and mentally from the supposed crimes. The Board, after hearing the applicant finds there is no merit to his claims. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-656 and Application Number 100-657

The victims, a man age 30, and his wife age 27, while proceeding east-bound on a concession road in Tuscarora Township, in a car driven by the husband, struck a mail box which had a cement base and which allegedly had been placed on the pavement. Both the victims sustained extensive injuries. Charges of criminal negligence were preferred against two persons and were dismissed. The Board, after considering all the evidence, was of the opinion that the accident was caused solely as the result of the negligence of the driver. He could not have been keeping a proper look-out at the time, or he would have observed the obstruction on the highway. The Applications were therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-670

The victim, a 14 year old boy, was playing with some other youths in a gravel pit on the outskirts of Lucan and was stuffing firecrackers in the mouths of frogs, causing them to explode. A family picnicking nearby became upset and after being taunted by the youths, the head of the family struck the victim a blow in the face, causing a small laceration and black eye. The offender was found guilty of assault and fined \$50. The Board found that the applicant qualified as a victim of crime. However, his own cruel and wanton conduct was such as to disentitle him from compensation. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-688

The victim, a 31 year old strip tease artist was apparently struck on the left breast by a small piece of metal thrown by a member of the audience in a Toronto burlesque theatre. The resulting laceration was so minor as to require little medical attention. She did, however, experience problems which were related to non-compensable breast surgery. In the opinion of the Board all surgery was undertaken to repair and correct a condition which bore no relationship to the incident which is put forward as the basis of this claim for compensation. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-700

The victim, age 29, when entering a cottage on Lake Simcoe, accompanied by his wife, was shot and killed. The offender was found guilty of manslaughter and was sentenced to five years imprisonment. The Board, after considering all the evidence, found that the applicant, wife of the victim, suffered no pecuniary loss as the result of the death of her husband. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-705

The victim, a 51 year old Toronto female, was beaten by her common-law husband. While the Board is satisfied that the applicant was a victim of crime, Section 4(2) of The Law Enforcement Compensation Act provides that an award for pain and suffering may not be made to a relative of the offender or a member of the offender's household. This lady was clearly a member of the offender's household. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-707

The victim, age 24, was assaulted at a late night party in London. Two of the victim's teeth were knocked out after an altercation, caused by the offender's resentment of the applicant's attention to his girl friends. No report was made to the police. When the injured person does not himself consider the attack upon him to be serious enough to require him to report it to the police and does nothing to bring the offender to justice, he cannot be regarded as eligible for compensation under the Act. The Application was therefore denied.

Application Number 100-723

The victim, a 42 year old female, was severely beaten by a person who was drinking with her in a Toronto apartment. She sustained a broken nose, a fracture of both jaws and multiple bruises. The victim would not co-operate with the police in the prosecution of the offender. Thus, the charge against him was dismissed. The Board, taking into consideration Section 5 of the Act, was of the opinion that there should be no award for compensation. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-740

The victim, age 31, alleged that while walking along a Toronto street, he was approached by three men who came out of a tavern and in a subsequent scuffle he sustained lacerations to his right wrist. The incident was not reported to the police and the Board after hearing the evidence of the applicant, was not satisfied that he was a victim of crime. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-742

The victim, a 54 year old lady, was bitten severely by a German shepherd dog in Toronto. The owner was convicted of having a dog at large. This offence, however, was not considered to be within the realm of the Law Enforcement Compensation Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-746

The victim, a 50 year old female, was attacked and bitten by a stray wild dog, when alighting from her car in Georgian Township, sustaining multiple lacerations to her head and face. The dog could not be located. All evidence pointed to the conclusion that it was a wild dog without an owner. The Board found that no offence by a person had been proven as required by Section 3 of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-752

(Same occurrence and disposition as Application Number 100-387 — Kingston Penitentiary riot).

Application Number 100-765

The victim, a 59 year old Windsor carpenter, alleged that he was assaulted while en route home from a hotel beverage room in the early morning hours. He sustained fractures of two vertebrae in the neck region. The offender was not apprehended. The Board, after hearing the applicant and considering all the available evidence, was not satisfied that he was a victim of crime within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-789

The victim, age 62, while in his room in a Toronto rooming house, alleges that he was assaulted by another roomer. He sustained only minor bruises and contusions. The evidence before the Board indicated that he had been drinking with his assailant for some time prior to the assault, and that he had been involved in a brawl. The Board, after taking into consideration Section 5 of the Act, was of the opinion that he was not entitled to an award for compensation. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-792

The victim, age 51, after leaving a Toronto hotel beverage room alleged that he was assaulted by three men, and as a result sustained a fractured jaw. The incident was not reported to the police. The Board, after hearing the applicant and considering the evidence at hand, was not satisfied that the injuries were the result of a criminal act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-804

(Same occurrence and disposition as Application Number 100-387 – Kingston Penitentiary riot).

Application Number 100-805

(Same occurrence and disposition as Application Number 100-387 – Kingston Penitentiary riot).

Application Number 100-816

(Same occurrence and disposition as Application Number 100-387 – Kingston Penitentiary riot).

Application Number 100-826

The victim, age 34, while a voluntary patient in a Toronto Mental Health Centre, alleged that he was assaulted by another patient. He sustained a fractured nose. He made no report to the officials of the Health Centre. The Board, after hearing the evidence and taking into consideration the condition of the applicant at the time, was unable to find that a criminal assault did occur. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-839

The victim, age 27, alleged that he was assaulted in his Kitchener apartment, by an acquaintance who had been invited in for the evening. He sustained a blow on the head, and neck lacerations. Although a conviction was registered against the offender, the Board took into consideration Section 5 of the Act and in its opinion the circumstances out of which this incident arose was not within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 100-896

The victim, age 53, sustained a fractured nose and ankle when attempting to quiet some tenants in his Ottawa apartment building. Evidence indicated

that he was intoxicated at the time and offered conflicting stories regarding the incident. Further, he refused to reveal the identities of the assailants and would not co-operate with the police. In the light of this, the Application was dismissed.

Application Number 100-924

The applicant, a 70 year old man, presented a great deal of information to the Board, yet none revealed that he had been the victim of any crime within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

**THE FOLLOWING APPLICATIONS WERE DEALT WITH UNDER THE
COMPENSATION FOR VICTIMS OF CRIME ACT, 1971**

Application Number 200-7

The victim, age 65, alleged that he was assaulted on the street en route to his Sudbury home. He sustained lacerations and contusions to his face. The police investigation concluded that the victim fell as the result of his intoxicated condition. The Board was of the opinion that no criminal offence had been proven. The Application was dismissed.

Application Number 200-16

The victim, age 25, alleged that while a patron in the beverage room of a Windsor hotel, he was assaulted and ejected by the "bouncer" of the establishment. He sustained a fractured nose and cheek bone with some injury to his right eye. The charge of assault causing bodily harm was dismissed. The Court held that the applicant had provoked the incident and in fact had struck the alleged offender first. In the light of all the circumstances, the Board was unable to find the applicant a victim of crime within the meaning of the Act. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 200-21

The victim, age 33, was first assaulted by a female with whom he was living in a common-law relationship, and subsequently on the same day by the husband of this female. He had consumed a considerable amount of alcohol. The victim sustained lacerations to the head. The Board, after hearing the applicant and taking into consideration all the evidence at hand, found that he was the author of his own misfortune. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 200-25

The applicant, a 23 year old male roofer, was allegedly assaulted outside a North Bay hotel. This matter was not reported to the police until five days later and there is no evidence to prove how the injury occurred. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 200-26

The victim, age 20, a student at an Arnprior high school, as the result of a quarrel with a fellow student in the washroom, sustained a slight laceration to his right hand. The offender was given a suspended sentence and placed on probation for one year. The Board, after considering all the evidence, came to the conclusion that the behaviour of the victim was extremely aggressive, and that to a considerable extent he was responsible for the slight injury which he received. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 200-41

The victim, a 26 year old unemployed male Windsor resident, was stabbed to death in a tavern brawl four miles east of the city. The alleged assailant was committed for trial and as a result the grand jury returned a "no bill" and the accused was released. The applicant, father of the victim, made a claim for re-imbursement of funeral expenses. The Board, had regard to all relevant circumstances. These included the details of a very thorough police investigation and report, establishing the victim's aggressive involvement. Section 5 of the Act was taken into consideration and it was decided that no award was warranted. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 200-49

The victim, now 82, was at a Toronto racetrack with her daughter when she was allegedly knocked down by two youths. The victim did not notify the police nor were there any witnesses to this incident. As there was no acceptable evidence that a crime was committed, the Application was dismissed.

Application Number 200-55

The victim, age 73, while standing on a Toronto street, was accidentally knocked to the pavement by a young girl who ran out of a laneway. The girl attempted to assist the victim to her feet and then ran off. The victim suffered a fractured hip. The Board, after considering all the circumstances, was not satisfied that the applicant was a victim of crime. The Application was therefore dismissed.

Application Number 200-70

The victim, age 24, alleged he was assaulted by the bar manager of a Hamilton hotel, sustaining the loss of two teeth. The evidence available to the Board indicated that the claimant had been evicted twice previously from the premises the same evening and that he was highly intoxicated. No charges were laid. The Board took into consideration Section 5 of the Act, and decided that the applicant was the author of his own misfortune. The Application was therefore dismissed.
