Sir:

I have the honour to submit herewith the Thirty-third report of the Liquor Control Board of Ontario for the twelve-month fiscal period which ended the 31st of March 1959.

SALES

The sale of spirits, wine and beer from liquor stores during the 12 months amounted to \$172,852,519.11. Sales of Canadian Wine made direct to customers from licensed retail wine stores amounted to \$7,601,634.89. The net value of beer sold from breweries and brewers' retail stores, exclusive of any charge for containers, totalled \$145,633,764.60.

The Provincial Treasurer received from the Board the sum of \$76,000,000.00 on account of profits, licence fees, etc. The Board also created a liability for payments to the various municipalities of a proportion of the fees received from licencees. Such amount totalled \$823,535.75, which was distributed to 259 municipalities. Payments by the Board to municipalities for realty and business taxes totalled \$272,515.98.

The Dominion Government received \$51,225,719.01 during the course of the year in Customs and Excise Duties, and \$8,857,261.85 for sales tax on spirits, wines and imported beers purchased by the Board, and \$46,412,703.63 for malt duties and taxes on domestic beers and wines sold in Ontario, the total to the Dominion Government aggregating approximately \$106,000,000.00.

Therefore, the grand total of revenue payments received by the respective Dominion, Provincial and Municipal Governments was approximately \$183,000,000.00 as a result of levies on alcoholic beverages sold in Ontario during the year. This amount was exclusive of Corporation and Realty Taxes paid to those Governments by the respective manufacturers and licence holders.

On March 31, 1959, there were 17 Ontario and 4 Quebec breweries licenced to sell their products in Ontario.

All brands of beer produced by the Ontario breweries and by the Quebec breweries which were sold in this Province were periodically analyzed as in previous years, thus ensuring that beer sold in Ontario is in conformity with the Regulations passed pursuant to The Food and Drugs Act of Canada.

The Board receives from its laboratory, at the Toronto Warehouse, current analytical reports of all brands of spirits, wine and beer.

WINERIES

The number of wineries and retail wine stores operating in the Province remained at 11 and 51 respectively, there being no changes in number during the year.

The retail store of Chateau-Gai Wines Ltd. was moved during the year from 1388 Queen Street West to 1354 Queen Street West, Toronto.

The following table which has been compiled from monthly reports to the Board shows the gallonage of Canadian wine sold during the fiscal years from 1955 to 1959.

HOME MADE WINE PERMITS

Regulations which became effective January 1, 1940, require that any person manufacturing more than 100 gallons of home-made wine must obtain a permit from the Board. Since that date, 1,545 permits have been issued and 48 cancelled, with the result that 1,497 were in force at March 31, 1959.

PERMITS

Individual liquor permits issued during the year totalled 1,309,124. In addition, 1,220 special permits were issued to physicians, hospitals, etc., including 393 permits issued to druggists. The permits issued to druggists allowed them to purchase limited quantities of spirits for compounding medicine, or for use as a solvent or preservative. They were also permitted to buy rubbing alcohol for resale.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Balance Sheet and Statements of Profit and Loss and Unappropriated Surplus are reported on by Mr. H. A. Cotnam, F.C.A., the Provincial Auditor. Current assets totalling \$30,720,260.23 consisted of the following:

Prepaid Charges for insurance, rentals, etc., amounted to: \$59,108.60

The Fixed Assets are shown at a nominal valuation of \$1.00 for each parcel of land, and \$1.00 for each building, either completed or in process, plus \$1.00 for all furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment and leasehold improvements in stores, warehouses and offices. The real estate consists of the land and buildings at 55 Lakeshore Boulevard East, Toronto; land and warehouse at Fort William, and land and partially built new warehouses at Fort William and Ottawa. Also included in the real estate are 32 store sites containing stores in operation; 19 store sites, against 17 of which charges have been made for costs of uncompleted store buildings and 3 store parking lots. The costs of all lands and buildings incurred during the year (less \$1.00 for each unit), totalling together \$4,324,109.76, have been charged against the Reserve for Contingencies. The accumulations of Reserves for Depreciation have been increased by \$329,701.17, representing the purchases, less disposals, of furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment and alterations to owned and rented premises.

Current liabilities of the Board totalled \$6,075,902.49 and were as follows:

The Confiscated Stock item represents a balance due for forfeited liquor which was purchased by the Board after analytical examination and in accordance with the provisions of Section 116(2) of The Act.

The liability for Mortgages Payable of \$107,566.22 is the total of the balances of two mortgages owing on store properties in Windsor.

The Reserve for Insurance of \$1,000,000.00 remains the same as at the end of the previous year.

The Reserve for Contingencies has been carried for the purchase of lands and store buildings and for the construction of new stores and warehouses. During the year, the cost values of lands and buildings purchased and constructed totalling \$4,324,109.76 were charged to the Reserve, leaving a balance of \$512,572.97.

Contingent Liabilities amounted to \$17,140,164.96. These items represent the value of undelivered orders totalling \$12,712,861.61, the amount of \$3,537,727.75 for Customs and Excise Duties which are payable on the goods which were in bond in warehouse on March 31, 1959, and the liabilities for property

under option and uncompleted building contracts. These contingent liabilities have no reflection on the trading profits of the Board.

The Statement of Profit and Loss shows that sales for the 12 months of spirits, wines and beer from Liquor Control Board stores amounted to \$172,852,519.11.

The same statement shows a gross trading profit of \$70,080,752.68 and other revenue of \$18,676,091.47 consisting of levies on brewers and wine manufacturers and their products, licence holders' fees, permit sales and fines. Expenses and depreciation for the year totalled \$12,650,107.96 (including \$711,376.16 incurred by The Liquor Licence Board). The net income carried forward to the Surplus Account is \$76,106,736.19.

After bringing forward the net income of \$76,106,736.19, a balance in Surplus is shown of \$23,083,440.15. Conforming with the procedure of previous years, the portion of Surplus represented by Accounts Receivable, Inventories, Prepaid Charges and Net Fixed Assets amounting to \$22,327,400.87 has been shown separately as Appropriated Surplus. The remainder of \$756,039.28, being available for transfer to the Provincial Treasurer, appears on the Balance Sheet as Unappropriated Surplus.

For comparative purposes, the percentages that the cost of stock sold, other revenues and expenses bear to sales and net income are given for the 12 month period reported upon herein and the two preceding fiscal years.

A statement showing the expenses of administration and operation for the twelve months is also attached. Individual percentages in comparison to the total sales are given for the 12 months and also for the preceding fiscal year. On March 31, 1959, the staff of The Liquor Control Board and The Liquor Licence Board numbered 1,913 employees, 163 of these being part-time or seasonally employed, compared with a total of 1,867 permanent, including 170 part-time at the previous year end.

A classification of permits and licences issued during the fiscal year appears on the attached Schedule.
