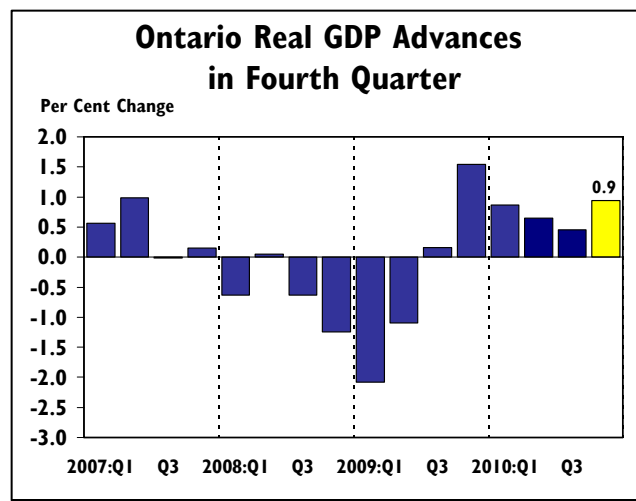

FOURTH QUARTER (OCTOBER-DECEMBER) 2010 SUMMARY

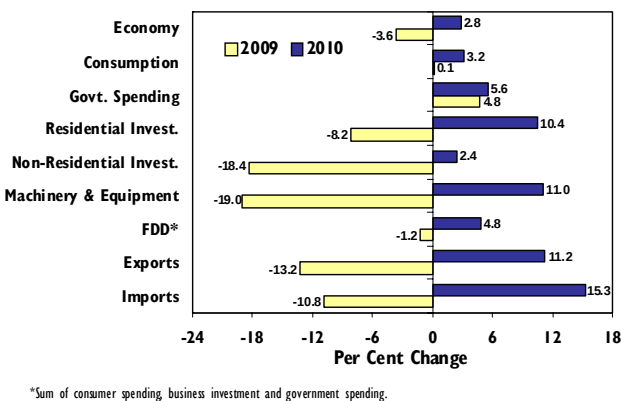
- ❑ Ontario's real **Gross Domestic Product** (GDP) increased 0.9% in the fourth quarter of 2010, the sixth consecutive quarterly gain. Canadian real GDP rose 0.8%, while that of the U.S. advanced 0.8%.
- ❑ **Consumer expenditures** were up 1.4%, following a moderate 0.4% gain in the third quarter. Consumers increased their purchases of autos, furniture and appliances, food and non-alcoholic beverages and natural gas and other fuels in the fourth quarter. Spending on services advanced 1.2%, after rising 0.6% in the third quarter.
- ❑ **Investment in residential construction** rose by a moderate 0.6% in the fourth quarter. Expenditures on new housing construction (-4.4%) and renovation activities (-1.2%) were lower, while spending on ownership transfer costs (+16.3%) relating to housing resales increased.
- ❑ **Business investment on plant and machinery** increased 1.7%, after rising 8.5% in the third quarter. **Investment in machinery and equipment** advanced 1.0% while **non-residential construction** spending grew by 4.6%.
- ❑ Businesses reduced **inventories**, cutting stocks by \$1.4 billion (\$2002) in the fourth quarter, following four quarters of accumulation.
- ❑ **Exports** rose 3.1%, resuming their upward growth after edging down 0.1% in the third quarter. **Imports** declined by 0.9% in the fourth quarter. As a result, the real trade deficit narrowed to \$17.7 billion (\$2002) from \$30.5 billion in the third quarter.
- ❑ In **current dollars**, **GDP** increased by 1.5% in the fourth quarter, following a gain of 1.0% in the third quarter. Economy-wide prices, as measured by the **GDP implicit price index**, increased 0.5%, matching the third quarter rise.
- ❑ Economic production estimated on an **industry basis** increased 1.1%. Production by goods-producing industries advanced 0.7% while services-producing industries posted a 1.2% gain.



2010 OVERVIEW

- ❑ Ontario's **real GDP** advanced 2.8% in 2010 after declining 3.6% in 2009. Canadian real GDP increased 3.1% while that of the U.S. rose 2.9% in 2010.
- ❑ **Final domestic demand** – the sum of consumer spending, business investment and government spending – rebounded 4.8% in 2010 after declining 1.2% in 2009.
- ❑ **Real consumer spending** increased 3.2% in 2010, after remaining essentially flat (+0.1%) in 2009. Personal spending on durable (+5.3%) and semi-durable (+5.0%) goods posted solid gains, while spending on non-durable goods were unchanged. Consumer purchases of motor vehicles and parts, furniture and appliances, clothing and footwear, food and non-alcoholic beverages and motor fuels all increased in 2010. Consumer spending on electricity, tobacco products and other fuels decreased. Spending on services rose 3.4%.
- ❑ **Business investment on plant and machinery** jumped 9.0% in 2010, after falling 18.9% in 2009. Real capital spending on **machinery and equipment** led the rebound, posting a solid 11.0% gain after a sharp 19.0% reduction in 2009. Real investment spending on **non-residential** construction rose 2.4% in 2010, following an 18.4% drop in 2009.
- ❑ **Investment in residential construction** rebounded 10.4% in 2010 after two years of decline. The increase reflects strong new housing construction spending (+12.4%) and renovation activity (+12.7%). Expenditures on ownership transfer costs increased 4.8% in 2010.
- ❑ Strong growth in **government current** (+2.8%) and **capital** (+20.0%) **spending** contributed to the overall GDP growth in 2010.
- ❑ **Real exports** grew by 11.2% while **real imports** rose 15.3% in 2010.
- ❑ **Nominal GDP** grew by a solid 6.0% in 2010, after falling 1.1% in 2009. **Labour income** increased 4.2% while **corporate profits** jumped 13.3%.
- ❑ The aggregate **GDP price deflator** increased 3.1% in 2010. Both export prices (-1.4%) and import prices (-5.0%) fell in 2010. Machinery and equipment investment prices also declined, falling 5.4%, while consumer prices rose 1.4% in 2010, after edging up by 0.3% in 2009.

- ❑ **Real output by industry** increased 3.1% in 2010, after falling 3.5% in 2009.

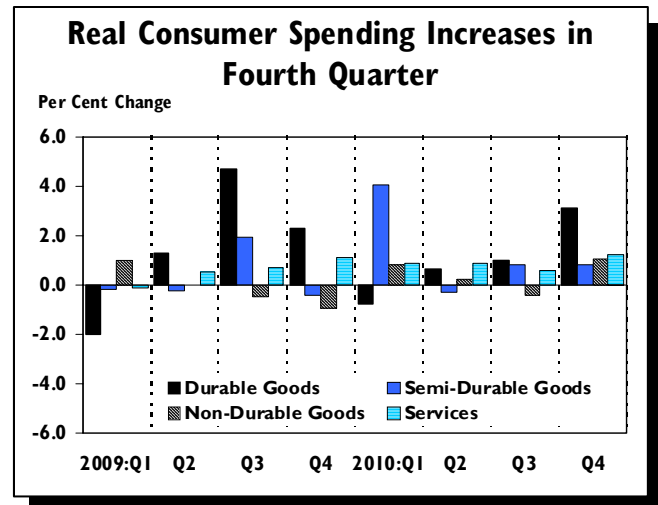
EXPENDITURE AND INCOME DETAILS

CONSUMER SPENDING CONTINUES TO STRENGTHEN

Real consumer spending rose 1.4% in the fourth quarter, its strongest quarterly gain in three years.

Spending on consumer **durables** advanced a healthy 3.1% with purchase of motor vehicles (+3.4%) and parts (+2.2%) and furniture and appliances (+3.3%) all rising strongly.

Consumers also increased their spending on **semi-durables** (+0.8%) and **non-durables** (+1.1%) with purchase of food and non-alcoholic beverages, drugs and personal goods all rising strongly in the quarter.



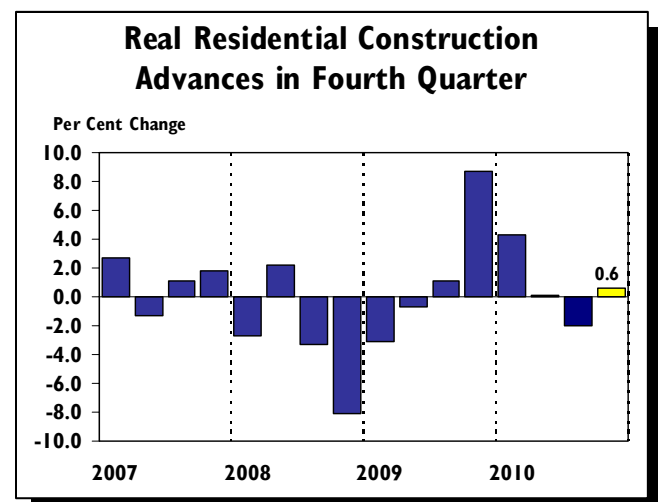
Household spending on **services** increased 1.2% in the fourth quarter, after rising 0.6% in the previous quarter.

In annual terms, real consumer spending grew 3.2% in 2010, after little growth (+0.1%) in 2009. Spending on **durables** (+5.3%) and **semi-durables** (+5.0%) rebounded strongly from 2009 as purchases of motor vehicles and parts, furniture and appliances and clothing and footwear all rose sharply from 2009 levels. Consumer spending on **non-durable** goods remained unchanged in 2010 after edging up 0.1% in 2009. Consumer spending on **services** grew 3.4%, after rising 0.6% in 2009.

RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION SPENDING HIGHER

Real residential construction investment spending advanced 0.6%, driven by a 16.3% jump in ownership transfer costs related to housing resales, which surged 13.8% in the quarter. Spending on new housing construction fell 4.4%, following a 1.3% third quarter decline. Renovation activity also weakened, dropping 1.2% in the fourth quarter, the second consecutive quarterly decline.

For 2010 as a whole, real residential construction investment jumped a robust 10.4%, after declining in 2009 (-8.1%) and 2008 (-3.1%). Higher spending

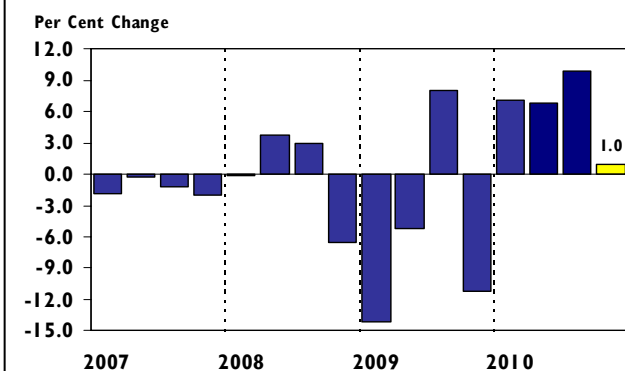


on new housing construction (+12.4%) and renovation (+12.7%) provided the impetus, along with a more modest contribution from ownership transfer costs (+4.8%) in 2010.

BUSINESS INVESTMENT GROWTH CONTINUES

Capital spending by Ontario businesses rose 1.7% in the fourth quarter, slowing from increases in the 5 to 8 per cent range over the previous three quarters. **Real machinery and equipment** spending grew a modest 1.0%, following a sharp 10.0% gain in the third quarter. **Real non-residential construction** spending accelerated, growing by 4.6%, following a 3.3% gain in the third quarter.

Real Machinery and Equipment Investment Slows in Fourth Quarter



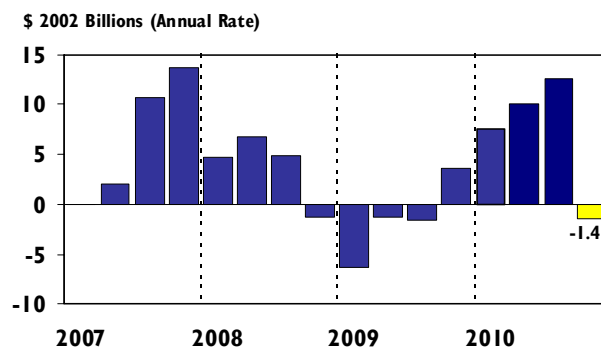
On an annual basis, capital spending by businesses advanced 9.0% in 2010, after declining in 2009 (-18.9%) and 2008 (-0.4%). Business investment in machinery and equipment jumped 11.0%, after a sharp 19.0% drop in 2009. Business investment spending in non-residential structures rose 2.4% in 2010, following an 18.4% drop in 2009.

INVENTORY LEVELS DECLINE

After a build up of inventories over the previous four quarters, Ontario businesses reduced inventories in the fourth quarter by \$1.4 billion. Manufacturers led the clear out, with sharp declines posted in the refined petroleum, primary metal and other transportation equipment manufacturing industries. Retailers also pared back inventories, particularly car dealers, who cleared out older models.

In 2010, Ontario businesses accumulated inventories by \$7.2 billion (\$2002) after depleting them by \$1.4 billion in 2009.

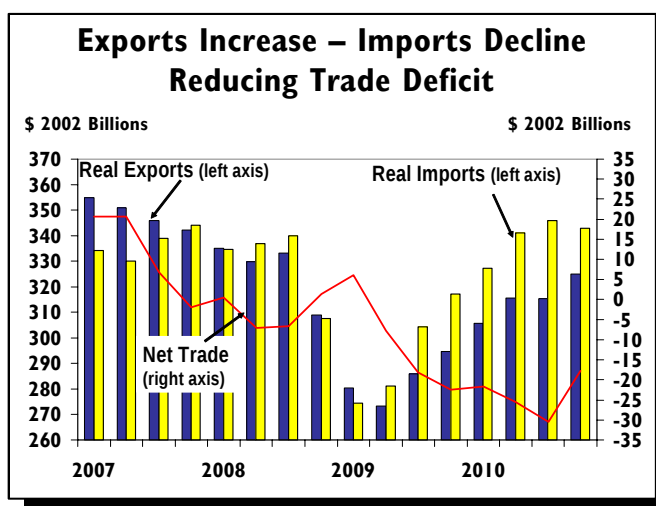
Business Inventories Fall in Fourth Quarter



EXPORTS INCREASE WHILE IMPORTS DECLINE

Ontario real **exports** of goods and services increased 3.1% in the fourth quarter, after edging down by 0.1% in the third quarter. Real **imports** declined 0.9%.

International merchandise exports rebounded sharply, rising 5.8%, following a 0.8% decline in the third quarter. Exports of industrial goods and materials, machinery and equipment and agricultural commodities all contributed to export growth in the fourth quarter.



International merchandise imports fell 1.7% after advancing 1.8% in the third quarter. Auto and machinery and equipment imports fell in the quarter.

Ontario's real trade deficit narrowed to \$17.7 billion (\$2002) from \$30.5 billion in the third quarter, reflecting the stronger pace of export growth.

On an annual basis, Ontario real exports rose 11.2% in 2010, reversing a 13.2% decline in 2009. This sharp increase was mainly due to higher international exports of goods and services which rose 13.1% in 2010 after falling a steep 18.6% in 2009. Interprovincial exports of goods and services increased 7.3% following two consecutive years of decline.

Real imports also jumped in 2010, rising 15.3%, after declining 10.8% in 2009. The import gain was mainly due to higher international imports, which increased 16.9% in 2010. Imports from other provinces increased by 8.8% in 2010.

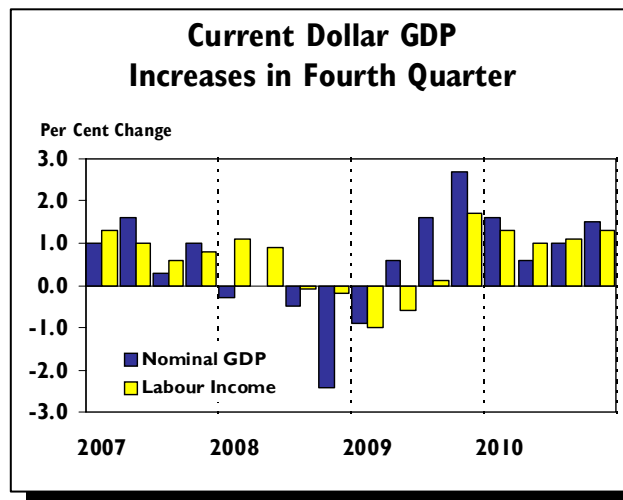
With imports increasing more than exports, Ontario's real trade deficit widened to \$23.8 billion (\$2002) in 2010 from \$10.6 billion in 2009.

CURRENT DOLLAR GDP INCREASES IN FOURTH QUARTER

Gross Domestic Product measured in current dollars grew 1.5% in the fourth quarter. Gains in labour income, corporate profits and net income of unincorporated businesses contributed to the increase.

Labour income was up 1.3%, reflecting growth in both employment and wages in the quarter.

Personal disposal income increased 2.2% exceeding the pace of personal consumption expenditures (+1.7%). As a result, the personal savings rate*, the ratio of savings to disposable income, increased to 3.8% in the fourth quarter from 3.4% in the third quarter.



Corporate profits, on a national accounts basis, increased 6.0% in the fourth quarter. The fourth quarter rise in corporate earnings was broad-based with gains in both the financial and non-financial sectors.

On an annual basis, **current dollar GDP** increased 6.0% in 2010. Labour income advanced 4.2%, reflecting higher employment and wages. Personal income was up 4.5%, while personal disposable income increased 5.4%. The personal savings rate rose to 4.2% from 3.7% in 2009, its highest level since 2002.

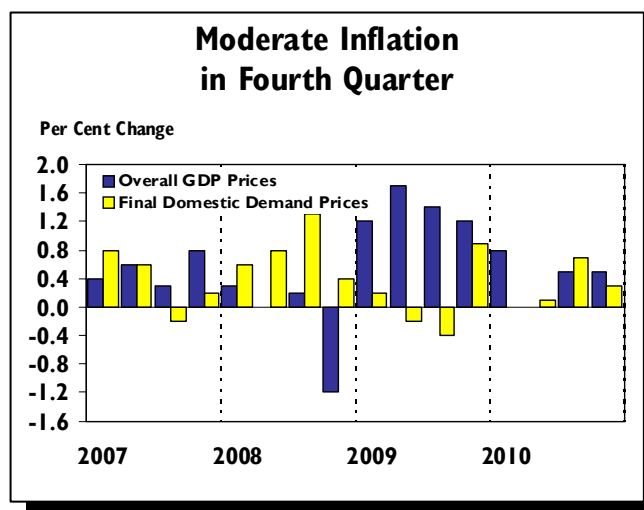
Ontario corporate profits (national accounts basis) jumped 13.3%, reversing a 13.6% drop in 2009. Both financial and non-financial sectors recorded strong earnings.

***Note:** Personal savings is calculated in the System of National Accounts as the difference between the amount households receive as income and their expenditures on taxes and personal consumption.

PRICES RISE MODESTLY IN FOURTH QUARTER

Economy-wide prices, as measured by the **GDP implicit price index**, increased 0.5% in the fourth quarter, matching the third quarter increase. The implicit price index for final domestic demand was up 0.3%.

Prices for **personal consumer expenditures** on goods and services increased 0.4% reflecting higher prices for auto parts, clothing and footwear, gasoline and other fuels. Lower prices for motor vehicles, furniture and appliances and natural gas helped moderate consumer price gains.



Prices for **business investment expenditures** fell 0.6%. **Machinery and equipment** prices continued to decline, falling 2.4% in the fourth quarter, the seventh consecutive quarterly decline. **Non-residential construction prices** edged up 0.1%. **Residential construction prices** gained 0.8% in the fourth quarter, reflecting higher ownership transfer costs and higher costs for renovation activity.

Export prices (+1.3%) and **import** prices (+0.8%) both increased in the fourth quarter.

For 2010 as a whole, the GDP implicit price index increased 3.1%. The implicit price index for domestic final demand increased 0.8%. Overall consumer prices increased 1.4% in 2010, after edging up 0.3% in 2009. Significant increases in prices for gasoline (+10.0%), other fuels (+17.0%), electricity (+9.6%), and motor vehicles (+2.1%) led the rise in consumer prices. Lower prices for furniture and appliances (-1.3%), clothing and footwear (-2.8%) and natural gas (-3.6%) moderated consumer price gains. **Machinery and equipment** prices dropped 5.4%, following a 5.5% gain in 2009. **Non-residential construction prices** edged down 0.5% after rising 1.2% in 2009. **Residential construction prices** gained 2.2%, driven by higher prices for new housing construction and higher ownership transfer costs.

Export prices decreased 1.4% in 2010. The decline in export prices reflected falling Canadian dollar prices for auto, machinery and equipment and agricultural and fishing products. **Import prices** dropped 5.0%, reflecting lower prices across all commodity sectors except energy products. The Canadian dollar appreciated 10.8% against the U.S. dollar during 2010. For goods whose prices are set mainly in world markets expressed in U.S. dollar terms, an appreciation of the Loonie lowers the price when expressed in Canadian dollars of both exports and imports.

ONTARIO PRODUCTION BY INDUSTRY

HIGHLIGHTS

Real output by industry advanced 1.1% in the final quarter of 2010, the strongest quarterly rise of the year. Output in both the goods-producing (+0.7%) and services-producing (+1.2%) sectors increased. The finance, insurance and real estate and leasing (+1.4%), information and cultural (+2.9%), construction (+2.1%) and wholesale trade (+1.5%) sectors all posted significant advances.

On an annual basis, industry output rebounded a solid 3.1% in 2010, after declining in the previous two years. Strong gains were recorded in the manufacturing (+8.3%), finance, insurance and real estate and leasing (+2.4%), construction (+8.4%) and wholesale trade (+4.9%) sectors.

MANUFACTURING OUTPUT SLIPS IN FOURTH QUARTER

The manufacturing sector's output edged down 0.2% in the fourth quarter of 2010, the first decline since the second quarter of 2009.

Five of the eleven manufacturing industries included in the Ontario Economic Accounts reduced production in the fourth quarter. A sharp 7.6% drop in auto production was a major source of weakness for the manufacturing sector. Both motor vehicle assembly (-7.8%) and parts (-7.4%) decreased due to extended plant shutdowns and severe winter weather.

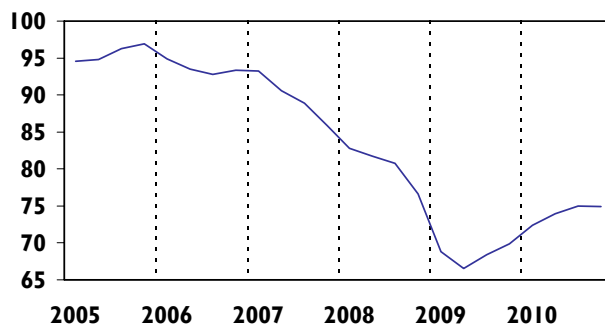
Notable fourth quarter gains were recorded in the "other" transportation equipment* (+17.9%), machinery (+5.6%) and electrical and electronic products (+4.6%) industries.

For 2010 as a whole, auto assembly and parts production surged 30.0%, the first annual increase since 2005 and follows sharp declines in both 2008 (-24.5%) and 2009 (-28.3%). The primary and fabricated metal products (+6.6%) and machinery (+13.5%) industries also posted strong annual gains in 2010. The paper products and printing industries declined 5.0% in 2010, the fifth consecutive annual decline.

Overall, manufacturing sector output increased 8.3% in 2010, following four consecutive annual declines.

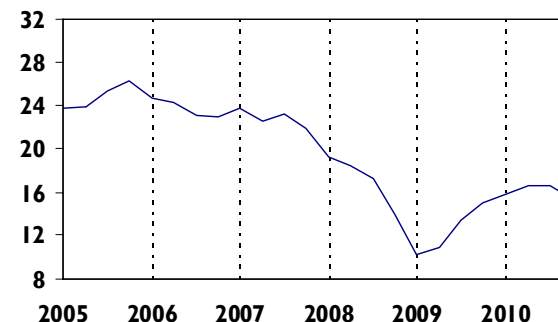
Manufacturing Down Slightly in Fourth Quarter

\$ 2002 Billions



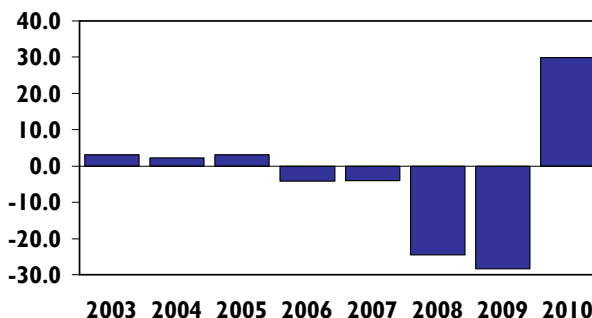
Auto Industry Declines in 2010Q4

Per Cent Change



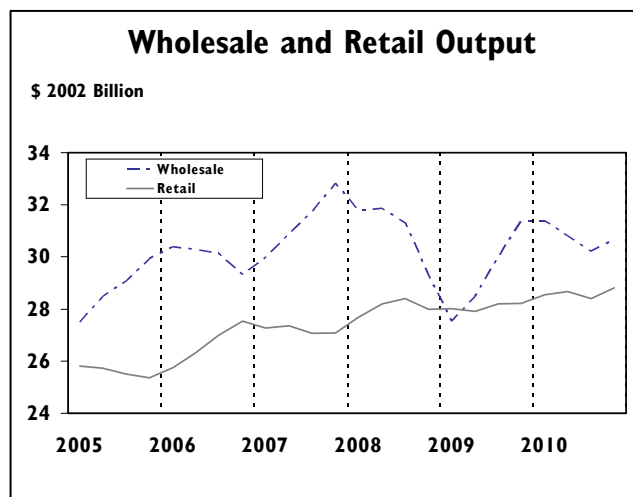

WHOLESALE AND RETAIL

Wholesale trade output increased 1.5% in the fourth quarter. Increased activity by wholesalers of machinery, equipment and supplies contributed to the fourth quarter gain.

Production in the retail trade sector rebounded 1.4% after declining 0.9% in the third quarter.

In annual terms, wholesale trade rose 4.9% in 2010 after declining in 2008 and 2009. Retail trade output advanced 1.9%, after edging up 0.1% in 2009.

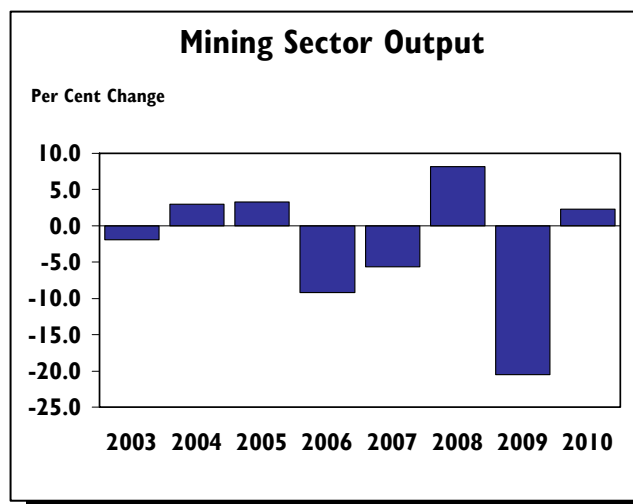


CONSTRUCTION, RESOURCES AND UTILITIES

Construction sector output advanced 2.1% in the fourth quarter of 2010, the sixth consecutive quarterly gain. Residential construction rose 0.8%, while non-residential and engineering construction increased by 3.0%.

Mining output jumped a solid 9.5%, boosted by increased production of copper, nickel, lead and zinc ore. Utilities output rose 0.8%, decelerating from a 4.8% increase in the third quarter.

In 2010, construction sector output rose 8.4%, rebounding from declines in both 2008 (-0.6%) and 2009 (-6.7%). Both residential (+13.2%) and non-residential and engineering (+5.3%) construction advanced. Production in the mining sector increased 2.3% in 2010, following a sharp 20.5% decline in 2009 as the sector recovered from a year long labour dispute in the copper, nickel, lead and zinc mining industry. Utilities output fell 1.5% in 2010, the third consecutive annual decrease.

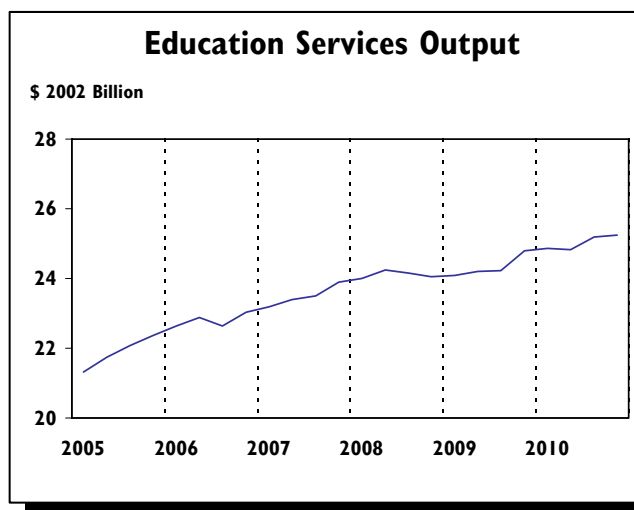


Note: Construction industry output is measured by the value added of the industry. This is a different statistical measure than the construction investment spending estimates included as part of expenditure-based Gross Domestic Product.

EDUCATION AND HEALTH CARE

Education services output edged up 0.2% in the fourth quarter, the seventh quarterly gain over the past two years. Production in the health care and social services sector grew 0.7%, the strongest rate of growth in a year.

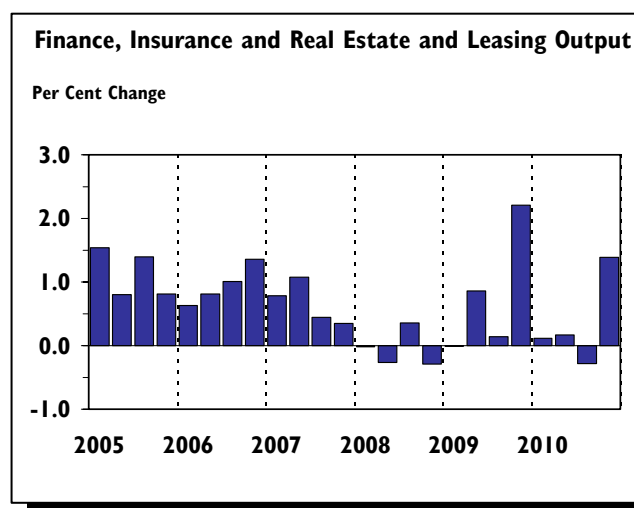
For 2010 as a whole, education services output rose 2.9%, accompanied by strong employment gains (+10,400 net jobs). Output by the health care and social services sector grew 2.0%.



FINANCE, INSURANCE AND REAL ESTATE AND LEASING*

Real output of the finance, insurance and real estate and leasing sector grew 1.4% in the fourth quarter as all sub-sectors posted gains.

In annual terms, the finance, insurance and real estate and leasing sector's output rose 2.4% in 2010, accelerating from a 1.2% gain in 2009.



*This sector (NAICS 5A) includes the finance, insurance, real estate and renting and leasing and management industries.

OTHER SERVICE SECTORS

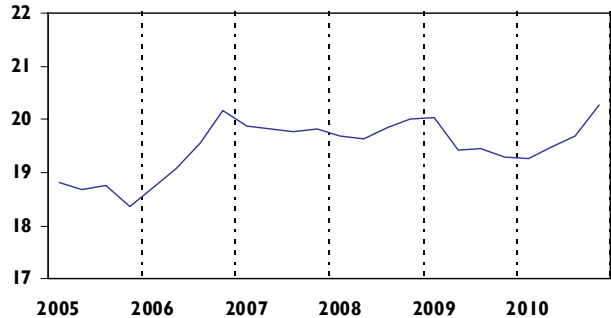
In the information and culture sector (which includes telecommunications), production increased 2.9% in the fourth quarter, the strongest pace of growth in three years.

Professional and administrative services output advanced 0.8%, offsetting a 0.6% drop in the third quarter.

Annually, production in the information and cultural sector increased 0.6% in 2010, following two consecutive annual declines. Activity in the professional and administrative services sector declined 0.9%; while transportation and warehousing output advanced 3.4%.

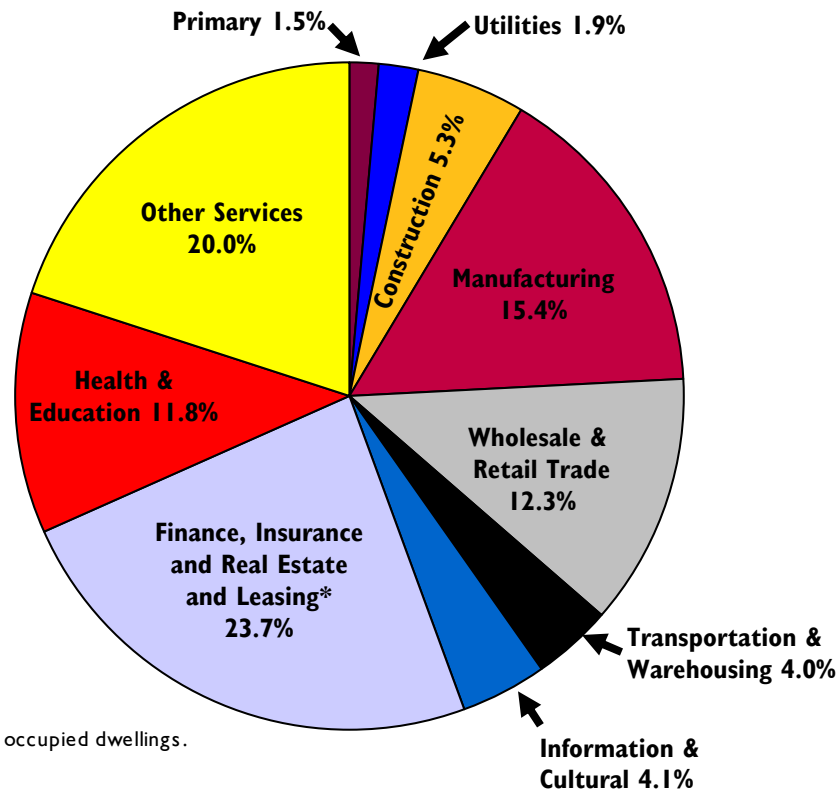
Information and Cultural Industries Output

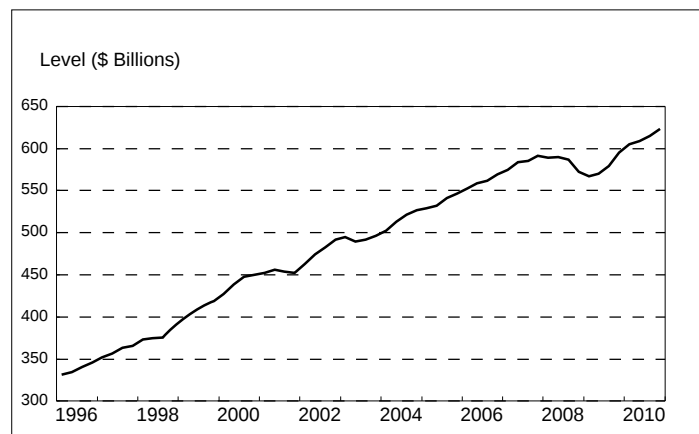

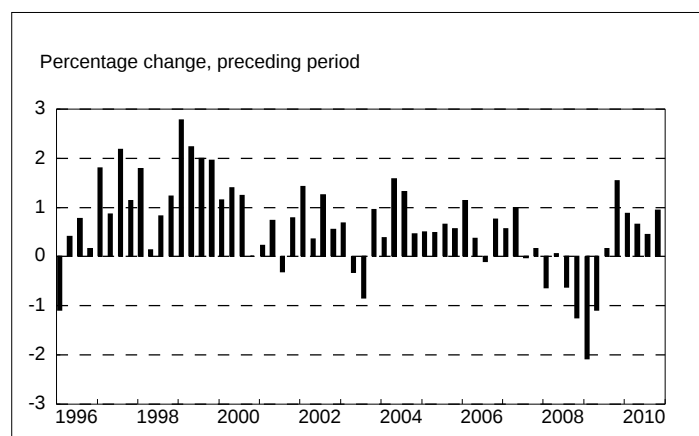

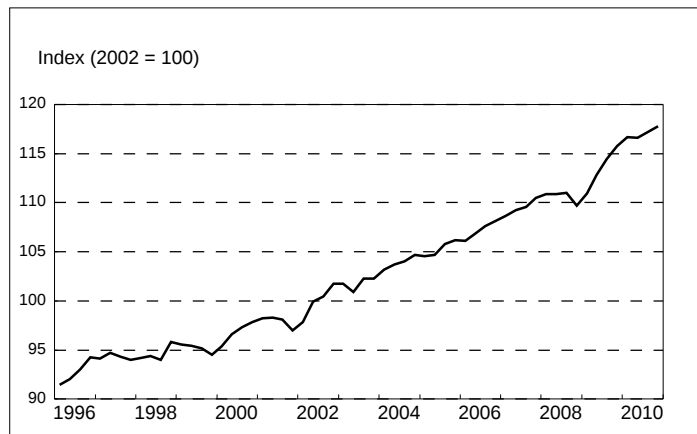
