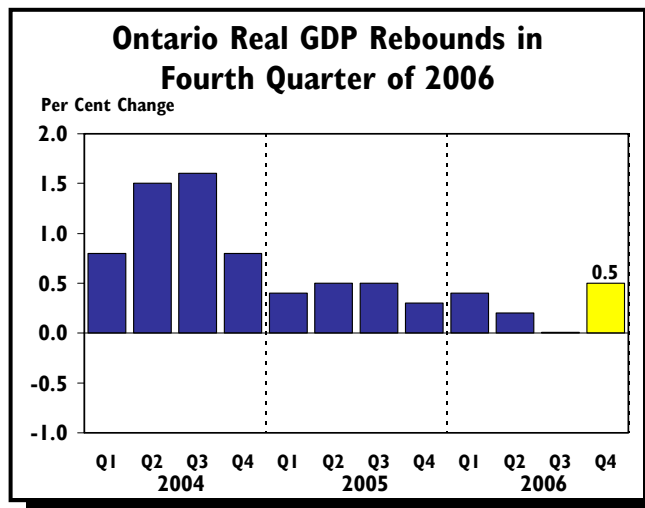


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FOURTH QUARTER HIGHLIGHTS: OCTOBER-DECEMBER 2006

- ❑ Ontario's **real Gross Domestic Product** grew by 0.5% (2.2% annualized) in the fourth (October to December) quarter of 2006, the strongest quarterly increase in two years. The Canadian economy grew by 0.4% in the fourth quarter, while the U.S. economy advanced by 0.6%.
- ❑ Growth rebounded from the third quarter when real GDP was flat. Third quarter growth is now revised up from the previous estimate of a 0.1% decline, based on new information from Statistics Canada.
- ❑ Quarterly growth reflected strong positive contributions from consumer spending, business investment spending and net trade. **Final domestic demand** grew by 1.3% in real terms, the fastest quarterly growth of the year. A reduction in inventories detracted from growth in the economy in the quarter.
- ❑ The largest source of fourth quarter growth was **real consumer spending** which advanced 1.3%, following a similar 1.4% rate of growth in the third quarter. Consumer demand was solid in all areas, especially for big-ticket durable goods such as autos.
- ❑ **Real residential construction investment** increased by 1.0% in the fourth quarter, following declines in the previous two quarters. Stronger resale (+4.1%) and renovation activity (+1.9%) was partially offset by a 1.2% drop in new housing construction in the quarter.
- ❑ Capital spending by the business sector continued to be a significant source of growth for the economy. **Real non-residential construction spending** advanced 3.0%. **Real machinery and equipment investment spending** grew 1.8% in the final quarter of 2006, the tenth consecutive quarterly gain.
- ❑ Ontario **pre-tax corporate profits** jumped 5.7% in the final quarter of 2006, following 2.3% growth (revised) in the third quarter. The increase was broadly based with improved performances by manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers.
- ❑ Ontario businesses reduced **inventories** in the fourth quarter of 2006 by \$465 million (\$1997), following a \$7.0 billion buildup in the third quarter. The inventory reduction was broadly-based

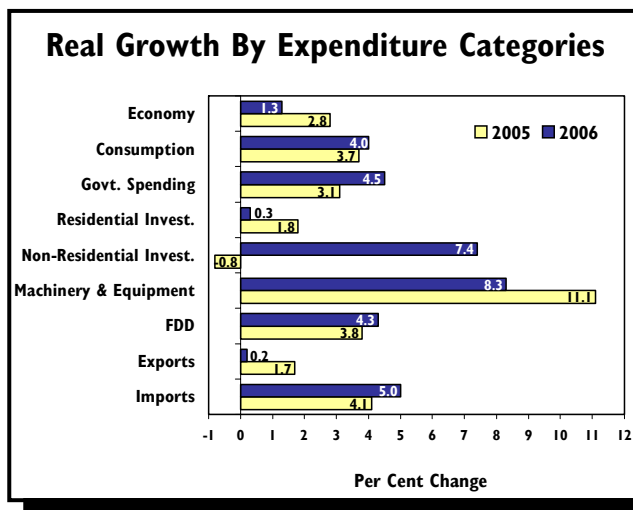


with the largest declines occurring in the manufacturing and retail trade sectors. Motor vehicle stocks fell in the wholesale and retail trade sectors.

- ❑ **Real exports** advanced 3.6% in the fourth quarter, following three consecutive quarterly declines. The fourth quarter increase marked the strongest quarterly gain in three years and reflected in large part a turnaround in auto product exports which jumped 6.1% in the quarter.
- ❑ **Real imports** also grew at a strong pace in the final quarter, advancing by 2.8%, following a modest 0.4% increase in the third quarter. The strong performance was led by healthy gains in imports of machinery and equipment and automotive products.
- ❑ With export growth outpacing that of imports, Ontario's real **net trade surplus** widened by \$3.2 billion to \$23.4 billion (\$1997) in the fourth quarter.
- ❑ In **current dollars, GDP** grew by 1.3% in the fourth quarter, up from the 0.3% increase in the third quarter. Economy-wide prices, as measured by the **GDP implicit price index**, rose 0.7% following a 0.3% increase in the third quarter.
- ❑ **On an industry basis**, economic production advanced 0.4% in the fourth quarter of 2006, following two consecutive quarters of little change. The financial sector led growth (+1.0%), while manufacturing output fell 0.7%.

2006 REVIEW

- ❑ Ontario's **real GDP** grew by 1.3% in 2006, following increases of 2.8% in 2005 and 3.2% in 2004. Ontario's economic growth was below that of Canada (+2.7%) and the U.S. (+3.3%) in 2006.
- ❑ **Final domestic demand** - the sum of consumer spending, business investment and government spending - remained strong in 2006, rising by 4.3%, following a gain of 3.8% in 2005.
- ❑ **Consumer spending** was a major contributor to economic growth in 2006, with real personal expenditures rising 4.0%, the largest annual gain in six years. Consumer spending was strong in all major categories but was particularly robust for semi-durable (+8.7%) and durable goods (+5.2%).
- ❑ A 4.6% jump in **personal incomes**, the largest increase since 2000, helped support increased household spending. Labour income increased 4.4% in 2006, benefiting from a 1.5% gain in employment (95,000 jobs).
- ❑ **Real residential construction spending** grew by 0.3% in 2006, following gains of 1.8% in 2005 and 3.3% in 2004. While a smaller gain than in recent years, 2006 marked the eighth straight annual increase in investment spending on residential housing.
- ❑ Business investment in **real machinery and equipment** grew by a strong 8.3% in 2006, increasing for the fourth consecutive year.
- ❑ Fuelled by major engineering investments in the electrical utilities sector, **real non-residential construction spending** grew at a robust 7.4% in 2006, following three straight years of modest declines.
- ❑ Ontario **pre-tax corporate profits** were little changed in 2006, declining by 0.2%, following a 1.7% drop in 2005.
- ❑ Businesses increased **real inventories** by \$4.3 billion (\$1997) in 2006, the fifth consecutive annual increase. Additions to motor vehicle inventories at both the retail and wholesale levels, along with a significant accumulation of wholesale machinery and equipment inventories,



dominated the build-up.

- ❑ Ontario **real exports** increased a modest 0.2%. A strong Canadian dollar, along with weaker U.S. demand and restructuring in the auto sector, hurt Ontario exports in 2006.
- ❑ Ontario's **real imports** grew 5.0% in 2006, bolstered by the strong dollar and solid domestic demand. This was the fifth consecutive annual increase in real imports.
- ❑ In **current dollars**, GDP grew 2.9% in 2006, down from 3.9% in 2005.
- ❑ **Economy-wide prices**, as measured by the GDP price deflator, rose 1.6% in 2006, up from a 1.0% increase in 2005. Upward price pressure was exerted by Ontario's construction sector, as residential construction prices rose 4.0% while non-residential construction prices rose 3.8%. A modest increase in consumer prices (+0.8%), and lower machinery and equipment prices (-3.5%), moderated the annual inflation rate.
- ❑ Overall economic output **by industry** grew by 1.4% in 2006. Gains in finance (+2.4%) and in wholesale trade (+7.2%) were partially offset by a 4.8% decline in manufacturing.

DEMAND AND INCOMES

CONSUMER SPENDING REMAINS STRONG

Real consumer spending increased by 1.3% in the fourth quarter following a similar 1.4% rate of growth in the third quarter. Consumer demand was solid in all categories, but spending on big-ticket durable goods such as autos was especially strong.

Real expenditures on **durables** continued to grow at a brisk pace, increasing 3.4% for the second consecutive quarter. The back-to-back quarterly growth in durable spending was the strongest two-quarter gain since early 2002. Growth in durable goods spending was led by strong demand for new motor vehicles.

Consumer spending on **semi-durable** goods also grew at a healthy pace, rising 1.9% in the fourth quarter, following a similarly sized gain in the third quarter. Spending on clothing and footwear remained solid, advancing by 2.5%.

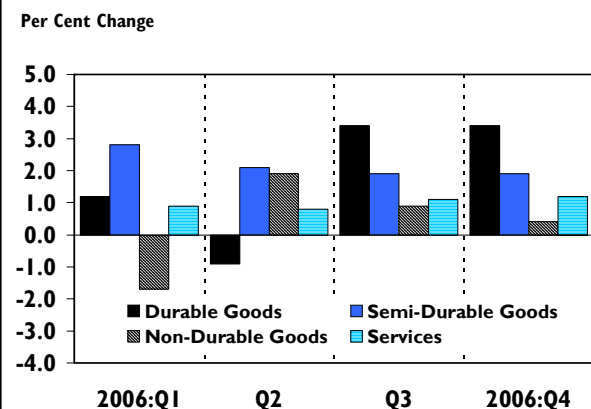
Overall consumer expenditure growth was tempered by **non-durable** spending which increased by 0.4% in the fourth quarter after a 0.9% advance in the previous quarter. Mild temperatures in the fourth quarter contributed to the slower non-durable spending with the consumption of electricity, natural gas and other fuels falling.

Spending on consumer **services** rose 1.2%.

Personal disposable income increased 0.8%, after jumping 1.1% in the third quarter. Labour income, the largest component of household income, grew by 1.4% in the final quarter of 2006, its strongest advance in more than a year.

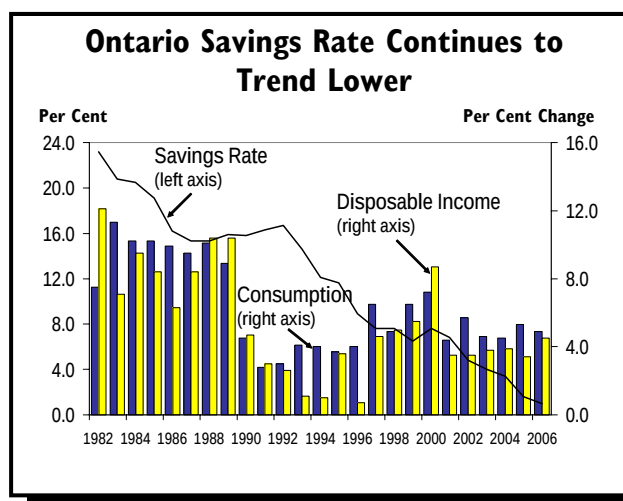
In annual terms, consumer spending was the leading contributor to real GDP growth in 2006, advancing 4.0%, its best performance since 2000. Consumer spending was strong in all major categories but was particularly robust for semi-durable (+8.7%) and durable (+5.2%) goods. Consumers benefited from lower prices in both these categories (notably for furniture, appliances and clothing) over the course of the year. Real spending on services also posted strong growth in 2006, up 4.0%. Non-durable expenditures grew at a more modest (+2.0%) pace as consumption of electricity, natural gas, and other fuels declined, reflecting the generally more temperate weather last year.

Real Consumer Spending Growth Continues



A 4.6% jump in personal income in 2006, the largest increase since 2000, helped support increased household spending. Labour income increased 4.4%, with employment growing by 1.5% (95,000 jobs).

Ontario's personal savings* rate fell to 1.1% in 2006, the lowest rate in over 50 years, as consumer spending in current dollars (+4.9%) outpaced personal disposable income growth (+4.5%).



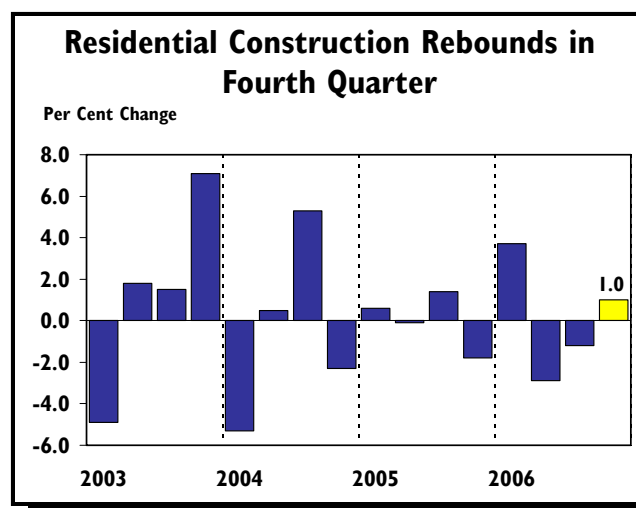
***Note:** Personal savings is defined in the System of National Accounts as the difference between the amount households receive as income, and their expenditures on taxes and personal consumption. It does not take into account changes in household wealth, such as financial assets, home equity and retirement savings.

RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION REBOUNDS IN FOURTH QUARTER

Real residential construction investment

increased by 1.0% in the fourth quarter, following declines of 2.9% and 1.2% in the second and third quarters respectively. The rebound was the result of stronger resale (+4.1%) and renovation activity (+1.9%). These gains were partially offset by a 1.2% drop in new housing construction.

On an annual basis, real residential construction investment grew by 0.3% in 2006, following gains of 1.8% in 2005 and 3.3% in 2004. While growth has slowed in recent years, 2006 marked the eighth straight annual increase in investment spending on residential housing. Over the last eight years, residential construction expenditures in constant 1997 dollars have grown by 56%, hitting a record \$26.3 billion in 2006.



The major factor driving up the value of residential construction spending has been the demand for home improvements by Ontarians. Renovation spending, which jumped 8.0% in 2006, has been growing at an average annual rate of 9.0% per year since 1998, accounting for over 60% of the total residential investment gain over the past eight years. Renovation spending has doubled in value since 1998, from \$5.7 billion to a record \$11.4 billion (\$1997) in 2006.

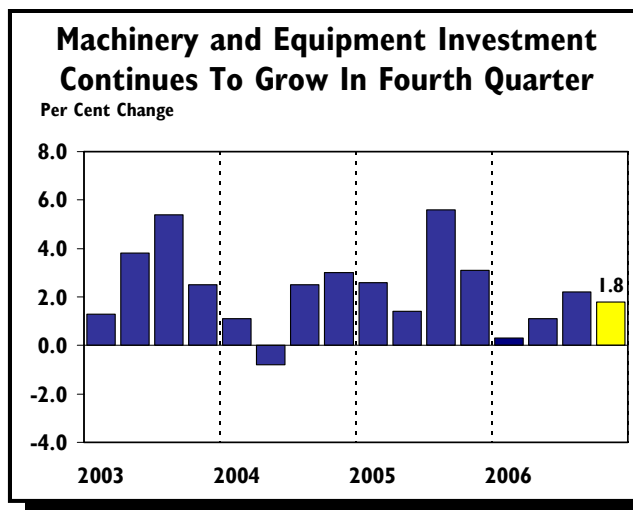
BUSINESS INVESTMENT SPENDING REMAINS STRONG

Capital spending by the business sector continued to be a significant source of growth for the economy throughout 2006. **Real machinery and equipment investment spending** grew 1.8% in the final quarter of 2006, the tenth consecutive quarterly gain, following 2.2% growth in the third quarter. Spending was fuelled by rising purchases of autos and trucks, other transportation equipment and software.

Real non-residential construction spending

increased at a 3.0% pace in the fourth quarter following a 1.5% advance in the third quarter. This increase, in part, reflects strong engineering-based capital spending by Ontario's utilities sector, particularly the electricity sector, which includes power generation, transmission and distribution.

Ontario **pre-tax corporate profits** jumped 5.7% in the final quarter of 2006, following a 2.3% advance (revised) in the third quarter. The increase was broadly-based with improved performances by the manufacturing, wholesale and retail sectors.



On an annual basis, business investment in real machinery and equipment increased for the fourth consecutive year, growing by 8.3% in 2006, following growth of 11.1% in 2005. Investment spending was concentrated in purchases of computers and other office equipment, software, telecommunications equipment, trucks and industrial machinery.

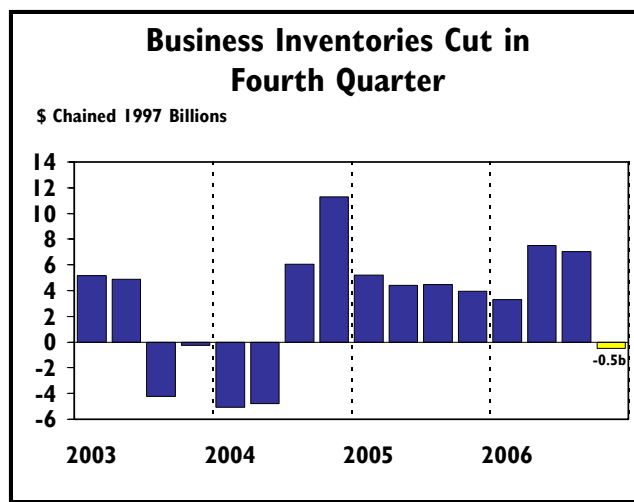
Business investment was also boosted by solid growth in non-residential structures in 2006. Supported by major engineering investments in the electrical utilities sector in 2006, real non-residential construction spending grew at a robust 7.4% in 2006, following three straight years of modest declines.

Ontario pre-tax corporate profits were little changed in 2006, declining by 0.2%, following a 1.7% drop in 2005. Solid profit gains by mining, wholesale and retail as well as the financial sector were offset by profit declines in manufacturing, particularly in motor vehicles and parts manufacturing.

INVENTORY LEVELS CUT IN FOURTH QUARTER

Ontario businesses reversed course with **inventories** in the fourth quarter, reducing their stocks by \$465 million (\$1997) following a \$7.0 billion (annualized) build-up in the third quarter. The fourth-quarter run-down in inventories, the first since mid-2004, was broadly-based with the largest declines occurring in the manufacturing and retail trade sectors.

Motor vehicle stocks fell at the wholesale and retail trade level in the fourth quarter. The decline in automotive stocks coincided with higher auto exports and rising consumer demand for new motor vehicles.



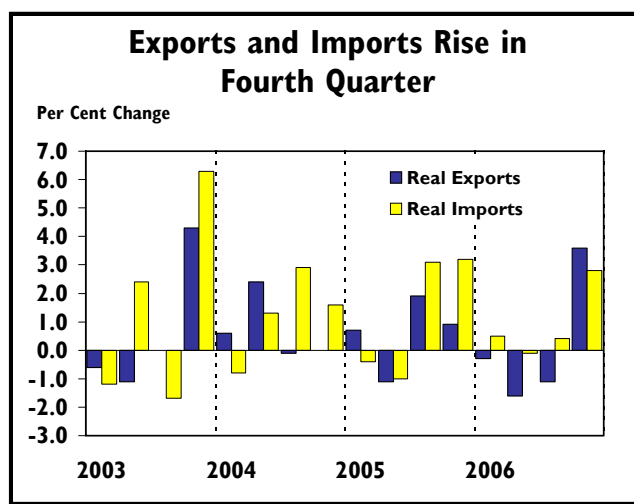
The decumulation of inventories detracted from growth in the economy in the fourth quarter, shaving the equivalent of 1.5 percentage points from real overall growth.

In 2006, despite the fourth quarter reversal, businesses raised inventories by \$4.3 billion (\$1997), the fifth consecutive annual increase. The stockpiling of motor vehicles in both the retail and wholesale trade sectors, along with a significant accumulation of wholesale machinery and equipment stocks, dominated the 2006 inventory buildup.

EXPORTS AND IMPORTS GROW STRONGLY IN FOURTH QUARTER

Real exports surged 3.6% in the fourth quarter, following three consecutive quarterly declines. This marked the strongest quarterly gain in three years and resulted in large part from a turnaround in automobile exports, which jumped 6.1%. The rebound in automotive product exports reflected stronger U.S. demand and a return to full production in a number of Ontario auto plants.

Spurred by healthy domestic demand, **real imports** also grew at a brisk pace, advancing 2.8%, the biggest quarterly gain in 2006. The strong performance was led by healthy gains in imports of machinery and equipment, automotive products and consumer goods.



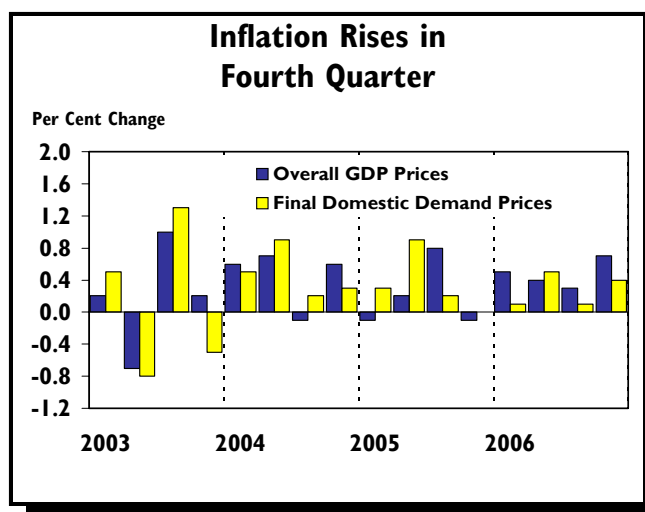
With export growth outpacing that of imports, Ontario's real **net trade surplus** widened by \$3.2 billion to \$23.4 billion (\$1997) in the fourth quarter. The improvement in the trade balance, the first in seven quarters, was a significant source of growth for the economy in the quarter, boosting real GDP by 0.6 percentage points.

On an annual basis, Ontario real exports were essentially unchanged in 2006, increasing a modest 0.2%. The strong Canadian dollar hampered Ontario exports in 2006. Export growth was also hindered by slumping U.S. demand for automotive products, industrial goods and materials and forestry products in 2006. This was partially offset by stronger U.S.-bound machinery and equipment exports. Exports to other provinces and territories continued to gain in 2006, offsetting the weakness in Ontario's international trade.

Ontario's real imports grew at a strong 5.0% pace in 2006, bolstered by the strong dollar and growing domestic demand. This was the fifth consecutive annual increase in real imports. With the exception of lower energy imports in 2006, overall import growth was broad-based, led by strong increases in machinery and equipment, automotive products and consumer goods such as household furnishings, clothing and consumer electronics. Imports from other provinces and territories also continued to expand in 2006.

GDP INFLATION RISES IN FOURTH QUARTER

Economy-wide prices, as measured by the **GDP implicit price index**, rose 0.7% in the fourth quarter, following a 0.3% increase in the third quarter. Strong demand put upward pressure on Ontario's construction prices, with residential prices rising 0.6% and non-residential construction prices up 1.1%. Machinery and equipment prices were also stronger, advancing 1.1%, following five consecutive quarters of declining prices. The increase in equipment prices reflects, in part, the weaker Canadian dollar during the final quarter of last year.



Lower consumer prices, particularly for goods, were a major factor moderating the overall price change. Consumer prices were unchanged in the fourth quarter, following a 0.1% decline in the third quarter. Overall, the price index for final domestic demand rose 0.4% in the fourth quarter, following a modest 0.1% advance in the third quarter.

Export prices increased 0.4% in the fourth quarter, following a 1.1% jump in the third quarter. Import prices declined by 0.3%, reflecting lower energy prices, after increasing by 0.9% in the third quarter.

For 2006 as a whole, economy-wide prices rose 1.6%, up from a 1.0% advance in 2005. Price increases were strongest in Ontario's construction sector as residential construction prices rose 4.0% while non-residential construction prices were up 3.8%. Consumer price inflation moderated: prices rose only 0.8% in 2006, following a 1.5% increase in 2005. Machinery and equipment prices fell 3.5%, exerting downward price pressure on the overall index.

Lower energy prices plus a 6.8% appreciation in the Canadian dollar in 2006 dampened import prices (-0.9%). Export prices (-0.6%) were also lower in 2006.

ONTARIO PRODUCTION BY INDUSTRY

FOURTH QUARTER 2006 HIGHLIGHTS

Output by industry grew 0.4% in the fourth quarter of 2006 following little change in the two previous quarters. Service sector output advanced 0.6%, while activity in the goods-producing sector declined 0.3%. The financial (+1.0%), education (+1.5%), primary (+3.7%), construction (+1.1%) and retail trade (+0.9%) sectors all posted strong growth in the fourth quarter. Manufacturing output was down 0.7%, the seventh quarterly decline in a row. Production in the wholesale trade sector declined 1.2% after ten quarters of uninterrupted growth.

On an annual basis, output by industry grew 1.4% in 2006, the slowest pace in three years. Gains in finance (+2.4%), wholesale trade (+7.2%), professional and administrative services (+3.9%) and construction (+4.9%) were offset by a 4.8% decline in manufacturing.

Note: Output by industry is defined as real gross domestic product at basic prices in chained 1997 dollars. The basic prices method estimates value added by deducting from the value of production the amounts an industry spends on factors of production, such as labour and capital, while creating products. These amounts include taxes net of subsidies on labour and capital inputs, but not those on the final products.

MANUFACTURING OUTPUT DECLINES

The manufacturing sector's output dropped 0.7% in the fourth quarter. This marked the seventh consecutive quarterly decrease in manufacturing output. However, the fourth quarter decline was the most moderate of the year, with monthly indicators showing solid growth in November and December.

Ten of the eleven manufacturing industries included in the Ontario Economic Accounts, representing 90% of the sector's production, reduced their output in the fourth quarter.

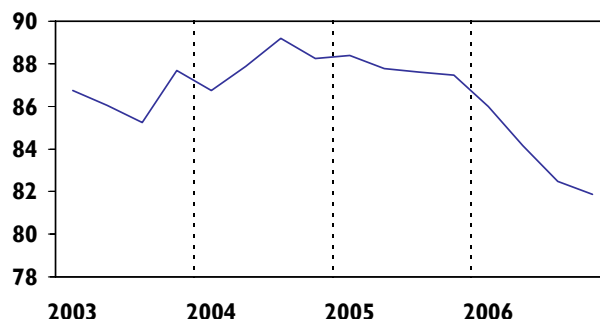
A sharp drop in wood products and furniture production (-6.8%) accounted for more than half of the quarterly manufacturing decline. Output of food, beverages and tobacco (-2.1%) and chemical and petroleum products (-1.8%) was also down significantly. A 6.2% surge in manufacturing of electrical and electronic products partly offset those declines.

Production in the auto industry edged down 0.4% in the fourth quarter, as a solid 2.9% increase in vehicle production was offset by a 3.5% decline in parts production. Over the previous three quarters, auto industry output declined by 3.5% on average, reflecting significant ongoing restructuring.

For 2006 as a whole, auto production fell 5.9%, reflecting weaker U.S. demand and industry restructuring. Other industries such as metal products (-10.2%), paper and printing (-7.1%) and plastic and rubber products (-7.7%) also declined sharply. Overall, manufacturing sector output fell by 4.8% in 2006 following a more modest decline of 0.2% in 2005.

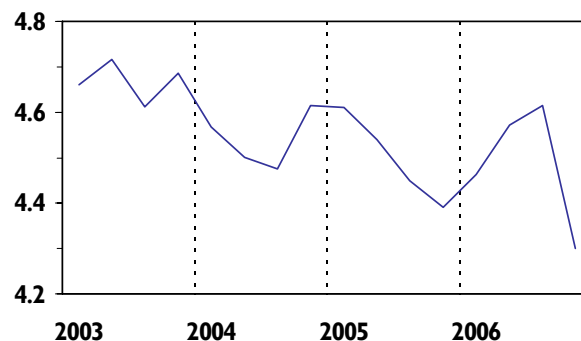
Manufacturing Down in Fourth Quarter

\$ 1997 Billions



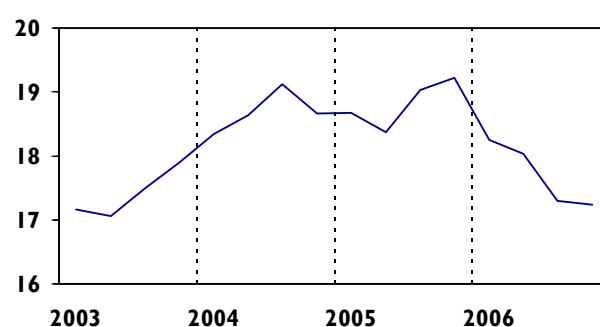
Wood Products and Furniture Output Down

\$ 1997 Billions

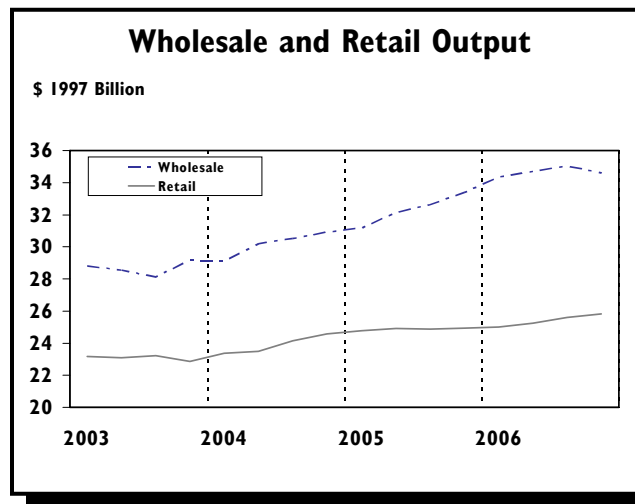


WHOLESALE AND RETAIL

Wholesaling activity declined by 1.2%, the first negative quarter for the sector in almost three years. Wholesalers of motor vehicles and motor vehicle parts led the overall decline for the sector.

Retail sector output increased 0.9% in the fourth quarter, with strong growth by gasoline stations and new car dealers.

In annual terms, wholesale trade jumped 7.2% in 2006, the sector's strongest performance since 2000. Retailing output increased 2.2% in 2006.

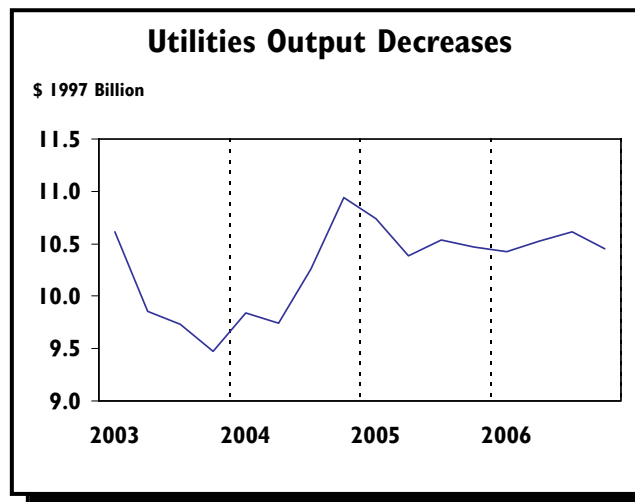


RESOURCES, UTILITIES AND CONSTRUCTION

The fourth quarter's unseasonably mild weather affected both the construction and utilities industries, but in opposite ways. While construction sector output advanced 1.1%, reflecting the longer construction season, utilities output fell 1.6% as energy demand was lower than usual.

Mining output jumped 4.4% as production of copper and nickel rose sharply.

In 2006, construction sector output rose 4.9% on the strength of a 10.5% jump in engineering construction. Mining also grew in 2006 (+2.8%) while utilities output edged down 0.3%.

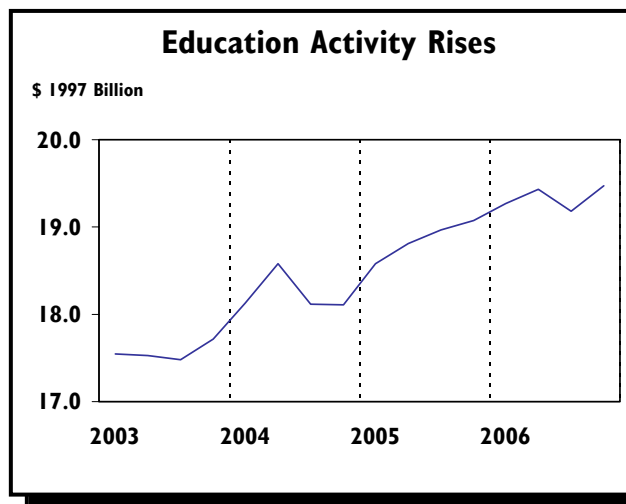


Note: Construction industry output is measured by the value added of the industry. This is a different statistical measure than the construction investment spending estimates included as part of expenditure-based Gross Domestic Product.

EDUCATION, HEALTH CARE AND PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION

Education services output grew 1.5% in the fourth quarter, rebounding from a 1.3% decline in the third quarter. Production in the health care and social services sector grew 0.8%, up for a seventh consecutive quarter. Public administration output was little changed as modest growth at the local government level was offset by declines at the federal and provincial levels.

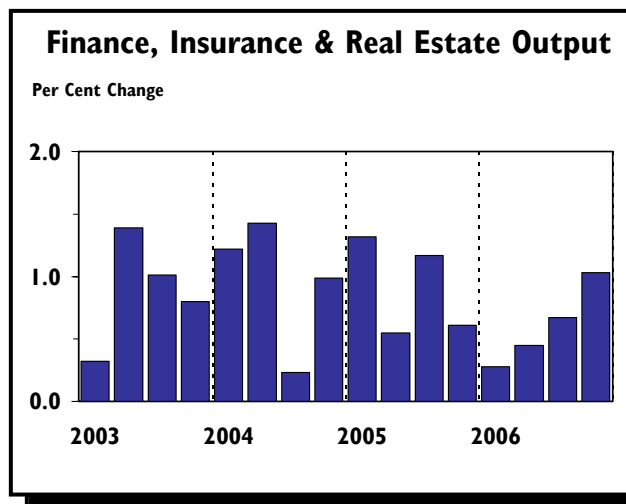
For 2006 as a whole, activity in education services rose 2.5%, following a 3.4% gain in 2005. Output by the health care and social services sector grew 2.5%. Output by the public administration sector advanced 2.7% in 2006, the fastest growth in three years.



FINANCE, INSURANCE AND REAL ESTATE

Real output of the finance, insurance and real estate sector grew 1.0% in the fourth quarter with strong growth in both the financial services (+1.9%) and banking (+1.5%) industries. The financial sector's advance was by far the largest positive contribution to overall growth by any sector in the fourth quarter. Output by the financial sector has been trending up since the beginning of 2003.

In annual terms, the financial sector's output grew 2.4% in 2006, the slowest pace in three years.



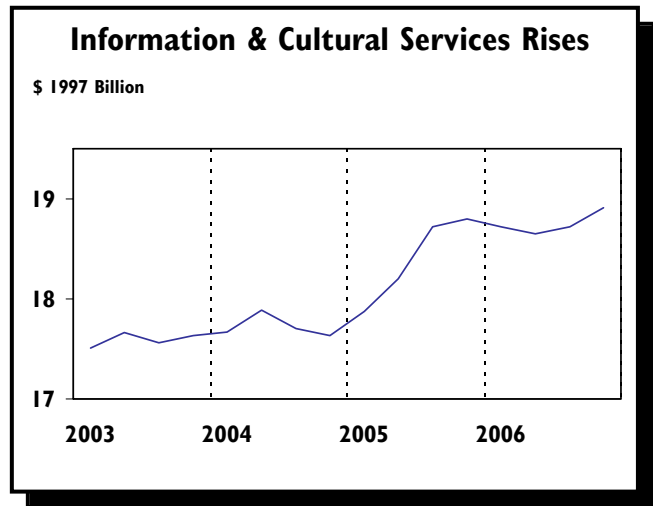
OTHER SERVICE SECTORS

Output in the information and culture sector (which includes telecommunications) rose 1.0% in the fourth quarter, accelerating from the 0.4% third quarter rate.

Accommodation and food services output jumped by 2.2%, the best quarterly increase in more than two years for this sector.

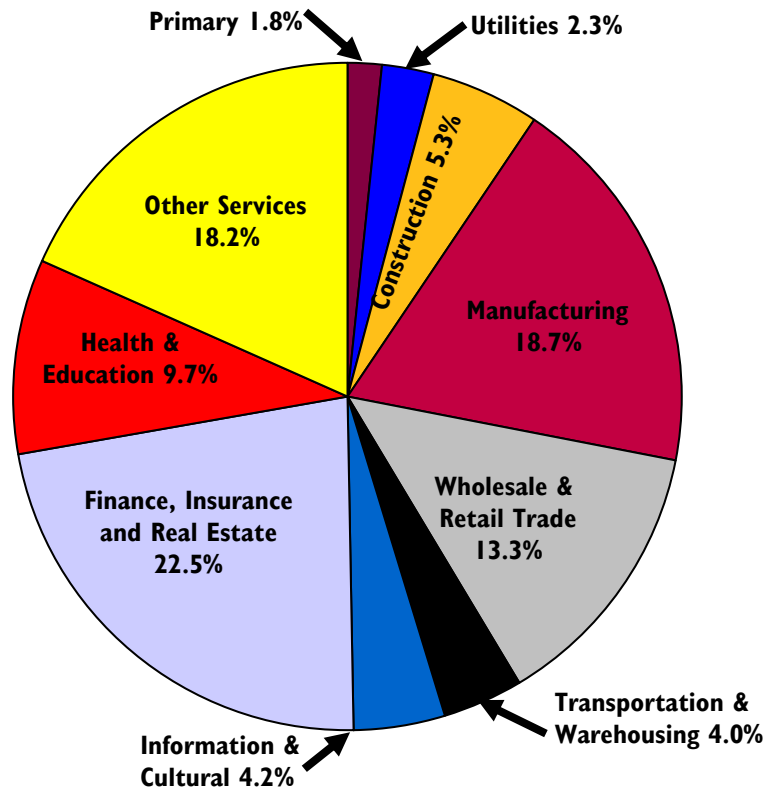
Except for wholesale trade, the only service sector to record a decline in the fourth quarter was transportation and warehousing, where output edged down for the first time in two years (-0.2%).

Annually, professional and administrative services output rose 3.9% in 2006, the best growth for this sector in six years. Activity in the transportation and warehousing sector advanced by 2.8%. Overall services growth was widespread in 2006 with all sectors posting increases in output.

Per Cent Share of GDP



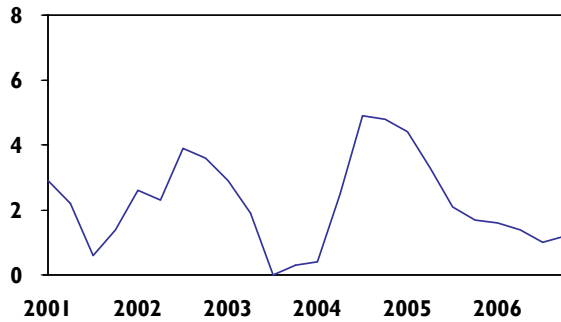

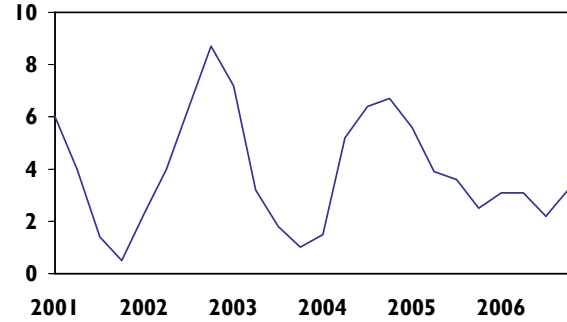
Gross Domestic Product (Chained \$ 1997)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



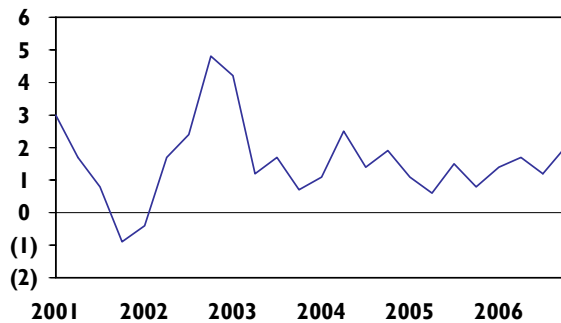
Gross Domestic Product (\$ Current)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



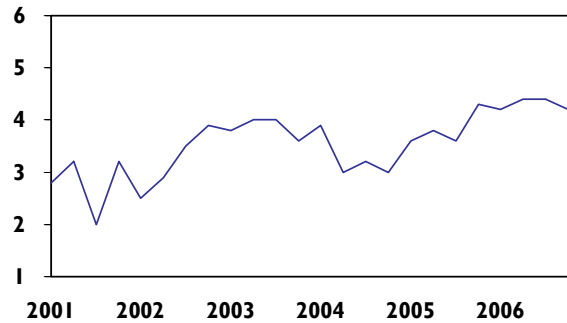
GDP Deflator (1997 = 100)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



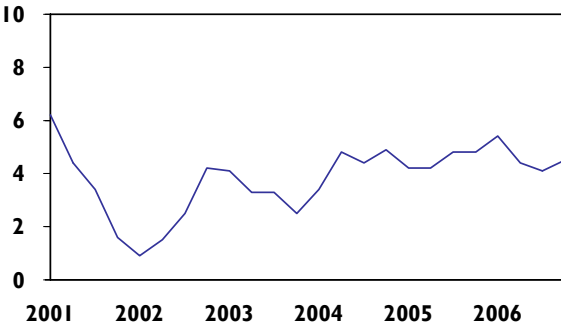
Final Domestic Demand (Chained \$ 1997)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



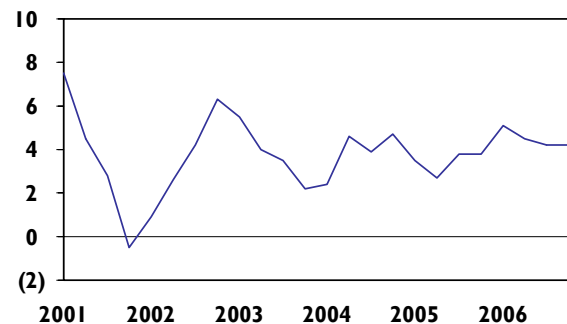
Personal Income (\$ Current)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year

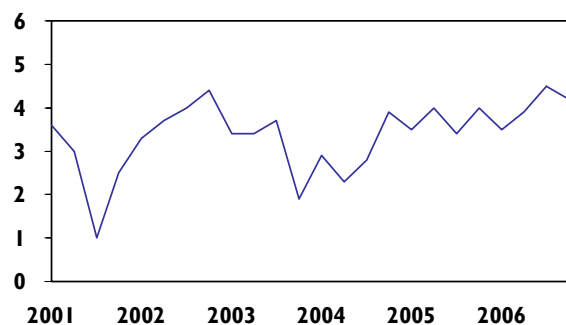

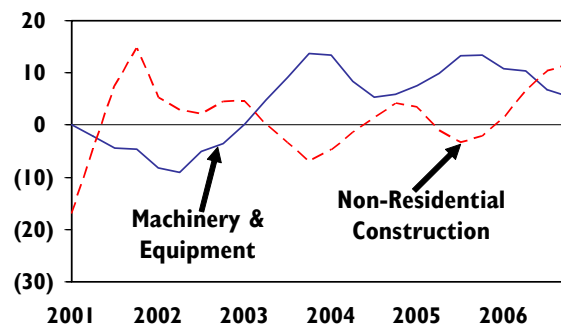
Consumer Spending (Chained \$ 1997)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



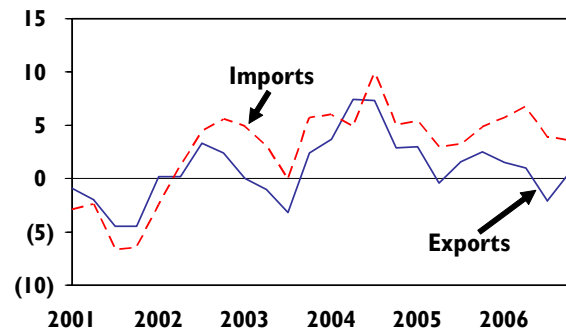
Business Plant & Equipment (Chained \$ 1997)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



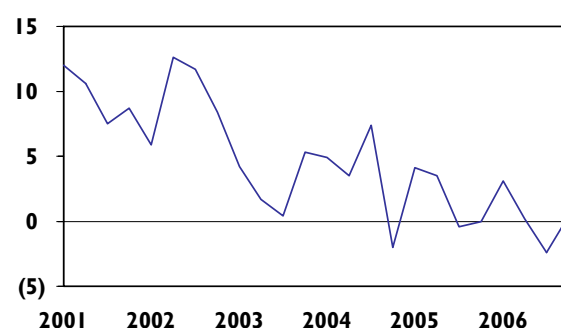
Trade (Chained \$ 1997)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



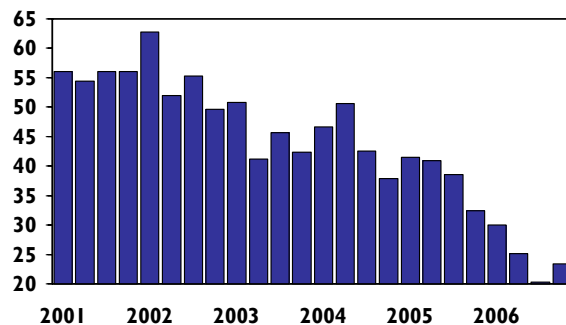
Residential Construction (Chained \$ 1997)

Per Cent Change, Year-Over-Year



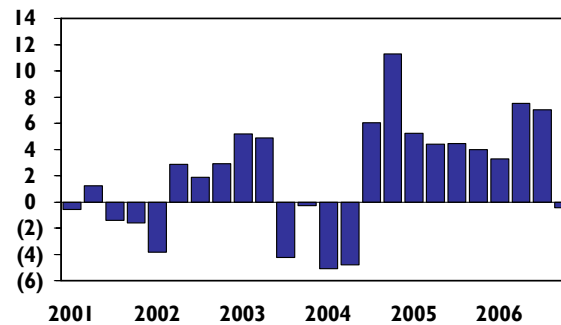
Net Exports (Chained \$ 1997)
