The Liquor Control Board of Ontario has the honour to submit herewith its sixth report for the year ending 31st of October, 1932.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Forwarded herewith is the balance sheet and profit and loss account prepared and certified to by Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon, Dilworth, Guilfoyle and Nash, who conduct a current and extensive audit of all the Board's activities.

On referring to the balance sheet, it will be noted that the amount of fixed assets is \$178,924.26; this amount represents the cost of land and buildings situated at 154 Wellington Street West, Toronto, and Fort William, less depreciation on buildings. Included also is the value of fixtures and alterations in rented premises, furniture and equipment, less the amount written off.

Other assets amount to \$2,551,760.82, being composed of the following items:

It will be observed that a surplus is shown of \$449,338.38. This is the balance of net profits as yet unpaid to the Provincial Treasurer, accumulated since the commencement of operations in June, 1927, after paying to the Provincial Treasurer the sum of \$44,285,000.00, of which \$9,260,000.00 was paid during the period under review. Contingent liabilities amount to \$1,108,636.70. These contingent liabilities, while representing matters that have to be set up are nevertheless not a fair charge on the operations of the Board for the year that just closed.

The profit and loss account shows sales of \$36,099,561.85. These sales include sales made through the Liquor Control Board Stores and Warehouses and the sales made from breweries and brewery warehouses. The amount sold by the breweries and brewery warehouses being \$13,309,827.40 as against \$22,789,734.45, the amount sold by the Board.

The statement shows a gross trading profit of \$8,426,902.88 and a net trading profit of \$5,847,938.18. This sum, together with other revenue which amounted to \$784,482.30, resulted in a total profit of \$6,632,420.48, which is carried to the balance sheet.

For purposes of comparison, the percentages that the cost of stock sold, miscellaneous earnings and expenses and other revenue bear to the total of gross sales are given for the years 1931 and 1932.

Besides the balance sheet and profit and loss account, statements showing summary of sales and the Board's expenses of administration and operation for the twelve months are also attached. Again, for the purpose of comparison, the individual percentage which all these expenses bear to the total sales is given for both periods on the expense statement.

In addition, all Liquor Board Stores, brewery warehouses, breweries and wineries privileged to sell alcoholic beverages in Ontario as of October 31st, 1932, are set forth on Schedule III attached, and a classification of permit and license sales appears on Schedule IV.

SALES

The continuance of the world-wide economic depression had a pronounced influence upon the Board's operations with the result that the sales for the year showed a decrease of 21.2% as against a decrease of 12.33% recorded during the previous year. The decrease was most noticeable with respect to the imported liquors, and it is well to point out that a very heavy decline in the sale of the liquors in question—a class of goods from which a substantial profit is derived—commenced immediately after the increase in prices became effective on May 9th. The decrease effected all classes of goods sold and was as follows: Imported Spirits, 35.2%; Domestic Spirits, 10.8%; Imported Beer, 27.3%; Domestic Beer, 17.5%; Imported Wine, 17.4%; Domestic Wine, 16.9%. The outstanding reason for the decline in business was unquestionably the reduced purchasing power of the people, a condition which applied equally to our own people and to the large number of tourists who come to us from the United States—many of the latter owning or renting summer residences in various parts of the Province.

The following table gives the usual details of sales, in comparison with those of the preceding year:

Actually, the decrease in spirit and native wine sales was greater than indicated in the above table, as the Board, with a view to taking care of the loss of revenue which would otherwise have been sustained as a result of the Dominion Government on April 6th increasing the sales tax from 4% to 6% and the special excise tax on imports from 1% to 3%, and also to meet the additional revenue requirements of the Provincial Treasurer as advised in his last Budget Address of 10c per bottle on spirits and imported wines and 10c per gallon on Ontario wines, increased prices on May 9th, 1932, as follows: 25c per bottle and 15c per half-bottle on imported spirits; 15c per bottle and 10c per half-bottle on Canadian spirits; 10c per bottle and 5c per half-bottle on imported wines; 5c per bottle and 15c per gallon on Canadian wines.

During the year the total quantity of spirits sold was 931,039 gallons, the previous year's figures being 1,283,634 gallons, a decrease of 352,595 gallons, or 27.5%.

Our stores, the breweries and brewery warehouses sold 8,578,560 gallons of beers as against 10,402,294 gallons last year, a decrease of 1,823,734 gallons, or 17.5%; imported beers sold to the extent of 34,104 gallons compared with 45,679 gallons in the previous year, a decrease of 11,575 gallons, or 25.5%.

There was a very heavy falling off in the total gallonage of native wine sold through our stores, the figures being 1,191,694 gallons for the year and in the previous year 1,505,978 gallons—a decline of 314,284 gallons, or 20.8%. The direct sales from the wineries amounted to 568,109 gallons against 589,577 for last year, a decrease of 21,468, or 3.6%. The total decrease, therefore, in native wines amounted to 335,752 gallons. Imported wines also showed a decrease, 88,703 gallons being sold in contrast with 102,948, the decline being to the extent of 14,245 gallons, or 13.8%.

On June 17th, the Dominion's trade treaty with France expired. Under the treaty intermediate tariff rates of duty applied on Cognac and French wines, whereas, with the abolition of the treaty, general tariff rates became applicable. This resulted in a substantial increase in the duties on these goods, but the termination of the treaty having been anticipated, the Board purchased a substantial quantity of Cognacs and French wines, and as a result, no further increase in price to the public became necessary during the year.

Almost at the close of the fiscal year the Dominion Government, during the session of Parliament, announced that the duties on spirits imported from Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and from the Irish Free State had been reduced from \$10.00 to \$8.00 a proof gallon and wines from South Africa from fifty-five cents an Imperial gallon to twenty-five cents. A reduction in our prices to the public was made on November 16th, of forty cents on Scotch whiskies and thirty-five cents on Rye whiskies, and, in the meantime, the duty on Canadian spirits had been lowered from \$9.00 to \$7.00 a proof gallon. The reduction in customs and excise duties on both British and Canadian spirits and on South African wines was undoubtedly a direct result of the Imperial Economic Conference which assembled at Ottawa last summer.

PERMITS

The number of liquor permits issued was 250,709 resident and 44,191 non-resident, a total of 294,900 as against 329,784 resident and 80,737 non-resident, a total of 410,521 in the preceding year, a decrease of 115,621, or 28.1%.

Sales of the Special Wine and Beer Permit amount to 117,902 resident and 22,176 non-resident, a total of 140,078, which compares with the sales during

the preceding year of 119,326 resident and 29,379 non-resident—a total of 148,705, a decrease of 8,627, or 5.8%.

18,933 Wine and Beer Permits were converted into general liquor permits, and of this number 17,905 were resident wine and beer permits and 1,028 were non-resident; the net issue for the year of wine and beer permits being 99,997 resident and 21,148 non-resident.

The usual co-operation was extended by our Permit Department to institutions, associations and public bodies administering relief, in an endeavour to curtail the consumption of intoxicating liquor by those without means. This work increased to a substantial degree during the past year in view of the depressed economic conditions, and also to the greater number of relief organizations having availed themselves of the services of our Permit Department.

In the City of Toronto all applicants for relief are required by the City authorities to obtain a certificate from the Liquor Control Board to the effect that they do not hold a permit, before any relief will be granted. At all other liquor stores in the Province, the vendors are instructed to obtain a list from the Clerk of their Municipality of all parties on relief, so that should a person on relief apply for a liquor permit, same would be refused.

Lists containing 59,330 names of relief applicants were received from 26 Municipalities, whereas, during the preceding year, lists containing 26,855 names were submitted by 15 Municipalities. As usual a great majority of the cases investigated showed that the relief applicants were not in possession of permits, the number of permit-holders appearing on the relief lists last year being 2,381 as against 2,715 during the preceding year, notwithstanding the increase in our listings of relief applicants of 32,475. The permittees concerned were placed on the "Prohibited List" and will remain there until their names are removed from the lists supplied by the Municipalities.

With the substantial decrease in the number of permits issued during the year as compared with the issue of the year before, it is not surprising that the permit cancellations decreased from 9,078 in 1930-1931 to 4,121 during the year just closed, with 6 orders of interdiction.

DOMINION TAXATION

To the Dominion Government was paid during the course of the year in Customs and Excise duties and sales and excise taxes on spirits, wines and imported beers purchased by us, \$7,963,391.74. There was also indirectly paid to the Dominion Government for malt duties, excise and sales tax on domestic beers, which included 4.4 beer, sold in Ontario, an amount exceeding \$2,400,000.00. The excise and sales tax paid on the native wines sold in Ontario direct from the wineries approximated \$80,000.00. The total revenue of the Dominion Government, therefore, was about \$10,400,000.00.

STORES

During the past year no new stores were opened. Two were transferred to new locations; the total now being 124.

BREWERY WAREHOUSES

At the close of the previous fiscal year, one Brewer's Warehouse (Hawkesbury) was closed, and during the year under review, no new brewery warehouses

were opened, but eight were transferred to other premises. At the end of the year, the total number of warehouses from which beer was sold to permit-holders was 102.

BREWERIES

On October 31st, 1932, there were thirty-three breweries producing and selling beer in Ontario, one having discontinued operations during the year, viz.: Tecumseh Brewery Company, Limited, Tecumseh, and one having recommenced, namely: The City Club Breweries, Limited, Toronto.

In addition four Montreal breweries also were represented in the brewery warehouses.

WINERIES

It may be said without reservation that there has been a vast improvement in the wine industry of this Province within the past few years. The wine sold to-day is of a higher standard than the wine sold in 1927 and 1928. Wineries are better equipped, both in knowledge and apparatus, and those associated in this industry have now a more intelligent grasp of their responsibilities to the public.

The Wine Manufacturers of Ontario must conform to certain Regulations. They are:

- (1) The Regulations under the Food and Drugs Act (Dominion).
- (2) The Regulations under the Liquor Control Act of Ontario.
- (3) The Regulations respecting the manufacture of wine (Ontario).

In view of the stringent wine regulations, and the serious attempts on the part of native wine manufacturers of Ontario to produce a satisfactory product, much has been accomplished, and the buying public may be assured that Ontario's native wines are prepared under strict supervision and careful manufacture.

There is a continuous analysis being made of native wines by the Provincial Department of Health. During the period October 1st, 1931, to August 10th, 1932, there were 483 samples collected and analyses made. This collection of wines for analysis is still being carried on. The Regulation of the Provincial Department of Health which provides that the total volume of finished wine manufactured from one ton of grapes, including any water, sugar, honey or other ingredient which may lawfully have been added, shall not exceed 250 gallons, is being enforced, and an improved and proper wine is the result.

Small classes have been formed by the Department of Health of the Province for the purpose of instruction in the proper analysis of wine. The enrolment consisted of wine-makers from various Ontario wineries, and they were schooled on the subjects peculiar to their work. Scientific methods of determining proper fermentation, up-to-date processing, and approved analysis were demonstrated in a practical manner, and studies were made of the various technical features connected with the manufacture of wine.

During the official surveys, conducted jointly by the Provincial Department of Health and this Board, great stress has been laid on the required and necessary cleanliness and ventilation of premises, and there has been a steady and noticeable improvement in this regard.

Wines, whether in the lowest price tier or in the highest, are subject, as mentioned earlier, to a detailed analysis, and at the present time we feel certain

that all sweet wines sold, including those selling at the lowest price, are more than one year old.

One important feature of our native wine industry in 1932 has been the completion of arrangements whereby sweet native wines are permitted to be fortified with wine spirit. As a result of this privilege our wineries are better enabled to compete with the fortified wines from other countries.

For some time past it has been the policy of the Board to issue no new licenses to wineries and at every opportunity to lessen the number then in existence. During the past year this policy has been adhered to with the result that the 51 winery licenses in force at the commencement of the year were reduced to 49, the license of the Sudbury Wine Company (Davie Bros.), having been surrendered in September, and the license of F. Baylis, Toronto, on October 31st.

A compilation of the monthly reports submitted to the Board during the years 1928, 1929, 1930, 1931 and 1932, results in the following statistics being obtained relative to the gallonage of native wine sold:

DRUG STORES

Pursuant to the relative sections of the Act and Regulations of the Board 1,549 drug stores were inspected by the Board's officers during the year. The inspections chiefly covered the sale and handling of rubbing alcohol, and the finding is that the great majority of Ontario druggists are both willing to and are actually co-operating with the Board in their endeavour to restrict the use of this product for legitimate purposes only.

Acting on a complaint received early in the year that a particular brand of rubbing alcohol, produced in the United States, was being smuggled into, and consumed as a beverage, in a certain Border locality, the Board's Drug Store Inspector interviewed the Customs authorities of that district and received the assurance of the local Collector of Customs that his officers would endeavour to stop the alleged smuggling of the product. Apparently, the Customs Officers were successful in their efforts since no further complaints have reached the Board to date.

Of the 1,429 druggists holding Special Permits, 1,403 sold rubbing alcohol. Only 346 holders of Druggists' Special Permits purchased Ethyl Alcohol, mostly in small quantities; 100 purchased spirits, and 77 purchased wine; all for use in compounding medicines or tinctures prescribed by physicians.

As the result of a complaint regarding the promiscuous sale of Paregoric in a certain heavily populated district, the Board's Drug Store Inspector visited the Narcotic Division of the Department of Health, at Ottawa, and found that

the sale of this product was not increasing and that the Department was tabulating purchases of it, by Retail Druggists, with a view to checking any large sales.

HOTELS

An important branch of the Board's work is the licensing and inspection of the hotels of the Province.

A favourable report with regard to the qualifications of the applicant and also with reference to the sanitary conditions and the fire protection equipment on the premises must be rendered by one of the Board's Inspectors before a Standard Hotel License is issued.

Six inspectors, including one fire marshal inspector, are steadily employed in examining all standard and non-standard hotel premises in the Province, to see that they at all times comply with the requirements.

Standard hotels which also desire a Light Beer Permit may obtain one on application, the joint license fee being \$10.00 as compared with \$1.00 for the standard hotel license only. During the last year 949 standard hotel licenses were issued, and 657 of these applied for, and obtained, the joint license.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

The law enforcement portion of the Liquor Control Act being in the hands of the Attorney-General's Department, the Board wishes to express its appreciation of the co-operation which it receives from your Department, and the Ontario Provincial Police, at all times. The municipal police throughout the Province have also aided materially, and with satisfactory results.
